NOT TOO LONG AGO MY NEPHEW GOT MARRIED. In discussing our family's plan to go to the wedding, Hannah asked *the* question: "Is she Jewish?" "No," I replied. "Is she Christian?" Hannah came back. "No," I said. "Well what religion is she?" Hannah pressed on. "I don't think she's anything," I answered. "That's good," she concluded. "Why do you say that?" I asked. "Because now she can become something," Hannah deduced.

At the core of every religious system is the notion that one's faith and one's *self* are intertwined. You cannot be one thing but believe something else. That's called hypocrisy. By the same token, simply because you do not embrace a particular theology or attend a church or synagogue doesn't mean that you are *nothing*. On the contrary, we all are *something* to one extent or the other. The question is "to what extent?"

In some ways, *that* is the question we are all to be addressing as we enter the New Year. *To what extent...*? And while no doubt on Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur that question ought be applied to one's *Jewishness*—namely, to what extent am I a Jew, to what extent is my life *Jewish*?—it also necessitates a more expansive approach. To what extent am I a father? A mother? To what extent am I authentic to myself? Or put another way, am I really *something*?

Becoming Something

The nature of life today is so demanding, from the time we enter high school until the time we retire we have so few genuine opportunities to ask these existential questions. Life just seems to take off and we're lucky if we can keep pace. From learning a craft, to making money, to raising a family, to planning retirement, life in the modern world rarely affords us the time to reflect: not *what* do I want to be ("... when I grow up") but *who* do I want to be?

Years ago I was involved in a retreat for interfaith families. The theme of the weekend was entitled "Judaism is Becoming." The double entendre was intentional. To be sure, Judaism is attractive; as a religion it has much in which people can find meaning and value. But Judaism is also a process. Not so much a way of life but a way of living (the latter term, at least for me, implying that it is something which must be done on an everyday, organic basis). Which is to say, for Judaism, life holds the ever-present potential for change, for transformation, for *becoming*.

This is why, for the mystics of our tradition, we are to enter these Days of Awe as if we are *nothing*. Not worthless, but—on the contrary—of infinite possibility. We come to the New Year as a blank slate, a *something* waiting to happen. But, like so much of what we teach in Judaism, what will come depends not on God but on ourselves. God has given us the soul. God has given us this spiritual oasis to nourish that soul. Whether or not we will emerge refreshed and renewed, whether or not we will become *something* is a question only we can answer.

Life is an opportunity. You know the rest.

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Did you happen to catch the story about the shuttle astronauts' observations of Earth? From their vantage point they could clearly see evidence of erosion, deforestation and a thinning atmosphere. Reading this kind of news can make one feel helpless and hopeless. Then again, imagine how the astronauts themselves must have felt when they reached the space station and learned that there was damage to the shuttle exterior. Sure, they could try to repair it, but they still had to have a lot of faith to say "No, thanks" to the Russians' offer to give them a lift back home. I don't know about you, but I was mighty relieved the morning they landed safely.

This past summer was a time of fragility, a time that demanded faith. I felt for my publishing colleagues in London who had to commute by subway after bombings in which one of them perished. I tried hard not to worry about my son's safety on a trip to Israel that immediately preceded the Gaza Strip pullout. Then there were those poor astronauts stuck with a shuttle from the disco era. Their warnings about the future of Earth, later punctuated with an exclamation point called Hurricane Katrina, made me want to curl up in a fetal position.

But that's not what Adonai would want. We can't let fear and hopelessness paralyze us when we have so much work to do, from rebuilding shuttles and cities, to feeding and housing evacuees, to repairing and protecting the environment, to bringing about peace between nations. Only in action will we find solace and understanding. As the prayer Geshet Tzar Me'od says, "The universe is but a narrow bridge—and the key is not to be afraid." We have to avoid looking down at the daunting crevasse. Instead we should keep our eyes focused on the people who are crossing the bridge with us and on the goals ahead.

May you go from strength to strength in this coming year, keeping your head up and never faltering on the way to your destination, and may the bridge supporting all of us be a sturdy one.

Michael Bogdanow, the award-winning artist who painted "Jerusalem Sunrise" (generously commissioned and donated by Steve Plofker and Bobbi Brown and recently hung in Temple Ner Tamid's chapel), will speak during services on Friday, October 21. He will show and discuss his paintings, including "Jerusalem Sunrise," and address the work of other contemporary Judaic artists and musicians. 
Sukkot services continue on Tuesday, October 18 at 10:00 a.m., followed by a light brunch at 11:00 a.m.

High Holy Day Offerings

CHILD CARE

This year child-care and/or children's programming will be offered during all High Holy Day services. (Please note, this includes evening services.) For children ages 1 to 4, babysitting will be offered. For children ages 5-7, a High Holy Day activity program has been specially designed. NOTE: The fee for child care is \$15 per child per service (Erev RH, RH1, RH2, Kol Nidre, YK a.m., YK p.m.). Children will not be admitted without prior registration.

BYACHAD

This year we will again be holding *B'yachad: A High Holy Day Family Worship Experience*. It will include prayer in English and Hebrew with transliteration, singing, and interactive family activities. This service, held in the new chapel and led by student Rabbi Stephanie Kolin, is for families with children ages 8-12. Older siblings of children ages 8-12 are invited to attend with their families. Younger children should go into babysitting/child care. Please see page 4 for more specific information.

Children will not be admitted without a parent. For the above offerings, please fill out the appropriate section of the High Holy Day Ticket Request Form. Families will not be admitted to the *B'yachad* without prior registration. Anyone who would like to help in the planning and implementation of these services should speak to Lisa Westreich (973-746-5115).

Children in Grade 7 and above are expected to attend services in the Main Sanctuary, unless they want to attend *B'yachad* with a younger sibling.

TOT SERVICES

Finally, for families of all ages, Rabbi Kushner and Cantor Elizabeth Goldmann will conduct High Holy Day Tot services in the afternoons of the first day of Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur. Services will begin at 2:00 p.m.

ROSH HASHANAH AFTERNOON TASHLICH

One of the most moving customs of the High Holy Days is *Tashlich*. Meet in the Temple lobby at 3:00 p.m. and join with other members of our community as we walk across Broad Street to Clark's Pond (behind Bloomfield Middle School) and symbolically cast our sins into the sea by throwing crumbs upon the face of the water. This exercise in *Teshuvah* (repentance), accompanied by the recitation of Psalms and singing, begins on the afternoon of the first day of Rosh Hashanah—at 3:00 p.m.—immediately following the High Holy Day Tot Service. Your children will remember this tradition for their entire lives.

YOM KIPPUR AFTERNOON DISCUSSION

For those who want to make Yom Kippur an all-day encounter, please join us in the library during the "gap" between the morning service and *Yizkor* for an in-depth Torah study and discussion group led by Student Rabbi Stephanie Kolin. This is a very informal discussion of some of the more enigmatic texts that are found in our liturgy and Torah readings during these Days of Awe. This is not a class but rather an opportunity to share thoughts and feelings about the themes that inspire and sometimes even overwhelm or alienate us on Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur.

Lower East Side Trip

Join with us on Sunday morning, October 16, for a delightful day of fulfilling the mitzvah of purchasing a *lulav* and *etrog* for the festival of Sukkot, walking in the bazaars of New York's Lower East Side, and — of course — eating at a kosher deli. For a modest fee, \$25 adults / \$15 children (13 and under), we'll provide a bus, a lesson on how to pick the perfect *lulav*, and the opportunity to re-live life at the turn of the century at the Tenement House Museum.

This is a great program for families or just come by yourself, but by all means—save the date: Sunday, October 16. Learning and Jewish Growth תלמוד תורה

On Tuesday evening October 25, during our Simchat Torah celebration, we will Consecrate all of the kindergarten through grade 3 students who are beginning their religious school education. What exactly does the word consecrate mean?

I started to think back to a book I used as a religious school student, titled Consecrated Unto Me. This book is about the sacred relationship of marriage. We use the Hebrew word *kiddushin* for marriage. This comes from the word *kadosh*, which means "holy" or "set aside." During the Jewish wedding ceremony the groom places a ring on the bride's finger and says the words *haray at m'kudeshet li* – You are consecrated to me....

Another time we talk about consecration in our tradition is when God consecrates us as a holy people at Mt. Sinai at the time of the giving of the Law. The Jewish people are to have a special, holy relationship with God. It is said that

all Jews that ever were or will be stood at Sinai to accept the Law.

During the holiday of Shavuot we learn about the consecration of the Jewish people to God's service through the story of Ruth. The narrative climaxes when Ruth, a Moabite widow, refuses to leave her old, widowed mother-in-law Naomi saying "Entreat me not to leave you and to return from following after you; where you go I will go, where you lodge I will lodge, your people will be my people, and your God my God." What more perfect act of faith can we find? How much more eager should our ancestors have been to renew their covenant and consecrate their relationship with God?


To be sure, Consecration is about holy relationships. When we marry we publicly declare that we are making a sacred commitment to another person promising to set up a Jewish home and raise Jewish children – all holy acts. We set ourselves apart from others in a holy relationship with God when we

accepted the Law at Sinai. And Ruth teaches us by her example about consecrating oneself to Judaism.

Each Simchat Torah we end and then begin again the reading of the Torah. Each Simchat Torah we celebrate that our youngest students are beginning a lifetime of dedication to God, Torah and the Jewish people. Like the reading of the Torah, once begun, Jewish education has no end. We learn in Pirkei Avot, "Turn it (Torah) and turn it again, for everything is in it." Each Simchat Torah we are reminded that the Consecration of our students is indeed the beginning of a holy relationship.

We celebrate with those being Consecrated and their families, joyfully welcoming them to the study of Torah. As we consecrate our youngest students this year let us also be reminded that each of us has a sacred relationship with God. Each of us is consecrated to God's service. And that each of us has holy work to do in this world.

Hurricane Relief Effort

The Temple Ner Tamid community is doing its part to help the victims of Hurricane Katrina.

The Drive for Supplies

In very short notice, with the help of the whole community, we collected boxes upon boxes of diapers, wipes, dry soup and sheets. On Sunday, September 18, adults and children helped box all the goods collected before they were brought to Temple Sharey Tefilo-Israel in South Orange. Sharey Tefilo-Israel was the collection point for any synagogues in the area that wanted to contribute to the Jacobs' Ladder Relief Project. Jacobs' Ladder is a staging and distribution center for relief supplies run by the Union for Reform Judaism. Our efforts filled about 1/4 of the 40 foot container shipped to Utica, Mississippi. Special thanks to ReMax Village Square in Upper Montclair for the donation of the truck to take the boxed goods to South Orange. And a huge thanks to Bon Bebe/International Intimates for donating the boxes and packing tape.



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ADULT EDUCATION

This year Temple Ner Tamid turns its attention to the ancient wisdom of the rabbis of 2000 years ago. *Pirkei Avot*, or Wisdom of the Fathers, a compendium of ancient Rabbinic ethics, still resonates today. This will be the springboard for our Adult Education program which will provide courses ranging from understanding our prayers and services in a once-a-month 15 minute course—The Art of Jewish Prayer—starting in January, to Jewish genealogy—Finding our Mothers and Fathers, to literature exploring the women's role—Wisdom of the Mothers. We can learn how to lead a *shiva minyan* and what Jewish values have to say about the hot-button issues of today.

All of the currently planned adult programming is included here, although plenty of additional things will be added throughout the year. We will offer education in the broadest sense from Torah study to Hebrew, from parenting classes to college level work and lots in between.

The offerings listed here are from Adult Education, Religious Living, Brotherhood, Sisterhood, Shores, Religious School and Tarbut (culture), all to the extent they are available at press time. And of course, Rabbi Steven Kushner and Student Rabbi Stephanie Kolin will be providing their expertise and skills in many of these offerings, along with outside speakers and teachers.

Thanks to all of them; please join us for these exciting programs in the months ahead, and keep your eyes open for more details and more events as the dates come closer.

TEN MINUTES OF TORAH

Each year our school community is involved in a family education program that connects student classroom learning with adult education & family learning at home. This year, springing from *Pirkei Avot*, our theme is "If Not Now, When?"

Pirkei Avot, or The Ethics of the Fathers, contains the most famous sayings and advice from rabbis who lived about 2000 years ago. They tried to identify principles that would not only improve the quality of life but would also imbue our lives and relationships with a sense of the sacred. Parents are invited to attend a class with Rabbi Kushner every Sunday morning and then continue the conversation at home using supplementary take home materials. Families with second through sixth graders who complete at least twelve of the assignments will be invited to a gala celebration in May. *Ten Minutes of Torah* provides a multi-

level approach to Jewish learning, giving children and parents the chance to study with peers as well as learning at home.

FINDING OUR MOTHERS & FATHERS

the art of Jewish genealogy

The two great myths of Jewish family research are "They destroyed the records" and "I don't remember anything". More and more birth, marriage and death certificates from Europe are turning up. Indeed, not only were the records not destroyed by the Nazis, they actually went to great lengths to preserve them. (How else could they prove "Who is a Jew"?). By the same token, when interviewing our aging relatives about life in the first half of the 20th century, often they will sigh of how little they remember—until, that is, we ask the "right" questions.

"Finding Our Mothers and Fathers" is a 3-part course in learning how to trace our roots. In light of this mission, we want you to be aware of a few things that our region is doing to support Israel. United Jewish Communities of MetroWest NJ has an office in Jerusalem which promotes connections, encounters, and partnerships between the us and Israel.

Israel projects and programs are in operation in the following partnership areas:

- **Partnership 2000 in Ofakim-Merchavim** in the Northern Negev includes a wide variety of activities – mainly social, cultural, educational, leadership development, and youth-related programs.
- **Israel Emergency Campaign.** Gives support to security-related matters
- **Religious Pluralism** –works in conjunction with all streams of Judaism to help develop tolerance and pluralistic Jewish identity for Israelis.
- **Mevasseret Zion**—support for TNT's sister Reform congregation.
- **Yozma-Developing Jewish Options in Modi'in and Yozma Modi'in-Jewish Educational Outreach**—developing a progressive Jewish elementary schools.
- **Beit Midrash, Beit Shmuel**—an intensive study track for Israelis of all streams and backgrounds.
- **Leo Baeck and Israel Movement for Progressive Judaism (IMPJ)**—a teacher training program.
- **Passport to Israel (PTI)** provides up to \$750 to high school students for an Israel trip with their peers. Even students who have taken individual or family trips to Israel are still eligible for a UJC grant towards a teen Israel experience.

The next time you are looking for a meaningful way to celebrate a *simcha* (joyous occasion), remember a loved one, or comfort a mourner, please consider a donation to Temple Ner Tamid.

Donations to the temple are a meaningful way to memorialize a loved one, honor a B'nai Mitzvah, celebrate the birth of a child or a wedding, congratulate someone on a major accomplishment or show appreciation. Some members make donations in honor of a temple staff person in gratitude for his or her assistance with a life cycle event or special situation.

SPECIAL MEMORIALS OR HONORS

- *Yahrzeit*—There are several opportunities to remember a loved one through contributions to Temple Ner Tamid.

Contributions to the synagogue of any size are customarily made upon the anniversary of the death of a loved one.

A memorial plaque may be dedicated in the sanctuary for \$360. Lights will be illuminated upon the occasion of *yahrzeit* and *yizkor*.

The Book of Remembrance is an annual publication listing the names of deceased loved ones. The book is distributed at the *Yizkor* service of Yom Kippur. Forms and donation information are sent together with the High Holy Day package in the late summer.

HIGH HOLY DAY APPEAL

An annual appeal is made to all members during the High Holy Day season to support the synagogue for the coming year. Members may choose to adjust the amount of their gift year-to-year.

COVENANT CIRCLE PROGRAM

A voluntary annual gift program for congregants who are in a financial position to provide ongoing support at a level above regular dues. Funds help alleviate many budgetary constraints, expand programming and help TNT remain inclusive and diverse. There are three levels: *Simcha* \$5,400, *Beracha* \$3,600,

and *Kavod* \$1,800.

ENDOWMENT FUND

Major gifts are welcome at any time to the Endowment Fund to perpetuate Ner Tamid programming well into the future. Gifts generally range from \$5,000-\$100,000 and may be pledged over multiple years. The minimum gift is \$1,800. Funds are invested over the long-term and overseen by the Ner Tamid Investment Committee. Like the Covenant Circle, funds will be used to maintain our inclusive culture and expand programs. The broader financial base will also make it possible to become a synagogue with true vision, innovation and progressive, experimental programs.

PLANNED GIFTS

Gifts to Temple Ner Tamid may also be made in the form of bequests, charitable gift annuities, charitable lead trusts and charitable remainder trusts. Planned gifts are generally invested in the synagogue's Endowment Fund.


