# MESSAGE FROM THE RABBI CROSSINGS. . .

The summer is waning. Autumn is peeking its head around the corner as the school year begins again. The Days of Awe will soon be here, bringing our extended Temple Family together once more. But how do we make these potentially sacred days more than a yearly Homecoming game? Will we in some way respond to the call to re-examine our lives and the choices we have made? Or will we again revert to last year's patterns, return to the old familiar ruts? Before we cross over into a new year, we should stop, look and listen.

Step aside from the routine. Take control, if but for a moment, of your time and your mental and spiritual energy which are used for so many other things. Be open to the new.

## **Torah Digest**

September 4-5

#### SHOFTEEM

Deuteronomy 16:18 - 21:9

In this week's Torah portion, are many laws under the rubric, "Justice, justice shall you pursue": setting up a system of courts and judges, limiting the power of any future king who must be subject to the Torah, requiring two witnesses for any conviction, establishing cities of refuge for unintentional manslayers, setting up a system of wartime ethics which dictates that peace must always be the first option pursued, that those who wish to escape must be allowed to do so, and that fruit trees must not be destroyed as part of war strategy.

September 11-12

#### KITETZE

Deuteronomy 21:10 - 25:19

The Israelite People living in the Land of Israel were to have exemplary ethical standards to follow. Laws discussed here include fair treatment of war captives, laborer and slaves, equal treatment for wives, ways of dealing with wayward and defiant children, return of lost property, compassion for animals, the obligation to extend interest free loans to the needy, keeping vows, marriage and divorce, respect for those to whom money has been lent, individual rights, rights of and obligations towards the stranger, widow and orphan, business ethics and the command to wipe out the memory of the eternal enemy Amalek.

September 18-19

#### KI-TAVO

**Deuteronomy 26:1 - 29:8** 

The Israelites are given laws meant to insure that they would follow God's commandments when in their new land. When the first fruits of the land were collected, they were to take an offering. Using the first liturgy written, they were to recount the Hebrew origins, the Egyptian slavery and God's having brought them to the Land of Israel. This "confessional statement" was later made a central part of the Passover Haggadah. As the people crossed over into the Land of Israel, blessings and curses were to be pronounced from two mountain peaks denoting the positive consequences of following the commandments and the negative consequences for rejecting them.

September 25-26

#### **NITZAVIM**

Deuteronomy 29:9 - 30:20

The central theme of this portion is the Covenant between God and the People of Israel. All Jews were present at the giving of Torah and are part of the Covenant, "those standing here today and those not standing here today." If the Israelites reject the obligations of the covenant, their punishment will be exile. And yet God will bring them back to their land in love when their hearts open up again. The Torah, blueprint for fulfilling the covenant, is not obscure and far away, but is accessible to all. A choice is given: life or death, the blessing or the curse. As we read on Yom Kippur as well - the command to the Jew is always, "choose life!"

#### **NEW BEGINNINGS FOR 5753**

Another productive summer has passed, registration is going well, the school is fully staffed, the entire facility has been painted and waxed in preparation for the students and we eagerly await the opening day of school which will be on Sunday, Sept. 13th. Grades Four through Seven will meet from 8:45 AM to 11:15 AM, while students in Grades Kindergarten through Three will meet from 11:30 AM to 1:15 PM.

#### THE COLLEGE CONNECTION






