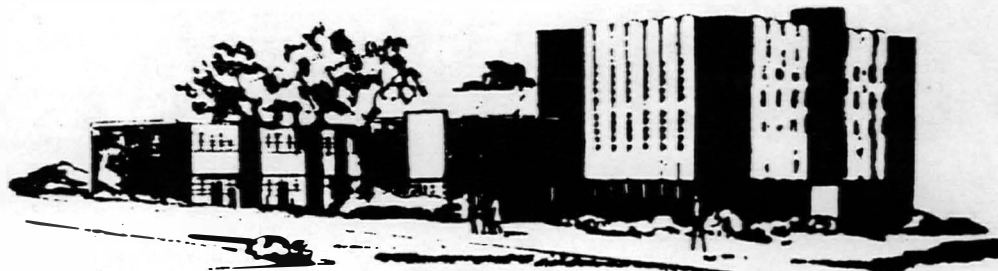
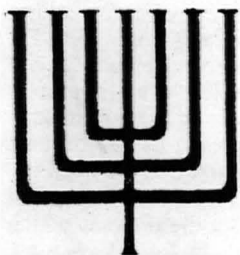

Rabbi's Message

An Open Letter to Jan Chason

Dear Jan,



The Bible teaches that the NASI of each tribe was to bring 1/2 wagon load (Tabernacle) full of offerings for the wilderness tabernacle, which was to become the Sanctuary. These were in addition to all of the free-will, heart motivated, gifts required of every Israelite. This was to teach that the NASI had a more profound and weightier responsibility than the average Jew.

Today we translate the word NASI as: President. Jan, you have given Temple Beth El and its congregants far more than your extra 1/2 wagon load. Yours has been a dedicated gift of energy, leadership and visions. Visions of what Temple Beth El may yet become - vision of what the Jewish people may yet become.

You, a Temple President, the son of a Temple President, have brought a spiritual dimension to your leadership which has transcended fiscal and leadership aspects of your service.

As you went from the office of Treasurer, to Vice President, to President in as meteoric a rise as we have ever witnessed at the Temple, I really didn't have an opportunity to know your serious side - your Jewish soul until these last two years.

Let me be honest. I expected a technocrat, skilled in accounting, and practices of business management, and I discovered in addition, a caring, compassionate, President committed to ancient values, contemporary issues, and to the future of our People and our congregation. I discovered a man who cared about individuals and their needs as much - or even more than "the bottom line." I am proud that you are not only a congregant, but a friend. You have been of enormous assistance to my Rabbinat, and to my own service to our people.

Finally, you have brought our congregation closer to the UJC and in the process, closer to our responsibilities to our fellow Jews in Israel, round the world and of equal importance - to building a strong combined Jewish community here in Bergen County. You are part of the strong contingent of Reform Jewish leaders to assume positions of authority and direction in the United Jewish Community.

Jan, as you have affirmed repeatedly, Laura is an integral part of your Presidency. Her jovial manner and wonderful good humor, do not camouflage that she, the daughter of synagogue officers as well, has her own keen sense of what we can become as a Temple and as a People.

Not only has her untiring service been a model for all of us, I know that she has been a helpmate to you both in your congregational and communal work. I have come to treasure her friendship as well.

President's Message

Dear Congregants,

I have to admit that as I sat down to write this column, it was with a sigh of relief, a burst of joy - however, in the end, it was with some remorse. It wasn't easy each month to sit down and write this column. The sense of relief and the joy is certainly that I won't have this monthly challenge; however I am a bit disappointed that I won't have this ability to communicate with the 600 - plus families that are on our mailing list. I think one of the most enviable parts of this job has been the ability to communicate, hopefully, some thoughts about our responsibilities as Jews; the joys which have come about from the things we were doing at the Temple; and, just ideas that I have had. I hope that you have enjoyed these comments or at least were stimulated occasionally by one or more of my thoughts.

As this is my last column, I would like to leave as my "last will and testimony" my thoughts about my accomplishments and the future of our Temple. Hopefully, in the past two years, under my administration, we have put into motion changes in the way the Temple delivers one of the most important services we offer - Jewish education - including emphasis on Jewish Family Education. We have instituted changes in the physical plant. Another area that has engaged much of my time has had to do with personnel matters related to the people we engage as professionals, including our clergy, school, administration and maintenance personnel. In addition, a major matter for all Presidents has to be our Temple finances. Finally, as a President of a Reform congregation, I have felt that a significant portion of my time had to be devoted to connecting our congregation to our Jewish community, locally, as well as in Israel.

The above agenda has been covered many times in my columns over the past two years. It is probably the outline of the agenda for the next in line for the Presidency. Most importantly, I hope that you the congregation become more involved in each of these areas. It has often been said that with all that changes - things stay the same. The matters that I attended to were not different from those that many Presidents before me had to deal with. I hope that I brought renewed interest and that some renewed interest was developed in the congregation.

As we approach the 40th anniversary of our Temple, I hope that our Temple programs begin to become the center of Jewish life for more of our congregants. I hope that our school programming is responsive to the ever increasing conflicting events for our children - so that more of our youth become active participants in our confirmation program as well as our youth programs. Our families with school age children often attend our Friday night services or holiday events - even our older members frequent these events - but significant numbers of attendees is often lacking at other times. A basic tenet in the practice of our religion is the communal act of prayer. Participation in our programs, contributions to our fundraising, etc. is not nearly as important as setting the example for our children by celebrating the Shabbat in our homes and at services.

We are living in an age where volunteerism is supposedly on the decline - especially with the advent of two working parents. This has certainly impacted us at Temple Beth El. Its biggest impact, of course, has been on our budget with increased payroll costs for a Temple Executive Director as well as increased costs for professionals in the administration of our schools, etc. Personnel administration has become a major item for the Board. It is my belief that we need the expertise that these people offer; but it is as important that we not abdicate our responsibility to set the policies which should guide this group of professionals in doing their jobs.

My final thoughts have to do with our roles as Jews in our world today. We talk of the Holocaust and the failure of the world to respond when 6 million of us were put to death merely because they were Jews. The problem with this is that there were many Jews who also did not respond at that time. I firmly believe that we have a responsibility to be the first to aid our brothers and sisters because there are often times when no one else will.

Last year, I was honored by the Accountants and Attorney Division of the United Jewish Community as the Humanitarian of the Year. To conclude this column I would like to quote from what I said then:

One of my associates once remarked that I seemed more interested in what I have been doing with the United Jewish Community and some of my other endeavors (including the Temple) than my work. I am glad that my partners haven't made the same observation. But I have devoted much time and I believe the reason is quite simple. I don't think I'm atypical either. We all have benefitted from what our grandparents provided before us and now since we are responsible human beings, we want to do our part to improve the world our own children and grandchildren will inherit. We can't be sure that our endeavors will bear fruit. But we can hope. We can't know what the world of our grandchildren will be like, but we plant our trees and pray that nothing will come along to cut them down.

This is why I and I hope my children after me are involved in Jewish communal affairs and I hope that you will join me in helping to make a better world for Jews in Israel, around the world, as well as, here in Bergen County.

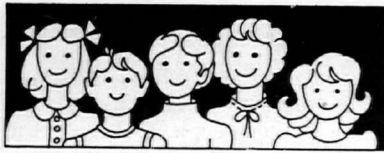
Their report:

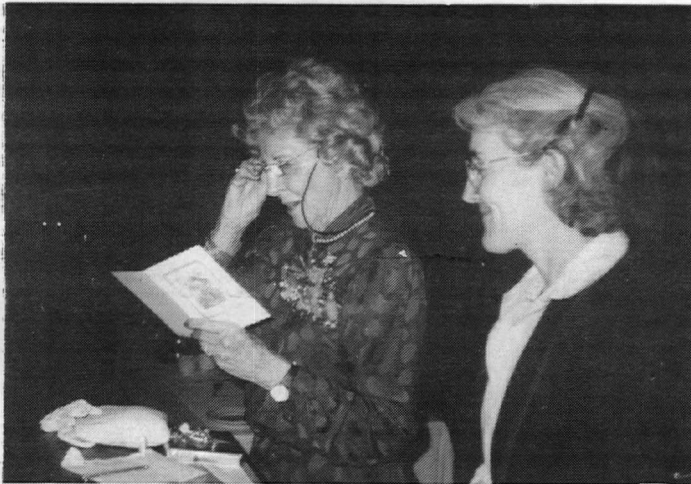


Nursery School News

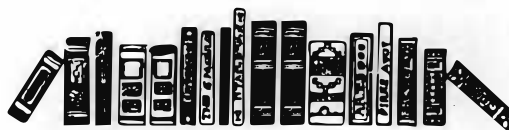

OPERATION EXODUS— ISRAEL PLANS SET

United Jewish Community has begun the enormous task of raising \$7 million as its part in Operation Exodus-Israel Emergency Campaign—a worldwide effort to rescue Soviet Jews and bring them to Israel.

The campaign needs to raise \$3.6 billion over the next 3 years. UJA/Federation has committed itself to contributing \$420 million toward the goal, which represents American Jewry's share in settling this long-hoped-for immigration.

UJC's Executive Committee has agreed upon the \$7 million figure as UJC's portion of the \$420 million. The amount is over and above its regular 1990 fundraising campaign to support thousands of programs in this country, in Israel and around the world. It is also above and beyond any domestic or local resettlement project.

UJC views this campaign to resettle between 750,000 and 1.5 million Soviet Jews in Israel as the most important and critical effort UJC has ever undertaken. Every man, woman and child in the community will be asked to consider a meaningful contribution, to be paid out over three years.

The Palisades Division of United Jewish Community is asking its constituents in the towns of Alpine, Closter, Cresskill, Demarest, Englewood, Englewood Cliffs, Norwood, Northvale, Rockleigh and Tenafly to gather in support of Soviet Jewish immigration and Operation Exodus-Israel. The gathering will be held on May 3 at the JCC on the Palisades, 7:30 p.m. It will be open to the public.

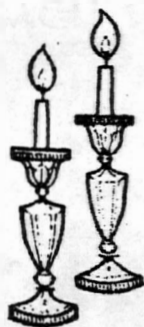

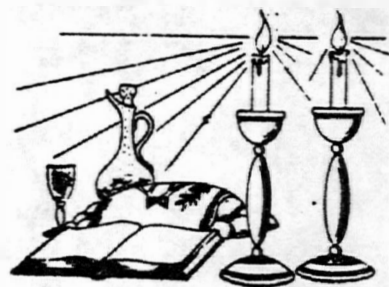
