Long-Range Planning - Update

The Long-Range Planning Committee continues to move ahead on two fronts: Gathering feedback and guidance from temple members and exploring a partnership with the Lorain congregation, Agudath B'nai Israel (ABI).

A sub-committee of the Long-Range Planning Committee is meeting twice monthly with a similar committee from ABI. Max Stark, our strategic planning consultant, facilitates the meetings. The goal of these meetings is to determine if it is feasible for the two congregations to formulate future plans together. We plan to complete the feasibility discussions with ABI before our General Congregational Meeting in January.

While those meetings go forward, the members of the Long-Range Planning Committee continue to gather feedback from every member of the congregation. About 50 members attended the congregational meeting in June where they provided excellent feedback and direction to the committee. The notes from that meeting were compiled and sent out to each member household at the end of the summer.

Within the next few weeks, you will receive an update to that report. Please review it, and then expect a follow-up call from a member of the Long-Range Planning Committee. One of us will call to answer any questions you may have and to invite you to a neighborhood meeting where you can voice your opinions and participate in small group discussion with other temple members. If you are unable to attend one of the scheduled meetings, we will arrange a time to meet with you at your convenience. Our goal is to get feedback from every member of Beth Israel – 100% participation.

A committee acting alone cannot decide our future. This kind of change will only be successful when it is the result of all of us working, thinking, and deciding *together*. Watch your mail and prepare to fully participate in the next step of this decision-making process.

EDUCATION NOTES

"High School Program Reaches New Heights"

Many congregational schools lose a number of their students after they become Bar or Bat Mitzvah. We are very privileged to have a large number of our students continue on through Confirmation and High School graduation. The challenge is to keep up the excitement and momentum that preparing for Bar and Bat Mitzvah creates "after the Torah is returned to the ark."

Two years ago we met with high school students and parents to examine our high school program and to help develop learning opportunities that were dynamic, relevant, and kept in mind the social needs for students of this age.

In response to these meetings, Tina Keller and Brian Friedman joined Lisa Feldman and Ken Cooper to expand our high school staff and to offer new direction and develop new leadership opportunities for our students. Last year was the first step in "recharging" the high school. The students focused on learning about who they were as Jews and how they "fit in" in the larger world. Much was learned, and much more was needed to be done.

This year, under Tina's guidance and very hard work, the focus is on "Jewish Dimensions of Social Justice." The plan has been to learn and to do; study a topic one week and go off and volunteer the next. For example, the students built the congregational sukkah one week, and worked for Habitat for Humanity the next... They learned about the American Civil Liberties Union from lawyer and temple member, James Levin, and heard firsthand from Mort Epstein about his work on behalf of civil rights and visited his show at the ACLU Building in Cleveland.

Our students are active, involved, and taking on new responsibilities as they learn and do. We are very proud of them, their supportive parents, and the dedication of their teachers. Chazak, Chazak! - Be strong, be strong! And may you continue to go from strength to strength.

SHABBAT MORNING TORAH STUDY at 10:00 a.m. continues in November as the scroll turns! It's never too late to join the discussion.

Nov. 2 – Chayei Sarah – Gen. 23:1-25:18
Although entitled, "The Life of Sarah", chapter 23 of this week's parasha deals with Sarah's death and the negotiations for her burial place. The portion continues with the dramatic love story of Isaac and Rebecca...

Nov. 9 – Toledot – Gen. 25:19-28:9 The birth and rivalry of Esau and Jacob are detailed. The story is one of family conflict and how problems are resolved... or are they?

Nov. 16 – VaYeitze – Gen. 28:10-32:3

[Note: Torah study begins at 9:45 a.m. on this date] Jacob, leaving his family, finds God in an unexpected place... and finds love and hardship with his uncle's family.

Nov. 23 – VaYishlach – Gen 32:4-36:43 Jacob wrestles with a mysterious assailant and gets a new name – Yisrael. We are later known as the "Children of Israel" – each of us wrestling with God.

Hungering for America: Italian, Irish, and Jewish Foodways in the Age of Migration By Hasia R. Diner

Millions of immigrants were drawn to American shores, not by the mythic streets paved with gold, but rather by its tables heaped with food. How they experienced the realities of America's abundant food...its meat and white bread, butter and cheese, fruits and vegetables, coffee and beer...reflected their earlier deprivations and shaped their ethnic practices in the new land. "Hungering for America" tells the story of three distinctive groups and their unique culinary dramas.

The People Next Door: Holocaust Resources (Booklet, Video Tape and CD-ROM)

The materials in this educational package present the stories of people who experienced the horrors of the Nazi rise to power and the Holocaust of the 1930's and 40's. They are people who may be your neighbors, friends and co-workers. Though each of them had a unique path that brought them to South Bend, Indiana after World War II, all of them survived the Holocaust. That experience binds them together, having faced loss and deprivation, tragedy and crisis, brutality and torture in a way few of us can comprehend.

She finds herself drawn to their youngest son, who doesn't speak. Joining forces with Mrs. Kalman, she learns to accept and respect a culture steeped in traditions, and finds the true value of love.

If any of the activities below are ones that you, by yourself or along with members of your family or friends, would like to consider participating in, please call us and we will give you more details and help make the arrangements:

- ✓ Adopt a Family Beth Israel is working with Jewish Family Service to identify one or more families to adopt for the holidays and beyond. For starters, pick a Star of David from the basket under the "Tree of Giving" in the high school hallway. Each star identifies, on an attached tear-off sheet, a particular need of the adopted family that you can help fulfill. Tear off one half of the sheet for your records, and leave one in the basket for us, indicating what you agreed to do for the adopted family and when. If you do not regularly come to temple but would like to help our adopted family, please call one of us and we will send you a star that allows you to help make someone's dreams come true!
- ✓ Adopt-a-Platoon Project Send a card or letter once a month (or more frequently) to a U.S. soldier deployed in Bosnia, Macedonia, Kuwait, or Kosovo. Help make sure that he/she gets mail regularly!
- ✓ Help prepare food or serve food to the needy by assisting at:
 - Cleveland Community Kitchen—prepare meals for area soup kitchens, between the hours of 8:00 and 4:00 PM, M-F. Assistance near the end of each month is especially helpful.

- Hunger Center—prepare and serve dinner at University Settlement evenings between 5:00 and 7:30 PM

Hanukkah

Al ha-Nisim - For the Miracles

During Hanukkah the following reading is added to the Amidah which is a central prayer of our worship service. This addition is a brief history and explanation of the holiday of Hanukkah.

"We give thanks for the redeeming wonders and the mighty deeds by which at this season our people was saved in days of old.

"In the days of the Hasmoneans, a tyrant arose against our ancestors, determined to make them forget Your Torah, and to turn them away from obedience to Your will. But You were at their side in time of trouble. You gave them strength to struggle and to triumph, that they might serve You in freedom.

"Through the power of Your spirit the weak defeated the strong, the few prevailed over the many, and the righteous were triumphant. Then Your children returned to Your house, to purify the sanctuary and kindle the lights. And they dedicated these days to give thanks and praise to Your great name." (Gates of Prayer)

A few explanations:

The Hasmoneans were another name for the Maccabees, led by Mattathias and his son Judah. The tyrant was Antiochus Epiphanes IV of Syria. The weak were the Maccabees and their followers whose numbers were much smaller than the mighty Syrian armies sent to battle them. The house the Maccabees returned to was the Beyt Ha-mikdash - the Temple in Jerusalem which they cleansed and rededicated for service to God. Hanukkah means dedication.

Holiday Schedule

Hanukah 25 Kislev — 2 Tevet

Kindle the first candle of Hanukah at sundown on November 29th



The last night of Hanukah is December 6th

The Mitzvot and Traditions of Hanukkah

- It is a mitzuah to celebrate Hanukkah for eight days beginning at sundown on the 9th of December.
- It is a mitzvah to celebrate Hanukkah by lighting the menorah at sundown on each of the eight nights.
- It is a tradition to display the Hanukkah menorah called a hanukiah in a window facing out to the street, thus publicizing the miracle of Hanukkah.
- It is a tradition to eat foods made with oil to recall the miracle of the oil.



Teach Your Children Well

The Talmud teaches that one who is consistent in observing the kindling of the Hanukkah lights will have children who are Torah scholars

(Shabbat 23b). This teaching reminds us that parents are the first and best role models for their children. By consistently observing Jewish traditions such as the lighting of Hanukkah candles, celebrating Shabbat, and giving tzedakah we demonstrate to our children our commitment to Judaism. The rabbis of the Talmud knew that children will live what they learn and love what they learn with the involvement and participation of their parents.

This Hanukkah may we kindle the candles and nurture the next generation of Torah scholars.

Crafts

Hanukkah Gelt or Tzedakah Bank

Many craft stores carry a variety of unpainted ceramic banks. Take a family field trip to choose a *gelt* (a Yiddish word for coins) or a *tzedakah* bank for each child in the family; the adults might like to participate also! Paint with acrylic craft paint which comes in a variety of colors and cleans up with water!

3 But the paints are permanent on clothing so push

up those sleeves!
Let dry two hours to overnight and if desired apply clear glossy acrylic for a shiny finish!

Gathering Around the Holiday Table

The Hanukkah Blessings

- Candles are added to the hanukkiah from right to left but are kindled from left to right. The newest candle is lit first.
- Light the Shamash- the helper candle set higher or lower than all the rest of the candles first using it to kindle the rest of the Hanukkah lights; say or sing:

Ba-ruch a-ta Adonai, Eh-lo-hei-nu meh-lech ha-o-lam a-sher ki-d'sha-nu b'mitz-vo-tav v'tzi-va-nu l'had-lik ner shel Hanukkah.

We praise You, Eternal God, Sovereign of the universe: You make us holy with Your Mitzvot, and command us to kindle the Hanukkah lights.

בָּרוּךְ אַתָּה יְיָ אֶלֹהֵינוּ מֶלֶךְ הָעוֹלָם אֲשֶׁר קִרְּשָׁנוּ בְּּטִצְוֹתָיו וְצִּנְנוּ לְחַרְלִיק נֵר שֶׁל חֲנָבָּה.

Ba-ruch a-ta Adonai, Eh-lo-hei-nu meh-lech ha-o-lam, sheh-a-sa ni-sim la-a-vo-tei-nu/l'i-mo-tei-nu ba-ya-mim ha-heim ba-z'man ha-zeh.

We praise You, Eternal God, Sovereign of the universe: You showed wonders to our fathers/mothers in days of old, at this season.

בָּרוּךְ אַתָּה יָיָ אֶלֹהֵינוּ מֶלֶךְ הָעוּלָם, שֶׁעֲשָׂה נִפִּים לַאֲבוֹתֵינוּ/לְאִפּוֹתֵינוּ בַּיָּמִים הָהֵם בַּוְמֵן הַזֶּה.

On the first night only we add:

Ba-ruch a-ta A-do-nai, Eh-lo-hei-nu meh-lech ha-o-lam, she-heh-cheh-ya-nu, v'ki-y'ma-nu, v'higi-anu, la-z'man ha-zeh. בָּרוּךְ אַתָּה יָיָ אֱלֹהֵינוּ טֶלֶךְ הָעוֹלָם. שֶׁהָחֲיָנוּ וְלִיְטָנוּ וְהִנִּיעָנוּ לַוְּטֵן הַוָּה.

We praise You, Eternal One, Sovereign God of the universe, for giving us life; for sustaining us, and for enabling us to reach this season.

On the Shabbat of Hanukkah, kindle the Hanukkah lights first and then the Shabbat candles.

If you celebrate Havdalah at the conclusion of Shabbat, this is observed first and then the Hanukkah candles are kindled.

Dreidel

Begin play by having each of the players ante up into a common pot, using plastic chips, pennies or peanuts in the shell. Each player takes turns spinning the dreidel and wins or loses depending on what letter shows when the spinning stops!

Nun - take nothing

Hey-take half

3 Gimmel - take all

W Shin-put in


