TISHA B'AV OBSERVANCE Sunday, August 9, 1992 - 8:30 a.m.

The ninth day of the Hebrew month of Av is a fast day and a day of mourning for our people. It was on this day that both Temples were destroyed, as well, a number of other tragic events in the history of our people happened on this day. In observing Tisha B'Av this year, we remember that it was on this date 500 years ago that the edict expelling the Jews from Spain went into effect. In commemoration of Tisha B'Av, we will be gathering at the Temple at 8:30 a.m. on Sunday, August 9th. At that time, we will hold a study session on the Scroll of Lamentations, the traditional text for Tisha B'Av. The session will be moderated by Bob Stone. We look forward to you joining us for this meaningful commemoration.

PROVIDE-A-MEAL CONTINUES THROUGH THE SUMMER

Sundays, July 19th and August 16th the Tzedakah Committee will continue with our new "Provide-A-Meal" program for local homeless families. The food is made at Anshe Emeth Temple starting at 1:00 p.m. on those Sundays, and at 4:30 p.m. it will be transported and served at the family shelter in Edison.

Donations of food staples are needed. These include: white rice, bisquick, canned peaches (in their own juice), bottled salad dressing, apple juice and soda (Coke, Pepsi or Sprite).

Your seat reservation will be sent by September 18th. Arrangements may be made for babysitting of younger children during morning services on both Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur. Please note that all seats in the Sanctuary and Social Hall are reserved. No one may occupy any vacant seats unless the Seating Committee is advised of their availability prior to the start of services. Remember, please, that tickets will be required at afternoon Yom Kippur, Yizkor, and Ne'elah services. Ushers will check tickets.

Ushers are needed for all High Holy Day services. If you can assist at one or more of the services, please call Fred Greenstein at 249-6456 or the Temple office 545-6484.

The congregation provides large print editions of the High Holy Day prayer book for those wishing to use them. Ask an usher to provide you with one. Special audio equipment for the hearing impaired is available for use in the Sanctuary. Please call the Temple office to reserve a head set.

Because of physical impairments, some members of the congregation may not be able to attend High Holy Day services. If you or a member of your family is unable to worship with us at the Temple, cassette recordings of previous High Holy Day services will be available. Please call the Temple office to make arrangements to obtain the tapes.

Please also note that there will be a reserved section at Yom Kippur Yizkor and Ne'elah Services for our disabled and/or elderly members. One family member may accompany each person.

PROJECTS SERVING THE JEWISH COMMUNITY

BONE MARROW DRIVE HELD

In March, Anshe Emeth was selected by the family and friends of Jay Feinberg to host the search for a matching donor to help Jay in his battle with leukemia. Jay is 23, and needs a bone marrow transplant to live. The testing at Anshe Emeth added 265 potential donors to the National Marrow Donor Registry. Hopefully one will be a match for Jay or for one of the other 9,000 victims awaiting a match.

The screening done that week was covered by a special grant; usually each test costs \$75. CELEBRATING SUKKOT WITH THE ELDERLY

Reaching out to the elderly has been an aim of our committee. We are working on bringing elderly from local nursing homes to share a Sukkot celebration with members of the congregation and the Religious School. Our rabbis and committee are planning a special program, which will include sharing a meal in the temple's sukkah. TZEDEK SOCIETY

This is a project we are having some difficulty in starting. Many people in our Jewish community urgently need emergency legal advice but cannot afford it. The Tzedek Society would provide such services with only minimal fees. JOB-A-THON

Many people in our community are feeling the effects of economic stress: more than 5% of Anshe Emeth's member families currently are dealing with unemployment, and so are many recently-arrived Soviet emigres.

As this newsletter is being printed, AEMT is working with Jewish Family Services to sponsor a phone "Job-a-thon:" members calling fellow congregants to explore local job opportunities. And since this is an area-wide project, the job listings ultimately will include possibilities identified by other congregations as well.

Through our rabbis, Anshe Emeth has long been involved in helping to link job openings with job seekers. Given the increase in need, we are working to increase the employment network.

Even after the Job-a-thon has been held, we still will be eager to hear about possibilities. COOKBOOK: A Way to Help Feed the Hungry

Family anecdotes, modern versions of tradional favorites, foods children can cook and foods children may eat ---- all will be included in our new cookbook.

The proceeds from this cookbook will be used for our programs to feed the hungry, both in the Jewish and local communities.

RE-CYCLED CLOTHING PROJECTS

The Winter Clothing Drive brought in over 1,200 articles of clothing. Because of this, more than 450 men, women and children were able to dress more warmly this year. Additionally, 125 men and women were able to "dress for success" with re-cycled professional clothing distributed through our "Clothed With Care" project.

Your clothing reached a variety of people, from elderly Jewish poor living on the Lower East Side of Manhattan to recently-arrived immigrants, both Jewish and non-Jewish; and to Ethiopian Jews resettled in Northern Israel. Locally, adults returning to school for High School Equivalency Diplomas and women in vocational and technical training programs were able to attend with the dignity of having decent clothes. In addition, because of the great number of donations, we were able to reach over 100 indigent men, women, and children through Elijah's Promise, which provides meals for the needy in New Brunswick.

The Need for Shoes

Once again, the more we did, the more we learned needed to be done. The clothes helped people enormously, but <u>shoes</u> also are desperately needed. Clothing Chairperson Ren Reinish's contact with an Edison shoe manufacturer has led to the promise of 8 cases of new, returned shoes every other month! (The first shipment already has arrived.) Donations of shoes from Anshe Emeth members also will continue to be needed.

On-Going Help Needed

This rewarding work continues. The community is aware of and responsive to what we're trying to accomplish: in addition to the shoes being donated, an Edison children's store has given almost \$1000 worth of kids' clothes. And many agencies are working with us to distribute the clothes.

There are many ways for Anshe Emeth members to help, from working during the twice-yearly clothing collections, to sorting afterward, selecting and delivering clothes, and contacting retailers who might make donations. PROJECTS SERVING THE LOCAL COMMUNITY

FEEDING HOMELESS FAMILIES

About 75 women and children are helped each day at our area's shelter for homeless families. Their diet, however, is made up almost entirely of food transported from a local hospital. By the time it arrives, in "stay-hot" containers, it's not very hot and usually like mush. There also are few fresh vegetables and fruits available.

AEMT is joining six local churches in providing one meal a month for this shelter. Those already involved report that the children look forward to the days when volunteers appear with meals, and that the experience is an extremely rewarding one.

We will be cooking on the third Sunday of every month. Volunteers are needed for preparing and/or serving the food.

Those doing the cooking will need to help at the temple between 1 and 4 p.m.; those serving need to be available between 4 and 6 p.m.

To provide the meals, we are asking for donations of specific non-perishable items. These will be listed in the Bulletin each month. We also welcome financial donations to purchase the perishables (such as chicken and vegetables) that will be used in these meals.

KIDS' CLOTHES DESPERATELY NEEDED; BACK TO SCHOOL EFFORT PLANNED

During the recent clothing drive we found that children's clothes are desperately needed by the homeless in our area. CHILDREN'S WISH LIST FILLED

The Resource Center for Women and Their Families, in Somerville, serves women and children who have fled abusive homes. Last fall we learned that this shelter needed materials to be used by the children staying there.

In December, as part of our Religious School's "Mitzvah Madness Month," Anshe Emeth's children brought in dozens of items to fill the wish list of these needy kids in our area. Large boxes of craft kits, coloring books, construction paper, glue, glitter, games, scissors, popscicle sticks and socks (for puppet making), and non-violent Nintendo cartridges were taken to the shelter by Tzedakah Committee members Rich and Judy Walters.

The Center will continue to need materials. As this school year ends and you go through your children's games and craft supplies that were gently (or never) used, please put them aside for collection in the fall.

A VISIT TO ELIJAH'S PROMISE

At New Brunswick's Christ Church on Paterson St., within sight of some of the city's most up-scale restaurants, is a different kind of eating place: Elijah's Promise serves those who cannot afford to pay.

By the end of any month, when employment and allotment checks are running out, over 200 men, women and children are served at the daily lunch and dinner programs. No one is turned away.

In February, several Tzedakah Committee members visited Elijah's Promise to survey the guests about their clothing needs. Over 100 made requests, and we were able to fill most of these using donations left from the Winter Clothing Drive.

The guests at Elijah's Promise were gracious as well as grateful. When items we'd selected based on their surveys did not meet their needs, they returned the clothes, asking us to give them to others. Jane Betz, the volunteer in charge of lunch, said she thought it wasn't just the clothes that were appreciated, but the caring shown by our congregation in providing them. In fact, she said that in the past when she has tried to survey the guests they haven't been willing to give their names, but for some reason they did so with us.

Quite frankly, this was a learning experience for those of us who participated. In fact, before going some of us were fearful. We all tend to stereotype, and if we saw most of these people on the street we'd probably cross over to the other side. But when we met them and talked with them, our perceptions changed. We even learned that there was a scattering of Jews among them. Whatever their backgrounds, they're just people, most of whom are working, but who have been victims of circumstances beyond their control.

The need for clothing continues, and we will be collecting more and returning again to Elijah's Promise. We hope some of you will join us. If you can, please call Ren Reinish, 819-9108.

MITZVAH CRIB OVERFLOWS WITH DONATIONS

Over the past year, the Mitzvah Crib in AEMT's lobby has been filled and emptied scores of times. Diapers, bottles, baby clothes, toys and food have been constantly donated. And they have been just as constantly needed by children in our community.

Women Aware, serving battered women and their children, has been the primary recipient of the baby goods collected. Jewish Family Service has requested items, and we also have been contacted about several heart-rending emergency situations. In these, the Mitzvah Crib donations have done more than bring physical comfort to children --- they've given reassurance and support to despairing parents.

The crib continues to stand, waiting for donations of new and gently-used clothes and infant equipment, as well as diapers, food, etc. Thanks very much to <u>Julie Green</u>, for her loving attention to the work and details of this project.

A special note: Our crib has "given birth" to another one -- after hearing about our project, a congregation in Essex County also has established a Mitzvah Crib.

PURIM AND THE PEDIATRIC AIDS PROGRAM

At last count, there were 80 children in the Pediatric AIDS Program at Robert Wood Johnson Hospital. Most of the children range in age from 2-9 years old. They need to come to the hospital regularly for check-ups, and sometimes for treatment. Their stays can last for many hours, and sometimes for days. Staff and volunteers try to find ways to help them pass the time as happily as possible.

We were shocked to learn that the program's VCR was stolen this winter, and through the Tzedakah Committee we located a used machine that is being donated to the program.

In addition, when we celebrated Purim at Anshe Emeth, we also participated in the mitzvah of Bikkur Cholim by remembering these young victims of AIDS, and asking members of our religious school to collect books and VCR tapes for them.

Any child who brought books or tapes to Anshe Emeth's Purim Carnival received two free game tickets. Dozens of books were donated. When word of this project reached the East Brunswick Public Library, they also became involved by donating two large boxes of books from their "Books to Keep" program.

As a result, Tzedakah Committee members Rich and Judy Walters were able to bring many large boxes of books to the AIDS Project's spring party. Every child received a book to keep. Enough books were left to stock the program's shelves to be used by the children when they have their hospital visits. We would like to be able to periodically offer a new selection of books for the children. Please keep this project in mind as your children grow, and as they outgrow their current favorites.

The Need for Help Continues ...

There are many other ways in which the Pediatric AIDS Program can use help, from fund-raising to clothing for the children, household items for their families, office help, and, volunteering to spend time with the children and their families during their hospital visits. The Children's Quilt Project

AEMT also sponsors the Children's Quilt Project, which makes quilts for children with AIDS. The Pediatric AIDS Program has been receiving quilts from this project since 1990. Recently the social worker there told us that the quilt project was one of the first community groups that reached out to the children and their families. She said that the quilts have served a special purpose in the children's lives, and have given very fond memories to their families. Unfortunately, more quilts are needed. PROJECTS SERVING ISRAEL

TWO ETHIOPIAN-ISRAELI FAMILIES "ADOPTED" BY AEMT

Anshe Emeth is one of the first congregations to participate in a new program to help Ethiopian families in Israel. Created by the American Rabbinic Network for Ethiopian Jewry, "Mispachah L' Mishpachah" is a Family to Family Absorption Program.

Under this plan, AEMT members contribute \$10 to \$20 per month. The money goes directly to the families; there is no overhead to this program. The response at AEMT has been so great, that we have adopted two families:

The Tadlas, with their four children (ages 8 through 15), arrived as part of Operation Moses. The father, Tesfahon, did manual labor until illness forced him to stop. The mother has been unable to find work.

When Tesfahon was working, the family purchased their own apartment. Now, even with some help from the government, it is impossible for them to pay for their mortgage, utilities, food, clothes, school fees, etc. Our sponsorship will change that.

The Talele family has six children, between 18 months and 15 years old. When the mortgage law came out for immigrants, the family was convinced to buy an apartment. For the past year they have been paying almost 33% of their \$600 a month income for the mortgage --- but they have been unable to move into the apartment. The father has asked about the selling the home, but has learned he is not allowed to until six years have gone by from the purchase date.

While efforts are being made to help the family with this dilemma, they are having a very hard time. When the older children come home on Shabbat from their free boarding schools, there is no food for them. Our contributions will make a big difference.

We currently are able to provide approximately \$100 a month for each of these families. If you would like to help, please call Deborah Cherniss, 985-9384, or Lee Livingston, 821-9757.

TREES FOR ISRAEL

A SQUARE FOOT OF THE FUTURE

Housing sites for Soviet and Ethiopian immigrants are needed desperately in Israel. It costs \$5000 to underwrite the development of each site.

Alan Zublatt is working with the Jewish National Fund to establish a pilot project for raising the money needed. We hope to have more information on this for the fall, perhaps in time for Channukah gift-giving.

AN ENGLISH RESOURCE ROOM IN ISRAEL

Early this year Danny Siegel forwarded a request to us: an English teacher in Israel wrote saying her school supplies were minimal, and that she needed a small amount of funding to make her language program a success. AEMT's Tzedakah Committee funded the program, and below is her response:

Dear Lee and Deborah,

Shalom! You can't imagine how pleasantly surprised I was last week when I opened my mailbox to find your letter and check! We at the David Stone School can't thank you enough for thinking of us and our pupils. The \$100 covered the cost of educational English games for our "English Fun Room." The pupils come and play during their recess and so far the room is quite a success and the children are benefiting greatly from the materials. There's a little sign on the door now thanking your congregation. It's nice to know that there are some people out there who care.

Israeli schools are in terrible condition. Every time I watch an American movie with a school in it I sigh and wish Israelis could have just a small bit of luxury.

A Trip to "Tzedakah Land"

A Visit with an AIDS Volunteer

At the Tzedakah Committee's April meeting, Anshe Emeth member Sue Gran spoke about her work with the Pediatric AIDS Program. There is a tremendous need for volunteers, both when the children are hospitalized, and when they are being seen for exams at the clinic.

Not everyone is capable of working directly with the children and this is recognized. Sue outlined various ways of being helpful to the children and their families. These ranged from doing fund-raising to helping at parties and outings for the children, donating household items for the families (many of whom are in serious financial straits), and doing office work to relieve the staff. Of course, if you think you would be able to work directly with the children, which sometimes involves feeding, holding, and general care, the need for your help is tremendous.

THE NEW JERSEY TOURNAMENT OF CHAMPIONS: "HANDS ON" HELP NEEDED

Children with learning disabilities and physical challenges often don't have the chance to participate in sports training and athletic competition. The New Jersey Tournament of Champions is a state-wide program that exists to give such experiences to all children ages 3 through 21 who have been classified by their school systems as learning disabled of physically handicapped. For the children in the program, it is the only time they ever will compete successfully in athletic games.

Formed in 1972, the Tournament of Champions remains the only program of its kind in the United States --- and to maintain its activities, it needs help: people to arrange and publicize events, people to be there to help run the events. HELP FROM THE RELIGIOUS SCHOOL

Although every grade in the Religious School has its own tzedakah project, several times during this year the temple's Tzedakah Committee has called upon the children for help. The results have been notable.

During the first clothing drive, when the need for shoes became clear, notices sent home through the Religious School brought in a wealth of shoes in all sizes, in excellent condition. AETY members also helped to improve our storage area: a Sunday was spent cleaning and painting the large donated space.

For Mitzvah Madness Month, the students donated craft items for the children at Somerville's Resource Center for Women and Children. This is a shelter for women and children who have fled abusive homes, and our students filled the children's "wish list" with many art activities and craft supplies.

In March, the Purim Carnival offered another opportunity for mitzvahs: AEMT's children were asked to bring books and VCR tapes for the youngsters at the local Pediatric AIDS Program. Once again, the donations were impressive, and large boxes of books and tapes were sent to the program.

In another AIDS-related project, children in the Saturday morning elective program made a quilt for **The Children's Quilt Project**, an AEMT-sponsored activity that provides quilts for children with AIDS.

Finally, this year the **Religious School's Summer Tzedakah Project** will be done in partnership with the Tzedakah Committee: New Brunswick High School has opened a day care center so that teen-age parents can remain in school. The center staff have asked AEMT for donations of toys that can be used with the infants and toddlers. Our children will be bringing in gently-used or new items when they return to Religious School in September.

During the summer, lack of volunteers at Elijah's Promise may mean that the hungry are not fed: in the most recent of our clothing deliveries to this local soup kitchen for the homeless, we learned that lunch would not be served because there were not enough volunteers available.
