#### FROM RABBI WEBER

Nuclear power plants. High tension power lines. Factories. Sixlane highways. When it comes to these things, I am one of the biggest NIMBYs ("Not In My Back Yard") around. They weren't here when I moved in, they were not what I want for my neighborhood or my children, and I will fight as hard as I can to keep them away.

But schools?

The recent — and continuing — furor over the location for new schools in Marlboro Township is very disappointing, and a little scary. The name-calling and "dirty tricks" which are usually reserved for our mayoral elections are now being employed against our school board, our school administration and anyone who dares to say that we need new schools now.

But the fact is, we need new schools *now*. And whether you live in Marlboro Township or not, this issue will not go away.

When you thought about moving to this area, what was the very first thing you asked about? I would guess that over 90% of us asked first about the schools; even the question of how high the property taxes would be came later. If the schools were not good,

we weren't moving here. So, look at us now: class sizes are being increased because we do not have enough classrooms to go around, and the school board has again applied to the State Department of Education for permission to use "substandard classrooms" — that means trailers — in almost every school in the district. Is this what we wanted when we moved here? There is no question that larger class sizes make it more difficult to teach and to learn; do we really want to re-create the New York City school system here in Western Monmouth? As for trailers, it is not just a matter of whether trailer-classrooms are conducive to learning (which they are not); it is also the fact that the students will have to put on coats and gloves, and walk through rain and cold, to get to and from these "temporary" accommodations. Would you like to finish gym and have to walk outside in January to get to your next class?

I know that most everyone agrees on the need for new schools, but agreement does not mean very much when every proposed location is opposed so aggressively that the plan is abandoned. Politicians are, by nature, cowards; the responsibility for the Township's continued inaction lies squarely on the shoulders of the citizens who have railed against every proposal and, more important, upon that great majority of us who have simply sat by and said absolutely nothing as the debate rages on.

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Would a new school bring increased traffic? Of course it would. But traffic is increasing in all our neighborhoods, and I don't see anyone trying to stop it. In my development, the number of college kids with cars is breathtaking — and the speed at which they drive is terrifying. Would I prefer a dozen busses, driven by professional drivers, over the 50 college kids zooming down our block? Any day.

In the 15 years I have lived here, I remember two accidents involving busses in Marlboro Township. In one tragic case, a child got off the bus and walked in front of it; in the other, a bus skidded on ice and hit a tree at slow speed. Where is the great danger which school bus traffic poses to us and our children?

As Jews, we have always had a special devotion to schools of any sort. In fact, one of the only things which Jews can do with a temple they no longer need, is to turn it into a school. In Jewish tradition, schools are of even greater value than synagogues, and helping to build a school is a *mitzvah* of the highest order. Even if a school would be inconvenient, or create more traffic, it is the Jewish response to welcome it into our community, as a sign of our devotion to learning. To Jews, a school is an *honor*, not a burden.

Finally, we should consider our own pocketbooks. If the children in our district keep learning in trailers and overcrowded classrooms, and more and more special programs are cancelled because there is no room to hold them, the reputation of our schools will become "substandard," just like the trailers. What will prospective home buyers think about a district that will not allow schools to be built? What will realtors say, when asked about the education which children receive here? Building new schools is also the right thing to do if we are to maintain the investment we have made in our homes.

Two thousand years ago, Rabbi Hillel challenged us: "If I am not for myself, who will be for me? And if I am for myself alone, what am I? And if not now, when?" For ourselves and our children, for other families and their children, and for the children of the future, the time is now. Please support the school board's efforts to build for the present and for the future. As citizens, as homeowners and as Jews, we can do no less.

Another year has begun. By the time you read this I will have already given my Kol Nidre appeal speeches, always a troubling point for me, my public-speaking fear being what it is. Please remember that the whole point of the President's Appeal is to assist the special circumstances family members, those who are in need of our assistance. It is our *tzedakah* to ourselves.

Thank you to those people who made their annual pledges early. Quite a few people made their pledges when they picked up their High Holiday tickets.

Our new pledge board has been mounted on the wall in the temple. It is on the left wall as you enter the building, next to the green plaques honoring those who gave in the original capital campaign. By the end of October, or the beginning of November, when the pledges have stopped coming in, we will have the glass etched with this year's names. The Board of Directors feels that this will be a good way to honor those who give each year. We will still list the names of every contributor in the Newsletter as well.

I look forward to the near future when we are ready to begin reading resumes and interviewing possible cantors. Our goal is to have a cantor begin working at TRT by July 1, 2000.

# **Viewpoint**

#### **God Knows!**

God knows I hate going to temple for services!

God knows what a struggle it is to get dinner ready early. Make sure everyone gets home on time. Showered and dressed in *presentable* clothing. God knows I have teenagers and they and I have <u>very</u> different interpretations of what "presentable clothing" means! And God knows what a struggle it is to coordinate everyone's schedules so that we can go to services with as many members of the family that we can unite in the effort at one time. To think that a family of five could actually do this in the name of religion and in an attempt to share a "quality" experience! What are we? *Nuts*? For God's sake, it is the *weekend* you know! And God knows weekends when all of us are together, at the same place, at the same time, are few and far between!

So, I rush them through dinner—God knows I don't have the time to make one of those full Shabbat dinners every week! Get with it, it's the 90's! Sometimes, God knows, pizza will just have to pass as a Shabbat dinner! Half the time, with our crazy lives, we don't get to have dessert even because we are rushing to be out of the house to try to be on time.

There's my husband telling me he got home early to do this so why can't we all be ready to leave when we are supposed to? God knows I try to stick to the clock, but I would like just five minutes to put on some make-up! Once we are in the car, I have to check to see that the interpretation of the mode of dress for the teenage contingent is the same as the one I shared with them prior to leaving the house. (Like it is going to matter? We're in the car already!) But, God knows, we are going out in public and I want them to look decent. Of course, God knows, it is just my luck that I'm the one with the spot on my shirt that won't rub off while my husband is darting too fast through the stop signs. My kids laugh and tell me that they will never let me live it down that I'm the one who got food on my shirt! And, God knows, they won't forget!

But once we get there—in one piece, thank God—things are different. I don't know how or why, but I feel calm for the first time all night. God knows I can't recall too many times during the week that I feel the kind of calm I feel in temple. When the rabbi begins to talk to the congregation about the simplest things—the weather, the drive to temple, the season—I sit back and take a slow, deep breath and begin to relax. God knows I could sit at home and talk about the weather and I wouldn't feel this calm. I don't know why this moment makes a difference from all the other times I've heard comments about the subject all week. Then I look around and I see something striking! There are other people here who also seem to share this calm. I know it because I can see it in their faces, in the way they are sitting, in the way that a mother hugs her teenager and the teenager doesn't pull away in embarrassment, in the way a couple reaches out, without thinking, to hold hands.

When the rabbi asks us to join him in welcoming the Sabbath, God knows it is an amazing thing because there is this sense of belonging to the community around me that I haven't felt anywhere else the entire week! When the congregation begins to sing, I sing. God knows that sometimes I fake the tune and, sometimes, I mangle the words. But I sing out loud here because I can't sing worth a damn at home. God knows my ability to carry a tune is so bad that I've been booed out of the shower! But in temple, nobody can tell me to shut up and spare the rest of them. God knows the way I sing, even the rabbi begins to sound in tune! Every now and then, I have to poke one of the teenagers to get them to join me by pointing out that God knows I have paid enough for them to go to Hebrew School so let me hear that I got my money's worth! And, God knows they roll their eyes heavenward in silent complaint before they move their lips.

And how does God know all these things? Because I tell God all this—and more. Silently, just between the two of us, while I am in temple praying. The prayers are more than just a few words between the Holy One and the congregation. God knows that sometimes it is the only time all week that no one interrupts me when I have something to say! Okay, so I say it silently, but <u>never</u> to myself! I get it all off of my chest here, with all those people around me, and God knows I feel a sense of peace that I pray will sustain me for the rest of the week.

God does know that I hate going to temple for services, but God knows I love it once I get there!

# Torah Today A Brief Summary of Each Week's Torah Portion

Shabbat 10/8-9 Parashat Beresheit, Genesis 1:1-6:8 Summary by Henry Levenstein

God creates the world in six days, rests the seventh day, making it Shabbat. God gives life to Adam and Eve, who eat from the Tree of Knowledge, and are expelled from Eden. Their first son Cain kills his brother Abel. God sees later generations as wicked, except for Noah, and considers destroying this creation.

Shabbat 10/15-16 Parashat Noah, Genesis 6:9-11:32 Summary by Janet Klemons

God was mad at the people and prepared to destroy all life, but spared Noah and his family, because he walked with God. He instructed Noah on how to make an ark and whom he should take with him. The flood lasted 40 days and 40 nights, and God made a covenant with Noah never to destroy humanity and the earth again. Noah had three sons, Shem, Ham and Japeth. The whole world branched out from these people. Shem's lineage leads to Nahor, father of Terah, who was the father of Abraham.

Shabbat 10/22-23 Parashat Lech Lecha, Genesis 12:1-17:27 Summary by Sharon Aptaker

God tells Abram to leave his homeland and travel to the land of Canaan. He promises to make of Abram a great nation. Abram obeys and settles in Hebron. His nephew Lot settles further east near Sodom. During a rebellion in the region, Lot is taken captive by King Chedorlaomer. Abram and a few hundred men defeat Chedorlaomer and rescue Lot, earning respect for the power of Abram's God.

Abram wonders how he will continue to possess the land since he is childless. God promises Abram that his seed will be as numerous as the stars in heaven and Abram believes him. God also foretells a period of enslavement before Abram's seed returns to possess the land of Canaan. A flaming torch appears out of the darkness to seal the covenant between God and Abram.

Abram's wife, Sarai, doubting she will ever bear children, offers her maid Hagar to Abram. Hagar conceives and bears a son, Ishmael. God reaffirms his promises to Abram, who he renames Abraham, meaning, "father of a multitude"; within the year Sarah will bear him a son, to be named Isaac. Isaac's descendants will possess the land of Canaan as an everlasting possession. They will be God's chosen people and they will follow God. God instructs Abraham to circumcise every male in his household as a token of this covenant.

#### Shabbat 10/29-30 Parashat Vayera, Genesis 18:1-22:24 Summary by Sheryl Cooper

God promises a son to Abraham and Sarah. God plans to destroy Sodom and Gomorrah. Abraham convinces God not to destroy it if there are at least 10 innocent people there. God destroys the city but saves Lot and his family. Lot's wife is turned into a pillar of salt because she disobeys God. Isaac is born to Abraham and Sarah. God tests Abraham by telling him to offer Isaac as a sacrifice. He obeys, but an angel stops him. Since Abraham obeys God he is blessed and told his descendants will be as numerous as the stars of the heavens and sands on the seashore.

#### WHY MUST WE PARK TO PICK UP RELIGIOUS SCHOOL STUDENTS?

Our primary concern is for our children's safety and well-being. Over the years, we have tried many methods for guaranteeing their safety as they arrive and depart our Religious School. Our current system is the best we have found: it is only minimally inconvenient, and it is safe.

When you drop off your kids, please drive around to the back of the temple (by the orange cones). Children can exit safely from both sides of the car, as we restrict traffic to a single file. Please note that, at the recommendation of the Marlboro Police Department, the back door of the temple will be locked when each school session begins. All students who arrive late should use the front door of the temple. When you pick up, please park, come in to get your children from their classrooms, and walk with them to your car.

#### A NOTE FROM THE YAHRZEIT COORDINATOR

My name is Linda Cranin and I am responsible for the temple's yahrzeit database. Temple Rodeph Torah is very proud of our commitment to properly remember those who have died. To have a name entered into the database, which generates the weekly list for the service announcements, just call, e-mail or mail me the pertinent information. By listing your yahrzeit in the database, it will generate a reminder card to be sent before each yahrzeit. This is especially important in keeping the Hebrew date since that date changes each year.

It provides valuable tools and materials about everything from social action programs to synagogue management, from attracting new members to youth programming, from outreach to dues structure.

It provides mechanisms through which we may access our Movement's rabbis, educators, and administrators when we need to hire new staff or get information.

It is responsible for many of the books and curricula we use in our religious school, as well as for a wealth of books, tapes, and videos about Judaism in the synagogue and Judaism in our homes.

It created and now funds the Religious Action Center in Washington, D.C. through which the collective voice of Reform Jews is heard on issues of conscience.


It runs nine camps across the country that provide a fantastic Jewish camping experience for our children.

It sponsors summer educational experiences for adults.

It provides a rabbinic aide training program for congregations too small to have a full time rabbi or for larger congregations where the rabbi needs assistance.

The UAHC is funded by its member congregations. Part of our UAHC dues goes to fund the Hebrew Union College-Jewish Institute of Religion (HUC-JIR). At the HUC-JIR campus, future Reform rabbis, cantors, educators, social workers, communal workers, and administrators are trained. HUC-JIR also offers programs, lectures, and concerts which are open to all.

What we, as individuals and as a temple, gain from our UAHC membership is far greater than what we put in.



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### Reform Movement Biennial Convention Is December 15-19 in Orlando, FL

In addition, for the first time Biennial participants will be able to focus on a particular area of concern over the course of the convention by following tracks devoted to issues such as the CCAR's Statement of Principles, conversion and Outreach issues, adult learning, building a synagogue leadership team, social action and social justice, and formal and informal education.

Concurrent with the UAHC's Biennial, the Women of Reform Judaism will hold its 42nd Assembly and the National Federation of Temple Brotherhoods will hold its convention, celebrating the 75th anniversary of the founding of NFTB.

### clickonJudaism Web Site Attracts Young Jews

Young Jews in their 20s and 30s, many of whom are not currently members of a congregation, are discovering clickon-Judaism, a Web site created by the UAHC almost a year ago.

Written both by lay people and professionals, the Web site at <a href="http://clickon.judaism.org">http://clickon.judaism.org</a> is aimed at inviting the unaffiliated to learn more about Judaism and to engage in Jewish life.

ClickonJudaism's information is organized around five themes: facing today's world (media and culture); making a difference (ethics and tikkun olam); searching for God (spirituality, prayer, and healing); finding a place (for unaffiliated Jews, intermarried couples, and those seeking conversion); and doing Jewish (parenting, life-cycle celebrations, and holidays).

Essays titled "Jewish Masculinity," "The Jewish Teletubby,"
"Getting My Shabbat Fix," "Reflections of a Stuttering Rabbi,"

and "Brushes with the Sacred" are part of the eclectic mix currently posted. New essays are posted each month, and previously posted articles can be accessed through the site's archives.

Clickon Judaism is a Web site where seekers can ask questions and get personal answers from rabbis and other scholars in a non-threatening or intrusive manner. Many of the questions involve interfaith issues, such as "What are the major differences between Jews and Christians?" and "In an interfaith marriage, can there be a ketubah?"

A project of the Union of American Hebrew Congregations and the Central Conference of American Rabbis Commission on Synagogue Affiliation, clickonJudaism is funded by a two-year grant from the Feld Family Foundation, which supports projects of national scope that change the face of the Jewish community.

### Progressive Congregation Given Synagogue Building Despite Ukraine Chief Rabbi's Protest

Local authorities in Yivpratoria recently handed over a pre-Soviet-era synagogue to the city's Progressive congregation, one of almost two dozen World Union sponsored congregations in the Ukraine. Ukraine chief rabbi Ya'acov Bleich had sought to prevent the building's transfer by calling Progressive Judaism an "undemanding religion" whose members worship in "luxurious temples" in a letter to Crimean officials.

ARZA/WORLD UNION, North America Executive Director Rabbi Ammiel Hirsch asked the leaders of the Jewish Agency, the Joint Distribution Committee, the National Conference on Soviet Jewry, and the United Jewish Communities to "convey to Rabbi Bleich our movement's deep pain and disappointment."

"We find it particularly offensive, and contrary to the Jewish spirit," Hirsch wrote, "that a Jew-let alone someone who pre-

sumes to represent the wider Jewish community—would speak so ill of fellow Jews to a foreign government."

The synagogue building had been used as a warehouse during Communist rule. A 1992 Ukrainian law provides for the restitution of religious community property that had been seized by the Soviets.

### How do I become an organ donor?

The completion of a donor card from the UAHC Committees on Older Adults and Bio-Ethics will allow you to become an organ donor. The Uniform Anatomical Gift Act of 1969 (USA) gives you the right to sign such a card. Patients who receive organs are chosen based upon many factors and are matched via need through a computerized system.
