FROM THE RABBI'S DESK

Caring Community

"The person who lends a friend a hand, it is counted to him as if he saved the entire world." (Midrash Tahnuma)

At various times in our lives, we have all had experiences in which a kind telephone call, a visit from a friend, or a warm meal has changed our outlook. The congregational leadership has decided to act in the best traditions of Judaism to form and operate a Caring Committee. But, as we all know, committees need people to step up and fulfill the work of the committee.

The Caring Committee is intended to become the sensitive, caring heart of the congregation that will mobilize resources to aid members of the congregational family. The Committee will become the nerve center that will help to keep me and the congregational leadership aware of the diverse needs of members. The Committee will help to insure that none of the members of the synagogue just drop out of sight as might occur if a member becomes too ill or is unable to travel to participate in the life of the synagogue. This Committee will carry on the holy work of the community.

In thinking about serving on the Caring Committee, you may wonder about the requirements for membership. The first requirement is to have a heart that cares for our fellow Jews and congregation members.

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The second requirement will be the ability to communicate with others, primarily by telephone. If you can fulfill these requirements (I do not believe there are any members of the congregation who could not fulfill them) and you are interested in enriching the lives of others (and your own as well), then please give me a call.

The active participation of all temple members is the key element in making this Committee succeed. To transform synagogue into a community that truly and concretely expresses its care requires that all the members be connected to the caring heart, the Caring Committee. It will then become the responsibility of each member of the community to contact the Committee whenever the needs of other members of the community are discovered. Please do not be shy about contacting the Caring Committee. Keeping the Caring Committee informed is an extension of the holy work of caring for each other.

President's Message

Although we're just at the beginning of February, believe it or not, it's time to think of summer camp for our children. Of course our thoughts include all the usual recreation and activity that summer camp can offer, but you might want to consider two options which offer a focus on Jewish ideals and traditions.

I have spoken to Rabbi Ron Klotz, the director of the UAHC-based Goldman Union Camp Institute (GUCI) in Zionsville, Indiana, (near Indianapolis). He tells me that there is a two week camp for students entering third or fourth grade in the fall. For children in grades four through ten there are two camp options — four or eight weeks. Many of our members have sent their children to GUCI over the years and were quite pleased with the experience. As an added incentive, there may be some grant money available to interested families.

Another option is the JCC's Camp Wise, located in Burton, Ohio — a bit closer to home. According to Karin Hess, the director, Camp Wise also offers a two-week session for first time campers entering grades three through five. There are three, four, and seven week sessions for students entering grades three through nine. JCC members enjoy a reduced fee and there is a sibling discount of \$100. Several Beth Israel members attended Camp Wise as children and some went on to become camp counselors.

Both of these camps are eager to send representatives to Beth Israel to speak with parents and campers about their programs. If you are interested in a presentation, let me know as soon as possible. Camp brochures and application forms are available at the temple office. Deadlines for applications are right around the corner, so don't hesitate.

SUPER SUNDAY '97

This annual day-long dialathon in support of the Jewish Welfare Fund campaign is set for February 9. Over 500 community volunteers are expected to participate in the 9a.m. - 8p.m. event. Super Sunday provides a spirited kickoff to the public phase of the community drive (which continues through May 15) by reaching close to one-third of all JWF contributors in one day. Last year the Cleveland Jewish community raised \$24.5 million in response to pressing human service needs in Cleveland, Israel, and around the world.

SHVITZ! - MY YIDDISHEH WORKOUT

What's freylach, builds muscle tone, and has people humming oy vey iz mir to the tune of "By Mir Bist Du Sheyn"? SHVITZ! My Yiddisheh Workout, that's what! This 30-minute exercise videotape, produced entirely in Yiddish (with English subtitles), is a follow-along exercise routine that the viewer can do at home without special equipment.

The half-hour workout sequence is a series of simple exercises for strengthening and toning muscles, all set to klezmer music and Yiddish songs. SHVITZ! is the brainchild of several committed young Yiddishists from The Workmen's Circle Branch 105 in New York City. "I made this tape for Yiddishists like myself. There are quite a lot of us out there. If people think the idea is funny because it's in Yiddish, let it be funny. They can laugh their way to good health!" says producer Roland (Ruvn) Millman, himself a gym junkie. But serious exercise it is. The routine, designed by a professional workout trainer, includes variations for beginners and seniors, including seated versions of the floor exercises. Advanced exercise buffs can follow the more strenuous workout.

SHVITZ! My Yiddisheh Workout, is the one and only exercise video in Yiddish. So, nu, why are you

Some of you have said that you find it hard to observe Shabbat on the West Side, away from family and amongst a non-Jewish community. To learn the art of observing Shabbat is a personal discovery. Rabbi Abraham Heschel writes, "...the higher goals of spiritual living is not to amass a wealth of information, but to face sacred moments." Lighting Shabbat candles on Friday night is a reminder of the coming of Shabbat; lighting the Havdallah candle at sundown is a reminder of its end.

When we awaken on Shabbat morning, we make a personal choice to enter into fellowship with the consecrated day. One simple way to get started is to recite a brachot (blessing): "Baruch atah adonai eloheinu melech ha-olam" reminds us of our many blessings and expresses our thanks. To continue your Shabbat morning involvement, we on the Ritual Committee invite you to come to Torah Services at 10:45 a.m. here at temple. You will find yourself in a welcoming atmosphere, giving and receiving support for your Shabbat commitment.



NEW LIBRARY ACQUISITIONS

ADULT NONFICTION

AUSCHWITZ: 1270 TO THE PRESENT by
Deborah Dwork and Robert Jan van Pelt. A work of
impeccable scholarship and narration, this book is a
definitive history of the site that has come to epitomize evil. To quote Robert I. Gildman, chairman of
the education committee of the Jewish Foundation
for the Righteous, this is "an amazing piece of
research."BIBLICAL WOMEN UNBOUND:
COUNTER-TALES by Norma Rosen. In this book
the author fills in the missing blanks of rabbinic
storytelling, placing biblical women where they
belong — at the center of the action. Touchin, witty,
gorgeously written, Biblical Women Unbound should
be read alongside the Bible, and reread again for
sheer joy.

GENESIS: TRANSLATION AND COMMENTARY by Robert Alter. Alter's brilliant translation recovers the meanings, literary strategies, and eloquence of the ancient Hebrew and conveys them in striking literary English. The result is a Genesis with the continuity of theme and motif of a wholly conceived and fully realized book. The translation is enhanced by the author's insightful, informed commentary,.

IN THE YEAR 1096: THE FIRST CRUSADE & THE JEWS by Robert Chazan. This book sets forth a lucid, intelligent, sober, wide-ranging, popular survey of the significance of the First Crusade based on a thorough command of the scholarly literature. Robert Chazan is one of the major figures in this field.

BOOKS FOR YOUNG ADULTS

THE KIDS' CATALOG OF JEWISH HOLIDAYS by David A. Adler. This easy-to-use introduction of each of the Jewish holidays is an entertaining collection of material from around the world, with stories, poems, recipes, songs, crafts, puzzles, cartoons, and more!

MOE BERG: THE SPY BEHIND HOME PLATE by Vivian Grey. This book is a biography of Moe Berg, on o f the few Jews to play baseball in the major leagues. Fluent in nine languages, an Ivy League scholar, and an attorney, he was a top spy during World War II. Wish his help, the United States won the race against Germany to build the dreaded atomic bomb. A fascinating book.

ESTHER'S STORY by Diane Wolkstein, illus.
