Happy Purim and a **Ziessen** Pesach

The Rabbi Writes

Purim celebrates the downfall of a man who wished to wipe out the Jewish people. The Megillah-the Book of Esther, which is read on Purim, tells us to keep the 14th of Adar (Sunday,



March 7, 2004) as a day of joy and happiness. The Megillah of Esther will be read in the synagogue on the morning of Purim (Sunday March 7, 2004 at 10:30 a.m.). The story of Purim is full of human interest and excitement.

The Book of Esther is of unique concern to modern Jews. A natural question to ask is, "Why isn't God mentioned in the Purim story?" Unlike most of the stories of the Tanach - Hebrew Bible, the Book of

Esther takes place outside the realm of the Holy Land. There is neither a Temple to defend nor the hope of redemption in a promised land. Instead it is very much a book of the Diaspora, concerned with people struggling to live a full Jewish life far away from the spiritual center of Judaism. It is thus uniquely relevant to modern times where the vast number of Jews live outside the State of Israel.

The story of Purim is not Anti-Zionist or atheist; it simply (and explicitly) ignores the discourses of Divine intervention and sacred land that inform most of the Tanach. None of the characters communicate directly with God; when Mordecai and Esther find out about their fate, they can only mourn and cry out (to whom?). The plot is propelled by human action rather than through plagues or divinelyspawned openings in the earth.

God is not in the Book of Esther because it is a text of an era where the actors have ultimate control of their own fates. Mordecai refuses to bow down to Haman and faces the consequences; Esther steps forward to plea for her people and risks her own life. And just as there is no Divine intervention when the Jews of the Persian Empire are faced with a problem, there are similarly no impediments when they assume power. In short, when we live in times where there are no contemporary prophets to guide us, we as children of God, individually and communally, must take responsibility for our own actions.

One month later, following Purim, we celebrate the Festival of Passover, our festival of freedom. On

My children will tell

you that their favorite holiday is Hanukkah, of course! They cannot understand why I am not in agreement. My favorite holiday is Passover, of course! Passover is a time



for family to be together, it's a time of tradition, and a time of love. That is why Passover is my favorite holiday. I know that each year, when we share in the traditions of Passover, my children are absorbing experiences of taste, sound and touch that will stay with them forever. There are so many lessons to be learned from Passover and so many fun ways to enjoy it.

Let's face it -- we have all experienced some pretty boring Seders in our days, or some that have turned into just another family dinner party devoid of meaning. In order to bring more meaning and enjoyment back to the family Seder, try the following:

1. Go to the dollar store and buy some "visual aids" for the plagues. When you get to that part of the Haggadah, throw out a pile of frogs...plastic cows and animals...snakes and spiders...ping pong

balls (hail)...dark sunglasses (darkness)...Be creative and fun. The kids (and adults) will love it.

2. Buy some dollar store "prizes" for kids. When they ask a good question (which is what you're trying to stimulate), they get a prize. Also give prizes for asking the Four Questions, good singers, etc... The kids will keep busy playing with their prize (doll, soldier, etc.) until they think of another good question and jump back in.

3. Explain to everyone that they are like royalty on Seder night. And since kings and queens do not pour for themselves, everyone gets a "pouring partner" who fills up their glass with wine or grape juice (or a combo) at the appropriate time. People pair up and have fun with this.

4. Read the Haggadah in the language that you best understand. That means English is fine. Share the reading by going around the table and taking turns.

5. It's okay to stop during the reading for a good discussion on the topic at hand. You may want to prepare some questions in advance to throw out at people such as:

- "If the Haggadah tells us that we are still slaves and not free, our definition of freedom must be very different. We are Jews in North America, aren't we free? What is the Jewish definition of freedom?"

- "Next year in Jerusalem? How many of us really want to live in Israel? What does the Land of Israel mean to you?"

- "The wise son doesn't sound so wise. He doesn't

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(Sisterhoods)} have a long history of advocacy supporting a woman's right to choose. Our Union for Reform Judaism President, Rabbi Eric Yoffie, stated,

"We are deeply concerned about the growing threat to a woman's right to choose. Reform Jews are not pro-abortion; our tradition permits abortion in some cases and prohibits it in others. But Reform Jews are emphatically pro-choice; we see women as moral agents who must be free to consult their religious principles and their conscience and then decide for themselves." *Process at Temple Shalom:*

The recommendation to support the April 25th Pro-Choice Rally in D.C. was brought to our Adult Jewish Growth (AJG) Committee. This committee is responsible for Adult Education and Social Justice issues. This, in itself, is problematic because that scope is very wide for one committee. Educating the congregation on tough social issues is a daunting, important task. It will be my recommendation to return to the days of old and separate these areas of interest into 2 committees......but now I am getting ahead of myself. The discussion at the AJG November meeting was very heated and passionate, and the resolution to bring the recommendation to our Board of Trustees passed, 6 yea, 3 nay.

At the December Board of Trustees meeting, the AJG Committee reported and (as with any important motion) we allowed the Board to consider the question for a month before bringing it to a vote. Because of the questions raised, ("Why should a Temple support such a controversial and emotional issue?" and "With so many imperatives for Tikkun Olam, why this issue?"), we invited those with the minority opinion to address the Board in January. I was very impressed with the thoughtful and respectful discussion that took place at that meeting and I publicly thank all those who participated. Special thanks to Barbara Kluger, Margo Wolfson, Susan Solow and Rabbi Malinger.

The Minority Opinion:

Affixing our name as a sponsor of the pro-choice rally would not be the right thing to do because it is divisive and it will cause

In the Haggadah we read, "...He [Jacob] went down to Egypt with meager numbers and sojourned there; but there he became a great and very populous nation. The Egyptians dealt harshly with us and oppressed us; they imposed heavy labor upon us. We cried to Adonai, the God of our ancestors, and Adonai heard our plea and saw our

plight, our misery, and our oppression. Adonai freed us from Egypt by a mighty hand, by an outstretched arm and awesome power, and by signs and portents." (Deuteronomy 26:5-8)

The celebration of the Passover Seder recreates that Israelite experience for us in our own time. We endure Egyptian bondage, the harshness of slavery and we become part of the redemption and the flight into freedom that our ancestors experienced so long ago. Their lives become our lives, their experiences our experiences, and their memories our memories.

It is a mitzvah to ...

... participate in a Passover seder.

...eat matzah and no leavened products during the seven days of Passover.

...participate in tzedakah during Passover. The rabbis of the Talmud taught that when one Jew celebrates all Jews celebrate. Woven into the celebration of Passover are several opportunities for tzedakah: *Maot Hittin* - "wheat money"

the bread of affliction, the poor bread, which our ancestors ate in the land of Egypt." We eat matzah because in the Torah it reads, "seven days shall you eat matzot - the bread of poverty and persecution." So that you may "remember that you were a slave in Egypt..." (Deuteronomy 16: 3 &12)

The rabbis who originally authored the Haggadah were very wise; first they remind us of the slavery, poverty and persecution of Egyptian bondage as if we ourselves had lived it. The rabbis wanted us to understand the life of the impoverished and the oppressed, it is then that the

Haggadah reads, "Let all who are hungry come and eat. Let all who are in want share the hope of Passover." By understanding hunger and want, we come to know the need for sharing what we have. The rabbis taught us to open up our hearts and our homes at Passover. Thus was born the tradition of inviting guests to the seder. Is there someone in your community in need of a place for seder, someone new or without family?

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Tales of Talmud Torah ElisaP.Bergenfeld,RJE Director of Education

Although Temple Shalom is located in Aberdeen, New Jersey, our religious school includes students from Aberdeen, Matawan, Old Bridge, Hazlet, Marlboro, Manalapan, Holmdel and



Middletown. Many parents send their children to our school not only to receive a quality Jewish education but also so they can just be around other Jewish children. Although some of the communities above have large Jewish populations, students in other school districts find themselves as a minoritymany even the only Jew in the class. It was because of this issue that we implemented several youth group type programs within the school setting. We did this in order to provide a more informal environment to encourage interaction amongst students who would not ordinarily get an opportunity to know one another.

This year's youth programs have been based around Jewish values and mitzvot. Through this process, the students have an opportunity to get to know each other while looking out into the world and becoming aware of others in need. Thus far, with the help of the Junior Youth Group advisor, Stacey Ringel, the students have learned about feeding the hungry while making sandwiches and decorating lunch bags that were sent to "Lunch Break", a soup kitchen in Red Bank. In December, the students learned about respecting the elderly while decorating cookies, and making special cards containing a polaroid picture of each 4-7th grade student. These cards and cookies were taken to Sunrise Assisted Living facility, bringing joy to many people during the holiday season who are often forgotten and alone. In addition to the youth group programs, during Chanukah, instead of spending money on grab bag gifts for their class parties, students brought in hundreds of hats, gloves, scarves, and socks that were distributed to local shelters and hospitals.

As we approach the holidays of Purim and Pesach, it is interesting to note how these holidays seek to encourage the same important values as discussed above. Purim teaches the idea of K'lal Yisrael - all Jews must stick together as a "community of Israel" in times of joy and crisis. Another key teaching of Judaism emphasized during Purim is Kol Yisrael Arayvin Zeh Bazeh - every Jew is responsible for one another. We celebrate the joy of Purim with friends and family and reach out to our immediate community with the mitzvah of distributing Mishloach Manot. These gifts are usually baskets of hamentashen, candies, and nuts. But during this time of great celebration, we are also obligated to think of those in need in the greater community. We often forget that it is also a custom to send Matanot L'Evyonim, baskets of food to those in need so they can also enjoy the holiday.

During Passover we mark the emergence of Israel as a nation and a people, celebrating our freedom and accepting the Torah as a basis for Jewish life. We celebrate with friends and family at our seders, retelling the story of how we became Am Yisrael, the entire Jewish people. We are encouraged to invite those in need, or without friends or family in the community, to our seders because we were once strangers in the land of Egypt. We are also obligated to give to a special fund for Ma'ot Chitim, literally "money for wheat" so that Jews in need may have money to purchase matzah, wine and other essentials for celebrating Passover.

We have a wonderful community at Temple Shalom filled with friends, family and a sense of community. May we always continue to see the value of our small Jewish community and support it while reaching out to those in need around the world.

So, you complete 7th grade in religious school and you have had your Bar or Bat Mitzvah. Now what? Is your Jewish education complete? Because I am still continuing my personal Jewish education, I would humbly suggest that no 7th grader could call their Jewish education complete.

Let's assume that we have agreed that the Jewish education does not end after Bar/Bat Mitzvah nor after the 7th grade is finished. What options do you have as a student to continue your Jewish education? If you were a child going to religious school at Congregation Beth Israel in Long Grove, IL, your only choice was to attend Bible Study with the Rabbi and adults. I did this for a short time as a teenager, but I was not with any children my age. I soon lost interest.

Luckily for the children in the Temple Shalom Religious School, they have a much better option available. They have the Monmouth Regional Reform Hebrew High School or MOREHHSHa program available to them. For those of you unfamiliar with MOREHHSHa, it is a joint high school program co-sponsored by Temple Shalom and Temple Rodeph Torah in Marlboro. Through this program, children can attend classes from 8th grade - 10th grade after which they are confirmed. They can then continue onto post-confirmation for 11th and 12th grade after which they have a Hebrew High school graduation.

The program leverages the resources of both temples to create a plethora of options for the high school students to choose from, ranging from The Jewish Kitchen to Conversational Hebrew and many more. The program also includes the option of a weekend retreat at Camp Kutz in 8th and/or 9th grade and, in 10th grade, 4 days attending L'taken-the social action seminar sponsored by the Religious Action Center of Reform Judaism in Washington, D.C.

We have had many students go through this program over the last 14 years and it has been highly successful. Even with all the program's success, there is room for improvement. In that spirit, we sent out a survey last year looking for things that were particularly good or possibly needed some improvement. Although the response date for that survey has long since passed, I welcome your feedback on our high school program as we continuously look for improvements. Morris and Rose Goldfeder Scholar-in-Residence Rabbi Matthew Aaron Kraus

MAY 14-15, 2004

Rabbi Matthew Kraus received his Ph.D. in Classics from the University of Michigan in 1996 and was ordained from Hebrew Union College-Jewish Institute of Religion in 1991. His main interests include the history of biblical interpretation and Judaism in the Greek and Roman world. He has written on Jerome's translation of the Bible from the Hebrew into Latin and on Philo, and he has given papers at scholarly conferences on the Old Latin version of the Bible and on the legend of the Septuagint (the Greek version of the Bible). He has given a paper on Jerome at the World Congress of Jewish Studies in Jerusalem. An article entitled "Christian, Jews, and Pagans in Dialogue: Saint Jerome on Ecclesiastes 12:1-7" has appeared in the 2001 issue of Hebrew Union College Annual and he has also published articles in Tikkun and Vetus Testamentum. Prof. Kraus spent 1999-2000 in Jerusalem on a Yad Hanadiv/Beracha foundation fellowship and lectured at Hebrew University on "Jerome as an ethnographer of the Jews." He currently is an Associate Professor of Classics at Williams College where he teaches courses on Bible in its Near Eastern Context, History of Interpretation of the Bible in the Greco-Roman Period, Introduction to Judaism, Myth and Biography in Late Antiquity (an upperlevel Latin course on Apuleius' version of Cupid and Psyche and The Confessions of Augustine), and first and second year Latin and Greek. Prof. Kraus lives in Williamstown with his wonderful wife, Rabbi Sissy Coran and 3 wonderful children, Jacob, Shirah, and Michah.

ADULT JEWISH GROWTH Barbara Kluger, Chairperson

Every Jew should have a selection of books they and their family members can refer to in order to learn more about Judaism and the Jewish people, seek inspiration and comfort, and access references from scholars on religious and cultural issues. A wonderful resource for finding out about books of interest to you and your family is the Union For Reform Judaism web site at www.urj.org. Go to its Lifelong Jewish Learning section and click on Building Your Jewish Library. You can review many categories of recommended books including Basic Jewish Thought and Theology; Jewish Texts; Jewish Observance; Jewish History, Women's Studies and Jewish Parenting. An adult Jewish learner needs to have reference resources easily at hand to help them address questions as they arise.

One of the ways in which our Committee supports Jewish learning is the Jewish Book Club - a popular series of Jewish book discussion groups that has been engaging adults in our congregation who love to read. Each year, we select five or six different books and a facilitator for each discussion group. Anyone can volunteer to facilitate a discussion group on a book you have already read and enjoyed, or a book you wish to read. You are always welcome to attend our Committee meetings, which are generally held on the third Wednesday of the month at 7:30 p.m.

This year, one of our selected books, presented in January, was "The Amazing Adventures of Kavalier & Clay" by Michael Chabon, a novel that takes place just before WWII through the post-war period. It is set in the milieu of the beginnings of the American comic book industry, which owes a great deal to Jewish stories and culture. The industry was greatly influenced by Jewish business people, artists and writers. Our President, Sharon Steinhorn, facilitated the discussion. You may be interested to read an article by Arie Kaplan entitled "How Jews Transformed the Comic Book Industry" which appeared in the Winter 2003 edition of Reform Judaism magazine. It is Part II of the article and talks about the Silver Age of comic books (1956-1978), the period just subsequent to the one encompassed by "Kavalier & Clay." Part III of the article is due to come out in the Spring 2004 edition of the magazine. It is a very interesting story.

Share your Passion in a Jewish Journey Group

Our Temple is the place where we come for worship, connection, support, celebration, guidance and learning - wherever we may be on our own Jewish journey. Here at Temple Shalom, we recognize the need for congregants to feel a sense of community within our larger congregation. Often, one's sense of belonging requires connection with a small group of people who share a common interest.

Jewish Journey Groups are small groups of 8-10 people with shared interests and passions. They meet for a limited number of sessions. When you join a JJG, you will meet other people to explore a topic of shared interest. JJGs can be organized around any topic relevant to the lives of Jews. There is a specific structure for each meeting. The group begins with an opening ritual allowing the participants to gather and focus on the group and the activity. After check-in, a time that allows everyone to greet each other, an exploration of the group's theme through text-study follows with an experiential activity, discussion or presentation. At the end of the meeting, there is a checkout allowing for closure of the day's session. A trained facilitator leads each group. Examples of group themes are; cooking, creating ethical wills, parents of newborns, B'nai Mitzvah families, parents of children with learning challenges, children of aging parents, new members, meditation, spirituality, pets, life after divorce, foreign language, leisure activities(e.g., golf, bowling, knitting, film, yoga, travel, art, music etc.) The topics are endless.

Nursery School News Laney Shapiro, Director

We are all aware of how quickly time passes and how quickly the children grow up. Do you ever wonder which family memories your children will hold and perpetuate as they grow older? I believe the memories of "everyday " family traditions are the ones which remain strongest and most meaningful. Perhaps a child will grow older and develop a fondness for a certain fruit or vegetable- not as much for the flavor as for the memory of picking it from the garden every summer with a grandparent. Or perhaps the lullaby a child's parent sang often will be remembered and then passed on to the next generation. These traditions tie generation to generation.

Therefore, we must provide our children with traditions they will remember and opportunities for families to share special times together. I recently read an article in Parents magazine which offered excellent ideas for special time activities. Here are a few of my favorites:

"The Never-Ending Game" can take as little as ten minutes a day. Choose a game or activity to which you and your child can return each day. It could be a continuous board game, a puzzle or a long book from which a few pages are read each day. They will look forward to this activity all day.

"One at a Time" is an activity I often stress to parents. It is excellent for families with more than one child. Set aside time each week for each child to spend alone with you. Your child will enjoy having you all to him/herself and I'm sure you will, too. This is especially important for an older sibling when a new baby is born.

"Hitting the Road" entails leading the family into the car for a mystery ride. The destination can be a park, candy store, grandparent's house, or any other special place.

"Counting Blessings" is a wonderful dinner or bedtime ritual. Simply have each family member share the nicest thing that happened that day. This can also be a Shabbat family ritual, where everyone thinks back on the most special events of the week.

"Media Blackouts" can also be a Shabbat family ritual, or you can try it on a weeknight to ensure the family spends time together. Simply leave all TV's, VCRs, and computers off. Use this time to have interactive fun. Try looking at family pictures, singing, and telling jokes.

As adults, rituals are also important to us. Don't we get a warm feeling when we remember special times with our parents and grandparents? We can feel good about doing the same for our own children by continuing these rituals with our children and by creating new ones!





TEMPLE SHALOM DIETARY POLICY

Our guidelines, which have been recommended by the Ritual Committee and approved by the Board of Trustees, stipulate that only Kosher or Kosher style food is allowed on our premises. That prohibits pork, shellfish, or any dish combining milk and meat products. Individual meat and dairy food items may be served at a Temple function but should be segregated at different ends of the table or at different tables. Also, if a dinner takes place at Temple at which meat is served, non-dairy creamer should be available for hot beverages.

Monday, April 5, 2004 the First Seder will begin at sundown. We are required to remember that we were slaves in Egypt and now we are free.

Of all the things we might have been bidden to remember, it is interesting that we are bidden by the Bible to remember that our ancestors were strangers. That memory, perhaps more than anything else, is meant to teach us the essence of our religion: empathy, compassion and responsibility for those who are in need. Thus, we begin the core recitation of the Haggadah with an invitation: "Let all those who are hungry come and partake." Yet, ultimately, we have a responsibility, especially as Reform Jews, to help others and speak out against injustice. Our tradition demands us to do so and these two holidays reminds us again the reasons why we must not stop doing this.

Every year, we take our Confirmation students to the **Religious Action Center of the** Reform Movement to learn about political issues and what the Reform Movement's position is on it. Then, we speak with our elected officials to share our concerns and remind them that we have an obligation as God's children to speak out against injustice. Our students learn that we must be like Mordechai and Esther and Moses in that we have to help others and make sure their lives are not lessened. That is why on Sunday, April 25, 2004, I will be going to Washington, D.C. to march in the March for Women's Lives Rally, an effort to cry out to protect women's rights for reproductive freedom and choice. Reproductive choice is often considered a legal and medical issue-what the law says and what doctors advise. But for most women and men, decisions about familyincluding decisions about when and whether to bear children-are mainly personal, involving their beliefs and

values. As pro-choice people of faith, I believe that the ability to make moral decisions is the very basis of an individual's dignity and autonomy and an expression of our God-given ability to exercise free will.

As Reform Jews, we hold in high respect the value of potential human life, while remaining committed to women as responsible, moral decision-makers. We believe that we must move beyond the bitter abortion fight to ensure that every child is wanted; that every pregnant woman has quality health care; that all parents-male and female-understand their responsibilities and have the support they need; that children are educated about sexuality so they can make responsible decisions; and that freedom of choice-basic to our way of life-is preserved. I am going to speak up with compassion and empathy and take the responsibility to help others. Please join with me!

seem to know anything. What is the Jewish definition of wisdom?"

Encourage an atmosphere where people feel comfortable asking questions about what's being said in the Haggadah. Once a question is asked, invite everyone to think about a possible answer, and/or to look in his/ her Haggadah to find one.

6. Tell everyone to eat a light meal before coming to the Seder. This is not a dinner party -- the reading and discussion of the Haggadah is the whole point of the evening! Let people know in advance that they will be reading through the Haggadah and discussing issues long before they begin eating. Don't let the meal become the focus.

7. Assign topics to present to various guests. For example, give someone the section on "The Four Sons" and get them to learn and discuss the meaning behind each son to present to everyone at the table. 8. Use the same Haggadahs so that everyone can follow.

9. If you are trying to change the focus of the family Seder toward something more meaningful, try hosting it at your home this year. Always invite guests who are not family. When "guests" are there, even the most cynical family member is on their best behavior.

10. Ask me for my packet of Passover Parodies. These are lyrics for Passover set to well known melodies such as "Take Me Out to the Ballgame".

Enjoy this special time with your family and friends. Know that you are transmitting to them some of the most precious memories of their lives!

some members to feel alienated from our Temple.

We should allow our congregants their own viewpoints on this controversial issue; we should support issues of tikkun olam, which we can support with all of our Jewish souls and congregants. With study and allowing our congregants to express themselves, we should not support the rally with our Temple's name at this time. The Majority Opinion & Results: It is obvious from the publicity you are getting that the Board of Trustees passed the following motion: Temple Shalom shall support and attend the Pro-Choice Rally in Washington D.C. on April 25, 2004. The overwhelming majority of Board members felt strongly that our prophetic writings provide an imperative to speak out, together, as a community, at this crossroads in history for the freedom for women to choose our own medical destinies.

What we learned:

1. Never assume an issue is a "no brainer" decision.

2. Whenever possible, publish upcoming Board of Trustee motions in the weekly email communication so the congregation is aware and encouraged to comment and/or attend Board meetings.

3. We are strong enough to withstand differences of opinions.
