Our Mission ❖

To be a center of worship and vital community life where Jews and their families from Cleveland's western communities learn Jewish traditions and values, develop their Jewish identity, and assure the continuity of Jewish life.

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The Long-Range Planning (LRP) Committee presented its recommendation at the Board of Trustees meeting on Tuesday, December 16. The committee's recommendation – "that Beth Israel embark on the construction and development of a Center for Jewish Life further west from the current location" – received a unanimous vote of support and approval by the Board.

The LRP Committee's recommendation took the form of a 14-page report, presented to the Board by George Rolleston, committee co-chair, and Max Stark, strategic planning consultant to the committee. A lengthy and thorough review of the document was followed by an extensive question-and-answer period. Once the Board was satisfied that all of its questions had been addressed, the members voted to support the recommendation and bring it to the congregation for discussion and a vote.

All members of Beth Israel will receive a copy of the report and recommendation this month by mail, in order to read it in preparation for the Congregational Meeting on Sunday, January 25, 2004 at 12:30 p.m. in the sanctuary. At that time, all who attend will have an opportunity to hear and see a presentation on the LRP recommendation and engage in discussion. Following the meeting, there will be additional opportunities for members to participate in Q &A sessions, in order to feel fully prepared to make an informed choice when we vote on the recommendation in February.

The LRP Committee has done outstanding work to develop a viable recommendation for our future. The Board has acted on your behalf to review the recommendation and bring it before you. Now it is up to you. As members, it is your obligation to make yourself fully aware of all the background and facts, to ask questions, to participate in the meetings and discussion opportunities that are provided, and to vote with the best interests of Beth Israel's future – and the future of Jewish life in the western communities – in mind. The members of the Board and the LRP Committee are all available to listen, provide feedback, and support each of you as we move toward this important decision.

Education Notes *

When the weather outside is frightful, And driving is not delightful... And you really don't want to go... In the snow, in the snow, in the snow...

It's that time of year again to remind you that we have a Snow Tree in place if the weather makes travelling unsafe and/or difficult. On Sunday mornings, you should receive a call between 8:30 and 9:00 a.m. if classes have been cancelled. And on Tuesdays, you should receive a call by 5:00 p.m. if Hebrew is cancelled. On Tuesdays, if public school has been cancelled, you will still receive a call if we are canceling Hebrew – sometimes, public schools cancel, but the weather and the streets clear by the time Hebrew is ready to begin. Because we are so spread out, sometimes it is clear in one neighborhood, but another is inundated! If we do not cancel school, but driving for you is dangerous/difficult, just call the temple office and let us know you and your children will not be coming, which is our usual policy for calling in absences. Your safety is important.

Torah Talk ❖

Torah Study continues each Saturday morning at 10:00 a.m. this month as we make our way to the end of the book of Genesis and begin the Exodus story.

Jan. 2 – Va-Yigash – Gen. 44:18-47:27
The Joseph story has now reached its climax;
Joseph can no longer conceal his identity.
With Pharaoh's invitation, he sends his brothers back to their father with instructions to return to Egypt with the whole mishpachah! Father and son are reunited.

Jan. 9 – Va-Yechi – Gen. 47:28-50:26 This brings us to the end of the book of Genesis, as Jacob gives his final blessings to his sons and dies. Joseph buries his father in the family cave at Makhpelah. Joseph lives 110 years, dies, is embalmed and buried in Egypt. But before he died, he told his family that God will remember them and take them out of Egypt, and they should remember him, and take his bones out as well.

Jan. 16 - Shemot - Ex. 1:1-6:1

As Exodus opens, a new king arises in Egypt who has no link to the Jewish past, who did not know Joseph... and this portion ends with Moses encountering God at the burning bush... and Pharaoh in his royal court.

Jan. 23 – Va-Era – Ex. 6:2-9:35 Moses and Aaron perform signs in Pharaoh's presence, but to no avail. The plagues begin.

Jan. 30 – Bo – Ex. 10:1-13:6

The plagues continue... The feast of matzot is described and, with the final plagues, the exodus begins.

This book was created as a response to the need to raise awareness of and reduce the stigma within congregations regarding individuals and families who are dealing with mental health issues. WHO WAS THE WOMAN WHO WORE THE HAT?

This quiet jewel is an unusual Holocaust reflection--subtle, powerful, historical, and personal. Nancy Patz ponders one subject, one person, and pours humanity over memory as she underlines the Shoah's senseless cruelty.

THE COFFEE TRADER A Novel by David Liss

The seventeenth-century Amsterdam that the author depicts is a wonderfully dark city of secrets, roiling with deceitful maneuverings and caffeine-fueled perils. *The Coffee Trader* is vivid, utterly absorbing, and more than a little relevant to our current age of financial skulduggery.

FATELESS

A Novel by Imre Kertesz

Fateless is the first English translation of a moving and disturbing novel about a Hungarian Jewish boy's experiences in German concentration camps and his attempts to reconcile himself to those experiences after the war.

A POET'S BIBLE: Rediscovering the Voices of the Original Text By David Rosenberg

The following paragraph is from "The Introduction": "The Bible, arguably the most important work of art in the Western literary canon, is an uneasy subject in the classroom. Why are our great poetic stories taught in the dullest of ways? I believe that the fault can be traced to a failure of imagination in academic life. Imagination can be stifled by dogma, but it can also be flattened by theories that handle merely the skeletons of texts. The Bible is a luminous guidebook to our past yet it is put out of reach by colorless professors. And the broad range of poets who gave voice to the original words have been rendered voiceless by prosaic translations. Once, the poets lent us what one critic has called, in the context of soul music, the 'spiritual magnitude of the individual voice.' It is time to rediscover the original text."

reversed a 500-year-old tradition of discouraging converts and helped welcome thousands of interfaith and non-practicing families into Judaism.

This initiative dramatically changed the face of North American Judaism and congregations everywhere, bringing new strength and vitality to our Movement. Congratulations, everyone!

During his sermon at the Minnesota Biennial, Rabbi Eric Yoffie, president of the Union for Reform Judaism, called on Reform congregations to help support Reform Jewish life in Israel and the former Soviet Union. "Reform Jews are ready: ready for a single vision and a shared future; ready to advance the cause of Israel and our people; ready to affirm the unity of the Jewish people across time and space," he said. With these words, the Hineini Initiative was launched, and congregations are now signing up to "adopt" a Reform/Progressive congregation in Israel or Eastern Europe, sponsor Reform rabbis at HUC-JIR in Jerusalem, or help build Israeli Progressive synagogues.

Many of you were privileged to attend a moving and inspiring presentation by Holocaust survivor, Eva Kor at Beth Israel last year. Ms. Kor's Holocaust musuem, CANDLES, was destroyed by arson last Tuesday. Eva Kor and her twin sister were victims of the notorious experiments performed by the Nazis under the direction of Dr. Mengele. When she spoke to us, everyone was moved, not by her accounts of these atrocities, but by her spirit, her resilience, and her ability to forgive, move on, and seek peace. The CANDLES Museum was the outgrowth of her spirit of determination to preserve history and overcome hate. Now it's been destroyed -- by hate -- but she is determined to rebuild.

As a congregation, we can contribute to the fund to rebuild Ms. Kor's museum -- an important symbol of survival and hope as well as a valuable educational resource. This tragedy provides us with the opportunity to take a step back, think about what is really important, and support this small but significant effort to keep the message of Jewish survival alive for future generations -- certainly a timely message as Chanukah approaches.

TRANSCRIPT FROM WTHI NEWS 11/18/03

A little piece of history is lost. Fire ripped through the CANDLES Holocaust Museum in Terre Haute, just after midnight on Tuesday.

Investigators call the fire suspicious saying there is evidence of arson.

Police are treating the case as a hate crime after finding "Remember Timmy McVeigh" written on the wall. Investigators told Action 10 News that the building is nearly a total loss.

Right now, they're looking at samples to determine the nature of the accelerant that started the fire. They are also working with the Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco, and Firearms because of the circumstances and the fact that this is possibly a hate crime.

Eva Kor founded the museum over eight years ago. She's saddened by the fire and wonders why someone set this place ablaze. "It couldn't be as bad and it's not as bad as being and living dead

on the floor for two weeks while I fought for my life in Auschwitz." Auschwitz is just one of the memories spread throughout the museum now destroyed by fire.

Eva has a message for whoever did this. "They are cowards, they're absolute cowards." While police continue looking for those suspects, Eva plans to keep sharing her memories. "There are two choices in life when we face tragedy. Give in to despair or triumph over it." Triumphing over despair is just what the museum is doing by looking to the future of moving on and starting over. A process that may take some time.

In the meantime, Eva Kor and Mary Wright will continue to spread the message of how hatred only leads to disaster and as Eva said, "Hatred is ultimately self destructive."
