#### FROM RABBI WEBER...

Dear Emily, Lauren and Marnie,

Your upcoming Confirmation is very exciting for you, for me, and for all the members of Temple Rodeph Torah. For many reasons, it will be one of the high points of this whole wonderful year.

The most obvious reason for excitement about your Confirmation is, of course, that we will celebrate it in our own sanctuary. Of all the ceremonies we hold during the year, I always felt it was Confirmation that suffered most from lack of a temple building. Not that we haven't made every Confirmation special, but it is difficult to feel we are observing Shavuot correctly — making a holy offering to God — when the walls are decorated with life—size posters of James Dean and Elvis. For this reason alone, your Confirmation will be exceptional.

Another reason for the specialness of your Confirmation is seen in your numbers: when you were in seventh grade, 21 students made up the class. Now that you are completing tenth grade, three of you remain. Each person who left the program had his or her reasons, and I don't judge them badly for choosing other paths; but you chose this path, and we have walked it together. For this reason, you - and all my Confirmands - are very special to me.

There is one more reason, and it has to do with each of you as individuals. Perhaps more than any other class I taught, I have watched you grow — and you have grown beautifully. I watched you in eighth grade, as you struggled to hold your own against forceful, outspoken tenth graders: it wasn't easy, but you did it. I watched you in ninth grade, as both you and our congregation came to know ourselves and each other better. You became active in the temple — in Youth Group, Social Action, and in the Confirmation Program itself — and you began to assert yourselves, together, as a class.

Tenth Grade was not an easy year for you. Some of the challenges you faced were unintended; others were done on purpose. Your bonds with each other were tested as we threw you in with eleven other Confirmation students from Temple Shalom, and while you kvetched (often with good reason), you also prevailed. You made the class work, and you made the other students work, too. It was in this effort that I saw your most outstanding quality emerging: you are leaders. You are willing to stand up for what you believe, to fight for your beliefs, and to challenge anyone – students, teachers and rabbis – who do not see what you see.

In December we went to Washington, where you learned about the crucial issues

of today - homelessness, AIDS, Soviet Jewry, El Salvador, Israel's survival, women's rights. Then I saw you turn those lessons into action, as each of you stood up to Congressman Smith's Legislative Aide, told him what you believed, and asked him what your Representative would be doing to address your concerns. You were scared to death, and you had good reason to be. But you were magnificent, you were courageous, and you were leaders.

Last month I asked if any of you would like to spend a day with me at Hebrew Union College — my alma mater. I explained that it would not be for a tour, but to attend classes with student rabbis, participate in a service, and listen as the students and faculty critiqued a student's sermon. I did not know if any of you would want to go; I should have known that all of you would want to go! I was proud to show you off to my teachers and my colleagues, I was proud of the way you listened and learned, and I was pleased to see you so comfortable in the school that trains Reform Jewish leaders.

Where will you go from here? I do not know, and even you only have an inkling of an idea. Did I bring you to HUC because I hoped you might consider becoming rabbis, cantors or educators somewhere down the line? I would be lying if I said the thought didn't cross my mind. But where you go is not crucial to me: what pleases me so is the way you are going. It is clear that you are proud to be Jews and willing to be leaders, and that makes every moment we have spent together special and memorable.

Speaking for the temple and the whole community of Israel, welcome: we have been waiting for you. And I add, personally, that I am very proud of you.

### PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

I just finished reading a very enlightening, yet disturbing article in TIME entitled, "Beyond the Melting Pot." It begins, "Someday soon, surely much sooner than most people...realize, white Americans will become a minority group. Long before that day arrives, the presumption that the 'typical' U.S. citizen is someone who traces his or her descent in a direct line to Europe will be part of the past."

The proposed changes in public school and college curriculum which will serve to more equitably reflect the contributions of the various components of this new America can possibly minimize the future teachings of the contributions of American Jews. The redistribution of political and economic leadership can again leave the Jewish segment of society in a vulnerable position.

What are the implications for us? It will become more important, I think, to preserve and to trumpet our pride in our heritage with the same zeal as all the other constituents of a multi-racial America; to avoid the complacency that a life without struggle for food, shelter, or education can bring. The face of the "typical" American will change and so, surely, will the role of the American Jew.

But who will be the players in this next great revision of American culture? Those little people whose current crop of heroes includes the New Kids on the Block, the Teenage Mutant Ninja Turtles, and Roseanne. Think about that the next time the car pool to Religious School seems to interfere with your usual routine, or when asked again to volunteer your time for the temple.

The walls of the Religious School wing of the temple were constructed of cinder block, so that at an opportune time we can expand up to educate more Jews. Beginner's luck? I don't think so.







#### SOMEONE YOU KNOW IS WAITING TO JOIN T.R.T.

#### REFORM HELP FOR "WOMEN AT THE WALL"...

The Reform Movement, through A.R.Z.A., has launched a campaign to assist Women at the Wall, a group of women which is fighting for the right to conduct organized prayers at the Western Wall in Jerusalem. A.R.Z.A. raised more than \$6,000 toward the purchase of a Torah scroll for the group, and for use in legal expenses.

Women at the Wall have been praying regularly at the Wall in the women's section, but have been denied the right to read from the Torah, sing aloud, or wear kippot or tallitot. They point out that there is no reason — even according to the strictest interpretation of Jewish law — why they should be denied these rights. The matter is currently being considered by Israel's Supreme Court, and a decision is expected soon.

In a new development, A.R.Z.A. leaders point out that Reform and other non-Orthodox groups are now being harassed when they try to pray in mixed groups in the plaza area behind the Wall. A.R.Z.A. notes that there is absolutely no justification for any limitations on Reform or mixed prayer in this area, and the A.R.Z.A.-sponsored Israel Religious Action Center is now investigating the matter. Temple members who belong to A.R.Z.A. are helping with the struggle for religious freedom at the Western Wall by supporting its efforts in this area. #### FROM THE RELIGIOUS ACTION CENTER: SUPPORT THE ANTI-HUNGER BILL...

The Mickey Leland Memorial Domestic Hunger Relief Act (HR 4110) has been introduced in Congress to address the rising rate of hunger in America — especially among children. Two to five million American children are hungry right now. HR 4110 is intended to be a living memorial to the late Representative Mickey Leland, who was the founder of the House Select Committee on hunger, and who died on a trip investigating hunger in Ethiopia last year.

The bill will increase both benefits and access to the Food Stamp Program, and will reauthorize and expand the Temporary Emergency Food Assistance Program (TEFAP) which distributes food to shelters and food pantries throughout the United States.

The Union of American Hebrew Congregations and the Central Conference of American Rabbis are requesting congregants to write to their Representatives, urging them to co-sponsor this legislation.

In addition, food distribution agencies are reporting greater need from poor families in our own area. We ask every temple family to remember to bring non-perishable food items to the temple, and deposit them in the "Open Door" basket by the front door.






