RELIGIOUS SCHOOL NOTES

It is very difficult for our Religious School to cover in depth all areas of its curriculum in 2.5 to 4.5 hours of class time per week. Rarely do our students delve into a textbook from cover to cover or exhaust the educational possibilities of a unit. We do not have the time, for example, to examine Jewish history for three years as is done in secular elementary, junior high school or high school programs. Our students make a gallant effort to learn Hebrew prayers, leaving little time for conversational Hebrew. Areas of fundamental importance to every Jew, such as ethics, Jewish identify, mitzvot and literature never receive the sustained class time required for full understanding. I refer you to the <u>Religious School Booklet</u> for the complete course outline.

As parents concerned with the Jewish education of your children you are in an excellent position to assist the school. The suggestions that follow do not require much of your time and might even be fun for you.

1. The print media is loaded with stories devoted to Israel. Encourage your children to use these articles for their secular school current events assignments. Of course, a family discussion around the clinner table about Jewish content articles would be great.

2. Television is a super source for Jewish content material. Suggest to your children to view an appropriate show and report on the material to their Religious School classes.

3. Ask your children to borrow books from our wonderful library for secular school book reports.

4. Attend Rabbi Priesand's Bar/Bat Mitzvah Workshop as a family.

5. Support our holiday curriculum by making festival foods at home and bring your children to holiday family services.

6. Let your children educate you by asking them to "teach" you what they have learned.

7. Get involved with our concern for ethical behavior by voicing your disapproval when stories reporting bigotry, cheating, etc. appear in the news.

8. Join the Religious School in its effort to support Rabbi Priesand's Mitzvah of the Month Program.

9. Foster Jewish identity by placing Jewish symbols and books conspicuously in your homes mezzuzah, seder plate, kiddush cup and Torah Commentary.

10. Bring your family to Confirmation Service.

Please let me know if you have additional suggestions for me to pass along to other families.

FROM RABBI PRIESAND

Recently a member of our Temple family mentioned to me her discomfort at making Shiva calls. She indicated that she never knows what to say or how to act. It occurred to me that others may have similar concerns; therefore, I share with you the following guidelines prepared by the National Institute for Jewish Hospice with the hope that they will prove helpful to you on those occasions when you are called upon to provide comfort and consolation.

"In Judaism, we believe that your very presence in the mourner's home marks the beginning of consolation. If you feel uncomfortable, know that it is understandable and perfectly natural.

• Listen considerately—not as though you are taking a breather before beginning to talk again. It is better to be silent than overly talkative.

• Show concern for the mourner's well-being.

Your face should wear a mien of seriousness, not necessarily sadness.

• Ideally, your conversation should not be distracting, but therapeutic. The mourner's "small talk" should trigger your interest as though it is of great import.

• Speak of the departed. It may appear to be hurtful, but in fact it helps the mourner to unburden himself. Recall the major events in life, his opinions on important matters, the quality of his relationships.

• Levity may bring you relief—but it is inappropriate for the mourners. However, humorous anecdotes of the deceased spoken respectfully are quite in place.

• Do not dwell on your own mourning experiences as it may appear to belittle the grief of the newly-bereaved.

· Do not offer gratuitous psychological advice.

• Conclude your words of consolation with hope—that the values of the departed will be incorporated by his relatives and friends; that the sunlight of health and happiness will shine once again on the family members; that this tragedy will turn into an experience of personal growth; and that the behavior of his survivors will reflect on the worth of the departed.

MEDICAL PROFESSIONALS SOUGHT FOR REFORM MOHALIM

To serve the growing need for Mohalim who are both medically competent and Jewishly sensitive to the needs of today's Jewish family, the Reform movement is seeking to train health professionals to become Reform Mohalim (ritual circumcisers). Open to male and female doctors and other medical professionals affiliated with Reform congregations, a program consisting of 10 weekly sessions will be offered in our area beginning in mid-March.

The curriculum for the program includes historical, legal and aesthetic background of circumcision and the ritual surrounding the Brit Mila ceremony itself. In addition, participants will learn about the social and psychological implications of Brit Mila in contemporary society; educational, medical and theological issues, and the Reform perspective on Brit Mila.

Please be aware that the bill we endorse is H. R. 2797 introduced by Rep. Solarz and the bill to defeat and protest against is Rep. Smith's H.R. 4040. It also promotes conscious awareness throughout the community of the grim realities of death and torture that took place during the lifetime of many of our Temple members. From time to time, I hear people reply to the call for Social Action with statements like "I doubt that my protest makes much of a difference." Recently, the American Jewish Congress successfully encouraged 11,000 people to mail post cards to the CEO and President of Toshiba Corporation protesting Toshiba's endorsement of the Arab economic boycott of Israel. Toshiba subsequently opened an office in Israel proving that we can make things happen. Presently, Al Paley of our congregation has launched a program to flood three other Korean electronic companies with post cards protesting their support of the Arab Economic Boycott.
