

Happy Pesach

The Rabbi Writes

On Wednesday evening, March 27, 2002, we will begin the Passover Festival with the Seder. During this festive meal, we will discuss the four sons (albeit children). Here is another interpretation and perhaps food for thought.

King Solomon advises us to "educate the children according to their way." What this means is that every child is unique and must be related to in a way that befits his or her character. Our offspring are not mere replicas of ourselves, nor did they step off a page in the latest book on how to raise children. Moreover, there will never be another child who possesses the singular potential which we have been

entrusted to nurture and polish. Find that which is peerless in your child. Identify it, nourish it, praise it, love it, and most of all -- speak to it. The Seder night: there is no better time to focus on your children than now. There is no better time for launching a tailor-made educational dialogue than on that night. The Wise Son/Daughter asks: "What are these laws, statutes, and ordinances?" When the Wise one looks at Jewish life, he/she doesn't just see one giant list of commandments. Rather, the child (and adult) breaks them down into various types and categories. Their perceptive skills are honed and distinctions are drawn. In fact, the ability to be thoughtfully discerning is one of the hallmarks of wisdom. Each and every one of us is the object of intense competition. Not only do manufacturers and advertisers compete for our attention, but there exist a host of would-be peddlers of ideas and values who vie for our time and energy, our support and commitment, our votes -- and, ultimately, our checkbooks. Eventually everyone becomes a consumer. From the Wise child we learn that one of the keys to freedom is becoming a thoughtful and discerning consumer, unless of course you don't mind being left with a bag of goods. Since the Evil child has excluded him/herself from the Jewish people, he/she has denied God. When Jews in Ethiopia or Russia are in trouble, Israeli soccer fans in Tel Aviv, doctors named Greenfield and Schwartz in St. Louis, and Jews speaking Portuguese on the beaches of Rio all respond. In the last decade, Israel has absorbed almost one million immigrants, which is the proportional equivalent of the entire

A Message From Our President

A little more than a month ago, a number of Board members attended the UAHC Biennial Convention in Boston. It was a transforming experience for me. First, I had the opportunity to meet with other Temple Presidents and to discuss our respective experiences and issues. Guess what!

Although the specifics are different, the issues are similar. We are all tackling facilities issues, getting enough volunteers, attendance at services, developing innovative Temple programs, bringing more Jewish values to our meetings, etc. It was comforting to know that I'm not alone, and there is a President's Chat group to get advice and counsel.

Next, I attended a number of energizing workshops. I don't have the space to go over all the ones I attended, but I would like to highlight one of them. Rabbi Malinger and I together at

The Desk of

Cantor

Those of you who were fortunate enough to be with us here at Temple Shalom on January 25 and at Watchung Avenue Presbyterian Church on the morning of January 27, are aware that we had a combined worship service. Rabbi Malinger and Pastor Brooks Smith exchanged pulpits to offer their messages to congregations eager to hear the words of these religious leaders representing different faiths.

So much is different and yet so much is the same. Nowhere are the similarities more clear than in the words sung by our combined choir of 45 voices, under the direction of Pamela Momyer, singing many diverse styles of music. Having done this 2 years ago, both choirs were anxious to join voices again for some wonderful music making.

Among the selections in which the choir combined was "Hiney Ma Tov". The translation is "How good it is and how lovely, for brethren to dwell together in unity!" What an appropriate text for this occasion! This piece, by contemporary composer

Jose Bowen, is written in the Klezmer style. Klezmer comes from the Hebrew word, "klezeimer" which means "vessels of song". Klezmer is Eastern European folk music whose melodies and rhythms came from a purely vocal tradition. At some point, musicians took these melodies and songs, wrote them down and "took them on the road". Klezmer musicians were traveling performers, moving from town to town, playing at weddings and other festive celebrations. As they traveled they incorporated the various styles of music they heard along the way. The fusion process of assimilating different styles and techniques into the music gave klezmer a continuous life of the old incorporating the new. "Hiney Mah Tov" is a small part of a larger work entitled "A Klezmer Service" which was written for the Friday evening Shabbat service.

Another selection sung by the combined choirs is "Amen Shem Nora", a piece based on Sephardic folk-songs, and arranged by Matthew Lazar. The text of the first song translates, "Amen to the awesome Name, Amen!" and the second song is a rendition of the very joyful Psalm 150, praising God with instruments and dance! Sephardic music is a style of music that descended from the Jews of the Iberian Peninsula. Many of the texts of these Sephardic songs are based on stories or poems already found in the Middle Ages. The melodies however tend to be more contemporary. In "Amen Shem Nora", there are two melodies, the first is more contemporary and more in tune with our ear of the 20th century. The second melody has a Middle Eastern "modal" sound

tended a session titled: Creating Healthy Leadership: How Boards and Rabbis Can Really Succeed Together. First, we individually did an exercise in which we divided a page in four sections titled as follows: Start Doing, Stop Doing, Continue Doing, Do More of. Rabbi and I then compared our results. It was gratifying to see how much in agreement we were. [As an exercise for you, the reader, I would appreciate your doing this and then getting your input to me. It helps your Temple Leadership to get feedback.] Then, the Rabbis and Temple President's were divided into separate groups. Each group was asked the same two questions: "What does the President bring to the partnership uniquely?" "What does the Rabbi bring to the partnership uniquely?" The results from the Rabbi's group and the President's group were very similar. Clearly, Rabbis and Temple Presidents can each bring unique skills to the table, and the partnership between them can make a very powerful and energizing team. We discussed a Partnership Model emphasizing the importance of planning together, and then working with the Temple Executive Committee and Board to agree on goals and responsibilities, always guided

by what is best for the Congregation. Finally, to end this Session, each Rabbi and their respective president were asked to say an individualized private blessing to each other.

In addition to the Workshops, there were a number of Plenary Sessions where various resolutions were voted upon. There were speeches, luncheons, and wonderful evening entertainment. I was especially inspired by the participation of Temple youth at the various events. Also, Temple Shalom was honored with the presentation of a Belin Outreach Award for "University of Passover". On the last day of the Convention, I had the opportunity together with Sharon Steinhorn, to attend a discussion between Congregational Presidents and Vice Presidents and Rabbi Yoffie, UAHC President and Russell Silverman, Chairman, UAHC Board of Trustees. Our UAHC leadership is in good hands!

As I look back on the Convention, reflecting on the Friday night and Saturday morning Shabbat services, the sight of perhaps 6,000 Jews praying, singing, and even dancing during services gave me the feeling that Reform Judaism is alive, well, dynamic, and thriving.

Learn About Pesach

The origins of Passover (Pesach) may have been several diverse and ancient festivals that pre-date Israelite culture. According to this theory, there were at least two spring festivals: shepherds celebrating the spring lambing by sacrificing sheep and perhaps smearing the blood on their dwellings, and farmers welcoming the new harvests of barley and wheat by clearing out the old crop from their stores and subsisting on unleavened bread until the new crop was in.

Somehow, over centuries, a transformation of symbols, a merger of ceremonies was supposed to have occurred. The Festival of Matzah and the Festival of the Pesach came to be part of a more momentous tradition: the liberation from slavery in Egypt, by a God who intervened in history to redeem the helpless and suffering clans who called themselves B'nai Yisrael, the Children of Israel.

According to the Torah, the word "Pesach", is derived from the Hebrew word "Pasach", translated to "pass over", and used to describe how the first born of Israel were spared inclusion in the terrible tenth plague. Another form of the verb means to leap or skip, to jump, or to dance, and could conceivably describe the scene at an ancient lambing festival. By the time the Torah had become a written text, the story of the Exodus had combined these two separate ritual observances and memorialized them as symbols of the deliverance from Egypt. At Exodus 12:3-14, the households of Israel are commanded to acquire an unblemished yearling lamb (a male sheep or goat) on the tenth day of the month later named Nisan, and, on the fourteenth day, to kill it, roast it, and eat it hastily. Having put the blood of the animal on the side posts and lintels of their houses, they thereby escape the death awaiting the first born of Egypt. This became the paschal sacrifice, to be eaten with bitter herbs and matzah, and observed every year in Jerusalem until the Temple was destroyed and sacrifices were no longer possible. The command to sacrifice a lamb is immediately followed (Exodus 12:15-20, 13:6-10) by the command to remove leaven and to observe the feast of unleavened bread for seven days as a sign of the redemptive power of God. At another place, the festival of unleavened bread is further linked to the story by the explanation that the



hasty departure from Egypt allowed no time for the dough baked by the Israelites to rise.

The pesach sacrifice was not possible without a Temple to bring the offerings to. Over time, the ritual of each family sharing a roasted lamb was replaced by an elaborate meal, modeled on a Greek-Roman banquet, that combined eating with discussions. This became the Seder, which means "order". Once the story of Passover was put into its own special text, called Haggadah (narrative or telling), that pattern for the celebration became the tradition.

No Jewish celebration in our cycle of holy times can be complete without attempting some repair of the world's ills. Therefore the giving of Tzedakah before Pesach is mandated by our tradition. Called me-ot chitin, literally "wheat money", it was collected from the community to let the poor among them have a proper Seder and to enable them to purchase matzah and whatever else they needed to celebrate properly and with dignity. It is also a mitzvah to invite to our Seder guests who normally would have nowhere else to go.

The Seder is a symbolic ritual meal, built around a real meal. The point of the Seder is the telling of the story, and all participants are supposed to regard themselves as personally experiencing the going out from Mitzrayim, which in Hebrew means a tight spot, a narrow place, and is the word used for Egypt.

Tales of Talmud Torah

By the time that you read this article, winter will have passed and we will be looking forward to Spring and to the wonderful holiday of Pesach. It is hard to believe that I have had the pleasure serving as your Director of Education for almost nine months already. This position continues to inspire me with each new day and I am grateful for the opportunity.

Although I usually use this opportunity to teach something interesting related to an upcoming holiday or event, I thought that I would take this chance to let you know about some special programs that have occurred in our religious school thus far.

In December, we had a K-3 Shabbat morning service followed by a bagel brunch. The students led the congregation in the Shema and Barechu and sang some Chanukah songs. The service was very well received and attended and we are looking forward to doing it again next year. In fact, each of our grades will have the opportunity to lead us in worship this year. In January and February, our 6th and 7th grade led the Friday night family services. The students were so enthusiastic and it was wonderful to see the sanctuary filled with so many proud families. Family services will be led by the 5th grade in April and by the 4th grade in May.

So far I have implemented two new family education programs. At the end of October, our Kindergarten students and their families learned about the "Well Dressed Torah". The day began with everyone in the sanctuary standing around the ark. The Rabbi and I undressed the Torah and introduced everyone to the different parts of the Torah in Hebrew and English such as the crown, pointer, breastplate, cover, parchment, etc. Then

Cantor Gordon opened the Torah and chanted some verses from the Torah portion. The students and their parents then returned to their classrooms and decorated the miniature Torahs that they received at Consecration with all the items that they had learned about in the sanctuary. The culmination of this project was putting their Torahs into a beautiful wooden miniature ark that they decorated. It was a fun and educational day for everyone involved.


In January, the third grade students and their families participated in a program called "In The Image of God". First, Rabbi Malinger and I met with the adults in the sanctuary. During this time, we discussed why and how one should talk to their children about God. At the same time, Cantor Gordon met with the students and their teachers to learn how we can communicate with God through prayer and songs. Afterwards, we all came together and participated in several different stations related to God. At station one, families discussed how we know that God exists. They made pinwheels and discussed what made them blow. At station two, families were asked to discuss what is their favorite thing that God created. They also learned what it means to be God's partner in creation as they planted parsley seeds in preparation for Pesach. At station three, families walked around the synagogue and outside to find the place their third grade child felt the presence of God. When they reached that place, they took a picture of the student with a Polaroid camera. At station four, families discussed what it means to be created in the image of God. Then they decorated frames with the words "I was created in the image of God". Later, they inserted

the picture taken at the previous station. The program ended with an extremely talented storyteller, Eva Grayzel, who had both the children and adults participating actively in her story theater. It is always such a joy for me to see families actively participate together in these programs and I am looking forward to continuing to create and implement new family programs throughout the year and in the future.



It was a meaningful and thought provoking evening for everyone present. Please keep an eye out for the beautiful quilt that was created by our 8th and 9th grade students in their class this semester in our MOREHSHHA program that will be displayed in Temple Shalom in the near future after it finishes its debut at Temple Rodeph Torah.

I would love to mention all of the wonderfully creative activities that are happening in each of our classrooms everyday but it would take up all the pages of the Shalom. But please take the time to look at our bulletin boards so you can see for yourselves how blessed we are to have such talented teachers and terrific students.







When I joined Sisterhood, I didn't really know what the purpose of Sisterhood was. I didn't know where our dues money went. I joined Sisterhood because it seemed like the right thing to do. Two years of discussion and fundraising were all worth while on that Friday afternoon in Boston.

The sense of community and commonality that I felt watching two of our past presidents standing on that bimah, holding our Torah was indescribable. The linkage and the connectedness of each of the Sisterhoods represented in Boston was repeated in the seminars and services that we attended.

Temple Shalom Sisterhood, along with Adult Jewish Growth, begins the celebration of Passover with a Feminist Seder. This gives us an opportunity to celebrate the exodus from a woman's perspective and to speak those words of deliverance in a woman's voice. Our Seder this year will be on March 24 at 4:00 pm. Temple Board And Committee Reports

BOARD OF EDUCATION

Sheila Rubin, Chairperson

I would like to share with you some of the thoughts of Rabbi Eric Yoffie, President of the UAHC. In his Shabbat morning sermon in Boston before 6000 Reform Jews, he urged us to invest in our schools and to make the transmission of Torah to our children our highest priority. To be a success, he encouraged us to draw our volunteer leaders into the work of religious education. Our professional educators cannot do this work alone.

In temples with outstanding schools, the most talented lay leaders have devoted themselves to education. Rabbi Yoffie related that the most dramatic changes were in those synagogues where Boards of Education do policy and evaluation. Secondly, we must find the best teachers for our children. They are the "shepherds of young Jewish souls." There are too few for the many openings. He urged us to look to our own temple members and the parents of our students. We in Monmouth County are fortunate to have a Federation that recognizes the need to educate our own and through LIMUD, several of Temple Shalom's members are learning to be teachers. Rabbi Yoffie went on to say that we need to involve our families in our schools. Here too, we are filling this requirement with family education programs and our new PTO. And finally, he mentioned the need for standards, so that all of us know what Reform Judaism demands of us.

I end with this thought from Rabbi Yoffie. "Because the religious school is the heart of the synagogue, we cannot be strong unless the school is strong. It is the key that opens the door to the grand adventure of Jewish learning and Jewish life. And we will not rest until our schools are a place where our children hear God's voice and see Torah as a tree of life." Want to know how you can get involved with your child's adventure? Nursery School News

In mid January, I had the opportunity to attend the second annual UAHC conference for early childhood directors. Over 50 directors from around the country gathered for two days in New York to network, study and advance our professional growth. Most importantly, we celebrated our love of Judaism and Jewish learning.

Breakout sessions included a diverse array of topics facilitated by professionals in the field. Rick Recht, the Jewish musical artist, treated us to a wonderful concert. However, the most exciting aspect was the opportunity to exchange ideas, develop camaraderie and discuss common concerns.

Wendy Mogul, Ph.D., author of *The Blessing of a Skinned Knee*, delivered the compelling keynote address. She uses Jewish texts to provide guidance in child discipline. "The most powerful thing we can do for the children is to set an example. Parents and

teachers must inspire children by the way we live our lives."

This was our second opportunity to study and learn together. The UAHC recognizes the value and the importance of Jewish early childhood education. They are a tremendous supporter and advocate for the importance of our field in Jewish lifelong learning.

The directors have created a professional organization, Gateway to Jewish Education, with the support of the UAHC. This newly formed association, under the aegis of the UAHC, will be a voice of advocacy for those of us in the field of Jewish early childhood education. We recognize that creating a strong Jewish identity in each child is essential to the future of our community. Our organization believes strongly, like Cheryl Meskin who is the Director of the Early Childhood Department of New York's Board of Jewish Education, that Jewish early childhood education is not a luxury in today's world.

population of France suddenly relocating to the United States. To Israel's credit, with all the daunting social and economic strains this influx has placed on the country, never once has anyone of any political stripe even hinted that immigration should be slowed or halted. What are we Jews anyway? Co-religionists, fellow nationals, compatriots -- or are we brothers and sisters? Born of one family and hewn of one stone? Are we bonded by a unifying relationship with God that is deeper than all which seems to divide us and render us strangers? And, could it be that when the rebellious child denies the quality of intrinsic Jewish connectedness, he/she not only turns his/her back on his/her brothers and sisters, but on their Parent as well?

Every Jewish child, and that includes us all, must be forced to consider this: Either you're with us or you're not; you can't have it both ways. At the Seder, the choice is ours. Don't mistake our harshness for anger. We love this child as much as we love you and every one else at the Seder tonight. If we didn't care deeply about this child we would have told him/her to take his/her cynical skepticism and go somewhere else for Passover -- but we didn't. Intent as one may be on hurtling oneself into the oblivion of a pseudo identity, we will always remain eager to teach them. We may have to say a few things that are painful for them as well as for us; but sometimes there is no choice.

The Simple Son asks: What is this? When your child asks you a simple question like, "Why does a magnet stick to metal?" what are you going to say? Or how about this one: "Why doesn't it ever snow in the summer?" Most of us who are omniscient in the eyes of our children find ourselves running for cover when these types of "cute" questions arise. "I'll be right back," we sheepishly assure them, as we are suddenly reminded of an ur-

gent call that has to be made. "Why don't you turn on the Discovery channel...?" You know why we don't have a lot of answers for our kids? Because we did what we now secretly hope they will soon learn to do -- we stopped asking questions. What a tragedy. We have sacrificed our youthful curiosity, our simplicity, if you will, on the altar of intellectual sophistication.

Inside each and every one of us lives a child of wisdom. We sense that there is more to Judaism than meets the eye. That what distinguishes a law from an ordinance is more than just Jewish legal jargon, but rather a deeper set of ideas and spiritual constructs. That what separates one holiday from the next is not just the taste of seasonal delicacies, but distinctive opportunities for expanded consciousness. That under the rubric of Judaism is to be found something not only profound and insightful, but deeply personal and meaningful. Inside us all there is a voice that wants the privilege of a fully panoramic view of Judaism -- To comprehend each facet of the Seder and how every nuance relates to the message of freedom, and the meaning of being a Jew. Listen to that voice. Refuse to sit there and just go through the motions. Be wise! Think, inquire and ask questions. Of Passover and its meaning for starters, and of Judaism and what it says about life as an encore. And then there is the son who doesn't even know how to ask. We act with a sense of urgency to free Jews in Russia, Syria, and Ethiopia. While on many fronts our efforts have met with success, there still exists another form of tyranny which must also incur the force of our wrath. This is the silent tyranny of ignorance. Ignorance, whether forced, induced, or knowingly chosen, is still ignorance. And if you don't know who you are then you are a slave.

At this point the Haggadah reminds us of what we already know -- that we are all responsible for one another. Whatever you know, you must

teach. Whatever you possess as a Jew, you must share. At the moment when you stand face to face with a Jew who doesn't even know what to ask, then the responsibility becomes yours. Whether this is a Russian child, your own child, the child of a neighbor... or you looking in the mirror. Help us! Chag Sameach!

to it--a more exotic. The instrumentation is piano and tof, a type of hand drum.

Another selection, "Make A Joyful Noise" is based on the text of Psalm 100: "Make a joyful noise unto the Lord, all ye lands..." The composer, Isadore Freed, is an important American composer of Jewish liturgical music. In listening to this piece, it is clear that Freed was tipping his hat to the sounds of western liturgical music with roots in the protestant Christian tradition. In fact, the compositions of the early reform movement strived to emulate the musical beauty and decorum of its Christian neighbors.

It is true that the musical styles of "Hiney Ma Tov", "Amen Shem Nora" and "Make a Joyful Noise" represent three diverse styles, which reflect the diverse roots deep in the culture of the Jewish people. Perhaps it is most important, however, to remember that music has, for good reason, often been referred to as the "universal language". Just by listening and opening our ears, the images and feelings of a people can be experienced and shared. We hope that this service, through the universal language of music, can help us open our hearts to the common bonds we all truly share.


