Rabbi's Message

Involving the Un-Involved

Dear Friends.



In recent years the Reform Movement has been active in Outreach projects. It has taken two forms: (1) Outreaching to the non-Jewish spouses in our congregations and to those who have recently chosen Judaism through conversions helping them feel more com-

fortable in our midst, (2) a new national outreach program is under way finding ways to welcome unafflicted Jews into Temple membership and Jewish involvement.


I am grateful for the fine outreach work being done in our congregation, yet it is time to also consider "Inreach."

Inreach, dear friends, consists of putting together a program that helps me as your Rabbi, as well as our Temple leaders to learn the following:

- 1. Who are you, our congregants? What are your backgrounds and interest? What is the current extent and realistic limits of your interest in worship and congregational activities? Are there important differences between our older and younger congregants in your approach to congregational life, and associational life generally, that should inform our thinking and planning?
- 2. I have been studying the literature to discover what programs, methods, and approaches, have succeeded in attracting congregants to greater participation and deeper committment to the Temple?
- 3. How do we reach out to the majority of you, my people whose interest and participation is candidly, marginal or nominal? What kinds of communications, and roles that I, our officers and our staff pursue can touch those of you not actively involved in Temple life and in Jewish life?
- 4. While pursuing successful programs and activities which may be social, recreational or educational, how do we help you into the central purpose of our enterprise; a place for worship and the development and constant nourishment of distinctly Jewish committment.
- 5. Central to all of this is discovering what you want and what you need; from your Rabbi, from your Temple, from your fellow congregants.

People, I'm not in the numbers game - you know that. I want to learn how to better help each other become even more deeply committed congregants and committed Jews, who are "both moved by satisfaction and enjoyment, but equally by the recognition that Temple Beth El life fulfills an obligation which Jews have to themselves, their predecessors, their children and their grandchildren more."

President's Message

B'reishit, "In the Beginning"

As the new dawn of my administration looms on the horizon I look forward to the coming days with a great deal of excitement and some trepidation.

The beginning of any Presidency tends to give the person involved a feeling of euphoria and headiness when you realize that so many of your fellow congregants have given you a vote of confidence. Ardelle has also been raised in Reform Judaism and has been as active as I in the affairs of the Temple and the auxiliaries.

We asked the question at our first congregational meeting: "What is going on for the young families?" We were told that the current administration was waiting for someone to ask the question and we were immediately asked to put together a group with the assistance of the Temple. That simple question on our part had brought us to a level of activity and friendship within the congregation that neither of us had every imagined.

Since the early days of my membership I have been fortunate enough to either be part of or chair various important committees and events for the Temple. This activity has brought me to this point of leadership and thankfully for your confidence.

Now that you are aware of how I got to this point in my Temple life the next logical question is where I hope to take us

Temple Beth El is pleased to announce the selection of Mrs. Sherry Newman as its new Education Director for 1990-91. Mrs. Newman is the daughter of Dr. Kenneth and Elaine Bloom, members of Temple Beth El since 1968.

Mrs. Newman attended Douglass College, Rutgers University where she majored in sociology with a specialization in ethnic and racial relations and took courses in hebraic studies and religion. She was involved in the Hillel Foundation at Rutgers where she became an outreach worker for the Foundation. Among her responsibilities was advisorship of the newly founded Reform Jewish Chavurah. She also taught grades 3-11 and led the junior congregation at Anshe Emeth Memorial Temple in New Brunswick. Mrs. Newman, also, while at Rutgers helped found an afterschool day care program for children in a low income housing project and worked as a volunteer with spinal cord injured patients at a Veterans' Columbia University with a specialty in higher and adult education.

Outreach Connections

The holiday of Shavuot, the Festival of Weeks, is one of the three harvest festivals, along with Sukkot and Passover. It is during Shavuot that we commemorate the giving of the Torah to Moses on Mt. Sinai, and thereby annually affirm our commitment to the teachings of our Jewish faith.

The ritual of "confirmation" takes place on Shavuot, when our young adults confirm their faith in God. Confirmation was first practiced by the Reform movement in 1847. In most Reform congregations, it actually replaced the Bar Mitzvah ceremony because it was available to both young men and women. It was not until after World War II that Bar and Bat Mitzvah became normative practice again within Reform

If there is true understanding of the meaning of Confirmation, there will be a desire to continue the study of Torah throughout adult life. Rabbi Hillel's quote from the "Sayings of the Fathers," is most appropriate: "Do not say I shall study when I find the time because you may never find time.' Before one can commit to Judaism and Israel, the Jewish people, a Jew by birth or a Jew by choice, must have knowledge of what this commitment involves.

The Haftorah portion on Shavuot is from the Biblical Book of Ruth. Ruth, a non-Jew, pledges her identification with the Jewish people in her vow, "Where you go, I will go, and where you lodge, I will lodge; your people will be my people and your God my God." This is interpreted by many commentators as a formal act of conversion. It certainly represents the formal identification of an individual with the Jewish people. Ruth later meets the Jew Boaz, whom she marries, and thus this devoted convert becomes the greatgrandmother of King David. Shavuot reminds us that Jews always welcomed those who wished to be part of our people.

We Are A Check-Off Congregation

On the Temple bill you receive for the 1990-1991 year, there will be a line item for ARZA. To enroll and join for the first time, or to renew membership, mark your bill accordingly and ARZA dues will be forwarded by the Temple office. ARZA membership is \$20 per family unit for members of "check-off" congregations, and is especially important because

- ARZA is the founder and patron of the Israel Religious Action Center, which opened in 1987 to fight aggressively for religious rights for Reform Jews and all Israelis, and to counter the extremism of Israel's Orthodox establishment. The Center initiates and finances legal action to reverse religious discrimination, educates Knesset members and government officials about Reform Judaism, and plays a vital role in combating the never-ending attempts to amend the Law of Return.
- ARZA directs the ongoing efforts of Reform institutions to obtain funding from the Jewish Agency and the United Jewish Appeal for projects operated by the Reform Movement in Israel. Beginning in 1987, ARZA's leadership has secured major allocations to Reform-sponsored educational and social service programs in the Jewish state.
- ARZA is the primary supporter of Har Halutz, the Reform free-enterprise settlement in northern Israel.
- ARZA allocates dues income to a series of projects in Israel, including Reform Nursery schools, an Arab/Jewish youth camp, a Reform youth movement for young adults, and a program to absorb new immigrants in Reform congregations in Jerusalem.
- ARZA provides a Jewish studies program for our Reform kibbutzim, Yahel and Lotan, and works with all three Reform settlements in their efforts to attract industry.
- ARZA represents the American Reform Movement in the World Zionist Congress, which meets in Jerusalem every four years. The Congress is a critical international forum for the discussion of religious rights and equitable funding for Reform institutions in Israel. ARZA played a central role at the 31st World Zionist Congress following a smashing victory in Congress elections, making it the second largest Zionist grouping in the United States.

Doris and David Mortman graciously gave of themselves and their home on April 29th, hosting a highly successful cocktail party for the benefit of Israel Bonds. Those attending heard Congressman Bob Torricelli speak and were entertained by Betty Silberman, one of the stars of the Yiddish musical, SONGS OF PARADISE. \$60,000 in Bonds were sold, giving the 1990 campaign an enthusiastic kick-off. A good time was had by all!

Reform Rabbi Elected to Religious Council in Israel

Rabbi Robert Samuels, the Headmaster of the Reform Movement's Leo Baeck School in Haifa, has been elected to Haifa's religious council. Rabbi Samuel's election is a dramatic victory for Reform Judaism in Israel. It follows nearly a year of work by the ARZA-sponsored Israel Religious Action Center to have a Reform candidate elected to such a position.

Religious councils are municipal bodies that allocate funds for local synagogues and religious programs. Approximately half of the members of these councils are selected by the local city council. In six cities throughout Israel, the Israel Religious Citizens' Rights Movement headed by Shulamit Aloni and the Shinui Party headed by Amnon Rubinstein — to put forward Reform and Conservative candidates. To date, however, only the Haifa City Council has elected a Reform representative.

Israel's Orthodox parties have challenged Samuel's election, and the Israel Religious Action Center will take the matter to court, where it is confident that the election will be upheld. The Center hopes someday to see Reform representatives on every religious council in the country, a development which will eventually make possible government funding of Reform institutions. All Bond Funds To Go Towards Soviet Aliyah

An international Jewish communal effort to provide \$1 billion in Israel Bond proceeds during 1990 to help Israel create jobs and housing for Soviet and other Jewish immigrants is under way.

Israel Finance Minister Shimon Peres told 300 delegates to a Bond conference in Jerusalem:

"The whole money. I assure you, will be devoted to the absorption of immigrants.

"This is today the central issue, and you are our main patner. We don't have others. We shall use the money to build the infrastructure for absorption of the immigrantsto pave roads, build energy stations and housing and to make the exodus from Russia and implementation in Israel as agreeable, as quick and as promising as we can. It is a partnership of great depth and meaning."

In a principal address, Prime Minister Yitzhak Shamir, said: "On the basis of the present number of Soviet newcomers, we estimate that we will have to build about 35,000 housing units, 300 new classrooms, and bigger ulpan facilities for the thousands of adult students. The cost is estimated at more than \$1 billion for every 100,000 olim.

"The people of Israel will cover the major share, but we are relying on world Jewry to make extraordinary efforts to help in this great enterprise."

How You Can Help Solve The Garbage Crisis

Reduce, Reuse, Recycle

- Avoid overpackaged goods, such as double-packaged beauty and cosmetic products; and avoid disposables, such as razors and pens.
- · Buy foods in bulk.
- · Compost grass clippings and leaves.
- Buy recycled goods.
- Promote curbside recycling: Call your local town hall or state solid waste office for more information. (Litesized soda bottles, plastic milk jugs, polyethelene shopping bags, and foam meat trays are all recyclable.)
- At home use cloth diapers rather than disposable ones.
- Reduce household toxic wastes in your garbage: Soap and water, ammonia, baking soda and vinegar can often replace cleaning solvents. Latex paint is less toxic than solvent-based paint, especially if allowed to dry before discarding. Batteries may contain extremely dangerous chemicals, call your county agency for proper disposal; if none exists, pressure your local official to establish a household hazardous waste collection system.
- Avoid containers made from multiple plastics and multiple layers, such as squeezable ketchup bottles and children's fruit juice packs. They cannot be recycled yet.
- Avoid polyvinyl chloride (PVC) containers, often distinguished by molded jug handles and often for cooking oil, detergent, or salad dressing. PVC is difficult to recycle, and its manufacture causes extremely noxious air pollution. (Soon more states will require that plastic containers bear a code identifying its type of plastic.)
- Bring your own washable cup to workplace and community meetings.
- Return hangers to your local dry-cleaner.
- Recycling must be accompanied by reduction of trash to make an impact.

New UAHC Introduction To Judaism Class

A 16-session course designed to give participants a basic understanding of Jewish belief and practice will be offered Wednesday evenings at Temple Emeth in Teaneck, beginning August 22. The class is open to all: individuals (with Jewish partners if applicable) who are considering conversion to Judaism; interfaith couples; and Jews by birth and non-Jews who wish to obtain a basic adult-level knowledge of Judaism. Taught by Rabbi George Stern of Nyack, NY, the course will approach Jewish tradition — faith, people, way of life — through a study of the holiday and life cycles of Judaism. A basic reading knowledge of Hebrew will also be included.

Class will meet once a week for 16 weeks from 7:45 - 9:45 p.m. through December 26. A single registration fee includes tuition and one set of books and materials for an individual or a couple.

Introduction to Judaism is sponsored by the Outreach Program of the New Jersey-West Hudson Valley Council of the Union of American Hebrew Congregations and its 58 member congregations. Additional sections will be offered in New Jersey.
