RABBI LETTOFSKY OFFERED ONE-YEAR CONTRACT

We are delighted to welcome Rabbi Lettofsky and his wife, Jean, to Beth Israel and believe that the agreement will work well for our congregation. We feel confident from your feedback that this is indeed welcome news.

MARK THAT DATE: We have added two Havdalah picnics to the summer calendar, July 10 and Aug. 28. The Board will be having a retreat with Rabbi Elliott Kleinman, regional director of the UAHC Northeast Lakes Council, in August.

We also confirmed eight young members who are a blessing to all of us, in a beautiful Shavuot service. Sunday school ended with class presentations about the educational fruits of their labors, and a special lunch to honor the volunteers who have worked so hard all year long.

What stands out most was the chance to meet a warm and friendly group of Jews from all over the U.S. and Canada. They came from tiny congregations (12) to more than 200 and every size in between, some very new and some well-established. Some lived very far from other Jews and some in urban areas. We all shared our problems, worked on solutions and came away feeling less isolated in our search to keep our congregations vital.

NEW LIBRARY ACQUISITIONS

FOR CHILDREN

HELLO, HELLO, ARE YOU THERE GOD? by Molly Cone. Ages 3-7. How do we explain to young children such concepts as learning, belonging and God? How do we teach them to value themselves and the tradition of which they are a part? How do we instill in them a sense of Jewish identity? Through the magic of storytelling, Cone accomplishes all these tasks and more.

MATZO BALL MOON, by Leslie Newman. Ages 4-9. Matzo balls always play an important part in the seder meal at Passover. In this book, matzo balls also play a very important part in the story.

DREAMS IN THE GOLDEN COUNTRY:
The diary of Zipporah Feldman, a
Jewish Immigrant Girl, by
Kathryn Lasky. Grades 5-8.
Character, voice and spirit
educate with charm in this
entertaining Lower East Side
fiction offered as a diary.

Narrator Zipporah Feldman is a spunky pre-teen girl. And through her entries, the book zips along. Nothing escapes her gaze or humorous tongue. As a result, no detail of early 20th century greenhorn existence escapes the reader. Cultural minutiae that readers would sleep through become a succession of vital secrets not to be missed. Despite poverty, Zippy registers a colorful life in an upwardly mobile, happy family.

BE NOT FAR FROM ME, by Eric A. Kimmel. Grades 5-8. This collection of stories reveals the tumultuous relationship between people and God that started 4,000 years ago and continues to this day. It begins with Abraham, who was the first to believe in one God and therefore the first to receive His blessing, and spans more than 1,500 years. Master storyteller Eric Kimmel draws from the Bible and the Midrash to create vivid portrayals of favorite heroes such as David, Samson, Deborah and Elijah and of lesser-known ones such as Miriam, Hosea, Jeremiah and Ezekiel.

THE GIRL WHO LIVED WITH BEARS, by Barbara Diamond. A folktale of the Pacific Northwest, teaching about the delicate balance between people and animals in the natural world and the respect people should have for this world.

FOR ADULTS

THE JEW OF NEW YORK, by Ben Katchor. For teens and adults. This hard cover cartoon book, which will appeal to readers of all ages, is pure New York humor. This latest Katchor book, uses the sense of the absurd to explore various religious and theatrical subcultures of the 1830s, simpletons, con men and all. Katchor's drawings evoke a nostalgia for the way the city appeared to us as children: towering, dark and mysterious. His stories follow suit, noting the detail that a child would, particularly if that child was raised in (or raised on stories of) New York's Jewish Lower East Side.

THE GREAT JEWISH CITIES OF CENTRAL AND EASTERN EUROPE, A Travel Guide and Resource Book to Prague, Warsaw, Cracow and Budapest, by Eli Valley. This is the most comprehensive guidebook covering all aspects of Jewish history and contemporary life in these four cities. This remarkable book includes detailed histories of the Jewish residents, walking tours of Jewish districts past and present, intensive descriptions of Jewish sites, fascinating accounts of local Jewish legend and lore. The book is a practical source book essential for the Jewish traveler, containing information ranging from kosher restaurants to prayer times and service

descriptions of active synagogues. This book includes maps, community office locations, and information on mikvehs and buildings of all sorts including locations, histories, customs unique to specific congregations, etc. A traveler's must read.

ISRAEL: A HISTORY, by Martin Gilbert. The eminent British historian has written a comprehensive history of Israel during its first 50 years, starting with its founders and the beginnings of the Zionist movement. The chronological arrangement takes the reader from the 1880s to 1997. Along the way, Gilbert covers the early Zionist Congresses, the British Mandate, World War II, the War of Independence and all the other wars and conflicts between Israel and the Arab states. The Entebbe raid, the Madrid talks and Oslo Accords, Yitzhak Rabin's assassination and funeral, the peace process. 72 photographs.

ONE-HUNDRED YEARS OF ART IN ISRAEL, by Gideon Ofrat. Israel's premier curator and art historian brings the rich legacy of Israeli art to a Western audience for the first time, from 19th century Jewish folk art in Ottoman Palestine to the post modern patterns of Israeli art today. This collection of 350 illustrations (200 in full color) with Ofrat's commentary provide an engrossing and invaluable guide to Israeli art.

TO EVERY THING THERE IS A SEASON, by Leo and Diane Dillon. The Dillons, highly acclaimed and award-winning illustrators of many children's books, are the creators of this interesting treatment of biblical verse. Beginning with the famous first eight verses of chapter 3 of Ecclesiastes ("To every thing")

there is a season...") and ending with verse 4 of chapter 1 ("One generation passes away, and another generation comes, but the earth abides forever"), as found in the King James version of the Bible, each double-spread page is stunningly illustrated with an interpretive painting. rendered in a different style.

VIDEO

ALEF...BET...BLAST OFF! For ages 3-10. This magical series of eight video episodes introduces children to traditional Jewish values and their relevance for today's modern world. Our first video, "One Big Family," introduces us to David and Rachel, the main two puppet characters, and some of their friends.

MIRACLE DAYS. Ages 2-11. This video provides a wonderful way to introduce children to the Jewish holidays. Dance with the Torah, build a sukkah, party on Purim, bake matzoh and celebrate all of the holidays together.

JINJA'S ISRAELI SAFARI. No age limit. Jinja, Israel's most lovable lion cub, takes us on an exciting trip through Tel Aviv's Safari Park, introducing us to new songs along the way.
