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<u>President's Message</u>

The High Holidays have come to a close, and I am feeling inspired and grateful to be a part of this extraordinary community. It was wonderful to see our sanctuary

filled with so many people and such palpable energy, to hear moving sermons, meaningful speeches and beautiful song. I enjoyed getting to meet many new folks, and look forward to getting to know you better over the course of the year as we share many more holidays and events.

I appreciated my newly appointed vantage point of experiencing services from the *bimah*, as it provided a fresh perspective from which to fully take in all that goes on. While I could describe many outstanding points, one of my favorite moments is when Rabbi Mosbacher calls up the interfaith spouses to acknowledge and thank them for being an integral part of our BHSS community. I have come to anticipate this tradition, but it nonetheless brings tears to my eyes.

I have shared pieces of my Jewish journey before, so you may recall that growing up, it was always my intention to marry within the Jewish faith. Life apparently had other plans. It was also Matt's and my initial idea to raise our children without organized religion, as our history with such was lackluster. We wanted our children to be "spiritual" but frankly did not spend much time thinking about what that actually means, let alone how to go about achieving it. When our eldest son came to us one day and asked why we didn't attend church or synagogue, we thought we had a perfectly good answer, one that had seemed to work for other families we knew. We told Aidan that he was both, so he could do either. But a few days later he returned and informed us that in his estimation, being "both" felt a lot like being "neither." And thus the temple search began... hoping to discover a place where our kids, with their interfaith, spiritually-stunted parents schlepping behind them, might fit in. We weren't optimistic.

Nine years later, I am president. And I am fairly certain Matt spends more time in *shul* than do many of his Jewish fraternity brothers. Somewhere along the way our family evolved from Jew-"ish" to what I think would be considered "authentically" Jewish. And each year when Rabbi invites the interfaith families to the *bimah*, my tears reflect how I am still taken aback by how far our meager expectations were exceeded.

In a timely coincidence, while I was working on this piece, a study conducted by the PEW Research Center was released.

The results, along with myriad responses, were circulating on social network sites and among synagogue circles. The study focused on demographics of American Jewry and revealed that following trends: Today's American Jews are less likely to affiliate with a synagogue, more likely to intermarry, less likely to raise Jewish children, and less likely to identify themselves as "religious." There were many commentators who interpreted the findings as rather ominous, foretelling the eventual end of the Jewish people. Others, including our Rabbi Mosbacher, while acknowledging that the data raised issues worthy of reflection, were far more optimistic and saw the issues arising as challenges as opposed to harbingers of impending doom.

I, for one, was perhaps most agitated by a few responses I read which implied that the only way to address the problem was to cease with all outreach initiatives, and become more insular, presumably to prevent the further dilution of Judaism.

When I read comments like this, I am brought back to that moment on the bimah at BHSS with our non-Jewish partners and am reminded that they are exactly that -- our partners. Some of our spouses continue to maintain beliefs and practices from a different faith; others consider themselves non-religious; and others fit into the PEW classification of non-Jews with a "Jewish affinity." At least one, when asked his religion, responds, "raising Jewish children." Rather than adopting a peripheral role, many of these individuals are deeply connected in one way or another to our community. Similar to their Jewish counterparts, I'll bet not all consider themselves religious. Some come for prayer, some for song, and some for learning. Some come to celebrate the holidays. Some tend to gardens, others are involved in social action, still others community organizing. Some come to be with friends, and some maybe come mainly for the oneg. Sure, these interests might all be fulfilled elsewhere, but somewhere along the way these folks decided to engage in them through the BHSS lens, a decidedly Jewish lens. And our clergy, staff and community not only tolerates their presence, but wholeheartedly embraces them.

At least here at BHSS, it does not appear that having an interfaith marriage or failing to identify one's self as "religious" is incompatible with being authentically Jewish. And I can't help but assume that if welcoming communities such as BHSS did not exist, there might be a lot more cause for concern.

From the Rabbi's Study

"If not now, when?"

Much has been made in recent weeks of the Pew Research Center's Study on Jewish Religion and Public Life. Vats of digital ink have already been spilled on the subject; dozens of congregants have asked me about the study and my thoughts, so I felt the need to weigh in. I'll start, though, with the my favorite statistic that I saw on Facebook in the aftermath of the study's release:

85% of the Jewish community reads too many surveys.

There's truth to that. We're always a bit, shall we say, paranoid -- always looking over our shoulders or around the next bend, always foreseeing the doom, the end of the Jewish people.

The statistics in the thorough study were, in fact, sobering; on the plus side for us, over half of American Jews self-identify as Reform or Conservative. On the other hand, 35% of Jews who were raised Reform say they have left Jewish observance. This statistic begs the question, "What do Jews mean when they say they've left Jewish observance?" since 70% of survey participants said they went to a *seder*, and 53% fasted on Yom Kippur.

One in five Jews overall describe themselves as having no religion, which is very much in keeping with Americans as a whole, 20% of whom also describe themselves that way. In this way, we are doing no worse (and no better!) than American faiths in general.

The intermarriage rate has reached 58%, with higher numbers in younger demographics.

Astonishingly, 34% said a person is still Jewish even if they decide to believe in Jesus as the Messiah.

So what are we to make of these statistics?

We could argue with them, making the case that a sample of 3,500 Jews in insufficient or skewed in some way; we could run screaming "the sky is falling, the sky is falling," as some bloggers and essayists have done in the past few weeks. We could say, "This doesn't apply to us, because our membership numbers are strong at Beth Haverim Shir Shalom."

I take a "both/and" approach in reflecting on this study. On one



hand, we ARE doing well at Beth Haverim Shir Shalom; our membership numbers are strong, and involvement and participation are higher than many synagogues in the area and around the country. On the other hand, these Pew poll numbers might lead us to think that we're in an inexorable downward spiral. But on the 'other' other hand, we as Jews have faced what seemed insurmountable challenges throughout our history. The rise of the prophetic tradition and the destruction of the Temples in Jerusalem, the expulsion from Spain, the Holocaust—each of these moments could have signified the end of our people. What emerged though, to the contrary, were periods of incredible creativity and dynamism that not only helped Judaism survive, but thrive.

But back to the first hand, the down-side of these numbers is hard to ignore, even in a community that is dynamic and progressive. On the other hand (I'm starting to feel like Tevye), I don't want us to be complacent or rest on our laurels; we need to continue to be on the learning edge of Jewish life and organizational development; we need to be willing to ask ourselves hard questions about best practices; we need to find new ways to connect our members to each other even more intentionally; we need to engage in deep, transformative social justice work with partners across lines of race and faith and class; we need to work with singles, couples, parents, and kids to create substantive, meaningful Jewish experiences for members of all ages that will keep us all learning and growing.

Some in the Jewish world see the Pew study with a "glass halfempty" point of view. I think the glass is totally full. It's half full with what Judaism has meant to us in the last 3,000 years—half full with the heritage that has been passed down to us, that has animated us and kept us together through thick and thin. And it's half full with the creative possibilities that the future holds. Judaism is ours to make and remake in every generation.

I hope you'll be an invested partner in that process, together with the members, leaders, and staff of our sacred congregation.

CHANUKAH MENORAH LIGHTING HINTS:

The first day of Chanukah is on November 28, 2013; therefore the first candle is lit the evening before (November 27.) Candles are placed in the *chanukiah* (Chanukah menorah) from right to left (the first night, place one candle all the way to the right, then add on from there each succeeding night.) Light candles from left to right (light the newest candle first, after you have lit the *shamash*, or service candle.)

First Blessing:





Ritual Committee

As I write this article (late as usual), the High Holidays are a not quite distant memory, our home *sukkah* has finally been dismantled in full (I'm always sorry to see it go) and I am already starting my menu for the Thanksgiving/Chanukah celebration coming in November (latkes with cranberry applesauce sound delicious). But before we look forward to what Pinterest has labeled "Thanksgivukkah," I need to take a moment to look back on what we as a community achieved over a four-week period in September. If you have only ever attended BHSS for Rosh Hashana and Yom Kippur, you may not realize how unique a community we have created here.

Let's start with our staff: Iris, Lisa, and Walter. You probably are already aware of how welcoming they are and how committed they are, but you may not be aware of the sheer number of hours they spend in the building during the High Holidays. As head of the Ritual committee, I arrived at BHSS a good hour before each service began, but however early I am here, they are already here, ensconced in their positions, waiting to welcome members and guest with equal warmth, dealing with whatever minor or major problems may arise, and I'm pretty sure not ever actually sitting down. And then there is Rebecca McVeigh and the teaching staff, who run all of the children's programming for the second through sixth graders, as well as overseeing the babysitting for the younger children. We take for granted that our children will have a meaningful High Holiday experience, but in many congregations, this type of parallel programming is simply not available.

We are also blessed with an involved and impassioned lay leadership. From Mitch Miller, who spoke of his own way to faith, to Eric Aronson, whose gave a beautiful High Holiday appeal, to our newly installed president, Jen Cole, who not only spoke eloquently about community, but also chanted Torah on the second day of Rosh Hashana (and did a beautiful job in the process). And speaking of chanters, I need to spend a moment kvelling about how in awe I am of what happens here, and again explain how different and how special our paradigm is. At most congregations, including the one where I grew up, there may be a lay Torah chanter or two, usually the same people each year, who chant the entire portion. At BHSS, we had FORTY-THREE separate Torah chanters, Haftarah chanters, Haftarah blessers and gabbais over the two holidays, including recent b'nai mitzvah, older teens (our Kadimah students made fantastic gabbais!), college

students, first-time chanters, empty nesters, moms, and dads, grandmas and grandpas. They practiced for weeks (or even months) in advance to learn High Holiday trope, and fearless (or perhaps fearful), took their place on the bimah. I feel blessed that I got to hear every one of them, and even more blessed to be part of a community where this is the norm.

And who took the time to train all those chanters and make sure they were prepared? Our very own Cantor Perper (with a big assist from Cantor Steinsnyder, who took over Torah/Haftarah prep over the summer during Cantor Perper's travels to California), who made CDs for every single chanter and also made himself available every Tuesday night for weeks to help prep us all. Thank you so much for your talent and dedication. But it is the team of Cantor Perper and Rabbi Mosbacher that truly sets us apart from the rest. One of my closest friends is a clergy person at a Reform congregation, and we often compare notes before and after different holidays. I love being able to tell her how innovative, creative, and moving the services our clergy lead are year after year, yet how they are always looking to make improvements ... how we piloted a new machzor for Erev Rosh Hashana, how Rabbi Mosbacher wrote a new, beautiful, moving service for Tashlich, how the kids come up for the shofar blowing service and got to make the calls, how we tried a whole new procedure for the Yom Kippur afternoon service, coming up to the ark to make our own private prayers, how we had speakers tell us their own unique immigration stories on Yom Kippur, and so many other little touches that start with our talented and creative clergy.

I know this article is insanely long, but there are a few other people I need to mention, and thank for their service:

-- Student Rabbi Adena Kemper, who joined us for Erev Rosh Hashana and Simchat Torah ... we are so looking forward to having you be with our community this year

-- Harris Reinstein, Judi Teich, and the entire shofar blowing crew, who inspire awe and make us smile

-- The BHSS choir, who, under the leadership of Cantor Perper and the accompaniment of Itay Goren, sound better every year
