FROM RABBI WEBER

ne of the great debates of Jewish life is, "What will we name the baby?" There are not many decisions we make in life which carry such powerful forces of tradition, love and memory, and when we add in the pressure from grandparents and other "interested parties," the stress can be awesome.

The Ashkenazi tradition from which many of us hail encourages us to name our children after dear family members who have died. By doing this, something of their life, their essence, is carried on in those who bear their name. For many of us — if we dare to think that far in advance — there is comfort in the thought that we, too, will live on one day through the life of a grandchild or great-grandchild.

But what if we could *know* that we will live on, whether we have children or grandchildren, or not? What if we could *know* that something of our essence will be carried on, even after we die? What if we could *know* that we will live on through another, even after our own time on earth is completed?

We can. Today. All we have to do is sign an Organ Donor Card.

There are few things available to us in the world which are as Godlike as being an organ donor. As a donor, we can bring sight to the blind, healing to the sick, and even restore to life those who are facing almost certain death. In every morning service, we thank God for doing all of these things; how awesome, how sacred, to have the opportunity to do them ourselves!

For many years, Jews have shied away from organ donation (though seldom from *receiving* organs) because of a feeling that it is "un-Jewish." After all, aren't bodies supposed to be buried

whole, without removing anything? This idea is based on two Jewish principles, and once we understand them, we may see that it is more "un-Jewish" to refuse to be a donor than it is to be one.

The first guiding principle for dealing with the dead is kevod ha-met, respect for the dead. To show respect, we strive to treat the body with dignity, not like some unpleasant thing. We treat it as the vessel which held a sacred soul, and which, therefore, is sacred itself. Thus, the rules which are followed by the chevra kadisha, the

But organ donation takes away nothing from this honor: organs are removed quickly, the body is restored to a proper appearance for burial, and no insult or indignity is suffered either by the deceased or by the family. Those who work with organ donors understand how precious their gift is, and they treat the body with both respect and with admiration.

The second principle is based on the belief that when the Messiah comes, all the righteous will be restored to life. According to Jewish folklore, if an organ has been removed, then the body will not be able to return to life. As Reform Jews, we have rejected a belief in the physical resurrection of the dead. Perhaps more important, in recent years even the Orthodox have come to approve of and support organ donation. In 1992, the Rabbinical Council of America, the largest association of Orthodox rabbis in this country, *endorsed* organ donation. So have the Rabbinical Assembly (Conservative) and the Central Conference of American Rabbis (Reform). Rabbis of every denomination have made their judgment clear: there is nothing in Judaism which should prevent each of us from being an organ donor.

Finally, there is the fact of human nature. No one wants to think of their own death, and even fewer of us want to think of someone doing something to us or taking something from us after we die. This cannot be addressed with facts, or with quotes from rabbis. That is something each of us must deal with, and we must deal with it in the light of the people whose lives hang in the balance.

Right now, there are thousands of people waiting all around this country for... for what? The records indicate that they are waiting for a heart, or a liver, or a kidney, or a cornea, but that is not what they are really waiting for. They are waiting for a chance to live, for without a transplant they will surely die — and sooner, rather than later. When it comes to Judaism, there is one tradition we should consider above all the others: pikuach nefesh, the commandment to preserve life. Even if you believe in every detail of halacha, there is at least an equal claim in Jewish law that we are commanded to be organ donors, for saving a life overrides nearly every other mitzvah. There is no contribution, no volunteer work, which can do what these thousands of people need. The only thing which can help them — which can save them — is our signature on a Universal Donor Card.

Your next temple bill will have one of these Universal Donor Cards enclosed with it. Please do not throw it away. I know it is uncomfortable to think of our own death, and it is much easier to file the card away with all the other things which we might do one day than it is to check the boxes and sign on the bottom line. But with our signature we give the gift of life, and with it, we gain a chance to live on even after we die — in more than just a name.

I carry this card. Please do it, too.

GETTING TO KNOW YOU...

Who are the people making decisions for us all at TRT? Are they any different than you or me? Find yourself in their stories. This month we meet **Ron Tornberg** and **Robbin Leibowitz**

Ron Tornberg lives with his wife, Kathy, in Marlboro, along with their children, Ian and Kimberly. The Tornbergs have lived in Marlboro for the past 15 years and have been members of the temple for the past six years. Ron was born in the Bronx but was raised in New Jersey, and Kathy is a true New Jerseyan, having been born and raised in this lovely Garden State.

ARZA

First, I want to thank everyone who joined ARZA this year. As of the end of February, our temple has 87 members, which is one less than last year. I am disappointed with these numbers and if you have not yet sent back your membership application, please do so. There is never a deadline on joining.

Much has happened in Israel these past few months and it is important that I update you on it. According to Rabbi Ammiel Hirsch, Executive Director of ARZA/WORLD UNION, "A revolution is underway in Israel." The non-Orthodox have been going through the courts in an attempt to overturn the Orthodox monopoly in religious affairs in Israel. The Israeli Supreme Court has repeatedly ruled in favor of equal rights for the Reform and Conservative movements. They ruled that Reform and Conservative representatives could not be prevented from serving on religious councils. The ultra-Orthodox, the *Haredim*, have consistently ignored these decisions and have attempted to circumvent them by passing new laws in the Knesset. The Jerusalem District Court, in a decision expected to be upheld by the Israeli Supreme Court, ruled that Reform and Conservative converts, converted in Israel, must be registered as Jews by the state. The Israeli Supreme Court also recently charged the Knesset to end the military exemptions of the ultra-Orthodox. Recognition of marriages performed in Israel by Reform and Conservative rabbis and official recognition of the Reform and Conservative movements seems only a matter of time.

On February 14, one quarter of a million *Haredim* demonstrated in Jerusalem against the Supreme Court rulings. This represents about half the country's *Haredim* and they were instructed by their rabbis and by the leaders of their yeshivas to attend. The rhetoric was particularly sharp and hateful. The Supreme Court was called the modern-day Haman. One ultra-Orthodox spokesman said, "We will undermine the legitimacy of the Supreme Court." Said another, "If the High Court is not convinced to cease involvement in religion/state issues, there will be war." That same day, 50,000 non-Orthodox Jews held a counter-demonstration in support of the Supreme Court and the democratic rule of law. Two of the most acclaimed Israeli writers, A.B. Yehoshua and Amos Oz, joined by many other leading intellectuals, urged all Israelis to register en masse with the Reform and Conservative movements. Thousands of Israelis, many secular Jews who have rarely set foot in a synagogue, have made inquiries about joining. Many are fed up with the ultra-Orthodox and want to express their belief in equality by supporting the Reform and Conservative movements. Most Israelis consider themselves secular, or non-affiliated, Jews. The Reform and Conservative movements together represent less than one percent of the Israeli population. Our problem now is to be able to expand fast enough to bring a real, spiritually rewarding, alternative to Orthodoxy. We must be able to engage these new members in a religiously and spiritually meaningful way. A window of opportunity has been opened that we must take advantage of.

This past summer I went to Israel with Rabbi Weber and the TRT group. It was one of the most fantastic and memorable experiences of my life. The highlights of the trip included visits to Reform temples in Israel. My daughter celebrated her Bat Mitzvah, together with four other TRT members at Kehillat Kol HaNeshama, a Reform temple in Jerusalem. The ceremony was beautiful and especially meaningful to my family and to all

who attended. It was so nice to have a Reform temple in the midst of Jerusalem where our children could be welcome and our own Rabbis Weber and Stern could lead such a beautiful service. It is so ironic to hear about the suffering and extreme effort needed to establish these Reform temples. There is no question that Reform and Conservative Judaism has been persecuted and discriminated against. However, despite this, Reform and Conservative Judaism are alive and vibrant forces in Israel. They must exist to give a religious alternative to Orthodoxy. Reform and Conservative Judaism are needed for the soul of Israel.

I believe that we have made, and are continuing to make, progress for our rights in Israel. We must try to get all of our friends to join ARZA and we should pray that our Orthodox brothers and sisters will see us as brothers and sisters.

Viewpoint No. 2: Youth Group Shines

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Torah Today A Brief Summary of Each Week's Forah Portion

Shabbat 4/9-10 Parashat Shemini, Leviticus 9:1-11:47 Summary by Aron Dercher

Moses conveys to Aaron God's requirements for preparing offerings to atone for the sins of Aaron and the Jews. When the offering was made, a mystical fire consumed the burnt offering which amazed the people. Two of Aaron's sons are destroyed because they did not follow God's instructions. The rules of what living things are kosher are described.

*Shabbat 4/16-17 Parashat Tazria, Leviticus 12:1-13:59 Summary by Arthur Rosenthal

God tells Moses about the rituals of bearing a child. When a male is born, the child shall be circumcised on the eighth day. The mother cannot enter a sanctuary for 33 days if she bears a male, or 66 days if she bears a female. After this period of purification, the mother shall bring a lamb or a burnt offering and a pigeon or a turtledove for a sin offering.

God tells Moses and Aaron that if a person has a swelling, a rash or a discoloration of the skin, it shall be reported to Aaron or one of his sons, because it may be leprosy. A person having leprosy shall be considered unclean so long as they have the disease, and they shall live outside the community.

*Shabbat 4/16/17 Parashat Metzora, Leviticus 14:1-15:33 Summary by Fran Robby

Rituals of cleansing, to be performed on lepers and on houses afflicted by a plague, are described in great detail. For lepers, these rituals involve bathing, shaving of hair, and slaughtering and sacrificing of animals. For afflicted homes these rituals involve the closing of the home, scraping and replastering of its walls, and finally, if necessary, the dismantling of the house.

Also described are the ritual cleansing for a man with an unclean discharge from his male organ, and for a woman when she is menstruating, or having some other discharge.

*Shabbat 4/23-24 Parashat Aharei Mot, Leviticus 16:1-18:30 Summary by Andrea Block

God tells Moses how Aaron and the Israelites must purge and cleanse themselves. This sets the rules for the day of atonement. Moses tells Aaron of God's prescribed method of killing animals for consumption. Then God reaffirms the first commandment and begins to list abhorrent actions which defiled Egypt and Canaan, and warns the Israelites not to practice them.

*Shabbat 4/23-24 Parashat Kedoshim, Leviticus 19:1 – 20:27 Summary by Neal Perlman

God gives the Israelites detailed guidelines for moral, ethical and sexual conduct appropriate for living in Israel. God warns them not to conduct themselves in the same manner as the nation God is expelling. God pronounces that just as they are set apart from other peoples, they are to set apart the clean beasts from the unclean.

Shabbat 4/30-5/1 Parashat Emor, Leviticus 21:1-24:23

Summary by Esther Nemetz and Sidney Nemetz 5 1

God has told Moses that he expects priests to act in the following manner: They must not enter a room that contains a dead body. They must marry a virgin. The priest must be clean to offer food or should cleanse himself after sunset. The food must not be blemished. The priests work six days and rest on the seventh. If a priest kills a man he must be put to death.

NEWS AND NOTES

BOARD NOTES

Actions taken by the Board of Directors during the month of March are as follows:

- 1. We will purchase a Y2K compliant computer for the office. Up to \$2500 may be spent on the purchase, such funds to be taken from the building supplies and maintenance funds.
- 2. Twice a year, TRT clergy will be given time to attend Friday night *Shabbat* services at other Reform congregations to learn how other congregations *davven*, and to report back to this congregation about what was learned. This was suggested by the UAHC of NJ and brought to our attention by Rabbi Weber.
- 3. We will buy a black-and-white, full-page ad in the journal honoring Rabbi Weiner of Temple Shalom on his retirement. The cost will be \$300. This will be taken from the Sunshine Fund.
- 4. The following policy was adopted to allow a family the option to have a *Havdalah* Bar/Bat Mitzvah service at TRT: (a) the service leader must be either an ordained or invested Reform clergy person, or a person who has been employed by a Reform congregation in an official capacity in a clergy role, on a weekly basis, for at least two years; (b) the service leader will use the liturgy and observe the customs practiced at TRT Bar/Bat Mitzvahs; (c) TRT will not be responsible for providing a substitute clergy person under any circumstances; (d) TRT will provide for ushers and a custodian; and (e) TRT will not be responsible for the cost of hiring the service leader.

CONGREGATIONAL MEETINGS AND ELECTIONS – NOTE THE DATES!

On Wednesday, April 21, and Wednesday, May 19, Temple Rodeph Torah will hold Congregational Meetings. The main task of the April meeting is to discuss and approve the temple budget for next year; the May meeting is to elect our congregation's new Officers and Directors. 
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What is the UAHC?

We see it on our Temple stationery; we proclaim it on our masthead; we are invited to participate in its biennialwhat is it?

It is the Union of American Hebrew Congregations known as the UAHC. It is the umbrella organization for over 850 Reform congregations in the United States, Canada, and the Virgin Islands. What does it do?

It, the Union, does many things for us that no individual or small group of congregations could do for themselves.

It links us with other Reform congregations in our area and in North America. Together we find new and effective ways to improve our Temple.

It provides valuable tools and materials about everything from social action programs to synagogue management, from attracting new members to youth programming, from outreach to dues structure.

It provides mechanisms through which we may access our Movement's rabbis, educators, and administrators when we need to hire new staff or get information.

It is responsible for many of the books and curricula we use in our religious school, as well as for a wealth of books, tapes, and videos about Judaism in the synagogue and Judgism in our homes.

It created and now funds the Religious Action Center in Washington, D.C. through which the collective voice of Reform Jews is heard on issues of conscience.

It runs nine camps across the country that provide a fantastic Jewish camping experience for our children.

It sponsors summer educational experiences for adults.

It provides a rabbinic aide training program for congregations too small to have a full time rabbi or for larger congregations where the rabbi needs assistance.

The UAHC is funded by its member congregations. Part of our UAHC dues goes to fund the Hebrew Union College-Jewish Institute of Religion (HUC-JIR). At the HUC-JIR campus, future Reform rabbis, cantors, educators. social workers, communal workers, and administrators are trained. HUC-IIR also offers programs, lectures, and concerts which are open to all.

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
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
