From Rabbi Rossoff

AFTER LITTLETON, WHAT?

It is over a month now since the tragic events of Littleton, but questions still remain. Will we once again "round up the usual suspects," form committees and go on with our lives? Or will something fundamentally change so as to diminish the possibility that others will die as they did, and thus, in some way, bring some meaning to their deaths?

What happened in that little town of Littleton touched the heart of America, at least white suburban America. I imagine those who live in many of America's urban cities look at these pictures of teens shooting teens and say, "What else is new? Black youths have been dying for years, and yet there are no nationally televised memorial services, no renewed calls for gun control, no national *mea cuplas*."

What touches us and frightens us about Littleton is that we cannot explain it—at least not well enough to convince ourselves that we and our children are secure from whatever it was that brought this about.

One of the things that struck me about the two killers was their painful sense of "otherness." The importance of this concern was brought home to me when I attended a presentation at Morristown High School on the issue of teens and drugs. In a very moving presentation, a number of teens and their parents—people not too different than you or me—told their stories. Most of the teens had begun use of illegal drugs—some starting with cigarettes and moving on from there—by the age of 13. And why did they begin? One after another, they told the story of being lonely, looking for friends who would like them as they are. Unfortunately, the price of acceptance was entrance into a world of deceit and self-destruction.

Just as, for the murderers of Littleton, their sense of otherness led them into a world of hate and wanton killing.

There is so much more to say, yet quick and easy solutions elude us. The safety-nets we set down for ourselves have too many gaps; and to close them all demands more time, more understanding, and more sacrifice than we currently have or are willing to give.

Let's start with us, in our own hearts, in our own homes, in our own Littletown. Let's start by talking to our children (and ourselves) about how they (we) treat

As we are taught in Pirkay Avot — Ethics of the Fathers, "Ours' may not be to complete the task, but neither may we desist from it."

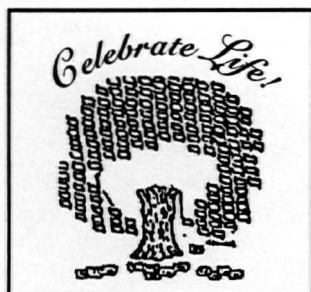

Through their kindness, we now have enough napkins, plates, cups and tablecloths to take us well past the next millennium.

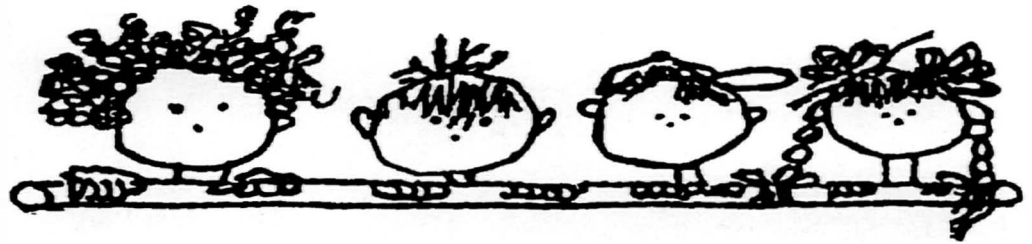
The next hosting project will be from June 27th to July 11th.

Nursery School

The debate continues... What is more important, "quality time" or "quantity time?" Parents claim they can spend less actual hours with their children if those hours are spent focused exclusively on the children. Parents who come home at dinnertime—or later, theoretically hire someone to handle daytime childcare and housekeeping and can devote those few precious hours to the family. Therefore, it's better than having more time with children but using that time to do the mundane chores that "non-working" parents do—whether the children are around or not. What the parents do or think the rest of the day doesn't really matter. Quality time, perhaps, but not quantity. Focus, but no real living interaction and not a role model for real life. Parenting in a time slot has its problems. Do these parents really get to know the children? Do the children really get to know the parents?

There are parents who spend a lot of time at home. Dad watches TV, mows the lawn, reads the papers and surfs the net. Mom talks on the phone, spends lots of time in the kitchen, does endless laundry and keeps everyone tidy. The parents are around many hours of each day, but hardly ever sit down with the children, read with them or chat with them. When friends come over, the children play in the playroom or outside. The children are sent upstairs to do homework. When it's done, they watch some TV and then it's off to bed. Quantity without quality. Do these parents get to know the children? Do the children get to know the parents?

Look back at your childhood. Put your family into the picture. What were the quality vs quantity experiences? What had an impact? Did you have a good, open

relationship with parents and siblings? Could you talk? Did you? When parents were around, what kind of example did they set? Did you learn your values from their behavior? Does it leave you smiling or sad?

What ideals do you have for your children? And what is your reality? Do your children see you as breadwinners who provide basic physical needs, discipline and transportation for the family? Or do they see you as loving role models, who enable the family to learn, love, share and grow together as a family in addition to being a nurturing nest for the next generation? How do you spend time with your family? Do you really know each family member, their needs, their ideas, their wants, and their dreams? Yes, there are many distractions in your life. But what is your most important responsibility now?

In a few short years, before you know it, you'll have plenty of time to read that paper, watch that TV show and talk on the phone or surf the net. You'll have lots of time to stay late at the office and go on vacation. The children will be all grown up, off on their own, busy with work and coming home too late to have dinner with their kids or help them with homework. Or they'll be too tired to play ball or too busy on the Internet or too involved in their own lives to worry about the kids' friends and their pastimes.

Sit down with your spouse. Talk, really talk, about what kind of parents you want to be. What are your priorities? Where are you now in this picture and where do you want to be. How can you work together to get there? Your children are depending on the results of this conversation for their future. Don't let them

down! You must give 100% to being the best parent you can be. Now is the time. That's 50% of the equation. The other 50% is luck. That you have no control over. I wish you good luck, too.

Judaism cannot afford to take a summer vacation. For our students to find meaning in our religion—"practice" will make perfect.

Parents are reminded to register their children in the Religious School at this time. We are hiring staff, forming classes, and preparing programs for the upcoming year NOW. Your early registration will ensure that we are properly staffed and that student placement reflects the class environment each child will benefit most from. Please don't delay.

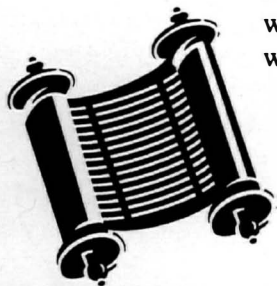

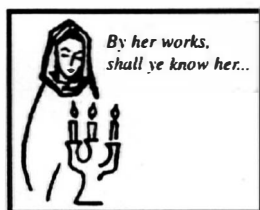

Just a reminder! When you use \$CRIP you are supporting Temple's many programs and services. For each \$1 of food purchased with \$CRIP, the Temple is given \$.05. If a family spends \$400 per month on food, paper goods, wine, etc., and purchases it with \$CRIP, the Temple would receive \$20. Spending at that level each month, over a year's time, would generate \$240 per family. 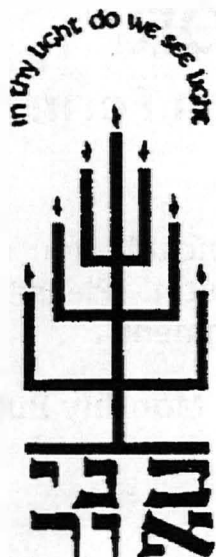

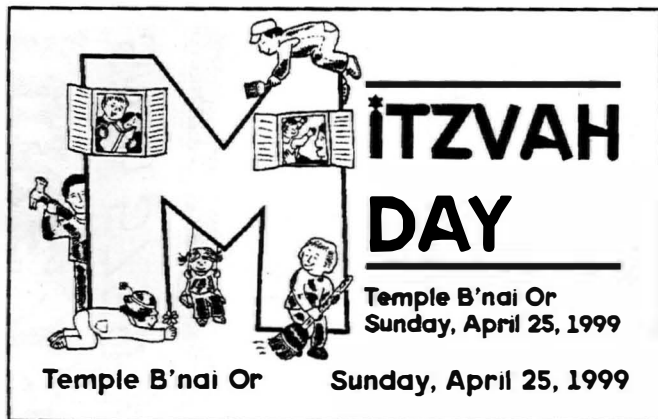
