#### FROM RABBI WEBER

I tell my seventh grade students that they are going through the second-most difficult time in their entire lives: only birth is more stressful and more traumatic than puberty. It is a time when half of them wants to be treated as an adult and half wants to be treated as a child, and they oscillate back and forth at the speed of light. They want to be individuals, but they want to fit in. They want to have their own ideas, but they are afraid to express them for fear that their peers will disapprove. Their bodies are going through massive changes, and their brains are trying to cope with those changes without experiencing a complete meltdown. I tell them that if anyone says they wish they were 13 again, that person should not be trusted to give advice on anything, since they are clearly delusional.

Yet, in the middle of all this pubescent turmoil they also demonstrate that they have the most beautiful souls. I know that at times this is hard to believe, especially when you are living with one of them, but it is true. I see it every year; most especially when I assign them to write their own prayerbooks. In class, I ask them to think of things they love to do, and things which they would love to do better. To write their prayerbook, they take those ideas and translate them into prayers... and in the process, they surprise and delight themselves... and me.

### **BOARD NOTES**

The following actions were taken at the November and December Board meetings:

- 1. The Board voted to accept the proposal of the Worship Committee for determining seating at the High Holiday services for the year 5761 based upon an alphabetical system whereby families that receive tickets for early services on Rosh Hashanah will receive tickets for late services on Yom Kippur, and vice versa.
- 2. The Board voted to accept a Torah crown (keter) for one Torah, and two finial covers (a set of rimonim) for the other Torah, generously donated by the Sisterhood.
- 3. The Board voted to set \$10,000 as the minimum needed to establish an endowment fund.
- 4. The Board voted to have a plaque created to honor those members of the congregation who have attained *Chai* membership (those who have been members of TRT for 18 years). The plaque shall read as follows: "We honor the members of our congregation who have been part of our temple family for over 18 years."

The full minutes from the Board of Directors meetings are available, for your review, in the temple library. The Board of Directors meet in the temple sanctuary, on the third Wednesday of every month, at 8:30 p.m. Congregants are welcome to attend all meetings. #### The Israel Scholarship Fund

The Education Committee believes it is important that our Jewish teenagers have the opportunity to experience a trip to Israel. A trip to Israel is one of the best ways for teens to explore their Jewish heritage, strengthen their Jewish identity, and make a permanent connection to Judaism.

We would like to remind the congregation about the Israel Scholarship Fund. The money that accumulates in this fund is used to provide financial support to any of our Confirmands who participate in an approved trip to Israel. Contributions to the Israel Scholarship Fund can be for any amount, and are a wonderful way to remember a birthday, graduation, Bar or Bat Mitzvah, Confirmation, or any other special occasion.

Who is eligible for an Israel Scholarship?

Any Confirmand, up to and including the summer after 12th grade, can participate.

When should a request for a scholarship be made?

By April 15th of each year, parents should notify the Education Committee, in writing, of their intent to send their child on an approved youth trip to Israel.

How is the money allocated?

Money in the Israel Scholarship Fund will be equally divided among all those students traveling to Israel in any given summer. The amount of money will not exceed \$1,000.00 per student. The amount given to each person is based on the amount of money in the fund as of May 31st and will be distributed to participants in June.

The Education Committee looks forward to the time when many of our Confirmands travel to Israel with the help of the Israel Scholarship Fund. We appreciate the congregation's generosity in considering the Israel Scholarship Fund when making a donation to the temple. #### Peace - The Price Is Not Cheap, But We Must Pay

My name is Scott Weiner. I am currently living in Israel as I am a first year rabbinic student at the Hebrew Union College. Since I was six years old TRT has been my home. I am far away now, but I try to keep in touch with what is happening through our monthly Newsletter. Last month's issue contained an article on the price of peace in Israel. I would like to express my point of view as someone who is living here.

Two weeks ago I spent part of my winter break scuba diving. I did this off the coast of the Sinai Peninsula. This was possible because 20 years ago Egypt and Israel signed a peace treaty. While Israel and Egypt are not the best of friends, they have become true partners in the Middle East. Hundreds of millions of dollars in commerce take place between the two every year. In fact, Egypt is the only Arab country that will actually sell oil to Israel. More importantly, in the 20 years since the treaty was signed, not one bullet has been fired across

that border. In April, I will be traveling to Cairo, one of the top travel destinations for Israelis every year. This is peace.

Whereas peace with the Palestinians is concerned, there are many issues to be considered, not the least of which are the humanistic ones. The Palestinians are a people unto themselves. All Arabs are not the same. That is the equivalent of saying that all Anglo-Saxons are the same. They deserve a home. We are well into the second generation of Israeli rule in the West Bank. When I first lived here three years ago, there was an eruption of tensions with the Palestinians. I had been in the country one week. From where I slept I could hear gunfire and I could see Bethlehem on fire. Eighteen proud sons of Israel lost their lives. No parents deserve that, especially when one considers that under two percent of Israeli Jews live in the Arab territories. The United States has fought in, or supported, countless wars so that the peoples of the world could have the right to self-determination. The Palestinians would only like that opportunity.

The Golan Heights is my favorite part of this country. My heart will break when it is gone. Truly, I will cry. Israel is hoping that the same type of peace that exists with Egypt will be created with Syria. The Golan Heights is no longer crucial to Israel's defense. As we all saw during the Gulf War, missiles can land in Tel Aviv regardless of distance. No set of mountains will stop them, only peace will. Ehud Barak, Prime Minister of Israel and former chief of all Israeli armed forces, believes in withdrawal from the Golan Heights. In addition, almost three-fourths of Israelis living in the Golan Heights voted for him, knowing full well that he believes in withdrawal. Israel is ready to deal.

While is it true that we pray twice a year "next year in Jerusalem," we pray every day of the year for peace in Israel. The cost of peace may seem high, but human life can have no price placed upon it. Israel may not love the idea of giving land away, but they dream of sleep without worrying about their sons on front lines. Those dreams can now come true. We must move forward.

# Torah Today A Brief Summary of Each Week's Forah Portion

#### Shabbat 2/4-5 Parashat Mishpatim, Exodus 21:1-24:18 Summary by Judy Kramer

This section includes a number of important laws and ends with Moses ascending the mountain of God, staying there 40 days and 40 nights and inscribing God's teaching and commandments on the stone tablets. Included among the laws mentioned are the rights and restrictions of slaves; punishment by death for planned murder, kidnapping; insulting or striking a parent; restitution for damage to property; bestiality, sorcery, false sacrifice or ill treatment, orphans or strangers. Also described are punishments for stealing, harming or loosely grazing oxen, sheep and other animals. Worshiping other gods, false witness and giving or taking bribes are forbidden. This section includes the famous "eye for eye, tooth for tooth" quote, it proscribes the Sabbath and the seventh year of rest for farmlands and vineyards, and establishes our three important holidays: Passover, Shavuot, and Sukkot.

#### Shabbat 2/11-12 Parashat Terumah, Exodus 25:1-27:19 Summary by Jonathan Seidel

Adonai tells Moses that the children of Israel must build a "temple" in preparation for receiving the testimony (Ten Commandments). The children of Israel have to build a sanctuary, ark, tabernacle, and altar. The instructions for building them are very detailed, required many precious metals and specific materials, and the measurements given for building them are very precise.

#### Shabbat 2/18-19 Parashat Tetzavveh, Exodus 27:20-30:10 Summary by Stella Guarna

God precisely details to Moses how to prepare Aaron and his sons for priesthood. He describes the sacral vestments, the creation of breastplates engraved with the names of the sons of Israel—twelve for the twelve tribes.

God directs Moses to ordain Aaron and his sons. The ordination is to take seven days. The rituals of purification and burnt offerings are detailed. A regular burnt offering is to be placed at the entrance of the Tent of Meeting, throughout the generations. The Recipe for "anointing oil" is given as are rules for its usage. Moses is given the Ten Commandments by God. Aaron makes a golden calf. Moses finds the golden calf, breaks the tablets, and destroys the golden calf. Moses begs forgiveness for the Jews. God inscribes new tablets and the Ten Commandments are given.

#### Shabbat 2/25-26 Parashat Ki Tissa, Exodus 30:11-34:35 Summary by Gloria and Ed Russin

While Moses is on Mount Sinai receiving the Ten Commandments, the Israelites build a golden calf to worship. Upon descending from the mountain, Moses becomes enraged at the sight of the calf and smashes the tablets. Moses asks to see God, but God says Moses can only see God's back, since to see God is to die. God tells Moses to carve new tablets, and God will provide him with the Ten Commandments again. During the next 40 days and nights God gives Moses additional laws to observe. God also commands Moses to observe the seven days of Passover, the Sabbath, and other holidays.

#### WANTED: HOMES NEAR RODEPH TORAH

From time to time, relatives of our members who are *shomrei Shabbat* (they will not drive on Shabbat) want to attend Bar/Bat Mitzvah celebrations at the temple. If you live within walking distance of the temple (even a *long* walking distance!) and would be willing to host a person or a family for a night from time to time, please

call the temple office and let us know. This does not happen often, but when it does, you would make it possible for loved ones to share in their family's *simchas*. Thank you very much!

#### ORDERING PASSOVER HAGGADOT

The Reform Movement publishes a beautiful *Haggadah* for Passover. It is large, easy to read, liberal in its perspective, and magnificently illustrated. If you are still suffering through the Maxwell House version (or if you never seem to get through it), you owe it to yourself to see how wonderful a seder can be!

Rabbi Weber has copies of the book for your inspection. If you would like to order them for your family's seder, you must place your order with Sisterhood's Judaica shop by March 1. The cost is \$13.95 per book, including shipping. We suggest that you purchase enough for *half* your guests the first year, and let everyone share. In succeeding years you can add a few more each year, so the expense is not so great.

If you wouldn't want to use an Orthodox prayerbook at Shabbat services when there is a rabbi to lead you, why would you use an Orthodox *Haggadah* when you have to do it by yourself? Ask Rabbi Weber to show you this beautiful book.

#### A MESSAGE FROM THE LIBRARY:

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### What is the UAHC?

We see it on our Temple stationery; we proclaim it on our masthead; we are invited to participate in its biennial—what is it?

It is the Union of American Hebrew Congregations known as the UAHC. It is the umbrella organization for over 850 Reform congregations in the United States, Canada, and the Virgin Islands. What does it do?

It, the Union, does many things for us that no individual or small group of congregations could do for themselves.

It links us with other Reform congregations in our area and in North America. Together we find new and effective ways to improve our Temple.

It provides valuable tools and materials about everything from social action programs to synagogue management, from attracting new members to youth programming, from outreach to dues structure.

It provides mechanisms through which we may access our Movement's rabbis, educators, and administrators when we need to hire new staff or get information.

It is responsible for many of the books and curricula we use in our religious school, as well as for a wealth of books, tapes, and videos about Judaism in the synagogue and Judaism in our homes.

It created and now funds the Religious Action Center in Washington, D.C. through which the collective voice of Reform Jews is heard on issues of conscience.


It runs nine camps across the country that provide a fantastic Jewish camping experience for our children.

It sponsors summer educational experiences for adults.

It provides a rabbinic aide training program for congregations too small to have a full time rabbi or for larger congregations where the rabbi needs assistance.

The UAHC is funded by its member congregations. Part of our UAHC dues goes to fund the Hebrew Union College-Jewish Institute of Religion (HUC-JIR). At the HUC-JIR campus, future Reform rabbis, cantors, educators, social workers, communal workers, and administrators are trained. HUC-JIR also offers programs, lectures, and concerts which are open to all.

What we, as individuals and as a temple, gain from our UAHC membership is far greater than what we put in.



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### How do I become an organ donor?

The completion of a donor card from the UAHC Committees on Older Adults and Bio-Ethics will allow you to become an organ donor. The Uniform Anatomical Gift Act of 1969 (USA) gives you the right to sign such a card. Patients who receive organs are chosen based upon many factors and are matched via need through a computerized system.
