On Friday evening April 25, as part of our Shabbat worship experience and in conjunction with the Rabbi, I will present a sermon in song on the texts of Shir Ha-Shirim (Song of Songs). Traditionally, Shir Ha-Shirim is chanted in its entirety on the Shabbat that falls during Pesach. The text of Shir Ha-Shirim is beautiful and falls into the category of Biblical love poetry. Often, Shir Ha-Shirim texts are read or sung at Jewish weddings; the lush poetry adds to the simcha, and illustrates the love of the couple for one another. Come join in worship, and to enjoy the texts of Shir Ha-Shirim set to beautiful music.

Already it is time to begin turning our thoughts toward the High Holydays and begin plans to rejuvenate a choir to sing on these holiest of days.

The philosophy of having a synagogue choir is to enhance the worship service, to help demonstrate the drama and excitement of the liturgy, and to help lead the congregation in worship.

An Open Letter to the Jewish Community

As rabbis and concerned Jews, we express our personal commitment to Klal Yisrael. We, at the same time, urge our people to demonstrate their commitment to Klal Yisrael through both word and deed.

It is important for every Conservative and Reform Jew to support Klal Yisrael by making a meaningful gift to the 1997 Federation/UJA Campaign. At this time when pluralism in the Jewish community is being challenged, it is especially important, this year, for Conservative and Reform congregants to support Federation/UJA Campaigns because their causes are ones that need and deserve our support.

The United Jewish Appeal and the Council of Jewish Federations did not cause the challenge to religious pluralism in Israel. To the contrary, they have demonstrated over the past several months a genuine willingness to be our partners in the articulation of distress to the government of Israel. We welcome that support and expect them to heighten their efforts to strengthen Klal Yisrael and the cause of pluralism in Israel.

As Conservative and Reform Jews there are constructive steps that each of us can take. We must continue educating fellow Jews as to the implications of legislation that, in effect, disenfranchises non-Orthodox rabbis in Israel. It is important that each Jew understand the issues as well as our hurt. We must express our feelings to the Israeli government. Letters must be received by members of the Knesset so that they will sense our position and our pain - and understand our outrage!

But, we must support our Federation Campaigns this year. We must not hurt our fellow Jews in the former Soviet Union who require our help. We must seek ways to ease the pain for Jews who have made Aliyah and who are currently struggling to make a new home in Eretz Yisrael. And, we must be concerned about local needs: there are Jews in our own neighborhoods who require our help. We must not turn our backs on them. We are just beginning to make strides in Jewish continuity. If there is to be a Jewish communal response to continuity, we must support it. The vision of Klal Yisrael - a unified Jewish people - is one that has been held by our ancestors for thousands of years. We share that vision. We believe that, working together with UJA and Federation leadership, we can mold and shape the Jewish community so its needs for physical security and financial well-being will be blended with its requirement for spiritual growth and educational depth and the freedom of all Jews to practice fully their Judaism wherever they are. It is through the partnership between the Synagogue world and the Federation world that this vision can become a reality.

RELIGIOUS SCHOOL NOTES

where parents set the example

On March 16, the Religious School joined the long list honoring Rabbi Priesand for her 25 years in the clergy. Ms. Millman, our 2nd grade teacher, and Ms. Bell, an intermediate grade teacher, wrote parodies to familiar songs



especially for the school's tribute. The children's choir sang two selections and the entire school sang the Rabbi's favorite Purim song, Lakova Sheli, complete with hand motions. Members of the confirmation class shared their special thoughts with the assembly and members of the eighth and ninth grades explained some of their favorite mitzvot from Rabbi Priesand's Mitzvah of the Month program. The tribute concluded with refreshments sponsored by the Religious Education Committee.

Observing the students from grades kindergarten through confirmation joining together for our tribute reinforced for me the Rabbi's long held belief that our Religious School is not composed of separate entities, called classes, functioning without regard for one another. Rabbi Priesand strongly maintains that each class operates as a member within the MRT Religious School community and that each age group is encouraged and fortified by the other age groups experiencing Jewish education together every Sunday and Wednesday.

Surveys have shown Passover to be the favorite holiday among Reform Jews. It is easy to understand the appeal of family get togethers, with bountiful food and wondrous aromas. For many, this month's seder quickly brings to the surface memories of joyous past Passovers when families may have lived in closer proximity than now and older loved ones were present to share the holiday spirit. As Passover united us in ancient times, it performs the same function today, bringing Jews together for family and cultural bonding.

Passover is my favorite holiday, as well, and I miss my parents and aunts and uncles who made the seders so special, and yes, so Jewish. And, I am saddened that two of my children, Craig and Rachel, will be attending college in Colorado during the Passover season. But, your children are here and I

want to help make this Passover model seder as special for them as possible. Rabbi Priesand conducts the seder mindful that this may be the only seder attended by some of our students. Much care and love goes into model seder preparation. Parent volunteers work all morning to create seder plates for each student with the traditional items brought in by the children themselves. Our new, children's oriented Haggadah is read and Lisa Goodall, our school's music teacher, leads us in the holiday melodies. It is my sincere hope that many years from now, our school children will look upon the MRT model seder with the same affection as I have for the holiday gathering of my childhood. (Please let me know if the model seder is the only seder that your child will attend.)

By now, all school families should have received my letter listing the Passover food responsibilities for each grade. If you would like to assist with the model seder on Sunday, April 20 (9:00 for volunteers), contact Susan St. Lifer, chair of the Religious Education Committee, 780-4778.

Due to the Monmouth Festival of the Arts, school will be held at the Monmouth Church of Christ on two successive Wednesdays--April 2 and 9, at regular session hours; NO school on April 6.

Passover candy orders will be available for distribution on Sunday, April 13.

Ms. Bell's fourth grade class will conduct the Shabbat family service on Friday, May 4. These students have waited all year to display their knowledge for their families and the congregation. I know that the class' high level of accomplishment will surprise many in attendance.

The magnitude of the Holocaust makes it an absolutely necessary subject for study and analysis. At MRT, the Holocaust and other genocide are examined in terms of their facts and their morality.

Our annual Yom Hashoah service conducted by Rabbi Priesand and Student Cantor Case and held this year on Sunday, May 4, reminds us that all life is holy and that the living have responsibilities to the dead. Grades 4 through 10 will attend this service and Grade 6 will participate in the program. I hope that school parents and congregants will "set the example" by attending.
