FROM RABBI PRIESAND

As summer approaches, I am busy preparing my list of things to do. Among the places I hope to visit is the United States Holocaust Memorial Museum in our nation's capital. Powerful, overwhelming, emotional, difficult are the words I have heard used to describe a visit there. That some question the need for such a museum here in America continues to amaze me. Can there be any doubt that it teaches what must be taught if the words "never again" are to have any meaning at all?

A recent poll conducted by the Roper Organization for the American Jewish Committee reports that 34% of adults surveyed and 37% of high school students either didn't know if the Holocaust happened or believed it was possible that it never took place. Moreover, 38% of adults surveyed and 53% of high school students did not know the meaning of the word "Holocaust," Such statistics validate the need for a Holocaust Museum; memorials are built not only to encourage memory, but also to combat ignorance. Hopefully, Americans of every faith and ethnic background will flock to this Museum as they do to other national monuments, and through the experience, will come to know what happened and why and will then be better able to make the transition from mere knowledge to true understanding.

Like Elie Wiesel, I too have sleepless nights, wondering how we can remember the victims of the Holocaust and not do something to stop the massacre that is taking place in Bosnia. Although I continue to struggle with what is the right thing to do, I firmly believe that silence and inaction are the wrong things. Ever since the end of World War II, when the horror of Hitler's Holocaust was revealed, people and nations have debated who knew what when, with the implication being that had they known they would have responded differently. This time we know. How can we remain silent?

Surely a unified coalition of countries, determined to make a difference, can find a way to stop the killing and bring an end to this tragedy. I believe that America must set the example and ever be a voice of conscience, providing the necessary leadership and reminding the civilized nations of the world that they have a moral responsibility to oppose and prevent the systematic slaughter of any people. Otherwise, the lessons of the Holocaust will have fallen on deaf ears.

FROM THE PRESIDENT

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Confirmation will be held Saturday morning, June 5, and I cordially invite all to attend this most significant service. As you know, the goal of Reform Jewish education is Confirmation. At that time, confirmands become voting members of MRT with all privileges and responsibilities pertaining thereto. Of greater importance is the completion of a commitment made by them and their parents to obtain a full (even though we never stop learning) Jewish education.

My own confirmation (which took place longer ago than I care to remember) remains one of the most vivid memories of my life. I remember more about that service than any other graduation or similar ceremony in which I took part. All the Confirmands were given a copy of The Holy Scriptures which I still treasure. Buried deep in my archives is my Confirmation certificate as well as my portion of the service and a letter from the Rabbi. To this date, I can recall almost every detail of the service. Won't you please attend on June 5 to help make this event a memorable one for our Confirmands?

While on the subject of invitations, why not attend Shabbat services during July? These services will be conducted by Temple members, each of whom lends uniqueness to the particular service they are leading.

TAHINI SALAD DRESSING

Many people asked for this recipe at the Purim Carnival. Gabe Torok was kind enough not only to make it for us for the carnival, but to write down the recipe, elusive as it is.

Tahini ground sesami seeds (16 oz container)

Water

Lemon Juice (real lemon concentrated) Salt Ground pepper

Garlic powder

Quantities are approximate and depend on amount of oil in tahini and individual taste.

Empty tahini into food processor, including all oil. Add some water and blend. Note that tahini goes through inversion process, becoming first thicker as water is added and then beginning to become a smooth paste. Add water until smooth but not too thin. Add 1/4 cup of lemon juice, 1 teaspoon of garlic powder, 1 teaspoon of ground pepper and 1 teaspoon of salt. Blend and add water to reach desired consistency. Taste, add lemon juice if taste is oily. Add salt, garlic, pepper to taste. Blend until very smooth. e. ante come

Arnold Strahl and Bernie Brandwene conducted a wonderfully successful program at the Children's Peace Fair held at Brookdale Community College on April 24th.

In response to the request for contributions to the Avidor Barugel Fund, MRT sent \$360. to help with the care of this one-year-old who has endured a liver transplant, numerous operations, and is presently maintained on a ventilator. If anyone wishes to contribute, please send your check to the Rabbi's Fund.

Several legislative issues are of current importance:

A. Senate Bill S113 has been introduced in the NJ State legislature and is known as the "Stress" Abstinence" Bill. Passage would require family life education programs to stress abstinence, virtually eliminating comprehensive, reality based sexuality education which is accurate, balanced and age appropriate. It is critical for young people to have all the information they need in order to protect themselves from unintended pregnancy, sexually transmitted diseases and AIDS. A "NO" vote is needed and MRT members are asked to write/phone their New Jersey State Legislators.

B. The "Coalition to Stop Gun Violence" is circulating a national petition to the U.S. Congress. Watch for a petition on the Social Action Table.

C. The Social Action Committee is supporting passage of the Mickey Leland Childhood Hunger

Relief Act, HR 529. This bill would strengthen and reform the core hunger relief program in the U.S.the food stamp program. There are vital reforms in this bill designed to bring the program up-to-date for the needs of children in the '90's.

D. Social Action supports a new U.S. Senate Bill S171 which would elevate the current environmental protection agency to cabinet level status. Environmental issues have taken on new importance as we learn more about the fragility of the life systems of our planet. Elevating EPA to cabinet status will add heightened credibility and importance to domestic and international issues.

E. On March 30th, President Clinton proposed to expand the "Earned Income Tax Credit: (EITC)." This is a tax credit for low and moderate income working families with children and helps to supplement low wages. Support is urged for this proposal.

Jeff Willard recently attended a three-day UAHC program in Washington where a multitude of Social Action issues were presented. The conference was entitled: "Consultation On Conscience." Watch for Jeff's article describing his fascinating experience at the Symposium in the next Temple Bulletin. Better yet, corner him at a Friday Oneg and ask him about Senator Kennedy's excellent presentation.

Please begin thinking about Social Action issues you would like the Committee to address next fall. Call Paul Brenner to discuss ideas and possible participation on the committee (389-2484).
