

FROM RABBI PRIESAND

BITOTOMS HOTELD WAS Every now and then, a movie comes along which we ought to see and discuss with our older SCHOOL TIES is such a film. thoughtful exploration of anti-Semitism in the 1950s, it provides a good opportunity to talk about exclusive societies, why they exist and what makes them thrive. It also encourages us to think about the expectations we have for our children and how sometimes the pressure caused by those expectations leads our children to act in ways that are unacceptable because they fear letting us


In the film, David Greene, a blue-collar boy from Scranton, PA, receives a football scholarship to a prestigious New England prep school. Under normal circumstances, the school administrators would never even consider enrolling a Jewish student. But the football team has been on a losing streak, and David is a terrific quarterback. Seeing the scholarship as his ticket to Harvard, David comes to St. Matthew's Academy where he immediately encounters anti-Semitism and chooses to hide his Jewish identity by removing the Star of David he wears around his neck and playing football on Rosh Hashanah (although the headmaster finds him that evening praying alone in the school's chapel.)

David's classmates all come from families of high lineage and wealth and are expected to follow the family tradition of excellence at Harvard, Princeton or Yale. One senior, whose name is Charlie, seeks revenge when he believes that his future is being threatened by David who has taken his place on the football team and wooed away his girlfriend. The climax of the story involves an act of cheating, confronting David with an important ethical question and leading to an ending that provides one of the

film's few surprises.

SCHOOL TIES reminds us that prejudice and religious bigotry are based on ignorance and often passed by one generation to the next. The students at St. Matthew's Academy were not necessarily hateful people. Their anti-Semitism came to them from their parents, and many of them were perceptive enough to see through it. Because children learn what they live, the best way to teach tolerance is by creating homes that welcome people of all different backgrounds.

we can help our children understand that prejudice means pre-judging, deciding in advance that something is wrong with another person because he or she is different, and if we ourselves remember that responding to bigotry with more bigotry merely encourages bigotry, then we will have taken an important step forward in banishing hatred from our midst.



New Member Sabbath is the time when we publicly welcome members who have joined in the past twelve months. Some new members may already be well acclimated to Monmouth Reform Temple life and involved in committee and Arts Festival work. Most likely the majority will still be feeling like visitors in the Temple family.

It does not seem easy to find one's place in a group which appears impenetrable at first glance. New Member Sabbath gives long-time and new members a chance to meet, chat and grow more comfortable with each other, and it serves as a stepping stone to more meaningful activity in Temple life.

I hope you will be at Temple on November 20, either to welcome or to be welcomed.


I still believe that to be Jewish today means what it meant yesterday and a thousand years ago. It means for the Jew in me to seek fulfillment both as a Jew and as a human being. For a Jew, Judaism and humanity must go together. To be Jewish today is to recognize that every person is created in the image of God and that our purpose in living is to be a reminder of God.

Naturally, I claim total kinship with my people and its destiny. Judaism integrates particularist aspirations with universal values, fervor with rigor, legend with law. Being Jewish to me is to reject all fanaticism anywhere.

To be Jewish is, above all, to safeguard memory and open its gates to the celebration of life as well as the suffering, to the song of ecstasy as well as the tears of distress that are our legacy as Jews. It is to rejoice in the renaissance of Jewish sovereignty in Israel and the re-awakening of Jewish life in the former Soviet Union. It is to identify with the plight of Jews living under oppressive regimes and with the challenges facing our communities in free societies.

A Jew must be sensitive to the pain of all human beings. A Jew cannot remain indifferent to human suffering, whether in former Yugoslavia, in Somalia or in our own cities and towns. The mission of the Jewish people has never been to make the world more Jewish, but to make it more human.

LIVE THEATER COMES TO MRT!

On Sunday, December 6th, at 10:30 A. M., the Library Committee, Adult Education and the Parent's group will present SEPHARDIC TAPESTRY, a solo story-theater presentation, devised and performed by actress/producer Judith Goldsmith. The performance pays tribute to the Sephardic cultural heritage in this anniversary year of the expulsion of the Jews from Spain.

SEPHARDIC TAPESTRY features the dramatic, moving story of an "underground" Bar Mitzvah during the Inquisition, and mini-portraits of three outstanding women of Sephardic heritage: Dona Gracia Nasi, who played a major role in aiding her fellow Jews after their forced exodus from the Iberian Peninsula; Rebecca Gratz, the inspiration for the wonderful Jewish heroine in Sir Walter Scott's "Ivanhoe"; and Emma Lazarus, poet of the American people and the "Voice" of the Statue of Liberty.

Judith Goldsmith, a graduate of Barnard college, is widely known for her solo theater presentations which she devises and stages as well as performs. Touring to libraries, museums, schools and college, religious and charitable organizations, Ms. Goldsmith has appeared Off-Off Broadway, on radio and cable TV. We are certain that her performance will be a highlight of the year at MRT.

 Confirmand's Reunion on November 28th for confirmands from 1966-1982. Directly stated, a major objective of our Religious School is for each student to develop a strong, personal attachment to Judaism. Typical Religious School language refers to this attachment as a student's Jewish Identity.

The mechanisms for raising our student's Jewish identity are as varied as the teaching styles and lessons of our teachers. Mrs. Pierson stresses arts and crafts, while Mrs. Sims creates a warm Shabbat experience each week. Mrs. Millman employs the values inherent in Hebrew words and Mrs. Landskroner talks of the good deeds of our prophets.

In the middle grades, Mrs. Bell stresses Hebrew vocabulary; Mrs. Speichler emphasizes class discussion and hands-on activities; Mrs. Cohan interjects current events at every opportunity to promote a global point of view; and Mrs. Kornberg brings an unusual wealth of Hebraic knowledge to her classes.

Mrs. Weingroff, who teaches the 8th and 9th grades, combines discussions, trips and videos in her weekly lessons. The students in the Confirmation class, under Rabbi Priesand's guidance, learn the meaning of commitment as they prepare to become full fledged members of our congregation.

There is one element that brings together the individual efforts of each teacher to form a learning environment in which all children prosper. That element is certainly abstract, and yet, Rabbi Priesand and I agree that without it Jewish feelings would be totally replaced by mere facts, and children would wonder with whom they should identify. I speak of a sense of COMMUNITY.

In our community all children belong. They share a common purpose and have the opportunity to see younger and older girls and boys experience similar, Jewish activities. The children in grades K, 1, 2 and 3 know exactly where they will be in the years ahead by silently observing the example set by 8th, 9th and 10th graders. Yes, in our community all grades are on the road to Confirmation.

The sense of community is certainly reinforced when my students see school parents, sisterhood and brotherhood participants, arts festival workers and other Temple members at MRT on Sunday mornings. My "kids" hope to see you at all of our functions.

SOCIAL ACTION UPDATE

When asked for contributions to relieve starvation in Somalia, some potential contributors have feared that significant percentages of the food and money donated have been diverted or stolen. Other contributors note that Israel does not have diplomatic relations with Somalia and therefore turn away from contributing because Somalia has been unwilling to accept Israeli or Jewish aid of any kind.

With 1 million Somalians expected to die in the year ahead, a plan is underway for the government of Kenya to build a Tent City on the Somalia border. It is emphasized that the Tent City will not be built in Somalia and the government of Somalia will not be involved with this project at all. This facility will be a humane refugee center that will house, cloth and feed twenty thousand Somalians. Because the Tent City is located inside Kenya, the project will not suffer from many of the logistical obstacles blocking groups attempting to work within the war-ravaged regions of Somalia itself.

In order to insure that the funds will be properly used, the UAHC will not turn over any contributions to any other organization other than the American Jewish Joint Distribution Committee, JDC. The Tent City will be built by a team of 25 Israelis together with 150 Kenyan workers. Once completed and operational, the facility will be turned over to the United Nations High Commission on Refugees who will be responsible for ongoing administration. All tents will be painted with the inscription "From Jerusalem with love," to inform the world that world Jewry joined together to help stop this nightmare.
