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

Happy Chanukah

The Rabbi Writes

T his year, the first night of Chanukah begins on Shabbat the day after Thanksgiving on Friday, November 29, 2002. How appropriate that we celebrate Thanksgiving, expressing gratitude for our



many blessings and Chanukah, celebrating our religious freedoms, one after the other. Yet, in the midst of this celebration, many of us struggle with the challenges of our modern world, looking for a new "light" in our lives.

During Chanukah, the Jewish people relive their military and ideological victory over ancient Greece. We still hear the echoes of this cultural clash today. As Winston Churchill wrote in his History of the

Second World War, "No other two races [but the Jews and Greeks] have set such a mark upon the world. Each of them from angles so different have left us with the inheritance of its genius and wisdom...the main guiding light in modern faith and culture."

The Classic Jewish texts label the period during which the Hellenists held influence over Israel as the "Greek Exile." Perplexingly, however, during the era, there was no attempt to drive the Jews from their homeland. This begs the question: who, or what, did they view as having been exiled? Jewish sages provide an explanation by comparing our existence under the Hellenic empire to the darkness at the beginning of creation. The first two lines of Genesis read, "In the beginning...the earth was empty...and darkness was upon the face of the deep."

The command "Let there be light" then banished the darkness. However, according to the sequence of events presented in the Torah, the luminous heavenly bodies including the sun and stars did not come into existence until the fourth day. This first "light" therefore must be understood not as light in a conventional sense, but as a primordial light of God -the essence of spirituality.

Life in the Greek exile is thus seen as comparable to a universe lacking a basic - the element of spirituality. At the time when Athens and Jerusalem locked horns, a core of Jews saw the glory that was Greece as a bleak shackling of the human spirit. The brilliant spiritual intensity of humankind had been eclipsed by the superficiality of idols, only because these as-

It was with a great measure of both pride and sadness that I found myself at Matawan Aberdeen Regional High School on the evening of September 11th. I was proud to represent Temple Shalom,



proud to stand next to Rabbi Malinger who served so ably as the Master of Ceremonies for the evening, and proud to be in the company of the members of the Bayshore Ministerium - all of whom offered up prayers in the various traditions of their own religions and particularly, Denise Mantell of Trinity Episcopal Church who shared, in such a deeply heartfelt manner, her experiences of ministering to the victims and rescuers at ground zero.

It was so fitting for the entire community to recollect the pain and tragedy of this day at the first anniversary of the atrocities of 9/11. After all, we Jews have always recognized the gravity of the first anniversary of death as we traditionally unveil the gravestones of lost loved ones. We pause at that spot and we remember the life of the individual lost to us. We have endured one year of life in their absence. We have had the opportunity to experience the rich calendar of holidays. We have both celebrated and lamented, wanting to share with our loved one and yet knowing that the sharing must forever take place in a different way. And, so it was, as we memorialized and "unveiled" our own monument to that tragic moment.

Each of us came with our own sacred words, which were embraced by all present. We listened to one another. I personally listened with particular interest to the words to be spoken by Mohamed Ismail Ali, the President of the United Muslim Association. I wondered, as did we all, what words he would share. I sat spellbound as I listened to this unassuming, plain clothed man who wore a "kippah" on his head. Among his many eloquent words, he spoke, and I paraphrase: "My friends, I pray that never again will fanatics twist the sacred words of our texts...whether those words be from the Torah, the Bible, the Koran...and use those these beautiful books as an armor as they destroy others." When he finished, we all uttered an "Amen".

And then, the lights went out. The screen was lowered so that we could all watch the moving Powerpoint presentation created by a member of Temple Beth Ahm. All of the clergy walked towards the side stairs of the stage. It was dark and I couldn't see and I stopped in my tracks, not wanting to take a tumble. I turned to look behind me and out of the darkness came Mohamed Ismail Ali. He stepped in front of me and took my hand in his. He led me

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that what we do here, what we stand for, and what we daily offer to all of you, in countless ways, is without price and without measure.

As busy as we all are, Pirke Avot tells us that, "it is not incumbent upon us to complete the work; neither are we free to desist from it..." So, we continue our good works, but there is always more to be done.

But, doing more is costly and, regretfully, no matter how fiscally diligent we are, no matter how hard we trim our spending without cutting the very essence of what we offer, our income just doesn't cover the expense of what it takes to run this aging facility and also do our good work. We need your help.

This year, the needs are greater than ever. We've made some necessary improvements to our facility but, as I write this, we are about to contract for major repairs to our leaking roof and replace broken air conditioners. We also need new lighting and carpeting in the sanctuary. There are many other needed items too numerous to mention. I realize this has been a difficult year for many of us, but, hopefully, you have responded to our High Holiday Appeal. If not, it's not too late.

In order to continue our work, to help us all live our dreams, to offer increased and diverse programming and worship opportunities, to secure the future of Judaism by subsidizing our Religious School and helping our children attend Jewish camps, and, hopefully once again, visit Israel, to expand our help to the needy both within our congregation and within the community to stand up and be counted as caring Jews, I am asking you to help Temple Shalom so that together we can ensure Jewish continuity. This wonderful Temple must be here for you, as it was for me, and as it will be for your children and your children's children!

Learn About Chanukah

HISTORY OF CHANUKAH

In 168 B.C.E., a Syrian king named Antiochus ruled the Jews of Judea. Antiochus and his soldiers were hellenized Syrians. More than 150 years before the

Maccabees, Alexander the Great had conquered all the Near East. He and his successors influenced the culture of these conquered lands. This meant they shared, sometimes forcefully, their Greek habits, customs and beliefs. That is why the "enemies" in the retelling of the Chanukah story are sometimes called Syrians, sometimes called Greeks and sometimes called Syrian-Greeks.

Antiochus wanted to hellenize Judea. His soldiers desecrated the Temple in Jerusalem and he decreed that Judaism be abolished. Antiochus demanded that the Jewish people now worship Greek

gods and sacrifice pigs. There were some Jews who wanted to hellenize and accept Greek ways, and other Jews who did not. One historian has suggested that the Maccabean revolt began as a civil war between these two factions.

The Syrian soldiers set up altars to the Greek gods throughout Judea. Slowly, a resistance movement began to grow, led by a priestly family known as the Hasmoneans or Maccabees. The head of the family was Matityahu (Mattithias). He and his five sons Judah, Yonatan, Eliezer, Yochanan and Simeon left Jerusalem and settled in the small village of Modi'in. When the soldiers arrived in Modi'in to set up the idols, they demanded that the Jews offer sacrifices. One Jew stepped forward to do this and Matityahu became so angry that he killed the man. His sons then began fighting the Syrian soldiers. The Maccabees led the Jewish rebellion against Antiochus and his forces. Responding to their leader Judah's rallying cry, "all for the Lord follow me," the Jewish fighters fled to the hills and from there carried

out three years of guerilla warfare against the Syrians. The Jews were greatly outnumbered, but one of the miracles of the Chanukah story is that they prevailed. After several losses in battle, the Syrians ad-

mitted defeat. Chanukah became the victory of the few over the many. It was a victory for religious freedom for the Jews.


The Temple in Jerusalem was cleansed and a ceremony of rededication was held. The Hebrew word for dedication is Chanukah and thus the name of our eight day celebration.

What about the oil? In the Books of the Maccabees there is no mention of the miracle of the oil. This legend evolved much later, during Talmudic times, around 500 C.E. The Talmud relates the following: When the Maccabees cleansed the Temple and they were ready to

light the Ner Tamid, the Eternal Light, only one small jar of oil marked with the seal of the Cohanim (the High Priests) could be found. It would only last for one day and it would be eight days before more oil could be prepared. But a great miracle happened there: the light lasted for eight days. According to the rabbis of the Talmud, this is why we celebrate Chanukah for eight days.

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Tales of Talmud Torah

here is a popular belief that the Pilgrims modeled their Thanksgiving on the biblical holiday of Sukkot because of the relationship to the harvest and the concept of giving thanks. So, if the Pilgrims stole it from us, isn't it about time that we take it back and make it Jewish? While thinking about Thanksgiving, you will notice that that the traditions inherent to this holiday - including gathering together with family and friends, eating lots of food, and taking the time to appreciate what we have - are elements of most Jewish holidays. Based on these traditions, we can use this holiday as an opportunity to introduce or reinforce the several important Jewish values, mitzvot and rituals below:

Hoda'yah (Thanksgiving/ gratitude): Thanksgiving is a wonderful opportunity to have everyone at the table express their gratitude for all that they have. If you would like to extend the concept. further, use the week surrounding Thanksgiving as a chance for you and your family to write thank you cards to friends, teachers, work colleagues or family members and let them know how much you appreciate everything that they do for you. Learn to say thank you in Hebrew by saying Todah Rabah.

Tzedakah (righteousness, charity): After realizing everything that you have, for which you should be grateful, it is also time to think about how you can give back to your community and to God. The act of tzedakah should be an active part of any Thanksgiving celebration. Create a centerpiece out of canned foods and donate it afterwards to a shelter. Give a donation to MAZON: The Jewish Response to Hunger. Work in a soup kitchen preparing and serving meals to the homeless. Make sandwiches at home and donate them to a shelter. Create a special tzedakah box for Thanksgiving and ask everyone to contribute before the meal begins.

Hachnasat Orchim (Welcoming guests: Take this time to make yourself aware of those around you who may have no place to go to celebrate Thanksgiving. Invite new or old neighbors, who may not have family near by, to join you. Contact your local university and offer your home to students who may not be able to fly home for the holiday. Take a package of food to a homebound sick or elderly person in your community.

There are also several Jewish rituals that could become a part of your yearly Thanksgiving celebration.

Motzi: Purchase or bake a challah and say the motzi blessing before you begin your meal. It the most appropriate blessing to say because it is related to the harvest and thanks God for bringing us "bread" from the earth.

Birkat Hamazon: This wonderful blessing said after the meal is all too often forgotten. So before heading off to the T.V. to watch football, use the concept of Thanksgiving to reinforce or learn Birkat Hamazon. Here is a nice translation that invites participation from everyone at your table.

Leader Let us bless God Group Blessed be the name of God now and forever Leader Blessed be the name of God now and forever. Blessed be our God whose abundance we have eaten. Group Blessed be our God, of whose abundance we have eaten, and by whose goodness we live. Leader Blessed be our God, of whose abundance we have eaten, and by whose goodness we live. Group Blessed be the eternal God.

Together Sovereign God of the Universe, we praise you. Your goodness sustains the world. You are the God of grace, love, and compassion, the source of bread for all who live for your love is everlasting. In your great goodness, we need never lack for food. You provide food enough for all. We praise you, Oh God, source of food for all who live.

May your Thanksgiving be filled with gratitude for family, friends, food and all that God has created.

Once again, the Jewish calendar has me perplexed. The first night of Chanukah falls on the night after Thanksgiving! Yes, Chanukah begins on Friday evening, November 29. As you recall, our High Holy Days were early on our secular calendar this year too, beginning just a few days after Labor Day. The Rabbis who devised the Jewish calendar built in a leap month every few years in order to keep the festivals at the correct season. After the month of Adar (Feb. 3 to Mar. 4), we will have the leap month of Adar II (Mar. 5 to Apr. 2). Our festival of Purim will take place during Adar II and will fall on the evening of March 17.

Back to Chanukah - We invite all of you to bring your chanukiyot (Chanukah menorahs) with two candles (one for the first night and one for the shamash), so that we can light them together during our Shabbat service on Friday, November 29, at 8:15 pm.

As you may know the Hebrew word chanukah means "dedication." The Jews commemorated the victory of the Maccabees over the Syrians in 165 B.C.E., and "rededicated" the Temple in Jerusalem. As we light the lights of Chanukah, may we all rededicate ourselves to Judaism and to the principal of religious freedom for which our ancestors fought so many years ago.

With the addition of youth group activities, exciting family programs, dynamic teachers, and a curriculum that teaches the history, language, and holidays of our people, we have a religious school that can't be beat. It is our sincere wish that every child will come to school with a smile. You can help put that smile on your child's face by being a religious school advocate. Join our PTO, say yes when you are asked to make phone calls or to help sell snacks. Come to your child's family programs. Be an active participant in religious services. Attend with your child. TEMPLE SHALOM DIETARY POLICY

Our guidelines, which have been recommended by the Ritual Committee and approved by the Board of Trustees, stipulate that only Kosher or Kosher style food is allowed on our premises. That prohibits pork, shellfish, or any dish combining milk and meat products. Individual meat and dairy food items may be served at a Temple function but should be segregated at different ends of the table or at different tables. Also, if a dinner takes place at Temple at which meat is served, non-dairy creamer should be available for hot beverages.

Also on Friday evening, the Caring Committee will award a \$500 scholarship funded by the Natalie Rubin Caring Fund to a Temple Member or dependent enrolled in an undergraduate or graduate program in mental health or medicalrelated field. Applications are available at the Temple office.

Finally, we would like to remind you that on every third Tuesday of the month at 8 p.m., Rabbi Malinger and Cantor Gordon lead a Service of Peace, Comfort and Healing. Conducted in a small, informal setting, the Service provides a brief mid-week respite from everyday pressures and concerns. The next services will be held on November 19th and December 17th.

Nursery School News Laney Shapiro, Director

I o bring the full richness of Jewish life into our homes, it may be helpful to expand holiday celebrations beyond traditional observance. It is imperative that we make our celebrations relevant to young children. This can be achieved by incorporating all five senses, which provides a more full, tangible and exciting holiday experience. By using our creativity, we can even include math, science, and language arts, which will give the children the ability to better understand, connect with, and remember our holidays.

Early years are learning years. We tend to think of math, science and language arts as formal learning applicable only to older children. However, we would be amazed at how the young child experiences them, as well.

Over the course of this year, I will be focusing my articles on ways in which we can enrich the observance of Jewish holidays for our children using the above concepts. Many of the ideas I will be presenting to you have been used in Temple Shalom Nursery School, always to the enjoyment of our children. While they focus on young children, you will find that many of the general concepts can be adapted for older children as well. I hope you will find this series of articles helpful in infusing greater meaning and connection to the holidays.

CHANUKAH

Math

1. Count the number of candles when you put them in the chanukiah.

2. Make a Chanukah recipe and incorporate math skills by recognizing the

numbers on the measuring cup, and by measuring the ingredients.

3. Compare a menorah and a chanukiah. Talk about why one has seven branches, the other nine.

4. Provide each child with a box of Chanukah candles. Encourage them to sort the candles by color, count them and make designs.

5. Discuss that if there are eight days in Chanukah, why does the Chanukiah have nine branches?

Science

1. Observe the changes of a candle as the heat from the flame causes the solid candle to turn into liquid wax.

2. Experiment with oil. What happens when you add water to oil? Make a Chanukah shaker bottle by combining oil, blue food coloring water and Chanukah shaped glitter from a party store.

3. Discuss fire safety.

4. Make latkes and sufganiot. Use your five senses before and after cooking.

Language Arts

 Read Chanukah stories with your child. Act out the parts.

Compare all the different ways to spell Chanukah.
Write down the Chanukah story as your child dictates. Leave room on each page for art work.

4. Make Chanukah cards and encourage your child to write a message.

 Each night take a polaroid picture of your family celebration. Make it into a book with your child's captions.

(Some ideas taken from Jewish Every Day by Maxine Segal Handelman)

Don't forgot to include art, music and movement into your Chanukah celebration! For example, the cards you and your children make for each other should be dated and saved so that they can be hung up as decorations year after year. These cards will become your treasures; they have been for me.

I hope you will incorporate some of these ideas into your Chanukah celebration. Have a wonderful and meaningful holiday with your children.





Para-Iales The Mitzvah of Bikor Holim By Michael Hoffman, Para Rabbinic Fellow

Bikor Holim means "visiting the sick." It also means so much more. It is "a meeting of people who are sick or otherwise in need at the place where they are--understanding what they need to help make their lives whole again and helping in that process." One is allowed to violate the Sabbath to visit one who is seriously ill. This is because this mitzvah is so important. While there are different responses and resources in Judaism related to illness, it has been said that the most important is bikor holim.

The first recorded act of bikor holim is in Parsha Vayera (Genesis 18:1-22:24), when three angels are sent to visit Abraham after his circumcision. Here, Abraham first learns a lesson about the importance of Bikor Holim, visiting the sick, when God makes a Bikor Holim visit at the very beginning of the Parsha visiting Abraham when he is recuperating from his surgery.

At Temple Shalom, we started a Bikor Holim group last year. A number of people have volunteered and have made visits to congregants and their families and loved ones who are in hospitals, nursing homes and other facilities. We consistently find that these visits are so rewarding to us because there is so much appreciation from the people we are visiting.

The word mitzvah means "command," although it is sometimes incorrectly translated as "good deed." There are many mitzvot which serve only a ritual function, while some mitzvot encompass fulfilling a ritual command while doing a good deed. The mitzvah of bikor holim, visiting the sick, is a classic example of the kind of action that is both a mitzvah and a good deed. This mitzvah has been considered an honored part of our tradition since its earliest days. The reason for this emphasis is simple to understand. As long as people are sick, there is a need to help ease their pain, both physical and spiritual. When we take the time to visit those who are ill, we bring healing to patients, and support to all who help them. Our tradition teaches that each visitor takes some of the sickness from a patient. Therefore, when this mitzvah is followed appropriately, we help bring healing. This mitzvah should be part of what everyone in the congregation takes as a personal obligation. It should not be left for just the clergy to do.

As we begin the New Year, we are working to enhance our efforts in this area. Joining the Bikor Holim group is a perfect entryway into Temple involvement. pects of reality were more readily explained by human reason of the time. This is the "darkness" of Greece. What Greek culture exiled was the spark of the human soul and spirit. Jews were bold enough to accept their tradition that concurred with universal human intuition: that objective moral and spiritual realties exist, despite the intellect's inability to articulate them comprehensively. This very same debate rages today between secular thought and Judaism.

It is by no coincidence then that the miracle of the Jewish victory over Greece culminated in the relatively modest miracle of the single cruse of oil that burned for eight days. To Greek thinkers and their modern day secular heirs, there are rules of nature that cannot be breached -- the physical world is wondrous, but it has its insurmountable limitations. The symbol of the oil burning for eight days is that, within the very stuff of which the physical world is made, rests a very real inner dimension of the spiritual. The challenge of the Jew is to see beyond the simple physical and uplift it, allowing the spiritual potential to shine forth.

To commemorate our victory over the darkness of Greece, we place a delicately flickering candle on our windowsills to shine into the stark black night in the dead of winter. This is our expression of the metaphor that, while society and many "intellectuals" may portray humanity as merely a dull sack of cells, the reality is that deep within every one of us glows a spiritual ember waiting to burst aflame to allow us to fulfill our spiritual potential. This is the message of Chanukah, this is the message of being a "light unto the nations", and this is the message of the Jewish people. May your lights shine brightly!

down the stairs and then found seats for the two of us in the front row. We sat there together and watched the presentation, each of us profoundly moved. As I sat and watched, my emotions were deepened by the ironic and tender gesture that he had made. What a picture it was in my mind's eye ... a Jewish woman Cantor, holding the hand of a Muslim cleric as he led her safely to a seat in the darkness. I've known religious men of honor who would not allow themselves to touch the hand of a woman and yet, here was this man, one who serves as the representative of a beautiful and peaceful religion, reaching out his hand to me.

Ironically, I did not sing a liturgical piece. As most of you probably know, I believe that prayer through music can be facilitated in a myriad of ways. For this evening, I chose to sing the song "Try to Remember" from the off-Broadway show "The Fantasticks". In parting, I would like to share them with you:
