From the Rabbi

Israel has been on my mind lately. I suppose that the presidential race brings it up. And, of course, Israel is never far from the headlines. But what first brought Israel to mind lately was the group of parents I saw gathered in temple, listening to a presentation about the Israel Incentive Savings Plan, an innovative community program dedicated to helping our children visit Israel.

I was thrilled by the attention this group of

I was thrilled by the attention this group of parents gave to the subject. There are many reasons not to do so. Money is tight, it is hard to think of saving for the future when bills are due now. Secondly, the press from Israel is hard to decipher. Is it a safe place to visit? Does it reflect our ideals? Do I want to send my children there? Thirdly, many people examine their own feelings about Israel and come away unsure.

Twenty-five years ago, Israel was a much easier "sell." American Jews knew, often first-hand, the importance of the state to them and to all of world Jewry. Troubling issues of security, terrorism and morality did not plague our thoughts.

Time has erased much of the ease. But I would argue that time has not erased the basic importance of the state to us. We are witness to the ingathering of Jews from the former Soviet Union, from Ethiopia and from Yemen. Because we feel safe is not a reason to marvel at the continuing miracle of a Jewish homeland. Because we might never need to live there is no reason not to support the state. Our comfort and ease are the precise reasons we have to support Israel with our money and our presence.

I urge <u>all</u> Beth Israel's congregants to think about Israel anew. If your knowledge is sparse, increase it! If your argument is with "politics as usual," find a way to make your voice heard in a loving, constructive manner (you can start with

your ARZA bulletin board in Ratner Hall). If you are worried about security and American political influence in Israel, get involved! There are organizations and information galore. While they disagree in tone and outlook, the entire Zionist spectrum is dedicated to Israel's survival and flourishing.

What that group of parents wanted for their children is, I believe, an authentic Jewish experience. That should be nothing less than what we want for ourselves as well. As we gather at our Passover tables and recite the closing line of the Seder, "Next year in Jerusalem," may that be our goal and our vision. May we be inspired to think, work and recommit ourselves to that precious land.

Aliyah is the honor of ascent to the <u>Bima</u> and represents a spiritual enactment of those people who assembled to receive the Torah from Moses. Those wearing tallit take an edge and touch where the Torah reader will begin and place the edge to lips. Once the reading from the Torah begins, tradition teaches to take hold of the Torah handle, Eitz Chayim (tree of life), in keeping with the practice of always taking hold of the object over which a blessing is recited.

dialoguing with us all.



An exciting variety of courses is being offered during the spring semester of the Congregation/Community Institute of Adult Jewish Studies. Participants can select one course for the six-week semester. Classes begin at 7:45 p.m. and conclude at 9:30 p.m. except the first week when the kickoff begins at 7:30 and classes end at 9:45 p.m. There is a break, 8:15 to 8:30 p.m., for coffee, dessert and socializing.

COURSE LIST/DESCRIPTIONS

Dealing With Missionaries: Know What To Answer—Rabbi Moshe Adler—A "messianic" Jew is out to convince you that Christianity is the ultimate form of Judaism. Why is he doing it? How do you deal with his "proofs?" What are the real issues?

Trope: Learning to Chant the Haftorah—Nili Sharon Adler—Study the signs for chanting the Haftorah, leading to learning how to chant entire passages. A basic reading knowledge of Hebrew is required. The course is both for beginners and for those who want to refresh their skills.

Learn To Lead A Service—Hazzan Edward Berkovits and Hazzan Stephen Stein—In just six weeks, you can learn to lead the weekday evening service in your congregation or in a private home.

The Sights and Sounds of Jews—Rabbi Fred Eisenberg—Examines movies and television and radio programs in which Jewish people are portrayed. Uncover the media Jew as seen by Jews and others.

Judaism, Ethics and the Real World—Rabbi David Gelfand—Confronting morality in today's world. Joining Rabbi Gelfand will be Hon. Louis Stokes, Chrmn. U.S. House Ethics Committee, "Government"; Ohio Atty. General Lee Fisher, "Judiciary"; Joel Hyatt, Hyatt Legal Services, "Law"; Max Friedman, Friedman Buick & Will Sukenik, Properties Development, "Business"; and leading medical authorities "Medicine, Health Care & Bio-Medical Ethics".

Abraham Joshua Heschel: The Man and The Message—Dr. Susannah Heschel—The course synthesizes the basic teachings of Dr. A.J. Heschel through a study of his writings; runs for three weeks, and then you can join any other class already in progress.

The Experience of G-d in The Bible—Dr. Roger C. Klein—Through close readings of biblical texts, examine how G-d is experienced by Abraham, Jacob, Moses, Jeremiah, Job and ordinary Israelite people. This course demonstrates how the Bible skillfully seeks to evoke the experience of divine nearness while protecting divine majesty and holiness; and conversely, how the Bible deals with the frequent sense that G-d is absent from our lives.

The Other Monotheistic Religion: Introduction to Islam—Rabbi Alan Lettofsky—The course presents an overview of Islam including the life of Muhammed, the Koran, the hadith, various sects and sufism (mysticism).

Turning Points that Revolutionized the Jewish World—Dr. Alan Levenson—Has any people experienced more dramatic upheavals than the Jews? Explore modern Jewish history through a look at its turning points including the excommunication of the Hasidic movement and David Ben Gurion's proclamation of Israeli independence.

What Happens After I Die?—Rabbi Michael Oppenheimer—Confronting this most profound of all human predicaments, our personal search is guided by the answers of classical Jewish texts and contemporary Jewish thinkers from all streams within the Jewish community. Be prepared to contemplate the mystery of the unknown. Text: "What Happens After I Die?".

Sex on a Higher Plane or That's the Spirit—Rabbi Daniel Roberts—a course for young singles to discuss the ethics of sexual relationships; co-taught by Rabbi Roberts and local psychologists and social workers.

More Jews of the World—Rabbi Milton Rube—In this class, study the customs, history and lore of various familiar and esoteric Jewish communities—Sephardic and Sshkenazic; Jews in Arab lands, Western Europe, and North and South America.

Jews and Their Non-Jewish Neighbors-Rabbi Stanley Schachter-The course presents a survey of the historical relationships between Jews and non-Jews as well as the impact of minority status and religious conflicts

Raising Jewish Children—Deborah Schein—The focus of this course is a look at how our children learn that they are Jewish. Topics include holidays and their celebration, home observance, mitzvot and tzedakah from the perspective of raising Jewish children, ages 5 to 10.

Back to Basics For Soviet Immigrants—Mark Shukhman—This is a course taught in Russian for recently arrived Soviet emigres, exploring Jewish observance of holidays, significant Jewish concepts and life cycle events. Co-sponsored by Anshe Chesed—Fairmount Temple and AVICHI Foundation. Special fee: \$8.

Wisdom of the Talmud: Love, Sex and Compassion—Dr. Zvi Yehuda—Situations in modern Jewish life are examined through the timeless source of Talmudic wisdom. Issues to be explored include Jewish ethics of romantic love, halakha and the impact of modernity on man-woman relationships and family cohesiveness and the Jewish concept of compassion.

A Taste of Ulpan—Miriam Schaffer—This new course offering provides an introduction to speaking Hebrew for those with no knowledge of the language. In six weeks, begin to participate in basic Hebrew conversation.

Learning to Read and Understand Hebrew Prayer

(Level I)-Esther Ruben

(Level II)-Orna Schafer

These courses have been developed to teach basic Hebrew prayer book reading. Level I is for those with no previous knowledge of Hebrew Levels II is designed for those who wish to refresh and extend their skills.
