

FROM RABBI PRIESAND

This is the season of the year when Hebrew Union College - Jewish Institute of Religion invests cantors and ordains rabbis. I recently attended the ceremony of Investiture and Ordination which was held at Temple Emanu-El in New York and soon I will travel to Cincinnati to attend a similar ceremony at the historic Plum Street Temple where my own ordination took place twenty-five years ago. I always enjoy attending these ceremonies because it gives me an opportunity to remember a special moment in my life, to renew my vision and reflect once again on what it means to be a rabbi.

Indeed, that very idea - what it means to be a rabbi - is usually the topic addressed by the one whose privilege and responsibility it is to deliver the ordination address. Over the years, I have heard rabbinic leadership defined in many different ways, and as with my own preaching, some sermons were more stirring than others and some words continue to resonate, even though years may have passed since they were spoken. For example, I remember one such speaker (unfortunately, I don't remember who) suggesting to his newly ordained colleagues: "The challenge facing today's rabbi is to become dispensable!"

I remember the comment because it reflects my own belief that a primary task of the rabbi is to help other Jews become more responsible for their own Jewishness. In today's language, that is called empowerment. The goal of every rabbi should be to teach his or her congregants those skills necessary for living a Jewish life, raising the level of Jewish knowledge and learning to make decisions within a Jewish context.

As you know, my new contract provides for yearly sabbatical leave. Next year, I will be away for the month of January. In the past, when I have been absent during times of vacation or illness, many of you have experienced the joy of conducting a worship service. Now I would like to offer you the additional opportunity of preparing a d'var Torah and/or reading from the Torah scroll itself. I stand ready to help you prepare by providing you with the necessary resource materials as well as a listening

ear and a helping hand. Please let me know if you would like to accept this challenge. I think you will find it an enriching experience. After all, it's fun to be a rabbi!

FOR ELDERLY SHUT-INS: Shopping, visiting periodically and during High Holy Days, reading.


FOR RUSSIAN REFUGEES: Tutoring English, preparing for citizenship exams. (There is a book available for tutoring.) Help needed ASAP.



NURSERY SCHOOL NEWS


