FROM RABBI WEBER

ast month, I wrote about some of the things I have learned in the 20 years since I was ordained. This month, as I begin my 21st year, I want to look at what I have tried to teach during those years.

There is only a Jewish community when we make one. When we were children, the Jewish community was already there for us. Our parents made sure we had a place to go for services and for religious school, and all we had to do was show up. Now we are the adults, and it is our responsibility to ensure that we have a healthy, thriving Jewish community for the next generation. There is no "they" to do this; only "we."

Shabbat is a gift, not a burden. As I said last Rosh Hashanah, the Torah gives even slaves and animals a day of rest. If we cannot allow ourselves this time off, we are saying that we value ourselves as lower than slaves or animals. We do not need to sit in the dark for 24 hours to make Shabbat; just make it a day of rest, of family and of thanks to God. When Pharaoh wanted us to work "24-7," we got out of there as fast as we could; there is a lesson here for all of us.

SUMMER IS A VERY DIFFICULT TIME FOR FOOD PANTRIES — Please remember to bring food all summer long!

Prayer is a conversation between lovers. How often should we pray? As often as we should say, "I love you" to someone we love. What should we say? "I love you" is a pretty good start. So is, "thank you," and even "please help me." We already know how to talk to God; God gave us people to love, in order to teach us how. All we have to do is make the effort, and to remember that no one believes us if we say "I love you" only once a year.

A good Jew is any Jew who is trying to be a better Jew. (The author, Elie Wiesel, was the first one I heard say that.) I don't care how much you know or how much you do, or how little you know or do; if you are working to know more and do more, you are a great Jew!

Jewish learning is a lifetime project. People define "living" in all kinds of ways: breathing, brain waves, etc. Jews define living as learning: to stop learning is to stop growing, and to stop growing is to deny what it means to be alive. Take a course, read a book, have a Jewish conversation, ask a Jewish question; anything but the television.

Jews need to marry Jews. I have met many wonderful intermarried families — most right here at Rodeph Torah — but they are, unfortunately, the exceptions. Most Jews who marry non-Jews are lost to our people. If

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

One of the things we do best at Temple Rodeph Torah is education. We offer a program of lifelong Jewish learning, from preschool through adult education. This spring, we celebrated many educational milestones and look forward to growth and change for the coming school year.

In April, we honored Edna Coleman, our Religious School Educator, for being with our congregation for 18 years, and for creating and maintaining an innovative, high-quality Jewish educational program for our children. Congratulations, Edna, and thank you!

This year, 21 students from our Hebrew High School were confirmed at a beautiful ceremony on *Shavuot*. On June 15, at the Adult Education Shabbat, we will present the Rodeph Torah Award to 11 congregants who have completed 50 hours of study, and the Reform Movement's *Keva* Award to six congregants who have completed 100 hours of study. At that same service, we will celebrate the graduation of nine post-confirmands who have continued their Jewish studies beyond confirmation. Congratulations to all!

Over the past few years, our Hebrew High School has seen tremendous growth. With growth comes change, and we are making some important changes that I would like to describe. First, we have recently decided to hire a second Educator, who will be responsible for our Hebrew High School (grades 8-10) and our Post-Confirmation Program (grades 11-12). Ms. Ruth Margolin, who has recently joined us as our Hebrew High School Educator, comes to us with a strong background in Jewish studies. She has an undergraduate degree in Religious Studies from Brown University and two graduate degrees, one in Jewish Studies from the Jewish Theological Seminary and the other in Social Work from Columbia University. Ms. Margolin also has a great deal of experience as a director of NFTY, the Reform Jewish Youth Movement, and with Hillel, the Jewish college student organization. We welcome Ruth Margolin to our temple family and look forward to working with her.

Due to the growth of our high school program, we have also made some changes in the school's schedule. High school will continue to meet on Monday evenings. However, the 8th and 9th graders will meet at one location (either TRT or Temple Shalom) while the 10th graders will meet at the other synagogue. This change will accommodate the increase in enrollment and allow us the space to continue to offer a quality program.

I would also like to call your attention to a change in our post-confirmation program. Based on the success of our joint Hebrew High School, TRT and Temple Shalom will offer a combined post-confirmation program for 11th and 12th graders. It will meet on Monday evenings, once a month, at whichever temple is hosting the 10th grade class. Post-confirmation students may take advantage of the Hebrew High School bus transportation if they wish to.

I am very excited by these changes, as they represent the growth and success of our school. I encourage all of our 8th through 12th grade students to take advantage of our excellent high school programs. If you have any questions about our school programs, please feel free to call the Religious School office or Laurie Kaufman, our Education chairperson.

ADULT EDUCATION

"MAKE YOUR STUDY A FIXED HABIT"

Temple Rodeph Torah participates in the nationwide Adult Education Program, KEVA, sponsored by the Reform Movement. This program recognizes individuals who show a dedication to Jewish study and learning through their participation in Adult Education courses.

Two milestones mark the path to a KEVA award: at 50 hours of study, our congregation will present a certificate honoring each student. At 100 hours of study, a certificate will be presented to the students by the Union of American Hebrew Congregations, and the students will be recognized nationwide for their achievement. To date, nearly 50 members of Temple Rodeph Torah have received the KEVA award!

In 1996, the Reform Movement established a new level of recognition: CHAVER KEVA. This award is given for the completion of 365 hours of study. Six members of Temple Rodeph Torah have received this award, and we are the first congregation in the United States to bring our students to this level.

On Friday, June 15th, we will honor the members of our congregation who have reached or surpassed the 50-hour Adult Education mark, and will receive the RODEPH TORAH AWARD:

gather 70 elders of Israel and inspires their spirit in the tent so that they may share the spiritual charge with him. God then provides a bounty of quail to the people of Israel to satisfy their cries, but then inflicts a terrible plague in anger over their greed.

Shabbat 6/15-16 Parashat Shelach Lecha, Numbers 13:1-15:41 Summary by Judy Borell

God commands Moses to send the chiefs of the 12 tribes to check out the Land of Canaan, which God has given to the Israelites. After 40 days, they return and report that the land is filled with "milk and honey," but it is also inhabited by powerful people. Dissidence occurs, and the community rebels against Moses (God's spokesperson). God establishes the laws of retribution.

Shabbat 6/22-23 Parashat Korah, Numbers 16:1-18:32 Summary by Ruth Kaufman

Toward the end of the 40 years of wanderings through the desert, Moses and Aaron are faced with a rebellion led by Korah, Dathan and Abiram. The leadership, power and privilege of Moses and Aaron are questioned. God squelches the revolt by having the earth open to swallow the rebellious leaders and a plague takes the lives of their followers.

Next, the authority, duties and privileges of the priests and Levites are firmly established.

Shabbat 6/29-30 Parashat Hukkat, Numbers 19:1-22:1 Summary by Randye Derris

This *Parasha* is actually comprised of two entirely different parts. In the first one, Adonai speaks to Moses and Aaron and tells them the ritual laws. Basically, they are codes of holiness and cleanliness for the priests and the general population, mostly in respect to handling the deceased.

Next we see the Israelites in the wilderness and hear of their discontent with Aaron and Moses. The congregation blames them for taking them out of Egypt and bringing them to this wretched land, lacking fruit and water. Adonai commands them to assemble the community; they exhibit the "rod," and before their very eyes, water is produced from the rod. Then the people are appeased. Because the Israelites showed lack of faith in God, Adonai retaliates by making Moses strip Aaron of his vestments and position and transfer them to his son, Eleazar. It was here Aaron took his final breath and all of Israel cried for 30 days.

Shabbat 7/6-7 Parashat Balak, Numbers 22:2-25:9 Summary by Pam Brisman

Balak, King of Moab, asks Balaam to put a curse on Israel. God tells Balaam not to curse Israel because they are blessed. Balaam agrees to go with Balak's officials to see the Israelites, but says he will only speak the words that God puts in his mouth. Balak takes Balaam to view the Israelites at three different sites, each time sacrificing seven bulls and seven rams on seven altars, and each time Balaam blesses Israel. Balak is enraged and sends Balaam away, but not before Balaam tells him that Israel will destroy Moab.

While staying at Shittim, the Israelites profane themselves by consorting with Moabite women and worshipping Baal-peor. God orders Moses to kill the leaders. Phineas kills an Israelite and a Midianite woman, and the plague against the Israelites is checked, but not before 24,000 people die of the plague.

Shabbat 7/13-14 Parashat Pinchas, Numbers 25:10-30:1 Summary by Steven Koster

God shows that Divine anger can be controlled by deciding not to wipe out the Israelite people. Phinehas and his passion for God soften God's heart. God decrees that Phinehas' descendants will become priests for all time.

After the plague is over, God orders Moses to take a census of the Israelite community from the age of 20 years and up, to find out how many people would be able to bear arms.

God determines an orderly succession of property to relatives. When a man dies his property goes to his son. If there is no son, then a daughter inherits the property. No daughter, then to the man's brothers. No brothers, then to his father's brothers. If there are no father's brothers, then to the nearest relative.




