The newly revised school schedule is being received in a most positive manner, a tribute to the hard work of the entire Religious School Board under the able leadership of its chairperson, Elaine Schwartz. We anticipate an increase in our enrollment at the Primary Level and look forward to an exciting year. Several area Religious Schools have inquired about our new hours and the Temple B'nai Or Religious School has become a model for their re-structure process.

Registration for the 1991-1992 school year has begun. We are most anxious to complete this process as soon as possible. If you have mislaid your forms, please call the school office and request a new registration packet. Those families who wish to take advantage of the Early Payment Discount Option, must begin to make their payments now in order to be complete and paid-in-full by the time the Temple First Quarter Billing is mailed. In August a class enrollment card will be mailed to each family who has paid in full. The Parent Manual and all other pertinent school information will be mailed at that time as well. The enrollment card will indicate class placement, room number and teacher(s) assigned; it is to be presented as receipt of payment on the first day of school.

Weekly Torah Portions

May 31 - June 1

Behaalotecha: Numbers 8:1 - 12:16

The Menorah (candelabra) is made and oil is collected for its use. The Israelites set out on their journeys, guided by God's presence - in the form of a cloud by day and a pillar of fire by night. The people tire of eating manna and want meat. God provides it, yet the people overeat and become sick. Moses asks for help in leading the people and a council of 70 elders is formed. Moses' siblings, Miriam and Aaron, express jealousy of their brother's preeminence; yet God responds by defending Moses, the most humble and most trusted of all of God's servants.

June 7 - 8

Shelach Lecha: Numbers 13:1 - 15:41

Twelve spies, one from each tribe, is sent to spy out the Land of Israel which the Israelites are to enter. They all report that it is a land flowing with milk and honey, yet ten insist that they are too powerless to overcome the current inhabitants. Only Joshua and Caleb have the faith and courage to predict victory. God is incensed at the general lack of faith and condemns the generation which did not want to enter the Promised Land to living out their lives wandering in the desert for forty years. It will be a new generation that had not known slavery which would enter the Promised land.

June 14 - 15

Korach: Numbers 16:1 - 18:32

Korach, a Levite, jealous because he was not part of the High Priesthood, revolts against Moses and Aaron under the guise of a popular rebellion. He and his followers are swallowed up after God is forced to demonstrate divine support for the leadership of Moses. The place of the Levites in general and of Aaron in particular is reaffirmed. It is to be the Levites who will be in charge of the sacred Tabernacle and the offerings brought to it. Since they will have no land allotted to them in Israel, they are to sustain themselves from the tithe offerings brought by the Israelites.

June 21 - 22

Chukat: Numbers 19:1 - 22:1

The enigmatic ritual of "the Red Heifer" serves to bring those who have had contact with the dead back to the "realm of life." The people complain about not having enough water. God tells Moses to speak to a rock so that water would come forth from it, yet in his anger, Moses strikes the rock. For this failure of faith, Moses is told that he will not lead the people into the Promised land. Aaron and Miriam die. The people wander for thirty-eight years, trying unsuccessfully to pass through neighboring countries in peace. To protect the people from serpents, Moses creates a caduceus, now known as a symbol of healing.

Balak: Numbers 22:2 - 25:9

King Balak of Moab hires Balaam, a sorcerer, to curse the approaching Israelite camp so that the latter would not prevail over the Moabites. On the way to pronounce his curses, an angel tries to block Balaam's path. Only Balaam's donkey sees the angel and when Balaam beats it for serving off the road, God puts speech into the donkey's mouth who objects to the mistreatment. God then turns the curse of Israel to a blessing in Balaam's mouth. Included in this blessing are the words, now part of the daily worship service, "How beautiful are your tents,

House and Grounds Update

First and foremost, kudos for those sturdy volunteers who worked so hard at Temple Grounds Clean-Up day on April 28. This small band of folks with strong backs and mighty spirits did the work of twenty people, and deserve some high praise. The group included: Art Klein, Beth Hess, Bob Friedman, Pat Tolkoff, Lee Henson, Joe Henson, Connie Rubin, Elaines Menkes, Donna Okin and daughter Lindsey Okin (one heck of a hard worker), Paul Rosenberg, and Wendy Keil. Thanks also to our gardener, Mike Anderson, for dropping off a wheelbarrow and assorted tools. This was a great start for an old "new" tradition at Temple, and we look forward to many more congregants coming out for Earth Day next year.

For those who are not aware, our Temple budgets a minimum amount of money for grounds care and maintenance each year. That is why we need and count on volunteer help from our congregation. We work with a rock bottom grounds maintenance budget of \$1,500 from May to October. Also, the House and Grounds Committee has been faced with the uphill battle of bringing an aging building back from sub-standard condition to satisfactory condition at a time of financial hardship. Last year, our sanctuary roof was re-shingled (it was leaking at the time) at a cost of \$14,000. The antiquated security system in the building was brought up to code at a cost of \$7,000. It is now a state-of-the-art system. Also, last summer, one of our old air conditioning units died and was replaced at a cost of \$5,000.

Only God makes miracles, but somehow we at Temple just came awfully close. The flat roof over our hallway, which had been leaking for a long time, was just re-roofed at a cost of \$15,000. As work was beginning and the air conditioning equipment was removed from the roof, we discovered that one of the units was completely dead. It apparently had not been working for some time, but no one was aware of it! The unit has been replaced at a cost of \$4,300. Other repair and maintenance jobs have been completed during the past year as well, adding up to significant dollars.

There is no way around the fact that our building is aging and must be properly maintained in order to meet current fire and safety codes, and to continue to serve as well in the future. While we have made every effort to pay fair prices and award contracts only after a carefully controlled competitive bid process, nevertheless substantial monies have been spent to "stay even" with the existing plan. Current expenditures are not for beautification; they are necessary to keep the building operating in a satisfactory manner.

Obviously, what is needed at this juncture is good long-range planning and volunteer effort. If anyone has experience in building maintenance, your ideas and suggestions are needed and wanted. I urge you to get involved with the House and Grounds Committee. Also, please do not hesitate to address any comments/concerns regarding this update to the House and Grounds Committee.
