What do you feel when you sit at your seder table on Pesach? Is it just another meal, just another family gettogether, which feels exactly the same as all the others? Or is there something else — something unspoken, something beneath the surface, something... remembered?

Does the seder table remember seders past, seders when our parents, grandparents and great-grandparents sat at the head of the table? Does it remember their voices, their jokes, their cooking? Does it remember the ones who loved to tell and retell the story, and the ones who *kvetched* about how long it took? Does it remember the light, fluffy matzah balls, and the ones that sank so hard the house shook when they hit the bottom of the pot? Does it remember the relatives who *knew* what slavery felt like; the ones who escaped from the oppression of Russia, or Germany, or the sweatshops of the Lower East Side? Does it remember the Hebrew, the Yiddish, the Ladino, the Aramaic, the Russian, the German, the Spanish?

The answer really matters, because if the seder table has memory — if the people who once sat there are not forgotten — then, in some way, they are still at the seder table this year. And that changes everything.

When we say, "Let all those who are hungry, come and eat; let all those who need, come and celebrate Pesach with us," whom are we inviting? Could it be that we are not inviting people to come in off the street, but rather, we are inviting people who are standing, breathless and unseen, right beside our seder table, waiting for an invitation? Wouldn't it be amazing to learn that those who used to sit at our seder table were really there this year, hoping that we would notice their gentle presence? What if, even in death, they want to share in our ancient ritual; to take their place once again among those they love; to be introduced to those who arrived after they departed?

There have been times in my life when I have felt my father's and my grandparents' presence beside me. Not an emotional presence, or a nostalgic one, but a physical *presence*: at that moment, they were standing with me. Am I the only one? Have you felt it, too? If so, then why do we have to wait for them to present themselves? Why can't we *invite* them into our lives, and set a place for them at our seder table?

If they want to be there, and if we want them to be there, then let's invite them in. Right at the beginning of the seder, before the whole story unfolds, is that invitation to "all who are hungry" and "all who need"; let's use that opportunity to *mean* the words, and make them real. This year, I am going to ask everyone around the table to think of whom they would like to invite, and to say why they think they would enjoy our seder. They could be close relatives or ancient ancestors; people of great fame or the nameless (to us) farmers who are our links to our past; or even historical figures whom we heard about only in books and stories.

Whom will I invite? My father and grandparents, a beloved teacher, a few dear friends and my grandmother's parents, who owned a chicken farm in Perrineville. I've just learned that these great-grandparents of mine were very traditional, so they might have a few problems with our very non-traditional seder, but I would love to meet them, let them see how their family turned out, and show them that we have "returned" to New Jersey!

Once we have each "invited" our guests, we will try to listen very carefully as we read and sing. I've heard it said that these guests, so excited about being invited to the seder once again, often hold the last notes of the songs just a little longer than everyone else, because the memories are just too precious to let go. If we listen very, very closely, we may be able to hear them at the end of each verse.

Who will you invite to your seder table this year?

NEW BOOKS AND REVIEWS:

A Good Enough Daughter by Alix Kates Shulman (This book is the story of the author's difficult journey from dependency through alienation to reconciliation, as she returns home to care for her aging parents.)

The Gifts of the Jews: How a Tribe of Desert Nomads Changed the Way Everyone Thinks and Feels by Thomas Cahill (Time was like a wheel, spinning irrevocably, until ancient Jews began to see time differently. From this insight came a new concept of men and women as individuals with unique destinies.)

It's A Mitzvah: Step by Step to Jewish Living by Bradley Shavit Artson (A starting point for all of us who want to increase our level of Jewish commitment, covering ritual, ethical, and social justice mitzvot and how to incorporate them into our lives.)

The Extraordinary Nature of Ordinary Things by Steven Z. Leder (Many Jews relate to God only on holidays and only in the synagogue. This book makes us aware that true religiosity means finding God everywhere, everyday.)

The Art of Public Prayer: Not for Clergy Only by Lawrence A. Hoffman (reviewed by Randy Cranin). This book helps answer the question "How can we make worship accessible and inspiring to everyone?" I chose this book because I am interested in making my worship experience better. This book led the way from how to describe the worship experience to ways to improve it via songs sung, words spoken, and space redesign. The writing style was a little "dry" but I would recommend this book to anyone looking to enhance his or her personal worship experience.

Viewpoint

I love to go to Friday night services but it seems that, too often, other things get in the way so I end up not going more than I end up going. If I do not go to services, then you can be pretty sure that no one else in my family will show up either. For some reason, this is one time that everyone wants to have my company. If we miss Friday night services, then Saturday morning is out of the question because we are not going to sit through a two-hour Bar Mitzvah service just for the fun of it.

One recent Saturday in March, I took advantage of the special alternative available to all of us. I attended the *minyan* service held Saturday morning in a classroom at the back of the temple. It was not my first time to attend the *minyan* service but I had not attended one in a very long time. It was a short service (less than one hour). Yet, within this short passage of time it offered me several things. The obvious one was a way for my kids to earn service scrip so they can fulfill the Religious School requirements for the year. More importantly, it gave me, personally, the time to reconnect spiritually with Judaism on Shabbat.

The classroom was packed with about 30 people. Some of us were actually sitting just outside the doorway because such a large crowd was not expected. Those of us sitting in the room were literally squashed in shoulder to shoulder. As we prayed, we got to the line "...and we, clay touched by God, will reach out for holiness and exclaim in wonder: how filled with awe is this place, and we did not know it...." At that moment, I recognized how special it was that in this cramped little classroom there was so much richness to be found if only we were willing to allow ourselves to find it. The people who attend *minyan* services regularly have found it. Here I could also feel inspired and renewed. I was inspired by 30 people making time for Shabbat. I was inspired by the *minyan* leader's interpretation of the Torah reading. I was inspired by the good feeling that surrounded us after the service was over. I was renewed in finding a reason to keep having faith by the way one powerful little sentence spoke to me. I was reminded that it is still my obligation to teach my children, by my example, that we must take the time for Shabbat.

The minyan services have been going on for a long time. I know that if there is not more sustained commitment from our membership that there is a chance that the minyan services might fade away. I know if that happens part of the responsibility will fall on my shoulders for not participating and appreciating more just what wonders the minyan services have to offer. I would like to thank those people who lead minyan services every

week and who have sustained it all these years through their dedication and commitment. It is so easy to let someone else be responsible and to tell myself that "I'm too busy to commit myself like that." And I am, way too busy. Torah Today A Brief Summary of Each Week's Porah Portion

Shabbat 4/6-7 Parashat Tzav, Leviticus 6:1 – 8:36 Summary by Steven Konigsberg

Details of the different types of ritual offerings that the priests are required to do are specified. The fire on the altar should be continually fed and should not go out. The offering is burnt on the altar and the priests and their sons are given a portion to eat. Moses consecrates Aaron and his sons as priests. The Israelites are prohibited from consuming some fats and any blood from meat.

Shabbat 4/20-21 Parashat Shemini, Leviticus 9:1-11:47 Summary by Aron Dercher

Moses conveys to Aaron God's requirements for preparing offerings to atone for the sins of Aaron and the Jews. When the offering was made, a mystical fire consumed the burnt offering which amazed the people. Two of Aaron's sons are destroyed because they did not follow God's instructions.

The rules of what living things are kosher are described.

*Shabbat 4/27-28 Parashat Tazria, Leviticus 12:1-13:59 Summary by Lynn Sternberg

New mothers are considered ritually unclean and must undergo certain sacrifices of purification. If a male is born, the mother is unclean for seven days; for a female child, 14 days. After purification — 33 days for a male, 66 days for a female — a sacrifice is made and the woman is clean once again.

Priests have the responsibility to diagnose various skin ailments including leprosy, burns and baldness, to determine if a person is ritually clean or unclean. They can also examine a person's clothing to see if the person is "clean." If a person or piece of clothing is unclean they are isolated for seven days and then reexamined by the priest.

*Shabbat 4/27-28 Parashat Metzora, Leviticus 14:1-15:33 Summary by Fran Robby

Rituals of cleansing, to be performed on lepers and on houses afflicted by a plague, are described in great detail. For lepers, these rituals involve bathing, shaving of hair, and slaughtering and sacrificing of animals. For afflicted homes these rituals involve the closing of the home, scraping and replastering of its walls, and finally, if necessary, the dismantling of the house.

Also described are the ritual cleansing for a man with an unclean discharge from his male organ, and for a woman when she is menstruating, or having some other discharge.

MAZON, the Jewish Response to Hunger, requests that every family fortunate enough to have food on their seder table remember these words from the Haggadah. Many across the country and around the world will have neither a seder nor a meal of any kind on Passover evening, and we are called to respond to their plight. MAZON respectfully suggests that we send a check for *chai* or double-*chai*—\$18 or \$36 per family—as we eat "the poor bread our ancestors ate," and remember the taste of slavery and poverty.

Please make your check out to MAZON, and send it to Rabbi Weber at the temple. All checks will be forwarded immediately, and will be used to purchase food even before the matzah's effects have worn off!



by Deborah Lipstadt

Since the publication of *Denying the Holocaust* in 1993, Deborah Lipstadt, a professor at Emory University, has refused to take part in debates with deniers. To do so, she argues, gives them the legitimacy they crave as "another viewpoint." The fact that the Holocaust occurred is not a matter of opinion and should not be put on trial. Yet that's precisely what happened when Lipstadt was sued for libel by British writer David Irving in April of this year. Irving claimed he was not a denier because his claims—that the mass murder of Jews in gas chambers is a myth and that Jews were not singled out for extermination—are "true." Under British law, the defendant in a libel suit is required to prove her case; hence, the Holocaust itself was on trial. The case was decided in Lipstadt's favor. The judge found that she was "substantially justified" when she described Irving as "one of the most dangerous spokespersons for Holocaust denial."




