

Rabbi Daniel H. Gordis is Vice President for Public Affairs and Community Ourtreach at the University of Judaism. He also serves as Dean of the Ziegler RabbinicalSchool - the newest rabbinical school in the United States - and Assistant Professor of Philosophy. Dr. Gordis received his B.A. from Columbia College, his Rabbinic Ordination and M.A. from the Jewish Theological Seminary of America, and his Ph.D. from the University of Southern California.

Dr. Gordis is the author of God Was Not in the Fire: The Search for a Spiritual Judaism (Scribner, 1995) and Does the World Need the Jews? Rethinking Choseness and American Jewish Identity (Scribner, 1997). His third book to be coauthored with Dr. David Ellenson, will be titled For the Sake of Heaven: Conversion, Law and Politics in the World of Modern Orthodoxy.

Rabbi Gordis has published numerous articles on Jewish law, ethics, and the future of Jewish life in America. He resides with his wife. Beth, and their three children in Los Angeles.

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

As we now get ready for the Passover Season, the library is prepared for you. We have several different kinds of Haggodot shelved at 262.5. Also available for borrowing are liturgical and ethical adult books as well as an increasing array of children's story books. A sampling follows:

Keeping Passover by Ira Steingroot

This books is subtitled "Everything you need to know to bring the ancient tradition to life and to create your own Passover Celebration." It provides descriptions of many of the rituals called for in the Haggadah. Armed with this infomration, families may form their own special Passover rituals.

Thinking Passover: A Rabbi's Book of Holiday Values by Ben Kamin

Passover can become of a time of reflection by drawing parallels between Passover themes and modern themes. Examples of such include relating the 10 plagues to what may be America's own 10 plagues and comparing Moses to Martin Luther King, Jr. This spiritually uplifting book provides new reflections on the Passover message.

Also among our new acquistions are several delightful books for children. You may borrow The Story of Passover by Norma Simon, Passover Magic by Roni Schotter, On Passover by Cathy Goldberg Fishman, Sammy Spider's First Passover by Sylvia A. Rouss, Sam's Passover by Lynne Hannigan and DAYENU or How Uncle Murray Saved the Seder by Rosalind Schilder. These delightful books are among the many new books for children that you will see in our library.

At this point I would like to break from the theme of Passover books to let our young adult readers know that they have not been forgotten. We have new books such as Fitting In by Sharon Kirsh, The Circlemaker by Maxine Rose Schur, Gideon's People by Carolyn Meyer and The Kofax Dilemna by Steven Schnur.

What is Passover?

Passover is a major Jewish Spring festival which commemorates the Exodus from Egypt over 3,000 years ago. During this period Jews all over the world abstain from eating foods that contain leavening; instead we eat matzah and other non-leavened foods. Passover actually has five names, each one explaining another significance of the holiday.

Chag Ha-Aviv The Spring Festival

In the book of Deuteronomy we are commanded to offer a Passover sacrifice and to abstain from eating anything with leavening in it. This is to remember our departure out of Egypt. The name Aviv is the old name for the spring month and which later became known as Nisan.

Chag Ha-Matzot The Festival of Unleavened Bread

In the book of Exodus, we hear that the Jews did not wait for their bread to rise because they had to leave in haste; therefore, we are commanded to eat matzah to commemorate this event. However, before the events tied to the Exodus from Egypt, Jews and other people of the region made and ate matzah to thank God for the spring crops. Therefore, eating matzah is also part of a spring thanksgiving tradition.

Chag Ha-Pesach The Festival of the Paschal Offering

Before the tenth plague, the Jews took the blood of a sacrificed lamb and smeared it upon their doorposts to safequard their homes from the angel of death. The sacrifice of one lamb from a flock was a spring time tradition in agricultural societies. Thus another agricultural tradition is associated with this festival.

Zeman Cherutenu The Season of Our Liberation

During the Seder we are reminded that we were once slaves in Egypt. We eat reclining to emphasize the fact that we are now free. Modern seders refer to those who were victims of the Holocaust, and more recently, to Soviet Jews who want to emigrate to Israel. This year the Soviet threat is gone; however, we all realize and pray for those Jews around the world who are subjected to anti-Semitism and persecution.

Pesach Passover

Pesach, the common name for this festival, is derived from Moses' promise to the Israelites that God would "pass over" their homes during the night of the killing of the first born. This name also unifies the concepts symbolized in the other four names.

In Israel, Passover is celebrated for seven days, as commanded by the Torah. Reform Jews all over the world also celebrate Passover for seven days. Outside of Israel, Orthodox and Conservative Jews celebrate Passover for eight days. This tradition originated in 700-600 B.C.E., when people were notified of the holiday's beginning by means of a network of bonfires. To ensure that the holiday was observed on the correct days, an extra day was added. By the time a reliable standard calendar was adopted in the fourth century C.E., the added day was so ingrained in tradition that it became law.

PREPARING FOR PASSOVER

All foods that are not permitted for Passover must be removed from the home.

These foods include: leavened bread, cakes, biscuits, crackers, cereals, coffee substances derived from cereal, wheat, barley, oats, rice, dry peas, dry beans and all liquids which contain ingredients or flavors made from grain alcohol. (There are some variations on these prohibitions among Sephardic Jews). Not only must they be removed from the home, but, traditionally, a Jew may not own these food products during Passover. Thus, some people "sell" the food to a Gentile friend only to "buy" it back after the holiday; others give the food away.

After the house is scoured, the search begins for hidden chametz. This occurs the night before the first Seder. One parent should place at least one piece of chametz in each room on a window sill or in a corner, make sure you keep count of the number of pieces you have hidden. Then the children, led by an adult, go from room to room by candlelight to find the chametz. When a piece of chametz is found, it is placed in a wooden spoon and dropped into a cloth; then a feather is used to brush up all the crumbs. After all the chametz is found, the feather and wooden spoon are wrapped in the cloth with the chametz, and the whole bundle is burned. The blessings that are said at the beginning of the search and before the bundle is burned are found in the Haggadah. All chametz must be out of the house by 10 a.m. of the day of the first Seder.



HAGGADOT

There are many beautiful Haggadot that are available. Look through a Haggadah to make sure that the language is appropriate for the age groups that will be assembled at your Seder. Also, make sure you have copies for each person at the Seder; make sure that you have one edition of the Haggadah so that the page numbers will be consistent for each copy. Our Judaica shop has several Haggadot from which to choose; you may also obtain them at Jewish book stores or through Jewish catalogues. Here is a list of some of the Haggadot that are currently in print:

A Family Haggadah by Shoshana Silberman. This volume has activities and questions for children. A cassette that is cued to the Haggadah is also available.

The New Union Haggadah prepared by the Central Conference

of American Rabbis. This contemporary Haggadah based on tradition has easy-to-follow large print. A leader's copy is available. It contains beautiful drawings by Leonard Baskin. It also contains a full section of Passover songs, words and music.

A Family Seder in 20 Easy Steps by Maida Hoffman. This contemporary Haggadah based on tradition has easy-to-follow large print. A leader's copy is available.

On Wings of Freedom by Rabbi Richard N. Levy. This Haggadah, distributed by the B'nai Brith Hillel Foundation, includes many readings that help make the experience of the Exodus more current.

We Tell It To Our Children by Mary Ann Barrows Wark. This Haggadah is set up as a play that children can participate in. It includes outlines for puppets that can be made in advance to help provide greater meaning for children.

THE SEDER TABLE

The Seder Plate is a beautiful symbol of Passover. The items that are placed on the Seder Plate are listed below:

Z'roah (Roasted Lamb Bone) - This symbolizes the animal sacrifice that the Israelites made to God on the night they left Egypt.

Betzah (Roasted Egg) - The egg symbolizes the sacrifices made in the Temple; it is also a symbol of life, the coming of spring, and also the loss we feel at the destruction of the Temple.

Maror (Bitter Herbs) - This is usually horseradish. It reminds us of the bitterness of slavery.

Charoset - This is a mixture of apples, nuts, wine, and cinnamon. It symbolizes the mortar that the Israelites used when slaves in Egypt. Karpas (Green Vegetables) - Usually we use celery or parsley to symbolize spring. We dip the vegetable in salt water to remind us of the tears shed by the Israelites.

Hazeret (Bitter Vegetable) - This vegetable, usually romaine lettuce or another bitter green, is used for the same symbolic purpose as the Maror. Some Seder Plates do not include Hazeret.

Elijah's Cup - Elijah the Prophet is symbolically welcomed at every Seder as a sign of hope for the coming of our ultimate redemption in the Messianic Era.

3 Matzot - The symbolism of Matzot has already been mentioned. Aside from what may be eaten by individuals at the Seder, 3 are used symbolically, and will often be placed in an ornate Matzah cover.

A FEW SEDER SUGGESTIONS

prepared by Rabbi Bennett Miller

[°] As you prepare your home for Passover, involve the children in the pre-festival house cleaning and general preparations. The memory of the sights, sounds and smells of the food and home around holiday time remains with us as Jews throughout our adult lives. Children should have the opportunity to share in the anticipation.
[°] Make your Seder table as elegant as possible. Spare

nothing in order to make the service superb, the setting breathtaking and the floral arrangements thrilling.

[°] Be sure to have an adequate number of Haggadot. Each person capable of reading should have a Haggadah. Be sure that they are all the same.

[°] Whoever is to lead the service should prepare in advance to be familiar with the order and the material. The tone that the leader sets will establish the tone of the service. The leader should assign portions of the service in advance. Enable the participants to become proficient in what they will read. The leader should personally study "The Four Questions" with the youngest child who will recite them at the Seder.

^o Hiding the Afikomen can be a delightful game and activity. In some families, the children "steal" the Afikomen and hold it for ransom. However, in most families today, the leader hides the Afikomen, and the children must find it. To enhance the fun, prepare symbolic warning signs using Jewish content. Instead of using the words "hot" and "cold," use names from the Haggadah. Although many families reward the finders with gelt (money), Jewish books or ceremonial objects (a Mezzuzah) are even more appropriate.

"Who Knows One" and "Chad Gad Yah" are two songs that easily can be turned in to skits. These would be fun to prepare for the younger children who do not read so that they can feel that they are contributing to the Seder.
Do not end the evening with the meal. Be sure to complete the Haggadah after the meal. The most entertaining and joyous part of the Seder is near the conclusion.

^o Singing is a great activity for the Seder. Especially appropriate are songs about freedom and about Israel.

REMEMBER: The Seder table is a stage on which is reenacted, in symbolic fashion, many of the events that we associate with the deliverance from Egyptian slavery. Understanding the symbolism is important if we are to celebrate Passover properly, namely, by reliving the experience of the Exodus.

MAZON

Our congregation is a partner with Mazon, a Jewish organization that helps to feed the hungry. The Haggadah says: "Let all who are hungry come and eat." Unfortunately, in this day and age, few of us are prepared to open our door for anyone to walk in. Instead, Mazon suggests that we donate to them the cost of feeding an additional person at your seder. Donations can be sent to the Temple office with checks made out to Mazon.



ORDER OF THE SEDER

In Jewish homes all over the world, the Passover Seder is conducted in the same order, in fact, the word "seder" means "order". The following are the sections of the Seder in the order in which they occur:

Kadesh - Sanctifying the holiday with the prayer over the wine.

Urchatz - Washing the hands with no prayer. This section is optional.

Karpas - Dipping the green vegetable in the salt water.

Yahatz -Breaking the middle matzah.

Maggid - This section contains the Four Questions and four renditions of the story.

Rohtzah - Washing the hands with a blessing. Motzi Matzah - Blessing the matzah and eating it.

Maror - Blessing and eating the bitter herbs.

Korekh - Making the Hillel Sandwich, which is bitter herb and charoset placed between two small pieces of matzah.

Shulhan Orekh - Eating the Passover feast.

Tzafun - Finding the Afikomen

Barekh - Saying the blessing after the meal.

Hallel - Singing songs of praise and opening the door for Elijah.

Nirtzah - Concluding the Seder.

GAMES FOR PASSOVER

The custom of distributing nuts to children on the eve of Passover to arouse their curiosity may well account for the origin of playing games with nuts during the festival. Another reason for this traditional and favorite pastime is that the numerical value of the Hebrew for nut is the same as that of the word for good. Some of the games given below have been played by Jewish children for many generations while others are modern adaptations of popular pastimes.

LEFT OR RIGHT?

One player puts both hands behind his back and places a nut in one hand. He then brings forth both hands and the other player must guess if the nut is in his left or right hand. If he guesses correctly, he takes the nut.

ODDS OR EVEN?

One player holds a number of small nuts in a closed fist. He asks the second player to guess if the nuts in his hand are an even or odd number. If the second player guesses correctly, he takes all the nuts in the hand of the first player. Failing to guess, he forfeits the corresponding number of nuts that the first player held.

NUT-PITCHING

An open box or other receptacle is placed on the floor. Each player is given five nuts and, standing at a fixed line, tries to pitch the nuts into the box. He collects those that did not fall into the box and awaits his next turn. The first player to pitch all his nuts into the box is the winner and he receives all the nuts in the box.

NUT-BOWLING

Place a two-foot board with one end on the floor and the other end leaning on one or more objects so as to form a triangle. Set ten nuts about two feet from the bottom of the board. Each player is given three walnuts which he rolls, one at a time, down the board, aiming to "bowl over" the ten nuts on the floor. He wins all the nuts that his nut hits directly or indirectly. If he fails to hit any nuts, his nut remains on the floor.

MUSICAL QUIZ

A few bars of a Passover song are played on the piano. The first player who calls out the name of the tune is given a point. The player who has the most points is the winner.

RECIPES

KNEIDLACH (MATZAH-BALLS)

4 eggs 1 tsp salt

1 tsp salt1/2 tsp cinnamon1/2 tsp white pepper(optional)

6 tbsp chicken fat

1/2 cup soup stock or water 1 cup matzah meal Beat the eggs with the salt, cinnamon, pepper and chicken fat. Add the matzah meal and the soup or water. Mix thoroughly. Cover and allow the mixture to stand in the refrigerator for one hour or more. Bring four quarts of water to a boil. Shape the mixture into matzah-balls and drop in boiling water. Cook covered for half an hour. Balls are then ready to be added to soup. Twelve large matzah-balls can be made with these ingredients.

CHAROSET

2 apples	1/4 cup shelled almonds	
1/4 cup shelled walnuts	1/2 cup raisins	
1 teaspoon ginger	1 teaspoon cinnamon	
1/4 cup swe	et wine	

Quarter and core the apples. Grind the apples, raisins and nuts, and then add the ginger and cinnamon. Blend in the wine. The above quantities allow enough for twelve portions. The finished haroset will keep in the refrigerator for a couple of weeks.

MATZAH BREI

4 matzot 4 eggs 11/2 tsp. salt butter or shortening

Soak the *matzot* just enough to soften them. Break the eggs in a bowl and beat with the salt. Add the soaked *matzot*. Heat the butter or shortening in a frying pan over a moderate flame. Pour the mixture and fry until golden on underside, turn over with spatula and fry on the other side. Serve with sugar and cinnamon. Four servings.

ALMOND MACAROONS

4 egg yolks

2 cups ground almonds

1 cup sugar

Beat the egg yolks well; add the sugar and beat until lemon-colored. Add the ground almonds and mix thoroughly. Chill for easy handling. Take small pieces of the mixture and shape into small balls. Place the macaroons on a greased baking sheet. Top with half an almond, if desired. Bake 350 oven for ten minutes. 50 macarrons.


