

RITUAL COMMITTEE

Greetings from the Ritual Committee. This month's news focuses on three main areas; High Holyday schedules for next year, the revitalization of the Shiva Corps, and volunteers for homestays for Student Cantor Case.

For next year there will be no double services for the High Holydays. Attendance figures from this year and the previous year indicate that we will have seats for everyone who chooses to attend any service. While Rosh Hashanah morning is likely to be attended to near capacity, we are confident there will be chairs for everyone. So the good news is that we will be able to pray together as a complete Temple family during the Holydays in 1997. The bad news is that some services will be quite full and so arriving early will be the only way to obtain the best seats. Plan accordingly.

From time to time Shiva calls to the homes of bereaved members' families are not as well attended as they might be. To help ensure that the mitzvot of comforting the bereaved is fulfilled more regularly, the committee is rebuilding what we shall call the Shiva Corps. A list of members who want to be notified about Shiva services and who agree to come out to members' homes for services has been drawn up and a phone chain established. More is better in this enterprise. Won't you please volunteer for this important form of inreach? Just call me or

leave a note in the Office indicating your desire to provide this important mitzvah of communal support.

Student Cantor Case is becoming more and more integrated into our Temple family as the weeks and months go by. One of her stated pleasures is having a Shabbat meal with Temple members and their families and staying overnight when she has Saturday morning services to perform. The Ritual Committee encourages you to consider providing homestays for Student Cantor Case, especially if you are able to do so for more than one week at a time. By establishing a "home base" for two or three weeks, she gets to feel more and more like a member of our family and you get to know your cantor more completely. Everybody benefits. Pleasures abound. Call me to volunteer, won't you?

FROM RABBI PRIESAND

A few weeks ago, I attended the UAHC Regional Biennial in Teaneck, New Jersey, together with the following members of our Temple family: Rich Goldberg, Myra and Stanley Ostroff, Gerald Reisner, Rosalie and Bob Rosin, Dorothy and Leonard Teitelbaum, and Jeff Willard and Steve Mahan. We joined 500 delegates from Reform synagogues throughout New York and New Jersey for a weekend of study and worship, reflection and fun. There is no better way to find out what is happening in the Reform Movement than by attending a regional or national biennial. Those who participate always come home with new ideas and with a clearer understanding of what it means to be a Reform Jew. Highlights of this year's convention included addresses by Rabbi Eric Yoffie and Rabbi Sheldon Zimmerman, the two new leaders of our Movement whose vision will take us into the twenty-first century. Both of them stressed the joy of Judaism as well as the responsibilities that come with being Jewish. They reminded us all that study in Jewish tradition is a lifelong commitment, that God is watching what we do and that every moment of our lives can be a Sinai moment if we make it so.

While at the biennial, we learned that a group of Knesset members in Israel had just introduced legislation seeking to invalidate non-Orthodox conversions, thereby undermining the legitimacy of Reform and Conservative Judaism and threatening the unity of the Jewish people as well as the relationship that exists between Israel and the Diaspora. The legislation comes as no surprise since the Orthodox parties demanded support for it as a condition of joining Netanyahu's government. But this is another attempt by Israel's religious parties to modify the Law of Return, change the definition of who is a Jew and overturn recent decisions in favor of pluralism made by Israel's High Court of Justice. If we remain silent, the consequences will be disastrous. There are two things you can do to help. First, write a personal letter to Prime Minister Netanyahu, expressing your concern and urging him to protect Israel as a home for all Jews. Second, support the work of ARZA (Association of Reform Zionists of America) which will serve as our

collective voice in protecting the rights of Reform and Conservative Jews. You can join ARZA by checking the appropriate box on your next dues statement.

Our concern for Israel was just one of many topics covered by the fifty different workshops offered at the biennial. Myra Ostroff served as moderator for the workshop titled: Tomorrow's Rabbis and Cantors - A Dialogue with HUC-JIR Students; Leonard Teitelbaum chaired a session called: When the Great Day Comes: Jewish Response to the Christian Millennium; and Bob Rosin offered a tour of Reform Judaism on the Internet. Among the other workshops that we attended were: Families Learning Together -Programs that Work; How to Keep a Big congregation Intimate; recent Developments in Modern Jewish Thought; Physician Assisted Suicide and the Right to Die; A Forum on Intermarriage Officiation and Outreach; AIDS and Other Taboos: Helping Temple Families Learn How to Help Those With Hard-to-Discuss Illnesses; and Recapturing the Sabbath - Turning Saturday into Shabbat.

Another workshop that caught my eye was called: 500-Family Congregation Raises \$60,000 Every Year with Scrip! How Do They Do It? Although I was unable to attend this workshop, I discovered that this congregation began its scrip program by making participation in it an obligation incumbent on every member. In other words, every household was required to purchase scrip in addition to its dues and building fund contribution. Our congregation has no intention of making scrip obligatory, but it occurred to me that if every Temple family purchased a minimum of \$100 in food gift certificates each month (most of us spend far more than that on food!) we could collect \$20,000 a year to help meet our budget without the need to raise our dues. Remember, food gift certificates cost you nothing, while at the same time helping our Temple enormously. Both the Finance Committee and the Ways and Means Committee will bless you for your participation - and so will your rabbi!





FROM THE PRESIDENT

I recently attended (portions of) the Regional Biennial Convention of the UAHC in Teaneck, NJ. While a smaller gathering than the national convention of a year ago, it was active and educational, and we were well represented. Rabbi Priesand has written about her impressions of the convention in her article of this month, so I won't overdo our 'coverage' - only to say that the convention again left me feeling proud of all we do at MRT!

You've just received a letter from me asking for your contribution to the MRT -25th CHAIR FUND. This is our fund-raising toward the commemoration of the 25th anniversary of the ordination of our Rabbi, contributing to the establishment of an endowed chair at the Hebrew Union College - Jewish Institute of Religion (HUC-JIR). This will be a very worthwhile fund and honors a landmark event in the life of our Rabbi and for the Reform movement. I hope you can find a way to contribute, as we look forward to the celebration of Rabbi's 25th in March. I know that this comes at a time when we are seeking contributions to our building fund, to the Scholarship fund, and when we are looking to shop for presents for our families and friends and continuing our dues and building fund obligations. But each of these causes is very important and worthy of your consideration.

I wish you all a happy and healthy Chanukah holiday, with much joy for you and your families!




YOUTH GROUPS





RELIGIOUS SCHOOL NOTES

When asked if one must believe in a heavenly God to consider oneself Jewish, a rabbi answered the question by drawing an analogy between Judaism and the spokes of a wheel. A wheel cannot spin with one spoke, he said. The wheel's strength increases as more spokes are added. Similarly, the rabbi explained, belief in a heavenly God is not the only spoke on the wheel of Jewishness. He mentioned study, mitzvot, tzdakah, prayer, political activism, cultural awareness, caring for Israel and, perhaps, a personal sense of godliness.

I would like to use the same analogy when speaking of Jewish education. Religious School is one of many opportunities for educational growth. A Jewish home, a trip to Israel, Temple youth group experiences and summer resident camp are the spokes

of the Jewish education wheel.

For students to receive an effective Jewish education, they must be exposed to the formal education made available in the school setting and the informal-experiential education provided by youth group activities and resident camp living. The NFTY trips to Israel and the Mitzvah Corps are vital experiential programs.

This is the reason why I strongly encourage you to carefully read the material that the Scholarship Committee has prepared for you. You should receive this information around the same time as the Temple

Bulletin.

Vallerie Hersch, committee chair, encourages all families to apply for assistance toward the cost of UAHC summer programs: youth trips to Israel, the Mitzvah Corps and resident camps. All three of my children experienced wonderful summers at Camp Harlam, the UAHC camp in Kreskeville, Pa. In addition, my son, Marc and my daughter, Rachel, still correspond with members of their NFTY trips to Israel. I encourage you to seek out information on these programs. Vallerie mentioned to me that donations to the scholarship fund will enable more Temple children to take advantage of the UAHC's summer activities.

The first marking period for grades 4 to 7 ended on November 17; report cards will be issued in early December.

All students in grades 4-6 must attend three Friday evening Shabbat services as congregants and participate in one service with their class. Several changes have been made to the school's class organization since the Temple calendar and Religious School Booklet were published. The Family Service dates for grades 4 and 5 may be different and I suggest that parents with children in these grades update their family calendars with the following: class 5B -- January 17, class 5A -- February 28 and grade 4 -- May 2. Kindly use my service attendance form or your own stationery to notify me of

your children's service attendance. The tally at the bottom of the report card will indicate the number of services attended by your children for which I have service forms signed by a parent. Kindly let me know of any error in the tally.

Please take time to review the report card with your children. As always, you may address any questions or concerns to your children's teachers,

Susan St. Lifer or me.

Every principal must contend with student lateness to Religious School. Before the members of the Religious School Committee seriously debate my suggestion to change Wednesday's starting time to 4:15 p.m., I would like to gather more information regarding the ability of Temple parents to transport their children to school. Attached to your child's report card will be a short questionnaire regarding your ability to bring your children to Religious School by 4:00 p.m. on Wednesday and 9:30 a.m. on Sunday. I would appreciate it if you would return the questionnaires to me as quickly as possible.

On November 22, the congregation had the opportunity to swell with pride as the 6th grade conducted Shabbat services. The students and Ms. Haussamen are to be congratulated for their efforts. The children demonstrated during the weeks prior to the service that they wanted to do well and cared personally for the success of their cooperative labors.

Chanukah is here. We want all Temple families to be at our Temple Celebration on DECEMBER 8. Our assembly program will begin at approximately 9:50 a.m. The highlight of the morning will take place in the social hall at 11:00 a.m. We will gather around tables arranged in a giant horseshoe shape, and after singing the Chanukah blessings the lights will dim and each family will kindle its personal menorah. 700 candles will mark our celebration. WHAT A SIGHT! Following the candle lighting, the students will eat their latkes in their classrooms and the parents will have their latkes in the social hall.

Over the years, the Chanukah celebration has become a major school experience. I urge all parents to attend the candle lighting ceremony in the social hall at 11:00. Bring your entire family, the grandchildren,

too!

The Temple's Sisterhood always remembers your children. This year as in many past years, the Sisterhood provided every school family with a box of holiday candles and each student with a dreidle and Chanukah gelt.
