


FROM RABBI PRIESAND

Recently I saw the movie A STRANGER AMONG US. Although I thought the plot a bit implausible, I enjoyed the film and was really quite touched by its portrayal of the Chassidic community. Emily Eden, a tough New York cop, is assigned to investigate the disappearance of Yaakov Klausman whom she discovers was murdered in his office in Manhattan's diamond district. Because she believes the crime to be an inside job, she asks the Rebbe's permission to go undercover and become part of the community, posing as a baal teshuvah (one who has returned to Judaism).

As Emily comes to know more about the Chassidic way of life so do we. We learn why Chassidic men wear payees, why a tallis has fringes and why the mirrors are covered and people do not wear leather shoes while sitting shiva. We see young boys benching and men davenig, women baking challah and making gefilte fish, the Rebbe's family and their guests joyfully observing Shabbat and the whole community celebrating the arranged marriage of the Rebbe's son to his basherta (destined one).

The movie is filled with emotion and warmth. It portrays quite successfully certain basic Jewish values: a nurturing family environment, people who care about each other, the joy that comes from observing customs and ceremonies, the importance of study and the effect that spirituality can have on one's daily activities. Emily returns home a changed person, having learned that much is missing from her life.

A STRANGER AMONG US is an appropriate movie for this season of the year when we too are called upon to take stock of our lives. That process is highly personal, but our tradition provides a framework in which it can be done with meaning and purpose. I hope you will want to take advantage of the many opportunities for reflection, return and renewal that the Holyday season offers. It all begins with S'lichot, Saturday evening, September 19. I look forward to seeing you there. L'shana tova!

Have a healthy, happy and active new year!





SOCIAL ACTION COMMITTEE:

Three members of our congregation presently do yeoman's work every Friday afternoon when they conduct Shabbat services at three local nursing home. Bernie Brandwene, Hy Klein and Max Singer are caring in spirit and gracious with their volunteer time to maintain this wonderfully humanitarian effort.

Now, a request for an additional service at another Nursing Home comes from a Jewish Monmouth County man whose 59-year-old wife is a quadriplegic suffering from multiple sclerosis. I have spoken with the husband, and he tells me that he has contracted Jewish Federation and congregations throughout the county, but no one has been forthcoming to offer help. It is not reasonable to ask Max, Hy or Bernie to do more than what they are already committed to, and I am therefore appealing to one or more members of the congregation to take on this voluntary task and bring our service to the Geraldine Thompson Medical Home on (an as yet to be determined) weekly, bi-weekly or monthly basis. If you are interested, Bernie, Hy and Max will give you all the preparation you need. Please phone me for more information (389-2582).

Do you have a job to offer??? The Shore Area Board of Rabbis has coordinated with Monmouth County Federation to develop a community-wide job bank. The Social Action Committee sees this as an excellent program that will benefit unemployed persons and meet the needs of members of our congregation who are seeking employees for their businesses or for home services. I am presently compiling a list of job offerings from our membership, and I will send it to Federation will then consolidate Federation. NEW UAHC INTRODUCTION TO JUDAISM CLASS

A 16-week course designed to give participants a basic understanding of Jewish belief and practice will be offered Wednesday evenings at **Temple Shalom** in **Aberdeen** beginning October 21. RELIGIOUS SCHOOL NOTES from David Levinsky

Welcome back to another Religious School year. Classes will begin on Sunday. September 13. You will have the opportunity to speak with our new and returning teachers during our annual PARENTS' DAY, held this year on the first day of school. The program begins with bagels and coffee at 9:30 AM., followed by a discussion of important school activities and concluding with parent-teacher meetings.

Claire Metzger, student cantor, joins our staff as the school's music teacher and student choir director. Through my many discussions with Cantor Metzger, I can attest to her strong interest in our children and her desire to continue our school's fine music program.

We are delighted to announce the appointment of two teachers to our staff: Mrs. Betsy Millman for our second grade and Mrs. Marcia Landskroner for our third grade. Both are very experienced religious school educators and truly love working with seven and eight year olds.

Returning to our school are: Mrs. Gail Pierson (kindergarten), Mrs. Elise Simms (first grade), Mrs. Janet Bell (Hebrew - fourth and fifth grades), Mrs. Karen Speichler (religious studies - fourth and fifth grades), Mrs. Evelyn Kornberg (Hebrew - sixth and seventh grades), Mrs. Shirley Cohan (religious studies - sixth and seventh grades), Mrs. Sandi Weingroff (eighth/ninth grades), and Rabbi Priesand (Confirmation Class.)

The books and curriculum designed for each grade, as well as other school-related information, are listed in the Religious School Booklet, issued every September for the new term. Described below are some of the changes we have made for the 1992-93 school year. Please refer to the School Booklet to obtain a more complete picture of the curriculum for each grade, especially kindergarten through second, and the books issued in support of our educational goals.

Our objectives for the third grade Hebrew program have been altered to include complete letter recognition, letter blending and simple reading skills. In past years, the students were required to learn only the alphabet. A values approach to Bible study in this grade has been added through the addition of A Child's Introduction To Early Prophets.

Hebrew students in the fourth through sixth grades will be asked to learn a Hebrew vocabulary list for each grade. These words will assist the students to recognize often repeated words found in Shabbat prayers.

Our fifth grade American Jewish history course will take on a different look this year. A new textbook, *Importance of One*, focuses on the achievements of individuals within an historical context as opposed to the survey type class given in the past. An adventure novel, *Melting Pot*, was added to enrich the curriculum.

The Tenth of Av, also an adventure novel, has been added to the sixth grade history curriculum. This excellent work places historical events in perspective for its young readers and obviates the use of a traditional early history textbook.

Seventh grade students will have their own copy of *Genesis* (the first book of the Torah) this year. The UHAC publishes the books of the Torah, with the commentaries, as individual volumes for classroom use.

An excellent book, How Do I Decide, will help focus the eighth/ninth grade class during its study of our Family Life Unit. Parents are encouraged to discuss the course material with their children.

The enrichment periods are taught on Sunday during the third period for grades five and above. Grades five and six are offered the Holocaust, Shofar magazine and choir. Grades seven and above will be involved in Jewish cooking, choir and a series of new, well crafted weekly lessons on topics not usually covered in our regular classes.

Students in last year's grades 4-6 who did not complete the Shabbat service requirement must get their attendance forms to me as soon as possible. This requirement must be completed for promotion.

Our teachers and I are looking forward to greeting you on September 13th. As always contact my office if you have any concerns or questions before then. (I shall be away during the first week of September.)
