A Message From Rabbi Lettofsky 🌣

Dear Friends,

As I write this letter, it is snowing (again), but it is my fervent hope that when you read it we will be rejoicing in the coming of spring, and spring, as you know, brings with it the holiday of Passover with its beautiful customs and rituals.

The traditional custom of reading the biblical scroll of Canticles (Song of Songs) during the week of Passover is very precious; the loss of familiarity with this beautiful love song in contemporary Reform and Conservative congregations because we have eliminated its chanting is truly regrettable. The love of youth - even infatuation - is celebrated in this unusual biblical book, and many have wondered how such a work was included in the Bible.

The broadly accepted answer is that the rabbis, and particularly Rabbi Akiba, read this love song as an allegory of the love of the People of Israel and God. How invigorating and exciting it would be if we could infuse our prayers and studies of Torah with the strong energies of the love of youth!

Passover celebrates not only the beauty and hope of spring, but also the joy and excitement of the love of our people's youthful relationship with God in Egypt. That is where the relationship of God and His young people began. That was over three thousand years ago - a long time for a "marriage" to remain exciting and vibrant.

Every year on Passover we "relive" and recall the excitement of that early relationship. Just as a couple who has been married for many years looks back and remembers their first meeting and first date with great fondness, so we, as a people, look back to our first meeting with God. May we all recapture some of the joy and energy of "young love" as we celebrate Passover again this year.

Dayenu - It Would Have Been Enough!

This past winter, the students in our religious school and members and families of our congregation went on some amazing journeys...

Had we just gone to New York – Dayenu!

In January, along with Rabbi and Jean Lettofsky and Brian Friedman, I had the privilege of taking our high school seniors on a trip to "Jewish New York". Over the course of two and a half [bone-chilling] days (!) we visited the Lower East Side, attended Erev Shabbat Services at B'nai Jeshuran on the upper west side with about 800 other Jews, enjoyed Shabbat dinner with another group of students from Boston at Shapiro's restaurant, took the ferry to Ellis Island, found family names on the wall of immigrants, toured the NBC Studio and walked the halls framed with photos of [Jewish] entertainers, laughed as an improv troupe acted out scenes from a "character's" life as he struggled with his American and Jewish identity. stood at Ground Zero while Rabbi Lettofsky chanted the Eil Molei Rachamim for those who perished, and walked the halls of the Museum of Jewish Heritage awed by the collection of Judaica and the view from afar of Ellis Island. Ask Matt Friedman, Joel Pendery, Dan Chait, Megan Abady, Becki Cooper, Laura Folkman, and Jessica Schecter about their journey...

Had we just gone on a wonderful congregational retreat – Dayenu!

In March, members of the congregation journeyed to The Lodge at Sawmill Creek in Huron, to reflect on and learn about "Being Jewish in a Gentile World". While the adults discussed issues of Jewish identity and what it means to be part of a Jewish family, the children learned about the journey in 1654 that brought 23 Jews to New York. With special thanks to Rabbi Lettofsky, Donna Sweet, Susan Wagner, and Linda Schwin... this was a spirit-filled and

Had we just gone to Washington, D. C. – *Dayenu!*

And while we were in Huron, Ken Cooper and four members of our Confirmation Class were in Washington, D.C. attending Panim El Panim: Institute for Jewish Leadership and Values. Super Sunday Results ❖

The Super Sunday kick-off for the Jewish Community Federation of Cleveland's 2004 Campaign for Jewish Needs raised \$1,106,613 on Sunday, February 8, 2004, to feed the hungry, care for the elderly, help the disadvantaged, and educate Jews in Cleveland, Israel and around the world. In Cleveland, the Campaign helps more than 40,000 people served by 16 schools and social service agencies, and supports education programs at synagogues.

Super Sunday set other remarkable achievements as well:

- * The \$1.1 million raised is nearly \$100,000 more than was raised last year
- * 4,636 generous Clevelanders made pledges, up from 4,483 at last year's event
- * 744 pledges were made from individuals who did not pledge to last year's campaign
- * More than 1,000 volunteers were involved.

"The turnout of volunteers and the generous response of our community are remarkable," said 2004 campaign General Chair Harley I. Gross of the day's remarkable success. "The Cleveland Jewish community understands the need to fulfill our commitment to help those people who depend on the services we provide."

With Super Sunday's boost, the campaign has now raised more than \$16 million from more than 6,500 donors, with a goal of \$30 million by its conclusion on May 6, 2004. The needs are so compelling that even with uncertain economic times, donors are increasing their previous gifts by an average of more than 9 percent.
