# MESSAGE FROM THE RABBI

#### Judaism: Hallowed or Hollow

Thank Goodness for Christmas," the obviously Jewish person says on the front cover of a Hanukkah card. Inside: "Who else would buy retail?" This was from a particular line of Hallmark holiday cards. Meant to be funny, I found these cards ranging from stupid to offensive to anti-semitic. There is no such thing as "just" being funny in this context. Something like the "retail" card can only be funny if it draws on a stereotype which has been internalized by the reader, a stereotype which is then reinforced through the reading. What bothers me about these cards is not only the tackiness (it is difficult to avoid these days) and the anti-semitic stereotypes which they reinforce, but the fact that there seems to be a market for them. Who would buy them? I imagine (or hope) that they would be of little interest to the Christian community (which has to deal with its share of cards in bad taste).

I can only surmise that the cards must be responding to a Jewish market, those for whom Jewish life is hollow. There seems to be an implied embarrassment about being Jewish, especially in those cards in which Hanukkah is just a pale Christmas. ("Deck the hall with boughs of challah!") I cannot believe that anyone with a great deal of Jewish self- esteem would buy such a card. It is one thing to have a sense of humor about oneself. It is another to be so selfeffacing as to be self-denying. The core of their Jewish selves seems to be quite hollow. My concern is not about "those" Jews. My concern is about us, we who recognize the importance of hallowing our Jewish lives with meaning. We need to possess and pass on the content of Judaism and living Jewishly, not just some vague sense of Jewishness or empty ethnicity. We ourselves have the power to affirm Jewish existence and give it a meaningful future, or let it slip through our fingers. Anti-semitism seems to be on the rise. Yet in the long run, we Jews will harm ourselves when we allow others to confirm or deny the worthiness of being Jewish.

We harm ourselves when we search the world for beauty, spirituality and meaning, ignoring that which we had all along. We harm ourselves when we do everything possible to make our children "well-rounded" while at the same time do not make as great an effort to give the "well-rounded" circle a core of Jewish identity. We harm ourselves when we do not give clear value messages to our children, for example, as to whom we hope they will date and marry.

We harm ourselves when we make Jewish learning "pediatric," for children only. We harm ourselves when our resources, tangible SCHEDULE OF SERVICES

and intangible, are spent on concerns of the general community to the exclusion of those which enrich Jewish culture and life.

The philosopher Emil Fackenheim has stated that after the Holocaust, all Jews hear a 614th commandment: "Thou shalt not give Hitler a posthumous victory! Thou shalt not despair of the Jewish People or of God, lest you complete what Hitler was unable to achieve." This is certainly not the only reason for being serious Jews. Yet, being part of Jewish history in this century means seeing oneself as an important participant in the struggle for meaningful Jewish survival.

As our secular New Year begins, let us each make a Jewish resolution. Let us each, in our own ways, resolve to do one more mitzvah which will lend more depth, meaning and substance to the Jewish label of which we are so proud.

# THOUGHTS FROM THE CANTOR

#### Sabbath of Song and the Song of the Sea

One of the oldest pieces of biblical poetry and the oldest song in Jewish history is the song that Moses and the children of Israel sang after they had crossed the Red Sea. It is found in the Book of Exodus, Chapter 15 and it is known as "The Song of the Sea" or "The Song of Moses", and in Hebrew as Shirat hayam. As the Hazzan starts to chant it, it is traditional to rise and join in singing the closing words of certain verses.

The Sabbath on which Exodus 15 is read in the synagogue as part of the regular cycle of Torah readings is called Shabbat Shirah - the Sabbath of Song. In North America, Jewish Music month begins on this Sabbath.

On Friday, January 17, it is Shabbat Shirah. During the Torah service, I shall chant this poem with the special Ashkenazic cantillation which is specifically for this song. I shall also present a Sermon in Song about this ancient biblical poem, which describes the Israelites flight to freedom. You will hear musical settings of this text that range from Sephardic melodies to renditions by Frederick Handel! I shall be assisted by members of the professional choir and the Adult Volunteer Choir and special guests from Temple B'nai Or. The month of January, 1992, also marks the beginning of a year which will commemorate the 500th anniversary of the expulsion of the Jews from Spain (1492) and their dispersion throughout the Mediterranean Basin and elsewhere. The vibrance of the Sephardic culture can be seen in its music as well as in its poetry, history and customs. During the next twelve months I hope to bring to your attention this rich musical and cultural heritage through prayer in the Sephardic tradition, the singing of Sephardic melodies to familiar texts such as Adon Olam and L'cha Dodi and more. Let us rejoice that we are free as Jews and can now experience the vibrancy of the Sephardim, a vibrancy that is often unknown to the general Jewish community. Let us celebrate the Sephardic contribution to Jewish culture. Finally, I am filled with joy and honored that my beloved Rabbi, Rabbi Gunther Plaut, is coming to install me as the Cantor of Temple B'nai Or on January 31. I look forward to his visit with us with great excitement.

#### January 3-4 Vaera

#### Exodus 6:2-9:35

God again appears to Moses and encourages him in the struggle to free the Israelites. Pharaoh will be so stubborn that God will have to visit Egypt with plagues. The power struggle between God and Pharaoh begins. God is out to demonstrate that God, not Pharaoh, is the one Power in the universe.

#### January 10-11 BO

#### Exodus 10:1-13:16

God inflicts on Egypt the last of the ten plagues culminating in the slaying of the firstborn. The Israelites place the blood of the paschal lamb on their doorposts so the "Angel of Death" passes over their homes and spares their children. But they must leave slavery in such a hurry that their bread has no time to rise. As a reminder of the Exodus, God commands them to observe the Feast of Pesach (Passover) and of Matzah (unleavened bread) for seven days each year throughout their generations.

January 17-18 Beshallach

#### Exodus 1:1-6:1

After the Israelites leave Egypt, Pharaoh commands his army to pursue them. Caught between the approaching Egyptian army and the Red Sea, God splits the sea so that the people can cross dryshod. Moses and the people praise their saving God with the "Song of the Sea" which includes the phrase "Mi chamochah - Who is like You among the gods that are worshipped..."which became part of Jewish liturgy.

#### January 24-25 Yitro

#### Exodus 18:1-22:23

Yitro, (Jethro), Moses' father in law, suggests that Moses share the responsibility of judging disputes with a hierarchy of qualified individuals. Moses brings the People of Israel to Mount Sinai where God communicates the decalogue, the foundation of the covenant (binding commitment) between God and God's people who are to become a "kingdom of priests and a holy nation."

January 31 - February 1 Mishpatim

#### Exodus 21:1-24:18

God's revelation continues with mishpatim (laws of social concern), the day to day establishment of justice and respect for persons and property. Some of the issues dealt with include violence, sexual propriety, theft, respect for the powerless, bribery, the prohibition against lending money on interest, concern for animals and the establishment of an impartial judicial system.



The Daryl Gehr Rosenfarb Scholarship Fund awards a \$500 prize each year to a confirmand who writes an essay which best expresses why he/she would like to visit Israel. # EACH GENERATION PLANTS

Tu B'Shevat falls in late January when the winter rains have tapered off, and the sap that brings food to the limbs of the tree starts to rise. Buds appear, and the land takes on a springtime glow. As nature comes to life, it feels like a new year. The holiday began more than 2,000 years ago in Israel and celebrates the love of the Jewish people for trees. The Torah required farmers to give one tenth (tithing) of all crops grown to the priests of the Holy Temple. Tu B'Shevat marked the beginning of the year for tithing trees. We are told in the Midrash Tanchuma, Kedoshim 8: "When you come into the land you shall plant..." (Leviticus 19.23) The Holy One said to Israel, "Even though you will find the land full of good things, don't say, 'We will sit and notplant.' Rather be careful to plant

trees. Just as you found trees which others had planted when you entered the land, so you should plant for your children. No one should say, 'I am old. How many more years will I live? Why should I be troubled for the sake of others?' Just as he found trees, he should add more by planting even if he is old."

In the modern age, trees have become the symbol of the rebuilding of the land of Israel. When the early pioneers came to Palestine 100 years ago, the land was barren from centuries of wars and neglect. They planted trees and made the land bloom again.

January is the month to support the Jewish National Fund "Plant A Tree" program. This organization has planted more than 140 million trees throughout Israel. Many forests and parks have been established. Last year Temple B'nai Or planted a Garden of 114 Trees. Let's see if we can plant two gardens this year. In order to do this we must plant 200 trees. Please support us in our effort.

When we buy a tree in honor or in memory of a friend or a family member we are helping to reforest Israel. Each tree costs \$7. Forms will be sent to all students enrolled in our Religious School. All other Temple families who wish to purchase trees may return the form printed in this bulletin (along with a check) to the Religious School Office. Each person who purchases a tree will receive a special certificate from the JNF sometime in April.

Rabbi Plaut is one of the true treasures of Reform Judaism. He is currently the Senior Scholar at Holy Blossom Temple in Toronto where he was Cantor Staiman's Rabbi and inspiration. Prior to living in Toronto, he was Rabbi Rossoffs Rabbi in St. Paul, Minnesota. He is past president of the Central Conference of American Rabbis and is the Chair of its Committee on Responsa which determines Reform stances from the Jewish legal tradition. A well known and well published Judaic scholar, his monumental work, The Torah, A Modern Commentary, is the most comprehensive contemporary work on the Torah ever to be published. Among his other works are the Rise of Reform Judaism, The Growth of Reform Judaism, the Shabbat Manual and his autobiography, Unfinished Business, Rabbi Plaut is also an acknowledged expert in the law and has taught and published extensively in this field. In addition, he has published a number of mystery novels.
