



Garin Fund Closed

Many MRT members remember Roz Garin who co-chaired the library committee with such grace and expertise for many years. When Roz died in 1990, her husband Bob set up the Roslyn Garin Fund to provide a continuing income for the library to purchase children's books. Bob's intent was that the fund would be open for contributions until the total reached \$10,000 at which point the money would be invested. Last fall, the fund reached \$10,000 and that sum was invested in an Israel bond. The income from the investment is transferred annually to the library's budget. This steady source of income will allow us to maintain an excellent collection to serve the recreational and educational reading needs of MRT's children. Bob had a special bookplate designed for books purchased with Garin Fund money. You can see it in many of the children's books.

The point of this explanation is to let everyone know that while the library welcomes, encourages, and depends on your contributions, the Garin fund is no longer accepting donations. Donations can still be made to the library in memory of Roz Garin, or earmarked to be spent on children's books. The generous support of Temple members through the years has meant that we have an excellent collection. Thank you from the Library Committee!

FROM RABBI PRIESAND

Like many of you, I watched the inauguration of our country's president on television. Standing before members of Congress and the Cabinet, justices of the Supreme Court, representatives of the Armed Forces and throngs of ordinary citizens, Bill Clinton took the oath of office in a rite of passage that happens every four years. giving us an opportunity to remember what's right with America, to renew our sense of vision and celebrate the peaceful continuity of government that marks our democracy. It was a day of pageantry and pomp, poetry and pride, a day that touched the patriotic spirit within us and bid us reflect on the obligations we have not only to each other, but also to those who have gone before and to those who will come after. The enormous applause that greeted the President's call for greater civility in politics and government suggests that the American people would truly like to form a more perfect union.

As I listened to President Clinton's address, I was struck by how Jewish it sounded. (I guess that's what happens when you've been a rabbi for twenty-five years: you look for something Jewish in everything!) Having myself often referred to the Promised Land as the Land of Promise, the President's hope that America in the twenty-first century would be a land of new promise resonated with me. When he called on us to repair the breaches, I thought of the mitzvah of tikkun olam, the Jewish value that asks us to be partners with God in repairing the world. I learned later that this was a reference to Isaiah 58:12, the chapter and verse to which Mr. Clinton had opened his Bible and on which he had rested his hand when taking the oath of office and promising to fulfill the duties for which his fellow citizens had elected him.

What I liked most about the President's speech was his suggestion that prosperity and power always fall short unless they are enveloped by the spirit of the human heart. That remark reminded me of a midrash. Our sages noticed that the last letter of the Torah's last word is the letter <u>lamed</u> and Torah begins with the letter <u>bet</u>. Together <u>lamed</u> and

bet form the Hebrew word <u>lev</u> which means "heart."
Only when we bring our hearts to the tasks of every day do the values contained in Torah become real and only then can we make a difference in the world.

This year's inaugural ceremony was enriched by the fact that it took place on the day set aside to remember Martin Luther King, Jr., a modern Moses who, like his ancient counterpart, devoted his life to the ideals of freedom and justice. President Clinton took the oath of office across the mall from the spot where Dr. King challenged us on that summer day in Washington decades ago. His dream remains alive, and the memory of all that he stood for inspires us still. Somehow I could hear his voice as the minister who delivered the benediction prayed that God would make us worthy of our history and grant to President Clinton ever-increasing vision, vigor and voice that he might speak tellingly to the American promise in history. That is our prayer too.




Rabbi Kraus to Discuss Pluralism

Rabbi William Kraus, Outreach Director of the Jewish Federation of Greater Monmouth County, will delve into the pros and cons of Jewish pluralism in a talk at our annual MRT Federation Sabbath on February 21. He will answer questions afterwards.

Rabbi Kraus, who played the part of Rabbi Michael Wolfe in the off-Broadway production of "Grandma Sylvia's Funeral," lived in Israel for several years helping to settle Russian immigrants there after he had studied Russian at Middlebury College. He returned to the U.S. in the 1970s, studied at Hebrew Union College in Cincinnati, and was ordained as a Rabbi in 1980.

He served congregations in Dallas, and then in Livingston and Somerville, New Jersey. He is a native of Elkins Park near Philadelphia.

FROM THE PRESIDENT

Rabbi Priesand recently gave a sermon which delineated the differences between the nature of an inheritance, for which we don't have to work hard, and a heritage, for which we must invest our energy and attention to sustain and nurture. While her sermons are always thought provoking and spiritual in their teachings of Torah, my articles are mundane and deal with the operation of our Temple - but there is a commonality here. Many people are doing the work to carry on our heritage through the business of our congregation - keeping the Board of Trustees vital, keeping our finances solid, developing a new contract between the Temple and our Rabbi, and finalizing the plans for expanding our building.

The Nominating Committee has been selected and charged to invite new members to join the Board of Trustees and fill the positions which will naturally be vacated when terms expire this spring. The committee will consist of Baldwin Davidson (chair), Bobbie Goldstein, Roz Reisner, Jay Wiesenfeld, and Jeff Willard. I'm sure with your cooperation and interest they'll be able to recommend a strong slate of candidates for our approval at the annual meeting in April.

The Finance Committee, under the leadership of Semmes Brightman, is both managing this fiscal year's budget, while developing the budget for our next fiscal year. This, too, will be brought up for your approval at the annual meeting.

As I have told you in past articles, the Pulpit Committee with Peg Baker's leadership is working to develop a new contract between the congregation and Rabbi Priesand. This will likewise be brought up for the congregation's ratification. The Building Committee led by Jim Berg is actively concluding its negotiation for the construction and financing of our approved addition and renovation.

Sum it all up and we have a rich heritage which is continually made richer.

Highlights from the MRT BOARD

* The board approved the Building and Building Finance Committee's motion to move forward in application for a mortgage to fund the building expansion program with the Shrewsbury State Bank. Mortgage amount is \$660,000 at 8 1/4% interest with zero points, 20 year amortization schedule with a five year balloon payment.

* It was approved by the Board that Student Cantor Case will continue her employment with Monmouth Reform Temple next year.

25th Anniversary Chair Fund

I want to thank everyone who has contributed so far to the visiting Professorship in Jewish Women's Studies being established at Hebrew Union College - Jewish Institute of Religion in honor of Rabbi Priesand. We have collected \$21,000 having heard from approximately 38% of the congregation. This is outstanding!

It is clear that we will reach our goal of \$25,000, but even more importantly, we would like to be the first Temple to provide 100% support for this important project in honor of our Rabbi. I am told by officials at the College-Institute that 100% participation has never before been accomplished. We would like to be the first to achieve this goal, even as our Rabbi was the first.



This year, we are seeking the following items:

Books: hard or soft cover, any vintage; any type/category, new or used

Records: 33 1/3, 45, 78; any type or variety including language records, magazines, or other printed material.

Please do not judge whether the material is saleable. Even the apparently least viable item may be desired by someone. Please do not donate textbooks with copyright dates between 1945 and 1988. The young people are encouraged to help with this project by acquiring material for the sale.

The sale's profits will be donated to a Temple project. The project(s) designated to receive the funds will be announced at a later date. Funding Received by Jewish Family & Children's Service of Greater Monmouth County

Jewish Family and Children's Service of Monmouth County has recently received funding from the Conference on Jewish Material Claims Against Germany to assist Holocaust survivors. Homemaking, home health care and companion services will be available through JF&CS and will be provided by the Visiting Nurses Association of Central New Jersey. Participants will be able to receive a maximum of 12 hours per week of subsidized in-home supportive services.

Jews who resided in European countries which were subject to Nazi rule and control between 1933 and 1945 are eligible for this program. They also must currently reside in the state of New Jersey. Financial need is based on the individual's income and ability to pay.

Case Management Services will be provided by JF&CS to all eligible applicants. The purpose of the case management services will be to assist the survivor and his/her family to identify, coordinate, negotiate and monitor those services necessary to maintain and enhance their quality of life and to maintain their functioning in the community for as long as conditions permit.

The JF&CS Case Manager shall act as a facilitator, advocate, and coordinator to assist the survivor/family in obtaining vital concrete and social services. These additional services shall be paid for by whatever resources are generally available to other clients of the local Jewish Family Service Agency.

RELIGIOUS SCHOOL NOTES

Titkun Olam, Kibud Zekaynim and Lo
Titeyn Michshol are three mitzvot in the series that
Rabbi Priesand has prepared in recent years for her
Mitzvah of the Month program. "To heal the world"
"to honor the elderly" and "to not place a stumbling
block" are three values that make us proud as Jews.
Much of our Religious School's curriculum centers
around values and mitzvot. We want your children
to act Jewishly and in that regard we mean ethically.

I endorse each class' curriculum. Jewish American history, Jewish philosophers, holidays, ritual and Torah are certainly fundamental to a Jewish education. We know that the specific factual material is not retained as well as the general insights gleamed from Religious School lessons. At MRT, we feel strongly that lessons on ethics and values should be internalized for a lifetime. Tzedakah (doing righteous acts) and Ayd shahkeyr (not bearing false witness) are concepts that the home and Religious School should teach in partnership. This is what it means to be Jewish.

Mazel Tov to class 5B for its splendid service. The girls and boys conducted the January 17th service as young rabbis and cantors and I look forward to 5A's Family service on February 28. I congratulate and thank Mrs. Linda Gerstel for preparing both classes so well.

With snow still on the ground as of this writing, it seems appropriate to review our procedures for canceling Religious School. Decisions to cancel a Sunday session are usually made on Saturday evening to avoid any early morning confusion and to allow your family extra minutes or hours of extra sleep. A class parent will inform you on Saturday evening when school is canceled.

Unless the weather conditions make closing an obvious call, the decision to cancel a Wednesday session is not made until 2:00 - 3:00 PM of that day. You may not be notified of a school closing until close to our usual arrival time. Our students represent many public school districts and several private schools; therefore, our Religious School has maintained the policy for many years of not automatically closing when the Tinton Falls system cancels school on a Wednesday morning. Contact the Temple office on a Wednesday so as not to venture out unnecessarily when a closing is possible.

Many parents have questioned me as to why I haven't closed the school when the roads are very icy and seemingly unsafe. You know that I am very concerned about the safety of every student and driver. As principal, I have an obligation to provide a continuity of education and I cannot close school at every indication of inclement weather or poor road conditions. The decision to drive is always a parental one.

The computer age is approaching MRT's Religious School. Please consider donating your older computers to the school for its eventual computer center. Unfortunately, there is no storage space now available in the Temple for your computers. If you must find a place for your "preowned" machine, I will store them in my home.

The Religious School has earmarked the profits from our 1996 Passover Candy sale to upgrade donated machines to accommodate the Jewish content software that is flooding the market. The computers will have to be fitted with sound cards, speakers and microphones. I would appreciate it if a parent could assist me in this area, since I know little about hardware.

Parents who wish to purchase Jewish content software for their children should contact me for assistance. There are varied programs designed to help children improve their reading ability. Jewish content programs in areas of religious studies areas are equally plentiful.
