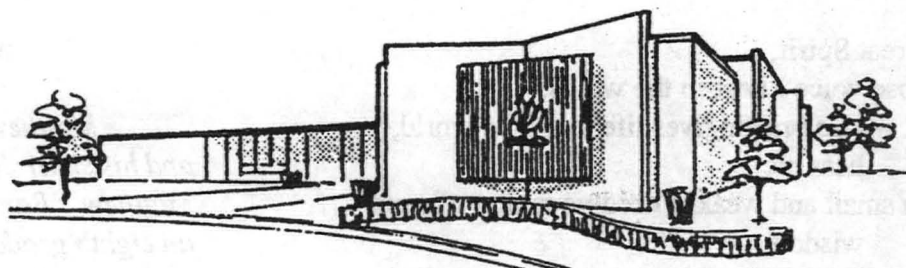

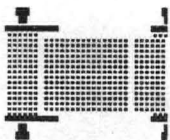

FROM RABBI PRIESAND

As our Temple membership increases, we have to work harder to preserve and enhance our sense of community. Here are ten things you can do to help make certain that our congregation will continue to be a family.

Do you remember what it was like when you first joined the Temple, how getting involved was easier when you felt welcome? Volunteer to be a CONTACT person, a friend and mentor to a new Temple family.

Have you ever felt awkward or lost walking into the Oneg Shabbat alone? Others probably feel the same way. Greet the people you know, but be sure to spend some time with those you don't know. Whenever you come to Temple, make a point of introducing yourself to at least one person with whom you have never spoken before.

Are you coming to Temple for services, a class or event? Do you know others who might need a ride? Call and offer to pick them up. Don't wait for them to call you.

Are your children grown, away at college or living elsewhere? Remember that many of the children in our Temple family have no aunts or uncles or grandparents here in Monmouth County. Come to family services and holiday celebrations and be their extended family.

Is the child of a fellow committee member becoming Bar or Bat Mitzvah? Come to services that day or the night before when they sponsor the Oneg Shabbat, and celebrate with them.

Have you heard someone's name mentioned on the Mi Shebeirach list week after week? Write them a note or send them a card and wish them well.

Has a Temple family recently welcomed a new baby or perhaps a new grandchild? Find out when the naming will be and make certain to come to services that night.

Have Temple members suffered a recent loss? Attend the funeral, pay a shiva call or come to services on Friday night and surround them with your love and support as they recite kaddish.

Do the members of your household have specific chores and responsibilities, and do you get upset when they refuse or forget to do them? Our

Temple family is like any other family. It depends on each member to fulfill his or her obligations for the benefit and well-being of the whole. When you're asked to volunteer or participate, say yes cheerfully, as you would want the members of your own family to do, knowing that your effort helps to strengthen our congregation.

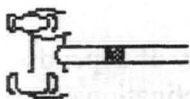
Have you wondered how best to pass Judaism on to the next generation? Setting an example and being a role model do make a difference. Our young people come to Religious School week after week and are required to attend services regularly when studying for Bar/Bat Mitzvah and Confirmation. Seeing you here at services or engaged in study will reinforce the idea that Judaism isn't just for kids and that being part of a Temple family is something special.

A Celebration of Children!

Come join us in celebrating our children on Friday evening, October 18 for Tot Shabbat at 6:30PM and regular services at 8:15PM. Our Temple will join with thousands of other congregations across the nation in the 5th annual National Observance of Children's Sabbaths:

"STAND FOR CHILDREN: PRAY, SPEAK OUT, AND ACT."

In our united voice of children we will also be celebrating the children of Project Hugs: "Helping Us Grow Safely" of the Women's Center of Monmouth County. We will be collecting on Friday night at Shabbat and on Sunday morning at Sunday School the items for the children's welcome boxes at the Center. The following new items are needed for children of ages 3-8: character toothbrushes, cartoon soap, washcloths, bubbles, golden books, small toys such as gliders, bubbles, jack'n ball, etc., colorful bandaids for boo-boos, small coloring books, and teething rings and bibs for infants. The children receive these boxes when they first enter the shelter. The women's center offers counseling, advocacy, shelter, and referrals for children and women of domestic violence. By now, you're hopefully up to date on the outcome of our congregational meeting of September 8, where we decided to move forward with a building program which will meet the near and long-term needs of the congregation. My key message is this: please consider becoming a part of this effort, through contribution of time, ideas, and funds. We have grown and enriched our experiences through participation in a variety of ways, and there are many ways to share in the growth of the building. I once again invite you to drop a note in my mailbox with a thought or to volunteer.

We have completed our search for an Office Manager, and I am pleased to announce that Elinor Goldberg (no, no relation) will be joining us October 7. She has served in administrative capacities in her past professional life, and served as a dedicated volunteer and member of the Marlboro Jewish Center for over 25 years. Please take the opportunity to drop by the office and introduce yourselves. I look forward to her contributions to the smooth operation of our Temple. I also wish to thank Cora Tuchband, Adele Stevens, and Gerald Reisner for serving as the hiring committee, screening numerous resumes and interviewing the top candidates we had for the position, lead to our decision to hire Elinor.

Highlights from the MRT BOARD

The Board called a special meeting of the Congregation on September 8, 1996:

Mike Gohar, builder, and Ken Himsel, architect, presented the revised building plan to the congregation. Questions were answered and ideas and comments were heard. The below motion to proceed with the revised plan carried (70 in favor and 24 opposed).

Notwithstanding any action taken at the Annual Congregation Meeting in May 1996, and based upon the receipt of up-front Building Fund pledges in excess of \$225,000 and on going Building Fund pledges on excess of \$80,000 per year, the Board of Trustees is authorized to proceed with a reduced scope building project that includes the following:

Plan Benefits

- * gain 5 classrooms (net: one spare above 1996-97 requirement.
- * refurbish all existing classrooms to include more efficient lighting, acoustical ceilings, new flooring
- * gain two meeting rooms
- * larger office for Rabbi
- * new office for Cantor
- * larger office for Religious School principal and Nursery School director
- * relocate youth lounge to main floor
- * larger library
- * additional kitchen storage space
- * return of the cloak room
- * refurbish and enlarged bathrooms with handicapped accommodations
- * staff washrooms
- * improve insulation and siding on Temple exterior
- * sprinklers throughout building
- * improve fire egress
- * improved egress from basement

The above reduced scope building project shall be limited to a capital expenditure of \$700,000 suitably mortgaged.

Your children are great. They had no trouble adjusting to the partitions in the social hall or the classrooms in the basement. I could not be more pleased with the tone of the school. Our teachers began the year with enthusiasm and your children responded in kind.

Dismissal went very well, too. Remember, please do not beckon a child to your car while you are on line in the parking lot. For reasons of safety, children should not move toward a car in line until all cars in front of the waiting students have come to a complete stop. As soon as I observe that vehicle motion has stopped, I will direct the children to their cars. Thank you for your cooperation.

Last month's affirmation of the Temple's building expansion conveyed an important message to our Religious School's children. The financial commitment undertaken by the temple reiterates your support for Jewish education. The addition will not influence the school's academic standing. It will provide the teachers with more room and a superior teaching environment to achieve their teaching goals. Most importantly, the basement will be designated as a storage facility and not classroom space.

The expansion vote speaks very well for the type of family who belongs to MRT. Many members who pledged money and voted for the expansion do not have children in the Religious School. They could have said that additional classroom space was not their concern and voted no for the expansion. I wish to thank them on behalf of our Religious School children for their forward thinking and strong belief in Jewish education.

The commitment to Jewish education goes beyond a building fund. The concept of the minyon teaches us that Judaism is a shared experience in education as in ritual. Rabbi Priesand and I believe that hardy Jewish memories created in a child's early years will lead to a lifetime of Jewish involvement. Eating in the sukkah with Rabbi Priesand and taking part in the festive Simchat Torah services will be terrific memories. Simchat Torah will be celebrated on Saturday, October 5 at

10:30 a.m. followed by a cooperative Shabbat luncheon at 11:30 a.m.

Other ways to share the responsibility to educate your children include: attending services as a family, treat Religious School with the same vigor as you do secular school and contact me immediately with questions regarding curriculum and/or classroom lessons. As in any endeavor, children respond better when their parents show interest in the activity.

Last year, the Religious School Committee asked me to include in the Religious School Booklet a policy statement regarding service decorum. The statement reads:

Services, Shabbat in particular, are quiet moments in which to worship, meditate and find peace. It is inappropriate to talk and for children to frequent the bathroom or lobby during a service. Children, either participating on the bema or sitting in the congregation, should wear clothes appropriate for the sanctuary.

All Temple members and guests are encouraged to participate. Sing, even if you are only partly familiar with the songs, and read aloud sections of the prayerbook printed in *italicized print*.

Applause at the conclusion of a program is not appropriate.

Again, I would like to use my column to encourage your children to use the MRT library as a possible source for their secular school projects. I am familiar with several area Temple libraries and I can tell you without reservation that we are blessed with a library and staff without equal.

Birthday parties at MRT? I know that birthday celebrations in secular school are the norm for younger children. I fully endorse the same celebration in our Religious School classes. You send your children to Religious School to receive a Jewish education and to be with Jewish children. Let us do whatever we can to assure Jewish friendships.

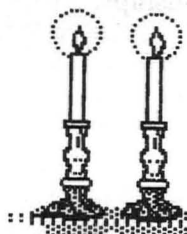

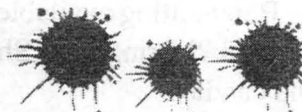
