

### FROM THE RABBI

### AT&TEMPLE

The recently announced layoffs at AT&T are going to affect us all. For some of us, it could mean the loss of jobs held for many, many years and perhaps even relocation. For others, it might mean the loss of friends and neighbors who will be out of work and may be moving elsewhere. Analysts predict a loss of revenue for the State of New Jersey – AT&T being its largest single private sector employer – and this will affect all taxpayers in the Garden State.

As for your Temple, while it may mean a loss of revenue, I hope it does not mean a loss of membership. And this brings me to my point: If any of our members lose their jobs in this (or any) layoff, your Temple will stand by you. If you lose your income, it does not mean that you have to lose your affiliation.

As you know, our Temple operates on a Fair Share Dues system, each person/ family paying according to income, with a certain Basic Dues level. Part of this same system includes a Dues Adjustment category for those who honestly cannot afford Basic Dues.

Dues Adjustment is not charity. Dues Adjustment is simply an extension of the Fair Share system, making sure that those with less income still have a way to pay their fair share.

Dues Adjustment is nothing to be ashamed of. The Temple is not doing anyone a favor when it accepts a member's request for a dues adjustment. It is simply being true to its mission: Our house shall be a house of prayer for all people.

Our Temple, like most, is aware that people often go through difficult financial times. Sometimes these situations are temporary, sometimes they are long term. The assumption is that we are part of a two-way covenant. Temple is there for its members when times are difficult. The members are there (financially) for the Temple when times are better.

There are those paying less than basic dues who make it a point to volunteer at the Temple. For them, it is a way to contribute their fair share in a different way. Although unnecessary – dues adjustments are given with no strings attached – it certainly is helpful both for the Temple and for the individuals who feel that they are doing their part for Temple.

And, yes, there have been those who have tried to take advantage of the Dues Adjustment. Some have said, "I can afford to pay basic dues, but I will give to Templeonly what I choose to give. After all, we only come on the holidays." As of the last few years, we have been saying to them, "This is not fair. You, like everyone else, need to contribute your fair share. In order for the Temple to be there, not only on the High Holy Days but on an ongoing basis, everyone has to do his/her part."

For instance, I myself have never needed the use of the Fire Department (poo, poo, poo) but know that I must support it for those in my community who do need it and for that time (God forbid) when it is my home which is burning. Temple membership is, in some ways, the same thing. As Jews, we are all responsible for each other, for the education of the next generation (as well as our own) and for the ongoing work of Judaism. And who knows when a situation will arise - a time of sickness or loss or a time of family joy - when the resources of the Temple are just what are needed?

And so, most began to pay their fair share. Those few who did not chose to leave the Temple. While we hate to see anyone leave, if this is what it takes to maintain the integrity of Fair Share and to keep faith with those who truly "play it fair," so be it. Dues Adjustment is there, not for those who simply want it, but for those who truly need it.

It is all too common that their acts are taken for granted. It is unfortunate that we as members of the congregation too often forget to thank them and not just for the extras but for all that they do to make Temple B'nai Or a workable and smoothly run organization. No matter how much the Board and the Officers do, we could not possibly run our Temple without the extraordinary efforts of our staff and that means both religious and lay people. I am asking you to look for these people next time you are in the building and thank them for their jobs well done. I know that I try to thank them for they certainly make my job easier. It would be nice if more people showed their appreciation as well.

In order to protect the safety of your children, we ask for your help and cooperation regarding drop–off and pick–up procedures. Therefore, we are asking you to review and discuss with your child(ren) the following policy.

On Sundays, children must be <u>dropped</u> off in front of the Temple at the "Nursery/Office" entrance. Primary Session (K–3rd grade) parents should begin <u>arriving no earlier than 11:20 AM</u>. Please proceed carefully because there will be cars exiting from the rear lot at the same time that late session parents are arriving to drop–off their children. Students from early and late sessions are to be picked up in the rear lot. Parents can <u>pick up</u> their children in the lobby outside the school office if they park their car in a parking spot before entering the Temple. No one should be parking at curbside in front of the Temple – that is either a fire zone or reserved parking.

For Monday, Tuesday, and Thursday sessions, we again ask for children to be dropped off only at the "Nursery/Office" entrance and picked up at the Temple entrance in the rear parking lot.

The safety of our students is of primary importance to us all. When coming to pick up your child, please proceed to the rear parking lot, pullinto a parking spot. Safety cones will be placed in the rear driveway creating a car–free safety zone through which children may safely walk to their cars. Do not drive through or around these cones.

Children are expected to walk, not run, as they exit the Temple. I will escort all those who weren't picked up to the front Temple entrance and bring them into the school office. Please try to respect the anxieties of your child(ren) and be prompt in the pick-up process.

During this time of the year, our early evening pick-up is in the dark. The children are tired and anxious to get to their carpools, while parents are raring to leave. We must have everyone alert and patient so that no one's safety is ever in jeopardy.

Our children are truly precious. We need YOU to help guarantee that each child goes home in a safe and orderly fashion. We expect our parents to model the behavior that will insure that our children are safe at all times.

Thank you in advance for your cooperation in this matter of great importance.

### Highlights of Board Minutes December 1995 Meeting

**PRESIDENT:** The Negotiating Committee has been charged with the task of negotiating a contract with Cantor Benson for a full time position as Cantor of Temple B'nai Or for the next two years, contract to begin in July, 1996. The Negotiating Committee was also charged with negotiating the financial terms of the last two years of the Rabbi's current five year contract, the two years in question to begin in July, 1996.

Volunteers and blood donors for Super Sunday are needed on February 4th.

**FINANCIAL SECRETARY:** Two new members were unanimously approved by the Board, with two additional forms expected shortly. Three families have resigned.

**RABBI:** Rabbi Rossoff reported receiving good feedback on the Thanksgiving service. He discussed Ralph Reed's appearance at the JCC. He also reported a good response to the teaching services, and indicated a future teaching service will focus on the philosophies of Reform Judaism.

**WOMEN OF REFORM JUDAISM/SISTERHOOD:** Barbara Bugen reported on the many programs planned by Sisterhood, and announced the Sisterhood Shabbat will be held on January 26th.
