

of nego ad illiw good ealshal coorde A recent question about leap years led me to do some research about the Hebrew calendar. This is what I learned. Until the middle of the 4th century, the calendar was determined by the Sanhedrin, the legislative body headquartered in Jerusalem. In order to maintain its authority over the Jews of the Diaspora, the Sanhedrin kept the rules governing the calendar a closely guarded secret. When the new moon emerged, the leaders of the Sanhedrin declared the beginning of a new month, and messengers were sent throughout the land to announce the date. Because of the distances involved, those Jews who lived beyond the borders of Israel did not always receive the news expeditiously, and therefore they adopted the practice of observing festivals for two days, just to be sure. Following the demise of the Sanhedrin, the task of establishing a permanent calendar was undertaken by the Patriarch Hillel II. The rules he published continue to govern Jewish calendar calculations to this day.


The Jewish calendar is lunar in nature. It consists of twelve months, alternating in length between 29 and 30 days. The greatest challenge it presents is balancing the lunar year (354 days) with the solar year (365 days). The eleven-day difference means that left as is, the festivals would move back eleven days each year, thereby destroying their link with the agricultural cycle and causing them to fall in the wrong season. This discrepancy between the lunar and solar years led to the development of a leap year, which on the Hebrew calendar, means not an additional day but an additional month (Adar II). In every period of nineteen years, there are seven leap years, falling in the 3rd, 6th, 8th, 11th, 14th, 17th and 19th years of the cycle. The addition of the leap year adjusts the lunar and solar years so that all our festivals will fall in their appointed seasons.

In order to determine a leap year, one divides the given Jewish year by 19. The quotient represents the number of cycles since the beginning of creation and the reminder shows which year it is in the current cycle. If the remainder is one of those fixed as leap years, then it is a leap year. Our current year 5752, for example, divided by 19, shows a quotient of 302 and a remainder of 14, indicating that it is the

14th year in the 303rd cycle; thus, it is a leap year. What that means in practical terms is that from this Purim until next all our holidays will appear later rather than earlier.



NEW FUND RAISER from Ways & Means

The yellow cards received by each Temple family are the first step in a new Ways & Means fund raiser which has been approved by the Temple board. Food gift certificates will be purchased from supermarket chains at a 5% discount up front.

For example: the committee purchases \$1,000 certificates at a cost of \$950. Temple families purchase certificates for their favorite supermarket chain for use at their convenience (no expiration date). If only 25% of the 110 nursery school families and 25% of the 272 Temple families purchase certificates at the rate of \$50/week for 36 weeks, the Temple's annual net profit would amount to more than \$8,000. If 50% participate, profits would double that figure, just through your usual purchases from your chosen food store.

Other local congregations have had great success with this program. We're excited and will keep you informed as we work out the details. We hope you participate!

Back by popular demand! Another ADULT EDUCATION series!







RELIGIOUS SCHOOL NOTES

Except for our newest families, it would be difficult to find a Temple family unfamiliar with the school's Janet Bell. I met Janet Bell nine years ago when I first arrived at MRT; then I marveled at her energy, creative teaching techniques and dedication to our children. As I write this column, Janet is as energetic this year as in any year past. Janet has always believed that our MRT children provide her with the inspiration and desire that maintains her vigor in the classroom. Her standards are high, as they have been for her sixteen years in our Religious School.

On Shabbat, February 7th, the Congregation certainly witnessed her dedication to the task of educating our students. Janet took over the 5th grade Hebrew class early in December, after Mrs.

Linda Gerstel took a leave following the unexpected death of her husband. Under the direction of Cantor Sussman and Janet Bell, the fifth grade class conducted an outstanding service. The students read their Hebrew and English parts with ease and appeared extremely well poised on the bema. Also, Janet put together a thought provoking and entertaining program. My thanks and congratulations to the fifth grade students for their efforts in making February 7th a memorable Shabbat for me.

On March 13th, we will again have the opportunity to enjoy Mrs. Bell's leadership when her fourth grade class conducts the Shabbat service.

We look forward to seeing you and your children at the Purim service on March 18th at 7 PM. A Temple family dinner precedes the service at 5:45 PM. Join Rabbi Priesand and Cantor Sussman as they lead us in the BOOS and HISSES every time that horrible person, Haman, is mentioned. As the story of Purim is read, we are reminded that while there are enemies facing the Jewish people, we can defeat them when unified in purpose and belief.

The Religious School's Purimsphiel (Show) and the Youth Group's Purim Carnival will take place on March 22nd. Aside from our usual silliness on this holiday, students in grades kindergarten through third grade will be invited to sing several Purim songs on the bema for your enjoyment (beginning at 10:15 AM). Students in grades four through seven will act out the story of Purim with their own original touches. Of course everyone is invited to the Temple's Purim Celebration. Since the entire social hall will be needed for our Purim Carnival, space in the sanctuary will be tight; therefore, I suggest that you and your guests arrive early for our Purimsphiel.

I would like to bring to your attention our schools. Model Passover Seder on March 12th. As in past years, our seder will be a school-wide effort. Each student will be assigned a specific holiday food to add to the seder. Class parents will be asked to serve the Passover foods brought in by the students. In keeping with the holiday traditions, all foods, if applicable, should be kosher for Passover.

Columbus, the Jews and 1492

In 1992, as we celebrate the 500th anniversary of Columbus' discovery of the New World, Jews should remember that 1492 was a very significant year for other reasons. Within a few months of Columbus' voyage, the Jews were expelled from Spain. By historians' estimates, some 300,000 Jews fled Spain and settled in Portugal, Italy, Morocco, Turkey and elsewhere. Some eventually ended up in the New World, the beginning of the North American Sephardic community. For many years, Jews were reluctant to return to Spain, and even in 1960 there were only about 3,000 Jews there. So 1992 is a good time to study up on Sephardic history and culture and to remember that if it weren't for the Jewish financiers at the court of Ferdinand and Isabella. Presently, there are large number of Haitians fleeing their country and there is no sanctuary for them. Worse, our government is now returning these refugees to Haiti. Please write letters to President Bush and your congressman voicing your outrage over this injustice. The following is the text of the letter which Rabbi Priesand has composed and which the Temple Board is sending to President Bush:

Dear President Bush:

As members of the Jewish community affiliated with Monmouth Reform Temple, we are particularly appalled by your decision to close the doors of our country to Haitian refugees seeking asylum. Like our fellow Americans, we have long taken pride in the compassionate response of our nation to the plight of those fleeing persecution. Successive American governments have responded to these tragedies by offering a haven in which to rebuild shattered lives.

Now we see Haitian refugees coming to our shores in search of freedom and justice and finding instead detention and deportation. Remembering that not long ago we Jews were the "boat people" of the world, we cannot remain silent in the midst of this injustice. We urge you to call an immediate end to the forced repatriation of Haitian refugees and to establish for them a provision of temporary protected status in our country. Please do not allow their perilous journey to end in heartbreak and tragedy.
