#### FROM RABBI WEBER ...

Ilu hotzi-hotzi-anu, hotzi-anu mi-mitz-rayim, Hotzi-anu mi-mitz-rayim, Dayenu!

"Had God brought us out of Egypt, and not divided the sea for us, Dayenu - it would have been enough!"

Nonsense.

I love singing Dayenu; it is a great Pesach song. But it does not tell the truth about the Exodus. It says that if God had only brought us out of Egypt and had not done all sort of other things for us, "it would have been enough." Had God not divided the sea, sustained us in the desert, fed us with manna, . given us Shabbat, brought us to Mount Sinai, given us the Torah, led us into the land of Israel, built the Temple, sent us the prophets, and made us a holy . people, it still would have been enough. Nonsense.

Had God only brought us out of Egypt, we would have died at the Red Sea. Had we survived the Red Sea, we would have died in the desert. And so on, through all the verses of the poem: Had God not provided every one of these blessings, there would be no one to sing *Dayenu*; the Israelites would never have survived. No matter how many times we sing the song, the lesson of Passover remains: it is not enough to "save" people by making them free. We must also help them survive in freedom.

Now, it is time to put that lesson to the test. Now it is our turn to be Moses; our turn to lead our people out of slavery and into the Promised Land. The Second Exodus is happening right now, and every person who has a *seder*, or even tastes matzah during Passover, is needed to save the Jews. This year -1990 - we expect 150,000 Jews to leave the Soviet Union. Between now and 1992, that number may exceed three-quarters of a million. As of December, 500,000 Jews applied for exit visas; 500,000 more are expected to apply by June. No more than 37,000 of these Jews will be allowed into the United States. The rest will go to Israel.

What if Israel cannot accept them? What if Israel is crushed under the economic burden of a half-million immigrants, and has to say "no" to any more? *Pamyat*, the Russian anti-Semitic organization, has the answer. In Moscow, a young Jewish mother was attacked in an elevator and a Jewish star was carved on her breast. They are calling for Jews to be excluded from universities, political parties and government posts. In Leningrad, 15,000 anti-Semites joined in a "Days of Russian Culture" celebration next door to the Leningrad synagogue... and "Russian Culture" means non-Jewish culture. The word our

great-grandparents dreaded - pogrom - is heard everywhere. It is now or never.

The Monmouth County Federation of Jewish Philanthropies just received its assessment for settling these Jews in Israel. Between now and 1992, we have to raise (brace yourself) \$1.2 million. I couldn't believe that amount until I heard the projected total cost for this Second Exodus: at last calculation, Israel will need \$2.5 billion to house, clothe, feed and provide jobs for these people. The numbers, even for a whole country, are mind-boggling.

I have never pushed very hard for our congregation to support Federation, even though Shira and I contribute every year. I felt we needed to build our building and learn how to survive before we could offer any substantial help to others. I would not even have chosen this as the time to begin, since building our home still requires paying for it. But Federation would not have chosen this time for "Operation Exodus" either: the \$1.2 million it must raise to save these Jews is in addition to everything it needs for all its own programs. We simply have no choice; there will not be another opportunity.

Not since the original Exodus have so many Jews had the chance to escape death. For some reason, some indiscernible quirk of politics, the "Red" sea has split, and our people are free to leave. But, as God taught us, getting out is not enough: these Israelites must travel through the desert, enter the Promised Land, and begin to build their lives. If we do not help them now, we will live with our shame for all history. If we do help them now, we will see the story of Passover come alive in our own day.

Yes, we all love to sing *Dayenu*. Especially since God was kind enough never to stop when we said "it would have been enough." Now we must teach a new generation of Israelites - our Russian brothers and sisters - that the road to freedom is long, and difficult, and worth the effort. We must teach them the words to *Dayenu*, and be kind enough never to stop when they say, "it would have been enough."

Call me, or write to me, or see me, and tell me you will help. This is our only chance, and we must not let it go by. Who knows? In the centuries to come, they may write songs about us, too. And that would certainly be "enough."



### SOCIAL ACTION NEWS

We all know there are Jews in the world who cannot practice their religion... but did you know that there are Jews right here in our own community who can't? These Jews are not being stopped because of political problems, but because they cannot afford or are physically unable to prepare a *seder* and participate in Passover!

Each year the Social Action Committee prepares a Passover basket of food for the needy Jewish family in Monmouth County. This year we are asking the congregation to join with us so that we can help not just one, but many families. Below is a list of foods needed (please keep in mind that all items must be designated "Kosher for Passover"):

Chicken, Turkey (frozen), eggs, apples, carrots, celery, potatoes, onions, shelled walnuts, horseradish, jars of gefilte fish, jars of chicken soup with matzoh balls, boxes of matzoh, boxes of matzoh meal, boxes of matzoh farfel, macaroons, wine.

Along with our Passover basket program, we are once again asking that when you prepare your own home for Passover, you donate your *Hametz* (leaven) to Open Door. *Hametz* applies to the fermented products of five kinds of grain: wheat, barley, oats, rye and spelt. Nowadays (Ashkenazi) practice is to also prohibit use of rice, peas, corn, peanuts and all types of beans. Rather than give these items to neighbors or save them until Passover is over, give them to Open Door so that someone won't go hungry that week.

Now that we are in our new building, you will find a permanent basket labelled "Open Door" in the Atrium. During March and April there will also be one for Passover items. When you pass them by and they are empty, please think of the children who go empty to bed in our community every night... Please, remember to give.



I'd like to share with you an incredible organization that is sure to change your life around. JFTY (Jersey Federation of Temple Youth) is a place where Jewish teenagers can come to express their innermost thoughts, form a close Jewish community, and just plain downright have fun. Through programs, song sessions, and dances, you not only get a chance to learn more about your Jewish heritage and yourself, but you also get a chance to socialize and make new friends. If you're a person who's looking to get involved, make a whole new load of friends, and have great fun, then I urge you to think about JFTY - it's an experience you'll never forget.




