#### FROM RABBI WEBER

If I had two children—a boy and a girl—and for whatever reason, I only had enough money to give one of them a Jewish education, which one would I choose?

The answer is simple: I would educate the girl.

I know that traditionally, it is the boy who gets most of the attention when it comes to Religious School, Bar Mitzvah, and the like. In fact, the whole concept of Bat Mitzvah is less than 100 years old; providing any sort of formal Jewish education for girls is not much older than that. Nevertheless, my daughter would get the Jewish education if I could only choose one.

Why? Because in the great majority of Jewish homes—of our homes—it is the mother who sets the religious tone. It is the mother who decides to light Shabbat candles, or to bring the kids to the "Very Young People's Shabbat" Service, or to call around and decide which temple to join. Even in families where the wife is not Jewish and the husband is, it is usually still the wife who insists on making sure the kids have a strong religious foundation! Whether Jewishly knowledgeable or not, it is the women who make most of the Jewish decisions in a family's life.

Because traditional Judaism did not provide formal education for girls, some people think this means it is not important. In fact, girls received at least as much Jewish training as did boys, but it was of a different sort. A traditional Jewish woman needed to know all the laws of *Kashrut* (keeping Kosher), of family purity (mikvab and the like), Pesach, and all the other rituals connected with the home. They were trained—by their mothers, their grandmothers, and by all the other Jewish women who lived nearby. A Jewish teenage girl of 100 years ago was probably more knowledgeable about Judaism than most adults—female or male—today.

Today, Jewish women live in a different world. Our world is not defined by the kitchen walls, even for full-time homemakers. There is carpool, PTA, sports, clubs and volunteer work, in addition to career and business life. These are things of which our ancestors never dreamed, and which the traditional "home schooling" method cannot cover. Today's Jewish women must know about the whole spectrum of life, not just home-oriented rituals. And the only way to get that knowledge is through parental example and religious school.

Elie Wiesel, the philosopher of the Holocaust and Jewish survival, has offered his own answer to the question, "Who Is a Jew?" He said, it is not a matter of whether your mother or father is Jewish; it is a matter of whether your children are Jewish. I agree; the truest test of Jewish faith is whether it is passed on to the next generation, for without the children even our greatest achievements will not outlive us. If children do not learn what it means to be Jewish—male or female—what are the chances they will pass our tradition on to their children?

We all know there are people around our area who will "Bar Mitzvah" kids without any real religious training, without belonging to a temple, without anything except a fairly large payment. Since each Rodeph Torah family chose to join here instead of taking this minimalist option, it must be because you care about more than having an excuse for a party. Obviously, you want your children to know what it means to be Jewish—to love it, to live it, and to pass it on (God willing) to their children. Because of this commitment you have already shown, you are the best teachers of the importance of educating every Jewish child. If a neighbor, friend or relative has a girl who is not in religious school because "it's not important for a girl," please pass on this article—along with your own encouragement to give a Jewish education to the child. She is the future of our people.

In truth, what I said about choosing the girl if I could only afford to educate one of my kids, is not what I would actually do. If I really could not afford to educate both my kids, I would sit down with my rabbi and say so. I would tell him (or her) that I have a Jewish child who is not learning what it means to be a Jew, and any Jew who cares about our tradition would help me do everything possible to get that child into school. And I would not leave the rabbi's office until we had worked out a way to make it happen.

So, what are you waiting for?

# PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Several weeks ago, we dedicated the Memorial Wall. Our building finally became a home. We now have a very personal and permanent link to our past. Unfortunately, not many of us were present for this event. Perhaps it was the early hour of the service on a weekend night. Rabbi Weber's sermon summarized why this Memorial Wall is important to our future. I felt that this sermon was important enough to this congregation that I have asked him to use the rest of my column this month to share his message with you.

"I spent a lot of time trying to figure out why this evening is so important. Why this Yiskor—this dedication of the Memorial—has stood out in my mind as one of the most important times in all of the High Holidays that we are now concluding. After thinking about it since long before Rosh Hashanah, I decided the reason was that today marks a very special point in the life of Temple Rodeph Torah. As we dedicate this Memorial, we complete the process of birth for this congregation. It has taken 11 years, but after 11 years I believe we have seen the emergence of the whole being that is Temple Rodeph Torah.

When Temple Rodeph Torah began 11 years ago, it was begun out of an understanding of our obligation to our children. It was begun by people who wanted to create a way to educate their children about Judaism and Jewish life. The very first part of this congregation was the religious school, because we understood our obligation to these young Jews.

Soon after that, with some tentative and faltering steps, the congregation began to hold services as the members recognized our obligation to God. They knew a congregation could not only be a religious school; that to be a temple, it had to include a place and a way to pray. And so, through several student rabbis (and some very trying times), the congregation developed its way of prayer—the way that continues to this day and beyond.

Through all the years since that beginning, we have learned of our obligation to our community. We learned that it is not enough to serve only ourselves—that we must reach out, and extend a hand to the community at large. And so, we began to volunteer at the hospitals on Christmas Eve and Christmas Day; we began to collect food for the hungry on High Holidays and throughout the year; and we began to offer programs and open them to the whole community, because part of our birth was recognizing what we owed to our community.

And then, a few years ago, we decided to build this building. Some of you may not remember, but there were many people who did not want to build the building. They said they were perfectly happy meeting in Asher Holmes School, and did not see any reason to spend all the money and do all the work that it would take to create this structure. But those were people who only wanted a place for their child's Bar or Bat Mitzvah, and who actually felt happier that they could have the Bar or Bat Mitzvah at the catering hall, and not have to travel from the temple to where they were having their party. But all of us, together, took the very difficult steps to build this building—for we knew that if we did not build it, there would be no future for this congregation. It would survive, perhaps for a couple of years, and then it would die. But until we recognized our obligation to the future, we had no hope of being a part of that future. And so, up to this point in the process of our birth, we have recognized our obligations to our children, to God, to our community, and to the future.

This evening we are here because we recognize and accept our obligation to the past. For as much as we have been rooted in the present and in the future, we can never grow into what we want to be until we accept that obligation to the past. As I have said many times, the only way to proceed on the straight line forward is to stop every now and then, look backward, and see where we have been, and what paths we have taken. Only then can we turn, and look ahead, and proceed in a straight line.

I am very glad that this room is used not only for services but also for Adult Education, and for the meetings of our Board of Directors. I am glad that all of those gatherings will take place in the sight of this Memorial that we dedicate this evening. I pray that all the studying that we do here will be done not only for our own good, but also to honor and preserve the past; to preserve the memory of all those whose names, inscribed on

this board, represent that past. And I pray that when the Board of Directors of this congregation meets in this room, it will make its decisions not only on the basis of what is good for us, but also on the basis of what is good for those whose names are here.

For tonight we accept our obligation to the past. And with it, we accept the understanding that we are the bearers of the past for those who have died. We are the ones who carry on the traditions handed down to us by those whose names are written here. We are their hope for the future. And do we even perhaps have the chutzpa to hope that one day our names will be written here? And that others, not yet born and not yet part of the community, will carry on what we have done? Not only for their good, and for the sake of the future, but also for the sake of our names inscribed on this Memorial.

Tonight we acknowledge our obligation to the past. And yet, we have a great deal more to do to make that obligation real because, as you can see from looking around you, many people don't yet understand that obligation. There are many people who don't yet understand that we cannot go forward until we remember the past. There are many who do not yet know that without this Memorial we are less, and we will be less. Or that with this Memorial, we are more—greater, stronger, and wiser—than we could ever be alone.

Tonight we complete the birth of Temple Rodeph Torah. We are young, and we have a long way to grow. We have a great deal to learn, and a great deal to teach. May we begin by teaching our obligation to the past."

#### A SHOPPING LIST FOR THE FOOD PANTRY

Our local food pantries offer basic food supplies to needy families and senior citizens throughout the year, without charge. Through our Social Justice Committee, Temple Rodeph Torah is participating in an ongoing program to gather food for the hungry.

These items are in extremely short supply: meat and fish in cans, peanut butter, and any other protein-rich foods; baby food and formula; canned soups; disposable diapers. The following items are also needed: any kind of pasta, rice, instant potatoes, beans, macaroni dinners, spaghetti sauce, canned chili (pasta meals, etc.), canned vegetables, canned fruit, peanut butter, jelly, hot and cold cereals, powdered and evaporated milk, coffee, tea, cocoa, crackers, cookies, sugar, canned and bottled juices, baby food and formula, especially disposable diapers, bath soap, bath tissue, dish detergent and laundry products.

When you go food shopping, please buy one of these items for yourself and another to donate to the food pantry. Remember, when you sit down to your dinner, there is someone - maybe a child like yours or an elderly person like your parents - who is going hungry that night.

ARZA has announced the 3rd Bar/Bat Mitzvah contest which will send a lucky 7th grade student and two adults to Israel for one week. Students are asked to write a composition of between 200 and 500 words on the theme: "Meeting and traveling with a Soviet and/or Ethiopian Immigrant in Israel." The contest is jointly sponsored by ARZA (The Association of Reform Zionists of America), Moriah Hotels, and El Al Israel Airlines. It is open to boys and girls in the 7th grade of Religious School who will be celebrating their Bar/Bat Mitzvah with the congregation.

Along with the First Prize of a week in Israel at the Moriah Jerusalem and Moriah Plaza Tel Aviv hotels and three round trip airline tickets (from New York), the winner will be featured in the El Al inflight magazine, ISRAEL AL, and the ARZA Newsletter. Second Prize is a \$250 State of Israel Certificate, Third Prize is a book and Israeli records. Five honorable mention prizes will also be awarded.

Entries are due in the ARZA office by March 31, 1992, and winners will be announced by June 1992. Compositions will be judged by a panel of representatives from ARZA, the Moriah Hotels, and El Al Israel Airlines. Judges will be looking for originality and creativity. For more information, 7th graders should speak with their religious school teacher.
