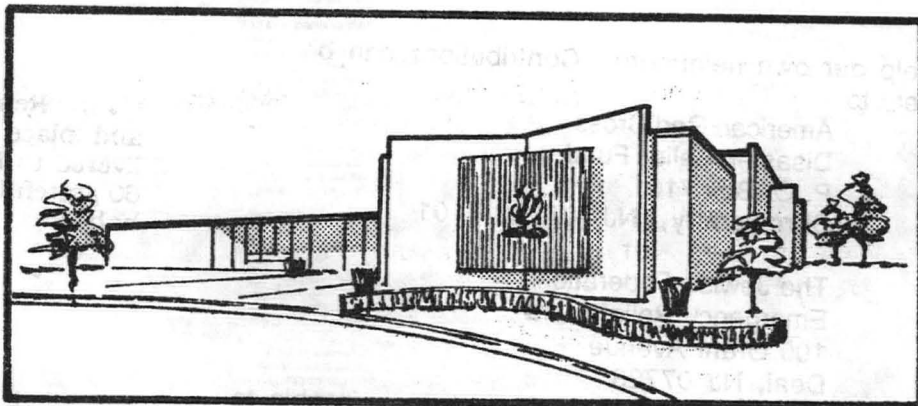

THE NOR'EASTER OF '92

The recent storm that ravaged the Jersey Shore touched all our lives and reminded us how vulnerable we are in the presence of nature whose mysterious power can cause such random destruction. 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FEDERATION NOTES

David Portman, the new president of the Greater Monmouth Jewish Federation, will explore solutions to the assimilation threat facing American Judaism in a talk at our annual Federation Sabbath on Friday evening, January 29.

His remarks will be made against a backdrop of rising anti-foreigner sentiment in Germany and of anti-Semitism in former Soviet-bloc countries of eastern Europe. But most of all, it comes at a time when surveys show anti-Semitic feelings emerging beneath the surface in America and when the Jewish intermarriage rate has soared to over 50%, with an estimated 75% of that total leaving Judaism.

Portman will discuss how the Jewish community can unite with synagogues and Federation working together as partners with a focus on a full Jewish education for each youngster and a feeling of pride in Judaism. Partly through his efforts, a major initial step has just been taken with Congregation B'nai Israel, Rumson, finally joining Federation after years of separateness.

Portman has been a stalwart in his commitment to keeping Jews in America together and not assimilated. A leading developer who resides in Ocean Township, he also has helped spur efforts to establish a Jewish senior residence in Monmouth County.

A week after Federation Sabbath is the annual Federation Super Sunday on February 7. With over 400,000 Jewish immigrants having come to Israel from the former Soviet Union, Ethiopia and now Yugoslavia, your personal support when called on Super Sunday is crucial. The monies raised help finance urgent Jewish community causes in the U. S. as well as resettlement of immigrants and other critical needs in Israel.

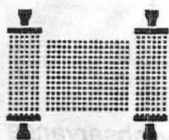

FROM RABBI PRIESAND

Recently I had occasion to read the long-range planning report prepared by the PSALM Committee in 1990. As you may remember, the purpose of this committee was two-fold: to gather and prioritize ideas for improving our Temple and to recommend ways for implementing those ideas. Nearly 60 members of our Temple family participated in this activity, generating an initial list of 197 ideas for consideration and discussion. From that list, 27 ideas were identified as having high priority, many of them offering opportunities for strengthening the relationship between the Temple and its existing membership.

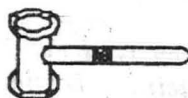
As I read the report, I was delighted to discover the progress we have made in accomplishing the goals we set for ourselves. Among the activities resulting from the PSALM report are these: the CONTACT program, which offers support to new members; mitzvot of membership; educational materials sent to the entire congregation concerning issues of death and dying; Tot Shabbat; Mitzvah of the Month program in Religious School; Inreach Committee; the establishment of a crisis support system; the addition of a full-time custodian to our Temple staff; the repair of the roof; making our building accessible to the handicapped; and refurbishing the Ladies Room (with thanks to Sisterhood).

The Temple Board, through its committee structure, continues its work in bringing to fruition other ideas suggested by the PSALM Committee. For example, the Adult Education Committee is currently working on a Hebrew glossary which we hope will help members familiarize themselves with terms that are used often at Temple, and the Inreach Committee is preparing a photographic display that will chronicle our yearly activities, as well as a Temple directory that will be distributed to the entire membership.

The PSALM report ended with a recommendation that in 1993 we invite all those who participated in the PSALM process to a special meeting of the Board of Trustees to discuss the effects of this activity. I hope we will be able to do that sometime this spring. In the meantime, my thanks to all those whose efforts lead to the strengthening of our Temple family. It is an active and committed membership that

enables our congregation to grow, both physically and spiritually. If you have not yet joined a committee, I hope you will consider doing so. Your participation will help us move forward into the future.

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FROM THE PRESIDENT

There are certain obligations and responsibilities that come along with membership at MRT. Of course, there are financial obligations; one is expected to pay fair share dues and building fund commitments as well as Religious School tuition and fees for Bar/Bat Mitzvah training when applicable. Those monies are essential to pay for staff salaries, supplies and upkeep of our building.

There are other responsibilities which each of us has in our relationship to MRT and which are also essential. One of these is to host an Oneg Shabbat or serve as an usher at services. Every member is asked to be a host (or an usher) on a Friday night once or twice a year. It is not a time-consuming job, nor is it very glamorous work. However, the congregation relies on its members to do it! Having an Oneg Shabbat is a celebration and a way to foster a sense of community.

Last month you received a schedule for host/usher service through August. Each member is expected to fulfill this responsibility when assigned. It is understandable that one may have a conflict now and again. If you are unable to be at Temple on the assigned date, you are obligated to find a substitute and to notify the Fellowship Committee. Under no circumstances is it acceptable simply to dismiss one's obligation.

A synagogue is a community and each of us is a participant in the group. For it to function properly, each of us must do his/her share. We rely on one another!

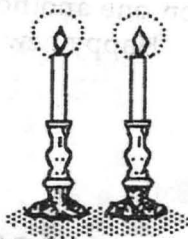

4 yr olds: M, W & F AM or PM

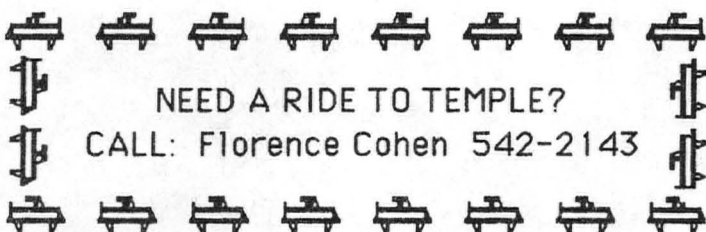

RELIGIOUS SCHOOL NOTES

Being involved in Jewish activities as a family unit is very important to many Religious School parents. Understanding this need, the Religious School Committee has put together a splendid Family Day program for Sunday, January 17, 9:30 - noon. As in other family-oriented activities, the program's goals are to provide a setting in which new Jewish memories will be taken home by all. **Since this school function is intended for each family to enjoy as a unit, all students must attend school with one or both parents; siblings are invited.**

Among the many pages of information distributed to your children in December was a complete school roster. This class listing is intended to make it easier for you to help your children develop friendships outside of school. To foster greater socialization among our middle school age students, the Religious School Committee gave its permission for grades 6, 7 and 8 to meet monthly, from 5:00-6:00, under the umbrella of the Junior Youth Group. Dennis Lord, the Youth Group Director, will organize and lead the hour's activities.

Mr. Lord anticipates greater involvement in Youth Group programs by this age group as a result of the School Committee's support. He asks these students' parents to encourage their children to participate in all Youth Group functions.

A FEW NOTES



FROM THE SOCIAL ACTION COMMITTEE

As I write this month's message, we have all just experienced what it feels like to be touched by the power and fury of our natural environment. In contrast to hearing and reading about what Hurricane Andrew did in South Florida and Louisiana, our own "Nor-Easter," which still remains nameless, brought the realities of death and destruction right into our daily lives. For most of us, the disruptions were "relatively" minor, i.e., an evening in a motel, a chilly house, a few shingles torn from a roof, or some trees uprooted. But for others, especially those living in the beachfront communities, there are more dramatic losses. As more information is obtained, the Social Action Committee will notify members of our congregation as to what might be done to alleviate some of the distress and loss suffered by our neighbors.

No doubt that everyone is reading about the upsurge in Neo-Nazi violence in Germany. Please watch for a mailing that will ask you to send post cards to Chancellor Kohl and President Susmuth asking that they take action to stem the rising tide of hatred and killing.

A few years ago, the city of Sarajevo was the site for a worldwide winter Olympics. Today, this city is being destroyed by the current civil war in what was once Yugoslavia. Before WWII, 80,000 Jews lived in Yugoslavia, but today, only 6,000 survive. Since April 1992 when fighting broke out, 300 Yugoslav Jewish children have reached Israel without their parents. At least 1,000 elderly Jewish people, most of whom are holocaust survivors, now face for the second time in their lives the ravages of war and suffering. Clearly, the catastrophe of human killing and misery in Bosnia-Herzegovina should hold our attention and command a major opportunity for tzadakah. (Contributions should be sent to: The Rabbi's Fund: Bosnia-Herzegovina. All money received will be forwarded to the American Jewish Joint Distribution Committee.)

At the most recent Social Action Committee meeting, there was discussion about New Jersey's needs for a comprehensive plan for environmental education. Presently, there is a proposed plan for the legislature to pass an environmental education act. In January

1993, Earth Day, Governor Florio will be presented with a final plan to formalize environmental education and make it an integrated part of the New Jersey community. More information about this topic will be forthcoming.

In addition to the concerns for human suffering, the Social Action Committee also seeks to alleviate suffering and injustice to animals with whom we share space on our planet. This month, there is grave concern about the plight of Alaskan wolves. The state of Alaska announced its intention to increase big-game populations of moose and caribou (which already total more than 1 million) by shooting wolves from airplanes. Governor Hickel and his director of wildlife conservation, David "machine-gun" Kellyhouse, call this wildlife management, a euphemism for what is actually a wildlife slaughter. The Social Action Committee invites MRT members to write letters or post cards to Governor Walter A. Hickel, State Capitol, PO Box 110001, Juneau, Alaska 99811-0001 or call (907) 465-3500.

How many MRT members ponder whether or not the committee's request for post cards and letters do any good? Well, you may be pleased to hear the follow-up news from the American Jewish Congress that the Japanese Electronics Giant Toshiba received more the 19,000 pieces of mail protesting its participation in the Arab economic boycott of Israel. According to AJC, Toshiba has ended its collaboration in the boycott and it now intends to "begin a major new marketing and promotion campaign in Israel with offices in Tel-Aviv." Furthermore, several other Korean companies such as Samsung, Lucky Goldstar, and Hyundai Electronics, have collectively received more than 30,000 post cards. In short, please feel confident that when big business wants you to buy their VCR's and when the Governor of a big northwest state wants tourists, your protests through letters and mailings really do work.

Last, mark your calendars for the Children's Peace Fair which will be held at Brookdale Community College on April 24, 1993.
