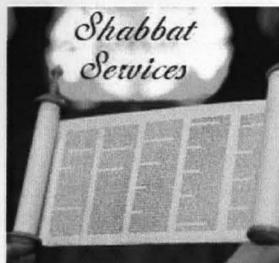

Rabbi's Remarks



Shabbat worship at Temple Beth Or addresses the varied spiritual needs of our adults, families, and children of all ages. Thus, given your feedback, we are delighted to add even more enhancements to our already creative Shabbat worship line-up!

For our youngest members, we are adding a Friday night "MINI-MINYAN" which will blend the traditional aspects of *Kabbalat Shabbat* (welcoming the Sabbath) with song, dance, games and storytelling. Since Mini-Minyan will be conducted on the fourth Friday of each month, from 5:30 - 6:30 p.m., it will allow participants to stay and share in our already established Pot-Luck Shabbat Festive Meal with the families who arrive for dinner at 6:30 p.m. Then, as usual, our Pot-Luck Shabbat dinner will be followed by our 7:30 p.m. evening Sabbath Service.



On the second Saturday of the month we will initiate TORAH-TOTS.

I, myself, can't wait to lead these special Sabbath morning services for our families and their youngsters from 8:30 - 9:30 a.m. starting in October. The experience will include an interactive service filled with song, stories, dancing around the *bima* and a Torah reading and skit. We will tear apart a specially themed *Chodesh Challah* (*Challah* of the month) for Kiddush and drink grape juice for the kids and more adult beverages for the parents! What a great way to start off our Sabbath morning for all of us.



Finally, we add to our worship lineup on the third Friday of the month with a more varied SYNAPLEX Shabbat experience. Inspired by the modern cinematic Cineplex, where one makes a choice from amidst a wide array of movies, so too we may select not a movie but a Shabbat Evening experience, choosing whichever venue feels the most suited for us! Do you want to meditate and find a spiritual space of relaxation? Would you prefer a lively discussion of the Torah Portion and its relevance in your own life? Would you prefer, instead, that the Shabbat music "take you away"? These will be among the options from which to choose on SYNAPLEX Sabbath. We will, however, gather together as one community and Temple family for Kaddish and Kiddush and an *Oneg Shabbat* to compare our

experiences and share together. We will inform you each month about the themes of these various events. And don't be concerned about scheduling. As always a full Friday Night Service will take place at 7:30 p.m. each week, no matter what precedes or follows it!

May 5771 bring spiritual renewal to us all. We hope to see you at our brand new Mini-Minyan, Torah-Tots and Synaplex Shabbat experiences!

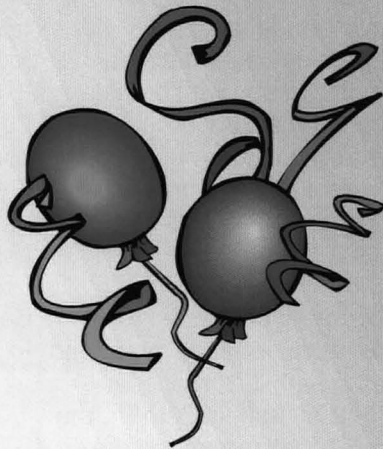

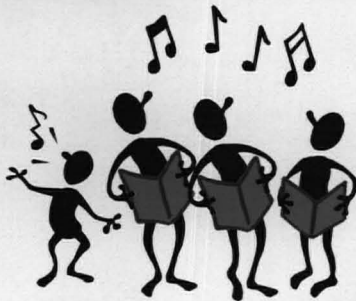

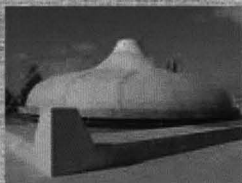
Postcards from Flat Matt*

Dear Temple Beth Or Family:

Hey all. While I am not known for hanging out in museums, the dedication of the New Israeli Museum this past month was pretty cool! When our Temple Beth Or group visited Israel last October, we only got to see two parts of the Museum; the Shrine of the Book and the Temple Model.



The Shrine of the Book houses the Dead Sea Scrolls, and has a roof that is supposed to resemble the jar covers in which the scrolls were discovered (in 1947), but the roof looks like an onion to me! In the center of the Shrine is a replica of the Great Isaiah Scroll (written around 100 B.C.E.). The actual scroll is 1,000 years older than the oldest biblical manuscript available before. Then, we went on to see the 50:1 scale model of the Temple in Jerusalem as it looked in 66 C.E., the year in which the Great Revolt against the Romans broke out and led to the destruction of the Temple and the city. The Temple model was built at the Holy Land Hotel in 1966 but was moved to the Israel Museum campus in 2006.



Now they have finished a three year \$1000 million renovation of the museum. The rededication just took place July 27-August 26. The museum is now fully handicap accessible and connects the collection wings for archeology, fine arts, and Jewish art and life. There is a collection of 3,000 year old weapons used by ancient warriors in the Battle of Lachish, just like they are described in the Bible. There is a set of 1.5 million year old bull horns, by far predating the religious account of the earth's creation as only 6,000 years old. There is a reconstruction of a church originally built about 400 years after the time of Jesus which has amazing similarities to a synagogue of the same period reconstructed alongside. And since the Jewish community in Suriname has died out, they sent their entire synagogue, piece by piece to the museum where it has been reconstructed!



Mom, you'd probably like all the modern art and the sculpture gardens designed by the Japanese-American sculptor Isamu Noguchi in the Billy Rose Art Garden. For the rededication, they've added a huge 6-foot tall stainless steel sculpture in the shape of an hourglass specially commissioned for the museum's reopening called "Turning the World Upside Down, Jerusalem." It was made by Indian born artist Anish Kapoor and shows Jerusalem's skies and landscape literally upside down.

The entire month, from July 27 – August 26, they had programs and events, including concerts by famous Israeli musicians, a wine-tasting festival and the museum's 25th annual Kite-Flying Festival! For a museum it wasn't so bad at all.

HIGH HOLIDAYS



Have Shofar, Will Travel

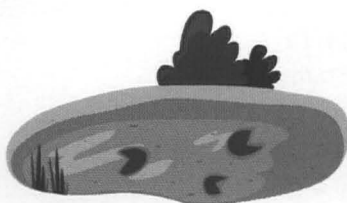
One of the *mitzvot* (commandments) of Rosh Hashanah is to hear the blowing of the *shofar*. For several years, Irwin Dumtschin and other members of the TBO Choir have visited congregants who have been hospitalized, homebound or in long-term care facilities, on Rosh Hashanah, so that they may hear the *shofar* and sing along with familiar High Holiday melodies. If you know of a congregant who cannot get out on Rosh Hashanah and would appreciate a visit, please contact Cantor Dumtschin.



The Big Picture

Picture this: It is September 15, 1985. The seventy six families of the newly formed Temple Beth Or are anticipating their very first High Holidays in their building and with their rabbi. Imagine the excitement as they put on their holiday clothes and gathered at family tables for a special Erev Rosh Hashanah dinner. How rewarding it must have been for the founders and volunteers to attend services that evening when over 200 people poured into the sanctuary. What a wonderful start to the new year!

This year we will celebrate the anniversary of those first High Holiday services in a very special way. We are planning a special picture taking event. The congregation will gather in the parking lot after the morning services of Rosh Hashanah on September 9 for a photograph. For this picture, we will shape ourselves into a "25." We hope that everyone from both our morning service and our family and youth interaction service will be in the big picture



Tashlich

Tashlich (literally, "you shall cast") is a Rosh Hashanah custom in which people symbolically rid themselves of sins by casting breadcrumbs into a body of water, preferably a live body of water with fish. Usually this is accompanied by the recitation of scriptural verses, including Micah 7:18-20. Micah 7:19 states, "You will cast all their sins into the depths of the sea."

Little is known about the origin of the ceremony, but we know it was practiced as early as the 15th century. In some communities, the ceremony is done at cisterns; in others, it is done by shaking out one's pockets. The important symbolism the same: we want to enter the new year with a clean slate, casting away our transgressions and bad habits. It's also refreshing to be outdoors in God's natural creation after spending much of the day inside the synagogue.

This year's *Tashlich* observance will be held at 3:00 on Rosh Hashanah afternoon (Sept. 9) at Grant Park in Washington Township. The site is level and is easily accessible from Grant's Trail, which intersects with both Paragon and Alex Bell Roads. A playground is adjacent to the creek and all ages are welcome. After symbolically casting away our sins, we'll enjoy apple cider and other treats. Maps will be available at Rosh Hashanah services.

HIGH HOLIDAYS

Why is Rosh Hashanah so EARLY this year?

Actually, Jewish holidays occur on the same day every year: the same day on the Jewish calendar! Rosh Hashanah is the 1st day of the Hebrew month Tishri, which this year falls on September 8,9. The Jewish calendar has a different number of days than the calendar we use because the Jewish calendar is based upon the cycle of the moon, rather than the sun. The Jewish calendar loses about 11 days relative to the solar calendar every year, but makes up for it by adding a month every two or three years. We will add the leap month of *Adar* this Spring. However, in mean time the High Holy Days fall in early September and be ready, because Hanukkah falls on December 1!

ONEG SHANAH

On Rosh Hashanah eve, Wednesday, September 8, we will have our first *Oneg Shanah* (celebration of the New Year) in our brand new Levin Hall! The reception is sponsored by the congregation, and we are asking our members to bring food items (cake, cookies, fruit, cheese platters, drinks, etc) which can be brought to the Temple prior to the service. 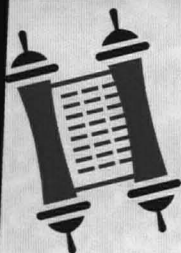

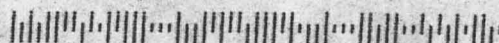
