# **MESSAGE TO OUR TEMPLE FAMILY**

The ancient world saw Israel at the center of the map, with Jerusalem at the center of Israel, and the Temple at the center of Jerusalem. What a fascinating way to perceive their ancient world.

It is easy to look back to biblical times to see how the Temple fit into this picture. People lived closer together and they needed a central location to barter or trade for goods or services; a central place to discuss ideas and to communicate with others; a place to seek help in troubled times, and a place to give thanks for the good things in life. This Temple was truly the center of their world.

As we look at Anshe Emeth today, our first thought is that its role in modern society is quite different...or is it really? I believe, our Temple is the center of our community and will become more and more in the years to come.

We are a *House of Prayer*, a place where families congregate to satisfy their religious needs. We celebrate in good times and seek help from the Clergy in times of trouble. We celebrate the birth of our children by naming them at the Temple. We now have "Gan Yeladeen" a child care and day care facility at the Temple. We are a *House of Study*, a place where we educate our children through High School; a place where we educate ourselves with programs like the "Keepers of Jewish Excellence", adult education series and wonderful musical programs. We reach out into the community to educate those who wish to enrich and renew their Jewish experience, and to those who wish to affiliate with our People. We are a *House of Assembly*, a place where we provide for the home bound and homeless. Through the help and guidance of the Tzedakah and Caring Community Committees we have provided for those of us who have fallen on hard times. In this troubled economic period we held a Job-a-thon and will continue to be a clearing house in order to help our unemployed family members find jobs, and to help our families from the Soviet Union start a new life here.

I am very proud of the accomplishments at Anshe Emeth and in September when one of our officers or trustees contact you they will want to know what suggestions you can make to improve our Temple programs, and also to ask you to reach as deeply as possibly and make a pledge to keep our programs going.

Please, at this time remember Hillel's, most poignant question "If I am not for myself, who will be for me, and if I am only for myself, what am I? And if not now, when?"

#### WORSHIP SERVICES - SEPTEMBER 1992

FRIDAY. September 11 - Another Presidential Election Rabbi Miller will speak about the current presidential election campaign and its significance for us as Jews. It is much more than politics as usual, or a media event. The campaign is a challenge for all of America and a test of our mettle as a nation.

FRIDAY. September 18 - From the Outside Looking In This summer, for the third time, Rabbi Paskoff taught a regional Introduction to Judaism course. As usual, this proved to be an enlightening experience for the instructor, as well as, hopefully, for the class. Together we will learn through the eyes of those confronting Judaism for the first time.

#### FRIDAY, September 25 - Articles of Faith

In his new book, preeminent Reform Jewish theologian Eugene Borowitz comments on how easy it is for us to express our doubts, while it is so difficult to express exactly what it is we do believe in. Utilizing the model of medieval Jewish philosopher, Moses Maimondes, Rabbi Paskoff will attempt to lay out articles of faith for the modern Jew.

Remember, please, that tickets will be required at afternoon Yom Kippur, Yizkor, and Ne'elah services. Ushers will collect tickets.

Ushers are needed for all High Holy Day services. If you can assist at one or more of the services, please call Fred Greenstein at 249-6456 or the Temple office 545-6484.

The congregation provides large print editions of the High Holy Day prayer book for those wishing to use them. Ask an usher to provide you with one. Special audio equipment for the hearing impaired is available for use in the Sanctuary. Please call the Temple office to reserve a head set.

Because of physical impairments, some members of the congregation may not be able to attend High Holy Day services. If you or a member of your family is unable to worship with us at the Temple, cassette recordings of previous High Holy Day services will be available. Please call the Temple office to make arrangements to obtain the tapes.

Please also note that there will be a reserved section at Yom Kippur Yizkor and Ne'elah Services for our disabled and/or elderly members. One family member may accompany each person.

The office will be closed on Monday, September 28th, in observance of Rosh Hashanah.

# ROSH HASHANAH 5753 HOME CEREMONIAL READING

During the course of the festive meal on Rosh Hashanah evening, pieces of apple that have been dipped in honey are distributed to the participants and the following is read either in unison or responsively.

For centuries, Jews have celebrated Rosh Hashanah by eating apples and honey. We express our hopes and prayers that this year ahead may be especially sweet for ourselves, our loved ones and all the Jewish people around the world.

Seated at the festive table, we remember our precious heritage. We understand that the new year is a sacred time for reflection and hope, as we pray for guidance to meet the challenges of the coming year.

The beginning of year 5753 is marked by extraordinary events.

We are witnessing the redemption of Ethiopian Jews in the land of Israel. May their memories of famine and danger fade, as they experience the joy of reunification with their families.

We are witnessing the emigration of more than 250,000 Soviet Jews who have been isolated from the mainstream of the Jewish world for decades. May they find empathy and caring as they establish new homes among the people of Israel.

We are witnessing – where there had been repression – the resurgence of Jewish vitality in Eastern Europe. May these communities gain new strength and success in their endeavors.

We are witnessing, through Operation Exodus, an outpouring of compassion and generosity for all Jews in need. May we be thankful for our religious freedom and the ability and opportunity to extend help to others.

Now, on this Rosh Hashanah, as we once again dip our apples into honey, we recite the age-old words of our tradition. May we enlarge our horizons, pledging to ourselves that this year we will do even more to reach out to Jews in distress, wherever they may be.

#### **BABYSITTING COMMITTEE**

We'd like to introduce ourselves to new members, and re-introduce ourselves to older friends. A few years ago the babysitting committee was formed when a few of us felt that our spiritual needs could not be postponed until our children had reached a more civilized age. With the sympathetic support of Anshe Emeth, babysitting services are now provided once or twice a month during services, mornings during High Holiday services, and occasionally during special events, such as meetings of the Keepers of Jewish Excellence. Watch your bulletin for times when sitting is available.

Here's how it all works. College students stay with children from 6 months on up in one or two rooms in the religious school. Parents drop off diapers, snacks, anything else the child may need. Children play freely, though often there are games or crafts on Jewish subjects. The parent who drops off the child picks the child up at the end of services.

We like to keep our child/sitter ratio to 1/4, and so if at all possible interested parents should call either Anne Thayer-Cohen, 819-0580 or Susan Jacobs, 247-7683, about a week before the event. We understand that this is not always possible, but reserve the right to turn dropins away if conditions become too crowded.

If there is an event that does not have sitting scheduled, try calling us to see if arrangements can be made. If enough people are interested, we can often work something out.

Sitting for high holidays should be reserved by now. However, if you have not registered, please call one of us to see if a place would be available. Have a good year!
