HOLOCAUST DRAMA: "Der Kaiser von Atlantis," a one-act opera composed by an inmate at Tereisenstadt, will be performed by Cleveland Public Theatre Nov. 5-14. A special preview to benefit the Cleveland Holocaust Center will be Nov. 3.

Composed by Viktor Ullmann, who died at Auschwitz, the opera satirizes the perils of political abuse of power and the meaning of death. The opera tells the story of The Emperor, who has declared himself "all powerful," stronger than all the forces of nature, including

death. Death, on hearing of such arrogance, lets no one die. The Emperor begs Death to return. Death agrees but only if the Emperor agrees to be the first to die.

Performances are in English at 8 p.m. Fridays and Saturdays with matinees at 3 p.m. Sundays at the Gordon Square Theatre, 6409 Detroit Ave., Cleveland. Tickets are \$20 (\$15 on Sundays). Mention Beth Israel for a \$2 discount.

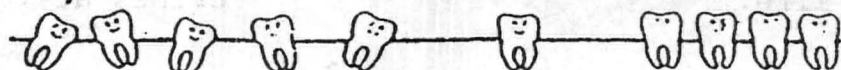
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**FEED YOUR MIND

NEW LIBRARY ACQUISITIONS

For Adults

Rabbi Nachman's Stories translated by Rabbi Aryeh Kaplan.

Captivating, moving, amusing, even startling, these tales "arouse" people from their

sleep using the most powerful weapon of all: the hidden secrets of Torah. Rabbi Kaplan's new translation seeks to convey as much of the richness of the original as possible while remaining scrupulously faithful to the text.

God Whispers...stories of the soul, lessons of the heart by Karyn D. Kedar.

Wonder, joy and beauty are not as far away as we might think...if only we open our minds and souls to the sound of God's whispering voice. So Karen Kedar reminds us. By sharing significant moments in the lives of ordinary people, she helps us along the journey to spiritual awareness and understanding.

"God Whispers" will inspire you to take a second look at everything around you and to rediscover a world that can be filled with the wonders of creation. "The universe abounds with gifts," Kedar writes, "open your heart and receive them."

The Fifty Years'. War...Israel and the Arabs by Ahron Bregman and Jihan El-Tahri.

Although the conflict between Jews and Arabs can be traced over 2,000 years, the modern dissension and its many cycles of war, terrorism, negotiation and hope dates to the creation of the state of Israel in 1948. Drawing on hundreds of in-depth interviews with politicians, soldiers and journalists from 16 countries, this book is the most comprehensive eyewitness account of the history of Israel's relations with its Arab neighbors.

Tears of Sorrow, Seeds of Hope: A Jewish Spiritual Companion for Infertility and Pregnancy Loss by Rabbi Nina Beth Cardin.

Many people who endure the emotional suffering of infertility, pregnancy loss or stillbirth bear this sorrow alone. Pregnancies that end too early are hidden; failed attempts at conception are barely mentioned.

Many women and men long to find solace in religious ritual and tradition to ease the emptiness felt from a loss that is without a face, a name or a grave.

At last, there is a source that acknowledges and encourages expression of their grief and offers comfort in their moments of pain.

Providing companionship and strength for healing from others who also have grieved, "Tears of Sorrow" is a spiritual companion that enables the reader to mourn within the words and ways of Judaism.

Grief in our Seasons: A Mourner's Kaddish Companion by Rabbi Kerry M. Olitzky.

This book is intended as a companion of comfort to saying Kaddish. It reflects the Jewish tradition of studying sacred texts while mourning and uniquely brings the elements of study and mourning together.

Common Man, Mythic Vision: the paintings of Ben Shahn by Susan Chevlowe.

Jewish Museum Associate Curator Susan Chevlowe was in charge of the Ben Shahn exhibit. She has brought to bear her special knowledge of early and mid-20th century American art as well as her experience working with the Jewish Museum's collection.

Ben Shahn's life as an artist has spanned six decades - a significant part of this century. His art has expressed a continuity of vision in dynamic tension with the social and

political transformation and upheavals taking place during the long period in which he worked. For many Americans, he has visualized both the freedoms and nightmares of the times.

Modern Masterworks on Paper from the Israel Museum, Jerusalem, edited by M. Perry-Lehman.

This catalog is published in conjunction with the Modern Masterworks exhibit at the Cleveland Museum of Art. This is the first collaborative undertaking between the two museums and it is also an important opportunity to share the substantial 20th century holdings of the Israel Museum's Department of Prints and Drawings with an audience in Cleveland, which is blessed with its own legacy of works on paper through the equally substantial holdings of the Cleveland Museum.

EVERY PERSON'S GUIDE TO THE HIGH HOLY DAYS by Rabbi Ronald H. Isaacs.

Rosh Hashanah, the Jewish New Year, and Yom Kippur, the Day of Atonement, are known in Jewish tradition as the "Yamim Noraim," the Days of Awe. Rosh Hashanah is the beginning and Yom Kippur is the culmination of the 10 special awe-inspiring days within which Jews are afforded the opportunity of a spiritual recovery by strenuous personal effort.

On the so-called High Holy Days, the synagogues are filled to capacity, and in many congregations there are overflow services to accommodate the vast numbers for whom no seats would otherwise be available.

Hopefully, this book will be a useful guide in the preparation and celebration of the High Holy Days.

EVERY PERSON'S GUIDE TO SHABBAT by Rabbi Ronald H. Isaacs.

Since ancient times, the Sabbath has been singled out as the most important of all Jewish festivals. It was the only one included in the Ten Commandments.

The fourth commandment states explicitly: "Remember the Shabbat day and keep it holy. Six days you shall labor and do all your work but the seventh day is a Sabbath of the Lord your God." (Exodus 20:8-11)

This volume is a book about the Sabbath, including its origins, the special Sabbaths that occur during the year and the customs, rituals and traditions that take place in the synagogue as well as in the home.

EVERY PERSON'S GUIDE TO SHAVUOT by Rabbi Ronald H. Isaacs.

This book will introduce you to the customs, laws, traditions, legends, stories, music and folklore connected with the festival of Shavuot. Each and every one of the Shavuot customs can enrich your lives as you keep the glorious past alive and at the same time light the way into the future. Always try to make the most of Shavuot. As each future Shavuot arrives into your lives, understand its meaning and enjoy it.

The Book of Jewish Life, A teacher's guide by Ellen Nemhauser.

This long-awaited teacher's guide provides age appropriate activities and instruction on

how to use the corresponding "The Book of Jewish Life" by Jo David and Daniel B. Syme. The textbook, focusing on the rituals and practice of the liberal movement today, is geared toward intermediate grades. Each chapter relates a stage or landmark of life, its traditional practices and its modern observance. For grades 4-6.

She was our "go to" person. If you needed advice on picking a rabbi, on how to bid your bridge hand or what to serve at the oneg shabbat, you went to Lenore.

In a congregation that must find leadership within its own ranks, Lenore stood out. She knew how to take charge. She was a WAVE during World War II (something she never bragged about), and she knew how to give orders. And expected them to be followed.

If something were amiss, you could expect a phone call.

"Linda, this is Lenore. Well, it's the Bulletin. You're going to have to fix this."

And my reply was usually, "Yes, ma'am." Well, OK, so I muttered a little too. But you had to respect her, because you knew she was right.
