FROM THE RABBI . . .

Reform Judaism Under Attack!

LIGHT A CANDLE FOR RELIGIOUS FREEDOM

This past Yom Kippur, I spoke of the struggle of Reform Judaism to gain legitimacy in Israel. I also talked about ARZA, the Association of Reform Zionists of America, the organization of Reform Jews which fights for the rights of non-Orthodox Jews and non-Orthodox Judaism in the Jewish State.

But in the intervening months, the stakes have been raised. As part of its campaign to gain support for the peace process, the Rabin Government has made a deal with the ultra-Orthodox "Shas" Party. In exchange for Shas' support in the peace process, the Government has agreed to pass a law to make the current religious "status quo" permanent. What this means simply is that in the "Jewish" state, Reform, Conservative and Reconstructionist Judaisms will never be recognized as Judaism and non-Orthodox Rabbis will never be recognized as Rabbis. This deal, as originally put forth, would even override the many Supreme Court decisions already supportive of non-Orthodox forms of Judaism—plus any such decisions made in the future!

This is an egregious affront to Israel's democratic character and a slap in the face to majority of Jews around the world who are non-Orthodox. In short, it is an outrage!

What can we do?

At this time when we join with fellow Jews in kindling lights and recalling the battle for religious freedom 2000 years ago, we need to engage in the battle once more. Just as we made our voices heard a few years ago over the "Law of Return" issue, so, too, must we raise our voices now.

Once again, ARZA remains our most effective instrument to protect religious freedom in Israel. ARZA, along with the President of the Reform Movement, Rabbi Alex Schindler, have made it known to Prime Minister Rabin and his government that, while we support the peace process so far, such a compromise with extreme Orthodoxy would "cause grave harm to the character of Israeli society... bring lasting damage to Israeli-Diaspora relations... and, for many American Jews, be further indication that Israel is unwilling to accept their authenticity as Jews." At this season celebrating religious freedom, we need once again to put forth a Macabean effort to battle the forces of fanaticism and intolerance.

At this most crucial juncture, I ask for your support. If this issue touches you—and how could it not in some way—then now is the time to join ARZA! In a few weeks, you will receive your January dues statement. On it, you will see an optional ARZA membership check-off. Simply check-off ARZA and you will be supporting democracy in Israel and the rights of all Jews to hold their heads up high in the Jewish state.

Translate your conviction into action. Check-off ARZA and light a candle for freedom!

Message From The President



In my message to the congregation on Yom Kippur, I talked about our need to plan financially for the future. I told you that we had always lived on a year-to-year basis; dues and fund raising were our sole source of income for any given year. If disaster struck, hurried phone calls were made to generous congregants to cover the emergency.

I believe most members of our congregation are not aware of the endowment fund that was established in 1988. We have not carried out a huge endowment campaign yet, or even made this a priority, because we are always too busy securing the resources for the current year. However, the vehicle does exist for long-range giving.

There are three different methods that can be used to help secure the future for your Temple. The first is simply by giving money or stock earmarked for the endowment fund. The second is to name the Temple as the beneficiary of a life insurance policy. The third is to provide a bequest in your will.

Although we have not publicized our endowment fund, in the last two years we have received:

- cash gifts
- cash from a bequest that was made in a will
- notification that we have been named in another will
- notification that we have been listed on an insurance policy

The actual amount of money in this account to date is small, and we have not touched the interest, because it is not yet significant. The important message is that the Endowment Fund does exist and is only waiting to grow.

If you would like to join this group of generous Temple supporters who want to play a role in our long term security, please give me a call. I will be happy to answer questions for you.

A Service of Healing

A special evening worship service forthose struggling with loss, grief, illness, or anyone in need of spiritual sustenance will be held each month at 8 PM in the Temple Sanctuary starting on Wednesday, December 7.

All of us, during the course of a lifetime, have or will experience "something" which will profoundly disrupt the ordinary rhythm of our lives. It may be an illness of our own or someone close to us, a betrayal, a loss, death of a loved one, a heart broken, a violation, the pain of divorce, a disability, or an accident. The consequence is a severe disruption of the life we know, and a need for spiritual sustenance to help us carry on, to overcome the grief and despair caused by these events.

Rabbi Yoel H. Kahn wrote: "The mystery of prayer is how our acknowledgment of our limits is transformed into a source of empowerment.

Prayer is not limited to words; I am praying when I reach out my hand to you, asking for support, yearning for connection. The answer to my prayer begins at that very same time you take my hand and give me of your strength."

However, during difficult times, many Jews, affiliated or not, do not have available or do not know how to find the spiritual nourishment and empowerment which can be found in Judaism. Temple B'nai Or, acknowledging this need, is offering a monthly Service of Healing. In an egalitarian service, using insights and materials from the Jewish Healing Center, we will have an opportunity to tap our own inner spiritual resources for healing in a mutually supportive and caring environment.

New UAHC Introduction To Judaism Class

A sixteen-week course designed to give participants a basic understanding of Jewish belief and practice will be offered Tuesday evenings at Temple B'nai Or beginning January 10. The class is open to all: individuals (with Jewish partners if applicable) who are considering conversion to Judaism; interfaith couples; and Jews by birth and non-Jews who wish to obtain a basic adult-level knowledge of Judaism. Taught by Rabbi Donald Rossoff and student Rabbi Andrew Paley, the course will approach Jewish tradition —

faith, people, way of life — through a study of the holiday and life cycles of Judaism. A basic reading knowledge of Hebrew also will be included.

Class will meet once a week for sixteen weeks from 7:30–9:30 PM through April 25. A single registration fee includes tuition and one set of books and materials for an individual or a couple.

Introduction to Judaism is sponsored by the Outreach Program of the New Jersey-West Hudson Valley Council of the Union of American Hebrew Congregations and its 58-member congregations. SCHOOL NEWS



As one year draws to a close, we take time to reflect on events of the past year and of years past. When we see our children finishing another year of school, another season of sports, or performing in one more play, we often think back on their first year of school, season of sports and first play. We cannot help but remember these times, the pictures we took at those times, and the pictures that remain in our minds. Each family has its own way of marking special events and the passing of time, and Judaism also

has a built in tradition for just the same thing. On the first day of each holiday, and the first time we do something we say a special prayer, the shehecheyanu. The shehecheyanu is a prayer that thanks God for our lives and for bringing us to new seasons, new times and new experiences.

Whateverway you have for marking important occasions in your life, why not add this special prayer, to help frame those special moments in a Jewish context. One idea that several Jewish educators have shared is to keep a photo album of shehecheyanu moments; all those times when you do something new, or for the first time that year. Make a point of saying shehecheyanu and keep this album separate from the rest. Joel Grishaver, in his book, 40 Things You Can Do to Save the Jewish People, says, "The shehecheyanu is Judaism's way of saving, 'Kodak moments.' Whether or not you snap the shutter, say this blessing and add it to the album in your heart." (pg. 21)



TORAH TOPICS

from THE JEWISH HOME A Guide for Jewish Living by Rabbi Daniel B. Syme

Hanukkah: Ceremonies, Symbols, Customs (excerpts)

1. What is the meaning of menorah?

Menorah is a Hebrew word meaning "candelabrum." In relation to Hanukkah, it refers to the nine-branched ceremonial lamp in which the Hanukkah candles are placed and then blessed.

2. Is the menorah unique to Hanukkah?

No. The menorah originated as a religious symbol in biblical times. The Torah records how the great artist Bezalel fashioned a seven-branched menorah for the desert tabernacle in fulfillment of a Divine commandment (Exodus 25:31-40; 37:17-24). Such a seven-branched menorah adomed the Temple in Jerusalem and was carried away by the Roman legions at the time of its destruction in 70 C.E. While the Roman Empire has long since vanished, a seven-branched menorah stands before the Knesset building in Israel, yet another tangible reminder of the indestructibility of the Jewish people.

3. How did the Hanukkah menorah originate?

The nine-branched Hanukkah menorah was a modification of the biblical model and seems to have originated in the first century C.E. It had eight branches, one for each day of the holiday, and a ninth branch for the *shamash* or "servant" light.

In ancient times, oil was used in the menorah. Over time, candles were substituted for the oil.

Interestingly, some scholars believe that the use of small candles for the menorah was a deliberate choice, designed to distinguish Hanukkah lights from Christian votive candles. Except in times of religious persecution, the menorah was placed outside the front door or, as is the custom today, displayed in the window of every Jewish home.

4. Why do we eat latkes on Hanukkah?

A common explanation is that we eat latkes (potato pancakes) because they are cooked in oil and thus remind us of the miracle of the single cruse.

Rabbi Solomon Freehof, a great contemporary Jewish scholar, has hypothesized that the eating of latkes may have grown out of an old custom of eating *milchig* (dairy) foods on Hanukkah. *Milchig* foods evolved into *milchig* pancakes and then into latkes, possibly because the main potato crop became available about the time of Hanukkah.

No one knows for certain how the association began, but for anyone who feasts on latkes at Hanukkah time, a historical rationale is unnecessary.

5. Why do we give gifts at Hanukkah?

Again, no one knows for sure. Many scholars postulate that the practice is a carry-over from the biblically-based custom of sending gifts (*mishloach manot*) to one's friends on Purim. It is clear, however, that presents were never a major element in Hanukkah, which emphasizes enduring religious and ethical values.

6. Who wrote "Rock of Ages"?

Ma'oz Tzur, or "Rock of Ages," was composed in Europe in the twelfth or thirteenth century by a man known as Mordecai. His words were set to different melodies over the centuries.

When all is said and done, perhaps the most important message of Hanukkah may be found in the name of the holiday itself—Dedication. When Jews have dedicated themselves, through faith and action, to the pursuit of high religious and human ideals, Judaism has been strong. That imperative, to strengthen our religion and our people, remains an important challenge at this season in every generation.

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


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DURING HOLIDAYS

MORRISTOWN MEMORIAL HOSPITAL

Each year for the past fifteen (15) years, the Jewish War Veterans have provided volunteer coverage at Morristown Memorial Hospital on Christmas Eve and Christmas Day so that the Christian regular volunteer staff may spend their holidays with their families. This tradition of helping out our neighbors goes back for many years and is always very well received by the Hospital.

The duties include: front desk/reception coverage, emergency room coverage, and courier service, which may range from picking up and delivering items from general supply, pharmaceuticals, lab specimens and other requested items between the wards and the in-hospital service units to delivering charts and forms to the floor coordinators. There are three shifts each day: 9 a.m. to 1 p.m., 1 p.m. to 5 p.m., and 5 p.m. to 8 p.m.

Each Christmas volunteer is provided with a personalized package which includes complete duty instructions, maps of the hospital interior, free parking permit for the day, free holiday meal pass for the hospital employee cafeteria, an identification badge and, most of all, a warm and wonderful feeling of having done a *mitzvah* by serving the community and our friends and neighbors.

As in the past, Alan Brown is coordinating the volunteer coverage sponsored by the JWV and supported by the local Jewish community.




