YOUTH NEWS

During the winter break, I had one of the most amazing experiences of my life while attending the JFTY Winter Conclave. "JFTY" stands for Jersey Federation of Temple Youth. The event took place in Warwick, New York just over the New Jersey border.

I think everyone realized and learned something about their own town, their temple, and themselves.

Probably the greatest thing about the trip was the people. Everyone there was so supportive and open. Friends were made so easily because there was an immediate bond, especially with all the young people there being Jewish.

I highly recommend that anyone in high school go to a JFTY event. I don't think it is possible to write in words all of the fun that I had. I hope that others will try JFTY and I'm sure they won't be disappointed!

FROM RABBI PRIESAND

As I write these words, I'm looking forward to Passover and the promise of spring-ime comes in its wake. We've had so much snow that I find myself thinking more and more about the biblical image that found its way into the Haggadah. It's always been one of my favorite passages, but this year especially so. "For, lo, the winter is past; the rain is over and gone. The flowers appear on the earth, and the time of singing is come."

For me, Passover also brings precious memories of seders spent with my family at home in Cleveland where I grew up. In my mind's eye, I can still see my father, alav hashalom, sitting at the head of our table, reclining on a pillow, prepared to read the Haggadah from cover to cover. I can taste my mother's matzah ball soup and the gefilte fish that she made from scratch, something that even now I consider a treat. I remember searching for the afikomen with my brothers and the non-Jewish friends that we always invited to share seder with us. How much I enjoyed preparing the seder plate and how fascinated I was with Elijah's cup, wondering as I did each year whether or not the prophet would actually dine with us.

Nothing can take the place of positive Jewish memories in the lives of our children and grandchildren. The more experiences we create for them within the context of Judaism the greater the possibility they will want to make certain that their children have the same or similar memories. Every holiday we celebrate, every Shabbat we observe, every ritual we practice, every custom we follow sends a message the ramifications of which are often unknown to us. It's like throwing a stone into the river. We can see the splash it makes before our eyes, but we cannot see its effect on the currents below the surface which may affect the flow of water for miles beyond. Every Jewish act that we perform not only has an impact on us now, but hopefully will also contribute to the survival of Judaism and the

Jewish people in years to come. Have a joyous Passover!

Our Religious School's Model Seder on March 20 is fast approaching. As is our custom, the school children will be asked to contribute ritual and food items. The request sheets will arrive home soon. The school tries its best to make the model seder a community effort. We try to convey the same feelings of warmth in our social hall as you have when your family and friends gather to reread the story of our exodus from Egypt on the first two nights of Passover. Aside from our model seder, several classes have invited parents to observe them in action. Kindergarten, first and second grades invited their parents to a songfest on March 6. Grade three asked its parents to take part in a Hebrew lesson on February 13. Grade 6 conducted a superior service on January 28 for the congregation. Grade 5 is scheduled to conduct a Shabbat service on March 11, with the fourth grade on the calendar for April 29.

MRT's Religious School has had a strong contingent in previous walks. If you cannot walk, I will gladly walk in the name of anyone who wishes to sponsor me. Students participating in the walk will receive credit for Religious School attendance.

This winter's snow falls have played havoc with our students' visits to the Shrewsbury Residential Health Care Facility. Grades 2, 4 and 5 will be rescheduled. What would you do if you got a telephone call informing you that 125 relatives you never before even knew about were on their way to your house? Would you:

a) run away?

b) hyperventilate?

c) order twelve dozen bagels, ten pounds of

cream cheese and twenty-five pots of coffee?

d) call Jewish Family & Children's Service?

Well, 125 Jews from the former Soviet Union will be coming to Monmouth and Ocean Counties to rebuild their lives during 1994. And they will need more than bagels and coffee.

Fortunately for all of us, JFCS has had lots of experience and fabulous success at helping New Americans. The Resettlement Program, which is funded by contributions to UJA/Jewish Federation of Greater Monmouth County as well as government grants, has a staff of people who will skillfully guide the emigres through all the new bureaucracies waiting for them from the school systems to the Department of Motor Vehicles.

They have, in the past several years, helped some 450 people make successful transitions. All are now employed, though some are not working in the area from which they studied in Russia. They all live in their own homes or apartments, have taken or continue to receive lessons in English and have learned how to negotiate what is for many of them the most amazing aspect of life in suburban New Jersey: the astounding variety of foods available in the local supermarkets.

But the whole process needs volunteers. And that's where you come in. If you can drive and have some spare time, if you can teach English, if you can donate furniture or a car, if you can supply an internship or, better yet, a job for a fellow Jew from another country, you can help.

ISRAEL BONDS 1979 and 1980 STATE OF ISRAEL BONDS ELIGIBLE FOR ADVANCED REINVESTMENT

Individuals holding unmatured 4.00% Israel Bonds purchased in 1979 and 1980 have the opportunity to take advantage of a special program authorized by the State of Israel. The maturity value of Israel Bonds not due to mature until later this year or 1995 can be credited toward an advanced reinvestment, provided additional funds are added to purchase one or more Israel Bonds of a higher denomination.

In other words, unmatured Reconstruction and Development Issue or Sixth Development Issue Bonds purchased in 1979 and 1980 can be submitted for advanced reinvestment toward the purchase of Individual Variable Rate Issue (IVRI) Bonds, Current Income Bonds, and \$250 State of Israel Certificates.

The IVRI has a current annual rate of interest of 5.50% for bonds purchased through February 1994. (Bonds purchased in March will bear April 1 rate.) The IVRI has a minimum subscription of \$5,000 (and is available for \$2,500 or \$2,000 for IRAs only). The bond has an annual rate of 5.00%, the rate is prime. The bond matures 12 years from issue date and has an early redemption privilege for IRAs and pension plans.

The Current Income Bond has a minimum subscription of \$500. When held at least one year, the bond may be cashed in Israel for Israeli currency, up to \$2,500 a month per person, to defray tourist expenses. The bond has an annual interest rate of 4.00% and matures in 15 years.

The \$250 State of Israel Certificate, when held at least one year, can be redeemed in Israel for Israeli currency or used toward payment of El Al Israel Airlines tickets for flights to and from Israel, under current provisions. The certificates mature in five years.

It is not possible to buy Economic Development Issue Bonds, Floating Rate Issue Bonds, or Zero Coupon Bonds through this advanced reinvestment program.
