### A SPECIAL GIFT: YOUR PRESENCE

When a member of our congregation suffers the death of a loved one, Temple Rodeph Torah conducts services at the member's home during *shiva*. A *minyan*—ten Jewish adults—is required to conduct these services.

We need members to volunteer to attend these *minyanim* when the need arises. No one is required to attend every service, but we need a sufficient pool of volunteers to assure that the needs of every family are met. If you can offer your presence, we would appreciate your volunteering to help.

No Hebrew knowledge or special training is required. Any adult Jew—that is, age 13 or older, male or female, regardless of whether you have celebrated your Bar/Bat Mitzvah—is welcome, and your participation would be the fulfillment of the *mitzvah* to comfort the bereaved. ### PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

I extended a written invitation to the Congregation to attend the December meeting of the Board of Directors. The task force I appointed in October was to give their report on the question of whether we should accept more than 76 students per grade in our Religious School. The Board meeting was postponed to January 3 because of the weather, and approximately 35 congregants turned out. The task force's recommendation, and the overwhelming sentiment of those temple members in attendance, was to maintain our current enrollment practice. On January 17, at its regular meeting, the Board, by a vote of 12 to 4, decided to retain our current limitations, and reject a proposal to expand enrollment to 90 students.

Why was this issue even raised? What does the decision mean? Since most families who join a temple are seeking to provide a Jewish education for their children, the number of spaces available in our third grade generally translates into the number of new families we can accommodate in any one year. Third grade was filled this past May, and throughout the summer, usually our most active membership recruitment period, we turned about 20 families away. We expect the scenario to be repeated for next year's third grade.

Several members shared with me their concerns about turning families away. Our temple was founded by families that were turned away by another Reform congregation in the area, and now we were doing the same thing. I was also concerned about the financial impact of turning down members. This temple is strapped with a large mortgage, and limited to some degree in what we can do and provide for our members by our revenue stream. Perhaps, I thought, if we could find a way to increase the enrollment in Religious School, we could absorb more of the demand in the community and improve our financial picture.

In the fall, the Education Committee realized it would have to add an additional day to next year's school schedule. Historically school was closed on Tuesday because it was the administrator's and rabbi's day off. However, because so many grades are now at or near maximum enrollment, the different grades could no longer share a session. With only one grade meeting at a time, more classroom space was available for each grade. I questioned whether enrollment could be expanded, perhaps to 90 students in a grade, without affecting the quality of our program.

The task force, in recommending against expanding the enrollment, was concerned about how to conduct Bat and Bar Mitzvah services for the additional students. With 76 students a year utilizing most available Shabbat mornings, an additional service would have to be conducted up to seven times a year to accommodate the 14 new students. The task force suggested an additional clergy person, perhaps a cantor, should be hired to officiate at these services. Concerns were raised that those members who would get the cantor, would not be happy about not getting the rabbi.

What about turning down members? Increasing the enrollment to 90 students is an increase of up to 14 new families a year. This past year, we turned down over 20. Thus, it appeared that we still could not accommodate the demand. The task force proposed that rather than just turn away families, we offer to connect those families with each other and assist them in starting their own temple.

It was not clear from the task force report what the true financial impact of accommodating the additional families would be. However, the bulk of the debate turned on another issue, for which there was a great deal of passion: the teaching of our seventh grade. Our temple is unique in that we are one of the few that have its rabbi as the sole religious studies teacher for seventh graders. Although my children have yet to experience that program, it is considered to be a very successful, enriching and rewarding program. Whether that is because our rabbi happens to be Rabbi Weber, who is an extraordinary teacher, or because the children are taught by the

congregational rabbi, is hard to say; the rabbi has always been Rabbi Weber. Without explaining all the logistics, our rabbi could not be the sole religious studies teacher for seventh grade if the enrollment was increased. Either some children would have a different teacher, or the curriculum would have to be split between the rabbi and another teacher.

This issue generated the most emotion, and the most discussion. Most revealing was the very strong feeling of preserving our method of teaching seventh grade by Board members and congregants whose children have already gone through the program, children who would not be affected by a change. One Board member, with younger children, said he was willing to share our rabbi with additional families, to expose their children to what we have to offer. A charter member responded to him, saying that she wanted his children to have the same wonderful experience that hers did.

In the end, the majority of the Board decided not to change the existing policy regarding student enrollment. While the Board was guided by strong passion, its decision was reached after the issue was reviewed by a task force, discussed at a meeting of the congregation and further debated at a meeting of the Board. It was a lengthy process, but the importance of the decision justified the time and effort that went into making it.

### RELIGIOUS SCHOOL

Starting January 29, our *Morehhsha* High School students are back home at Temple Rodeph Torah, and we welcome them back. I would like to tell you how proud I am of an extraordinary group of young men and women—the *Morehhsha* students. They come together "religiously" every Monday night, and are truly happy. They are serious and fun, spunky and sensitive, opinionated and thoughtful. Our *Morehhsha* has 110 students.

This semester the eighth and ninth graders had the opportunity to choose two courses from a selection of nine. A few examples of course topics are: Great Jewish Debates: speaking out for what you believe in; Jerusalem 3000; Conversational Hebrew; *Shoah*: Studies of the Holocaust; Life Discussion: peer counseling; Jewish Cooking; Choir; and Jewish Themes through the Arts.

On January 22, we held a special program for parents and students entitled, "Life is Worth Living." It was facilitated by Maureen Mullin Underwood, ACSW. Maureen is a Clinical Social Worker whose practice specializes in grief and bereavement. We learned how to identify the warning signs of suicide and were told the importance of not keeping someone's thoughts of suicide a secret. A list of "hot line" phone numbers for our area, was distributed and is available at the school office for anyone who would like a copy. I would like to thank all the parents who attended, and the Temple Shalom Caring Committee for sponsoring the evening event.

This space will be devoted to articles of interest to intermarried couples, couples contemplating intermarriage, Jews-by Choice, those considering conversion to Judaism, parents and/or children of intermarried couples and anyone concerned about the future of Judaism.

If you find that you fall into one of these categories, please consider taking the time to write an article for this space. Need some ideas? Letters to the Editor

I recently attended a conference held in Philadelphia, entitled "The Jew and the Lotus." It was an enlightening experience and it was helpful to me in my spiritual quest.

The conference was led by three members of a delegation of rabbis and teachers that visited the Dalai Lama in 1991. The purpose of that visit was to share the long tradition and wisdom gained during the Jewish Diaspora with the Tibetan Buddhists, who in this era are faced with dispersion from Tibet and the ruin of their spiritual treasures, monasteries and sacred cultural artifacts. The meeting also included a discussion on some similarities and differences between Buddhism and Judaism.

I was amazed by the number of people who attended this conference. The Germantown Jewish Centre was packed with well over 1,000 people. I was attending because of my interest in Buddhism, meditation and Yoga. It was through this exploration that my interest in Judaism was rekindled. I learned that I was not alone and that many workshop participants also have made use of Eastern religions. Jewish participation and leadership in New Age and Eastern religious groups far exceed our proportions in the American population. Rabbi Zalman Schachter explained that after the Holocaust, many Jews have been angry at God and that it is hard for people looking for a loving, living God to find God among angry voices. Consequently, Eastern religions have been lifelines to many. He said that it is possible to be both a Jew and use the tools of Buddhism to deepen our Jewish practice. In studying our own tradition we discover that many of the same ideas and tools are right here. Meditative practices have been widespread among Jews throughout Jewish history. Unfortunately, much of this information has been hidden and is not readily available. This mysticism and spirituality must be more readily available to those who seek it and people should not be forced to look at other religions for answers.

For the past year and a half, I have been a member of Temple Rodeph Torah. Through our temple and Rabbi Weber, I have rediscovered the spirituality in Judaism. The Shabbat *minyan* is spiritually rewarding and I encourage you all to participate. I am rediscovering the beauty and power of prayer. I would like to explore alternate forms of prayer through chanting, meditation and yoga. Perhaps there are others who have similar interests. If you have any related ideas, give me a call at 536-8404.

The book "The Jew and the Lotus" by Rodger Kamenetz, explores in detail the ideas I have touched upon. The book "Jewish Meditation—A Practical Guide" by Aryeh Kaplan is an excellent guide to meditation and is available in the Temple library.

### **Torah Today**

A Brief Summary of Each Week's Torah Portion

Shabbat 3/1-2 Parashat Tetzavveh, Exodus 27:20-30:10 Summary by Stella Guarna

God precisely details to Moses how to prepare Aaron and his sons for priesthood. He describes the sacral vestments, the creation of breastplates engraved with the names of the sons of Israel—twelve for the twelve tribes.

God directs Moses to ordain Aaron and his sons. The ordination is to take seven days. The rituals of purification and burnt offerings are detailed. A regular burnt offering is to be placed at the entrance of the Tent of Meeting, throughout the generations. The Recipe for "anointing oil" is given as are rules for its usage. Moses is given the Ten Commandments by God. Aaron makes a golden calf. Moses finds the golden calf, breaks the tablets, and destroys the golden calf. Moses begs forgiveness for the Jews. God inscribes new tablets and the Ten Commandments are given.

Shabbat 3/8-9 Parashat Ki Tissa, Exodus 30:11-34:35 Summary by Gloria and Ed Russin

While Moses is on Mount Sinai receiving the Ten Commandments, the Israelites build a golden calf to worship. Upon descending from the mountain, Moses becomes enraged at the sight of the calf and smashes the tablets. Moses asks to see God, but God says Moses can only see God's back, since to see God is to die. God tells Moses to carve new tablets, and God will provide him with the Ten Commandments again. During the next 40 days and nights God gives Moses additional laws to observe. God also commands Moses to observe the seven days of Passover, the Sabbath, and other holidays.

Shabbat 3/15-16 Parashat Vayakhel, Exodus 35:1-38:20 Summary by Linda Cranin

This Torah portion describes, in detail, how Moses acquires the necessary goods—gold, silver, fine cloth, wood, etc.—to make the Tabernacle, and how he is blessed by God with the skills needed to complete the task.

Shabbat 3/15-16 Parashat Pikudei, Exodus 38:21-40:38 Summary by Len Lapatnick

The *parashah* is divided into three distinct parts. First is an accounting of all the materials that went into building the tent of assembly. Next comes detailing of the construction of priestly garments for Aaron and his sons. Finally, there is a set of instructions on setting up and using the tent of assembly.

Shabbat 3/22-23 Parashat Vayikra, Leviticus 1:1 – 5:26 Summary by Ellen Finkelstein

Rules and procedures for sacrifices are described in great detail. Sacrifices, or offerings, are made for different purposes. There are voluntary sacrifices and sacrifices of well-being. A sin offering is to be made by someone who has unintentionally incurred guilt. Rules are spelled out for priests, the entire community, and individual members of the community. Finally, a guilt offering must be given by any person who has committed any one of a variety of wrongful acts.

Shabbat 3/29-30 Parashat Tzav, Leviticus 6:1 – 8:36 Summary by Steven Konigsberg

Details of the different types of ritual offerings that the priests are required to do are specified. The fire on the altar should be continually fed and should not go out. The offering is burnt on the altar and the priests and their sons are given a portion to eat. Moses consecrates Aaron and his sons as priests. The Israelites are prohibited from consuming some fats and any blood from meat.

### A LETTER TO RABBI WEBER

January 8, 1996

Dear Don,

I just landed in New York from Ben Gurion Airport, Tel Aviv. On this twelve hour-long flight I have had time to reflect the past two weeks I just spent in Israel.

Israel is the most beautiful place I think I have ever seen. Words cannot describe the experience I had there. I do know that I need to go back for a semester or for an extended period of time to understand more. Some questions no tour guide can answer are:

- 1) Why do Israelis use their horns instead of brakes?
- 2) Why does everybody eat chocolate for breakfast?
- 3) Why don't people who make signs know how to spell?
- 4) Are there only 5 songs the radio plays over and over again?
- 5) Why is every American in Israel on Rechov Ben Yehuda on Saturday night?

Seriously, I need to learn more about the Israeli culture than I can as a tourist. I know I could never live there, but I still need to be there again.

While I was in Galilee, Syria fired two rockets into Northern Israel that struck 20 miles west of the Kibbutz I was on. Also, the 'Engineer' of Hamas was assassinated, probably by the Israeli secret service. The strange thing was, that both of these incidents occurred on Shabbat and nobody knew that there was even something wrong. In America however, Peter Cohen's parents and my father freaked out because the media made it seem that the whole country was in a state of emergency. The truth is, I have never felt safer in my life. Strange, though, being protected by 18 year-old soldiers (some of which are really cute girls...) with machine guns.

Basically, I would like to thank you for helping me make this trip possible. But, not only for giving me money. I would like to thank you for giving me an interest in my Jewish identity from about 8th grade on. Had I never gone to confirmation, I never would have gotten involved with NFTY, Kutz, songleading, and teaching. If I had never done these things, I never would have cared to even bother to go to Israel.

I'm really jet lagged and I don't know how much sense this letter is making but I figured sending it now would be the best bet.

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
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
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
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It, the Union, does many things for us that no individual or small group of congregations could do for themselves.

It sponsors summer educational experiences for adults.

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
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
