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FROM RABBI WEBER

**W**hy 2K?

That is the question posed by a coffee mug we have in our kitchen. It is from a Jewish educational organization, and it asks a very *good* question for Jews: why should this whole "Year 2000" thing matter to us?

Those of us who use computers have just about had our fill of Y2K paranoia. Most of us have decided not to stock up on six months' worth of food and water, and we are comfortable with the assumption that the bank will not "forget" all our deposits in a haze of Y2K hangover. As for this being the millennium — well, that just doesn't carry a lot of weight in Jewish circles. Even without the technicality that the new millennium doesn't begin until 2001, we Jews are bystanders in this whole craze: why should we care how long it has been since "their" savior was born?

For the most part, we shouldn't care. Whether Jesus was born in the year zero, or in minus-three, or whether the changes in the calendar over the centuries make the whole question moot, the number of the year A.D. — *Anno Domini*, "the Year of our Lord" — is nothing more than the date we write on letters and checks. As my friend always said, "Let *their* mother worry"; it's just not our problem.

But then again, it is.

This is a time of great excitement, great anticipation, in many Christian circles. Many people truly believe that as the new millennium begins, the Messiah will choose to return to earth and to complete the prophecies of ancient days. It is a time of waiting, of hoping, of reevaluating lives to prepare for the Day of Judgment. I find no fault with that; it is the equivalent of our opening the door for Elijah at each Pesach *seder*, as we pray that this year will be *the* year for all of us.

Our problem arises with those who feel it is their duty to hasten the Messiah's return, and who feel that Jews are standing in the way of that return. Missionary efforts directed at Jews have increased tremendously in recent years, culminating in the Southern Baptist Convention's publication of a prayer guide for the High Holidays this year, through which Baptists can pray that Jews will see the light and convert to Christianity. (They just recently issued another such guide, to help Hindus see the light; we're not the only ones lucky enough to

have them praying for our souls!) Beyond the missionizing, we have also seen an increase in anti-Jewish violence: the attack on the JCC in California, fire-bombing of synagogues in California, New York and Connecticut, and an Internet full of anti-Jewish venom. These are not mainstream Christians, but I fear they are people who have taken the Christian millennium fever as permission to kill and destroy. Searching your own soul to prepare for the Messiah is fine; feeling that *my* soul is standing in the way of the Messiah is a dangerous belief. And I am not alone in this concern: the FBI recently issued a report, cautioning that the coming months may well see an increase in anti-Semitic and anti-minority violence spurred on by images of the Apocalypse.

Arlo Guthrie once said, "Some people think I'm their problem, but that's their problem." He was right, but only to an extent. If people don't like us because we are Jewish, that is, indeed, *their* problem. But when they decide to "fix" their problem, it becomes ours, too.

What is going to happen? Well, either the Messiah *is* going to come this year (in which case, please ignore everything I've ever taught), or s/he is not. If s/he does not arrive, there will be a lot of disappointed people — and they can be just as dangerous as overanxious people. I believe that we will see a continuation of this sort of violence for the next few months, then a quiet time, and then another resurgence as we approach the end of the year 2000. It is possible that as people see the year slipping away they may be driven to force a resolution, and then it will become our problem once again. Once we are into 2001, I believe things will return to normal and we can go back to worrying about our computers taking over, as Stanley Kubrick predicted.

Why am I not more alarmed about the possibility of violence over the next year? First, because being alarmed will not solve anything, or prevent it from happening. We will take every possible precaution, both at Rodeph Torah and at Jewish institutions around the world, but there is nothing we can do to stop every crazy person who wants to take history into their own hands. But what reassures me, and allows me to relax even in the face of this threat, is the response of Americans to every act of violence we have seen. Unlike Germany in the 1930's, each attack on a Jew or a synagogue has brought a massive reaction from the *non-Jewish* community: marches, rallies, speeches and denunciations coming from every pulpit and podium in the country. So long as our non-Jewish neighbors cry out their disgust for those who would kill and destroy in the name of religion, we are as safe here as we are anywhere in the world.

So, on this Hanukkah, I suggest we celebrate with a little more seriousness, a little more focus on what it means to light a candle in the darkness. We should thank God for the gifts of our tradition, the blessings of our family and the safety of our country — a country where most of the people who don't believe as we do still stand up and speak out for our right to believe as we do.

Shira, Noah, Ari, Eytan and I wish you a *Chag Ha-Urim sameach* — a joyous Festival of Lights — and a happy... 5760.

## HANUKKAH SUPPLEMENT

"How many Hanukkahs are there?" asked the rabbis.

"Not just one," we say, "but eight. Eight dedications: Creation, Shabbat, the desert sanctuary, Solomon's Temple, the Second Temple, the Maccabees, Israel, and the World to Come..."

Blessed is the match consumed in kindling flame.

Blessed is the flame that burns in the heart's secret places.

Blessed is the heart with strength to stop its beating for honor's sake.

Blessed is the match consumed in kindling flame.

(The candles are placed in the *hanukkiyah* from right to left, and kindled from left to right. As you use the *Shamash* to light the other candles, recite these prayers:)

בְּרוּךְ אַתָּה, יי אֱלֹהֵינוּ, מֶלֶךְ הָעוֹלָם, אֲשֶׁר קִדְּשָׁנוּ בְּמִצְוֹתָיו וְצִוָּנוּ לְהַדְלִיק נֵר שֶׁל חֲנֻכָּה.

*Ba-ruch A-ta A-do-nai, Elo-hei-nu Me-lech ha-o-lam, a-she-er kid-sha-nu be-mits-vo-tav ve-tsi-vanu le-had-lik ner shel Hanukkah.*

We praise You, Adonai our God, Source of all Creation, for giving us *mitzvot* that make us holy, and commanding us to kindle the Hanukkah lights.

בְּרוּךְ אַתָּה, יי אֱלֹהֵינוּ, מֶלֶךְ הָעוֹלָם, שֶׁעָשָׂה נִסִּים לְאַבוֹתֵינוּ בַּיָּמִים הָהֵם בְּזִמְן הַזֶּה.

*Ba-ruch A-ta A-do-nai, Elo-hei-nu Me-lech ha-o-lam, she-asah ni-sim la-avo-tei-nu ba-ya-mim ha-hey-m baz-man ha-zeh.*

We praise You, Adonai our God, Source of all Creation, who performed wonderous deeds for our ancestors in days of old, at this season.

(On the first night only, add this blessing:)

בְּרוּךְ אַתָּה, יי אֱלֹהֵינוּ, מֶלֶךְ הָעוֹלָם, שֶׁהַחַיִּינוּ וְקִיַּמְנוּ וְהִגִּיעָנוּ לְזִמְן הַזֶּה.

*Ba-ruch A-ta A-do-nai, Elo-hei-nu Me-lech ha-o-lam, she-he-che-yanu ve-ki-i-manu ve-hi-gi-anu laz-man ha-zeh.*

We praise You, Adonai our God, Source of all Creation, for creating us, for sustaining us, and for enabling us to reach this season.

When Hanukkah falls on Friday evening, follow these blessings with the Shabbat candle lighting, *Kiddush*, and *Hamotsi*.

## GETTING TO KNOW YOU...

Who are the people making decisions for us all at TRT? Are they any different than you or me? Find yourself in their stories. This month we meet **Alyse Gleitman**.

Alyse and her husband, Gary, live in Marlboro with their two sons, Alex and Scott. The Gleitman family has lived in Marlboro for the past six years, moving here from East Brunswick. Alyse spent her childhood in Queens, New York, and her teenage years in Yonkers, New York. Gary grew up in Spring Valley, New York. The family has been members of the temple for the past five years.

Alyse works as a Marketing Assistant for Prudential Insurance Company. She also designs Mica furniture as a side venture and hobby. Gary is the Vice President of Sales for a New York recycling company. Everyone in the family is a big-time sports enthusiast, especially when it comes to baseball. Alyse and Gary both sit on the Marlboro Little League Board of Directors. Alex, age 12, and Scott, age 10, play all kinds of sports from soccer to hockey to basketball to baseball. Gary has a big passion for college basketball. Alyse loves to spend any free time she might have reading, checking out furniture, and shopping. Alyse is also a member of the Youth Committee and is a new member of the Social Justice Committee.

Alyse grew up in a Conservative Jewish home. She practiced a lot of traditions without knowing why she was doing things. Through adult education classes, she has gained a sense of understanding of, and commitment to, Judaism. "Being Jewish has become a part of me instead of just something I am." She decided to become a Board member because she had a lot of questions about why things were done one way or another. The opportunity to learn more was one she could not pass up. For Alyse, the most pressing issue the temple is faced with is one of finances. "When I listen to the things that the congregation would like to see changed, a lot has to do with affording to make those changes. If the members of the temple truly understood the strain our wallet is under, maybe some help would be more forthcoming." Alyse also thinks it is extremely important that we bridge the gap between the Board and the congregation. "I think we need to keep striving for more member involvement. The temple cannot just be a place to drop your kid off to become a Bar Mitzvah." As a new Board member, Alyse feels she is in a true learning stage. "The commitment of the Board members to really try and make decisions that are right for all of us is amazing. There is a great feeling of camaraderie one gets from being a part of something that is so critical to the temple." Despite all of this, Alyse finds it difficult at times. "It is tough explaining all that is involved in some of the Board's decision-making processes and all the hard work and research that goes into their decisions. I find it difficult to combat some of the negative attitudes I have encountered." Alyse would like to see us all discover the positive things the temple has to offer us. "If we expect our children to carry forth Jewish traditions, then we better give them something positive to carry forth. If the temple is important in your life, then it will be important for your children."

## EDUCATION

A story is told of a prince who fell into the delusion of thinking he was a rooster. He took off all his clothes, sat under the table, and refused to eat any food but corn seeds. The king sent for many doctors and many specialists, but none of them could cure him. Finally, a wise man appeared before the king and said, "I think that I can cure the prince." The king gave him permission to try.

The wise man took off his clothes, crawled under the table, and began to munch on corn seeds. The prince looked at him suspiciously and said, "Who are you and what are you doing here?"

The wise man answered, "Who are you and what are you doing here?"

In this way must genuine teachers go down to the level of their students if they wish to raise them up to their proper place. Our responsibilities as educators are many. The circumstances our teachers confront daily are challenging. Presently, as we enter the new millennium, the family structure is changing. There are more single parents raising our students than ever before, more "blended" families, more students with two working parents, and more relatives who identify with other faiths. There are many questions being asked by educators regarding the philosophical approach, the pedagogical techniques, the theological dilemma, and the effective and cognitive answers to this existing social situation.

Reform Judaism, with its foresight, is providing some guidelines to this complicated situation. We are a movement which indeed *moves* with the times.

On October 10, 1999, teachers from all five of the Reform Congregations in Monmouth County spent the morning together at Monmouth Reform Temple in Tinton Falls, where they studied, discussed, and debated some of the issues we are confronted with in our various classrooms. The theme of the day was "Why Reform Not

Reformed." Close to 100 Reform teachers attended. All welcomed the opportunity to be among "equals" with other Reform colleagues.

Rabbi Sally Priesand of Monmouth Reform Temple presented a moving keynote address, "Her Hopes for Her Students." I am indeed indebted to Rabbi Weber for finding the time and teaching us about "What We, as Reform Jews, Believe." We also focused on "How We, as Reform Jews, Pray," "What We, as Reform Jews, Celebrate," and "How We, as Reform Jews, Welcome (the non-Jewish relatives, etc.)."

My vision of many years came through with hard work and persistence. I am grateful to my colleagues Helene Matorin, Educator of Temple Beth Miriam, Dina Maiben, Educator of Temple Shaari Emeth, David Levinsky, Educator of Monmouth Reform Temple, and Ilana Feitlowitz, Educator of Temple Shalom for seeing the need, for believing in ourselves, and for accomplishing our goals. Our teachers asked that we continue this event each year, and we will.

This day could not have been possible without a generous grant from the Jewish Federation of Monmouth County and the help of the UAHC.

I wish you a wonderful and joyous Hanukkah.

### **Reports from *Tikkun Olam* Day**

On *Tikkun Olam* Day, a group of congregants went to the Cook Educational Center in Eatontown. The Cook Educational Center is affiliated with Spring House. Spring House is a halfway house for homeless women that provides the women and their young children with a safe, secure place to stay while they re-enter the workforce and save money so that they can eventually afford to move into apartments of their own.

Our mission that day was to provide story-time reading and craft activities for the children. We arrived at the Center at approximately 2:00 p.m. For the next hour and a half we read books to approximately 10 children ranging in age from 18 months old to seven years old. The group from the temple consisted of approximately seven adults and eight children. We all took turns getting involved, but it was especially rewarding to see our kids reading to these little ones, getting them interested in the stories, and later helping them with art projects. Our kids made pumpkins, ghosts, scarecrows, goblins, and paper chain dolls to the absolute delight of the children we were there for. One 18-month-old baby insisted on throwing all the books on the floor until one of our kids got him interested in a Sesame Street book!

Originally, we had been scheduled to go to a different locale for this project. Thanks to the generosity of our congregation we had collected, in August and September, approximately 500 books! At the last minute, this other place canceled on us and we had to scramble to come up with a venue to participate in. We were able to contact Spring House but they were unable to guarantee that any of their people would be available for this date. Thankfully, we had a wonderful turnout from the residents of Spring House.

Everyone who participated in this venture came away feeling absolutely wonderful. It is definitely something that we should strive to do again.

For years TRT has had a mechanism in place to deal with this. The Special Circumstances Committee is made up of the President, Vice President, Financial Secretary, and one other member of the Board of Directors appointed by the President. Currently, this committee is made up of Randy Cranin, Ellen Finkelstein, Robbin Leibowitz, and myself. When I took the Financial Secretary position, this included chairing the Special Circumstances Committee. I must tell you that years ago, I questioned the process as it seemed to be very secretive and I did not understand, as I am sure many of you do not either, that there was and still is a very formal process in place for determining special circumstances eligibility. Well, after having been involved for five months, I can tell you that the process is an excellent one. Let me outline the process for you.

(continued...)

1. The Special Circumstances Committee deals with matters brought to them in strictest confidence. The only people privy to what is going on are the four members of the Committee. Even the rabbi is not aware of who is being given consideration for special circumstances relief.
2. A Special Circumstances Application needs to be requested from the Financial Secretary. The application requires a written explanation of the special circumstances as well as certain financial information to assist the Committee in determining the amount of financial assistance necessary.
3. The application is submitted directly to the Financial Secretary for initial screening. The Financial Secretary will ensure proper completion of the application with the member should there be any missing information.
4. Every other month, or more frequently if needed, the Special Circumstances Committee convenes to consider the applications it receives. The Financial Secretary presents the information, and usually includes a recommendation to the Committee. The Committee, after an intensive review of the application, makes a preliminary decision on the amount of assistance to be granted. All decisions are then compared to the others being considered and to all currently open special circumstances cases. This gives us one more cross-check for reasonableness of the amount granted. A letter is then sent to the member informing them of the final decision.

Assistance is granted for the current fiscal year only, which ends in June of each year. The member must reapply annually. Furthermore, if the situation changes during the course of the year, it is the obligation of the member to inform the Financial Secretary, at which time the special circumstances will be reconsidered based upon the updated information.

The amount of relief granted can range from simply deferring the building fund and/or capital assessment until some future time (these are never waived; just deferred until the member is able to pay) to a complete waiver of membership dues and religious school fees. It is also important to recognize that the Bar/Bat Mitzvah fee and all religious schoolbooks must be paid when due. Approximately five percent of our members receive some form of special circumstances assistance. This amounts to less than three percent of our operating budget.

I hope this overview answers some of your questions and gives you some comfort with this very serious subject. I do implore any member that is aware of abuses of this critical process, to bring it in strictest confidence to my attention, or to the attention of any executive board member with whom you feel comfortable speaking. ## Viewpoint

A subtle, yet significant, change caught my attention this year during the High Holy Day services. Sitting in our lovely, new, freezing-cold, holiday sanctuary I was noticing the congregants who had been given the honor of reading *aliyot*. In previous years, there was always a pause as new people went up to the podium to read their part. This year that really did not happen. The congregation, reading along in their prayerbooks, did not skip a

beat. In many instances, it was up to the reader to keep up with the congregation. No one was stopping and waiting for the reader to take the lead.

Does anyone remember the times in years past when the rabbi would be doing all the reading and hardly anyone would be reading aloud with him? He would interject into the services something like, "I'm not here to pray for all of you so you better start praying for yourselves." When is the last time he had to remind us of that? It appears that as a congregation we have really grown to this place where we are all praying for ourselves and the readers keep us on the right page but are a part of us rather than separate from us.

After thinking about this for awhile, I realized that there have been other subtle, yet significant, changes taking place that are very positive for us. During Friday night services it seems as if more people are getting up and going out of their way to truly say hello to someone they have never met before. During our first *Tikkun Olam* Day held in October, we had over 100 volunteers of all ages participating in community service projects, all at the same time! The Men's Club will meet this month, for the second month in a row, to discuss the issue of men's spirituality. A group of women meet on a monthly basis to discuss women's spirituality. The newly formed Fifty-Sixers and Thirty-Four Club had an incredible response to their kickoff activities. Adult Education classes are bursting at the seams with enrollment in the eighties, per class. Okay, so this last one is not subtle at all!

Could there actually be a momentum building here at TRT — a momentum of participation that we have been striving so hard to reach? How exciting it will be if we continue on this way, with more and more congregants taking small forays into temple life, giving it the infusion of new blood it needs to keep its heart beating strongly. It may be a momentum that does not gather much speed and that is okay. We only need it to gather passengers.

## Torah Today

*A Brief Summary of Each Week's Torah Portion*

**Shabbat 12/3-4**      **Parashat Vayyeshev, Genesis 37:1-40:23**      **Summary by Jason Goldberg**

Joseph, son of Jacob, is subdued by his jealous brothers and sold into slavery in Egypt. His brother, Judah, tricks his daughter-in-law into fathering her child. Joseph's master's wife tries to seduce him, and has him imprisoned when he refuses. While in prison, Joseph successfully interprets two men's dreams.

**Shabbat 12/10-11**      **Parashat Mikketz, Genesis 41:1-44:17**      **Summary by Tracy Berman**

Pharaoh has two dreams about the number seven. Joseph is the only one who can interpret them, saying God was telling Pharaoh there would be seven years of abundance and then seven years of famine. Joseph is put in charge of the court, and his predictions come true. During the famine, Joseph's brothers come begging for food which Egypt had rationed, but they did not recognize Joseph, who gives them food, but takes his brother Benjamin as a prisoner.

**Shabbat 12/17-18 Parashat Vayyigash, Genesis 44:18-47:27 Summary by Neal Finkelstein**

Joseph is alone with his brothers and reveals his identity to them. He reassures them that he is not angry with them. Joseph believes that God meant for him to rise to power in Egypt so that Joseph could save his family's lives.

Joseph sends his brothers home to Canaan with food and gifts, and tells them to bring his father and all the family to Egypt where he will provide for them. Pharaoh also invites Jacob and his family to dwell in Egypt and provides wagons and food for the journey. Jacob and his family travel to Egypt. God appears to Jacob and assures him that God will be with him while Israel is in Egypt. God promises to redeem Israel from Egypt, thus foretelling the Exodus.

**Shabbat 12/24-25 Parashat Vayechi, Genesis 47:28-50:26 Summary by Jessica Hanan**

Before dying, Israel (Jacob) asks to be buried with his ancestors. He blesses Joseph's sons and tells his own sons, who become the twelve tribes of Israel, their future. With the Pharaoh's permission Joseph brings Israel to his burial place. Joseph returns, forgives his brothers, promises to feed them, and before dying, tells them God will help bring them out of Egypt.

**Shabbat 12/31-1/1 Parashat Shemot, Exodus 1:1-6:1 Summary by Beverly Azarchi**

The Egyptians try to control the Israelites by enslaving them. Moses' mother hides him in the Nile, to save him; he is found and raised by Pharaoh's daughter. After killing an Egyptian (who was beating a Hebrew slave), Moses flees Egypt only to return after God appears to him in a burning bush. Moses and Aaron are sent by God to save the Hebrew slaves from the misery of Egypt. God predicts that Pharaoh will release the Israelites only out of fear of a greater might.

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
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## What is the UAHC?

We see it on our Temple stationery; we proclaim it on our masthead; we are invited to participate in its biennial—what is it?

It is the Union of American Hebrew Congregations known as the UAHC. It is the umbrella organization for over 850 Reform congregations in the United States, Canada, and the Virgin Islands. What does it do?

It, the Union, does many things for us that no individual or small group of congregations could do for themselves.

It links us with other Reform congregations in our area and in North America. Together we find new and effective ways to improve our Temple.

It provides valuable tools and materials about everything from social action programs to synagogue management, from attracting new members to youth programming, from outreach to dues structure.

It provides mechanisms through which we may access our Movement's rabbis, educators, and administrators when we need to hire new staff or get information.

It is responsible for many of the books and curricula we use in our religious school, as well as for a wealth of books, tapes, and videos about Judaism in the synagogue and Judaism in our homes.

It created and now funds the Religious Action Center in Washington, D.C. through which the collective voice of Reform Jews is heard on issues of conscience.

It runs nine camps across the country that provide a fantastic Jewish camping experience for our children.

It sponsors summer educational experiences for adults.

It provides a rabbinic aide training program for congregations too small to have a full time rabbi or for larger congregations where the rabbi needs assistance.

The UAHC is funded by its member congregations. Part of our UAHC dues goes to fund the Hebrew Union College—Jewish Institute of Religion (HUC—JIR). At the HUC—JIR campus, future Reform rabbis, cantors, educators, social workers, communal workers, and administrators are trained. HUC—JIR also offers programs, lectures, and concerts which are open to all.

What we, as individuals and as a temple, gain from our UAHC membership is far greater than what we put in.

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
