

FROM RABBI PRIESAND

This year, the first day of Elul falls on Wednesday, September 3. Tradition enjoins that we use this last month of the Hebrew calendar to prepare for the Holydays, to begin the process of cheshbon hanefesh, of taking stock of our lives and trying to understand ourselves better. The theme of this season is self-examination, a reminder that what we do is recorded in the book of human life, that our actions do have consequences, and most importantly, that change is always possible. The Holydays provide for us an opportunity to correct the mistakes of the past and reorder our priorities for the future by changing the way we behave now.

The message of this season is one of hope. No matter how far we may have strayed we can always return to the path of righteousness. Indeed, our prayer book offers constant reassurance that change is possible: "Teshuvah, tefillah, and tzdakah (repentance, prayer and charity) avert the evil decree." That does not mean that bad things will never happen to us. It simply suggests that being part of a community, fashioning a faith of meaning and purpose, training ourselves to look inward, upward and outward, will make it easier for us to cope with those difficulties that are part of every life.

Looking inward is the purpose of teshuvah (repentance). Before we can seek forgiveness, or even grant it, we need a better understanding of ourselves, why we act as we do and what it is that keeps us from being the best that we can be. That task may seem overwhelming at first, but a useful little book by Rabbis Kerry Olitzky and Rachel Sabath called PREPARING YOUR HEART FOR THE HIGH HOLY DAYS will help you on your journey, providing as it does words of reflection for each day of Elul. Also, we hope you will join us for our S'lichot discussion and service, Saturday evening, September 27, at 9:00 PM as we usher in the Holydays in the midst of community, together as one Temple family.

Looking upward is the purpose of tefillah (prayer). One of the reasons many people come to services on Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur is the desire to reconnect with God, the yearning for

spirituality that does so seem to characterize our generation. The act of prayer is made more meaningful through practice, that is, by setting aside a few moments of worship every day, by coming to pray with the community not just on Holydays but every Shabbat, and also by understanding the meaning of the prayers and the order of the service. To help you better embrace the joy of tefillah, I will offer a three-part sermon series beginning Friday evening, September 12, called UNDERSTANDING OUR WORSHIP SERVICE.

Looking outward is the purpose of tzdakah (charity). The word tzdakah literally means "righteousness" or "justice," a reminder that God has called us to be partners in completing the work of creation, in setting right the wrongs of the world. Our congregation's first annual Mitzvah Day, Sunday, September 21, will give all of us an opportunity to fulfill the obligation of tzdakah. I congratulate and thank the members of our Social Action Committee, the participants in last year's Bar/Bat Mitzvah family program and all the other volunteers who have worked so diligently to organize this program of service to our community, and I hope that every member of our Temple family will participate.

Teshuvah, tefillah, tzdakah - a prescription for change, an opportunity for renewal, that will make our observance of this Holyday season the spiritual experience it was meant to be. I look forward to seeing you often in days to come. L'shana toya!



FOOD CERTIFICATE PROGRAM

Though I am in the middle of an audit, I wanted to inform the membership of our preliminary results for last year's scrip donations. We had wonderful results. Our total participation was 128 families and we raised \$8,375 for the Temple. That was \$2,152 more than the previous year. If we can get a few more families involved I am sure we will be able to earn \$10,000 this year. My personal goal is \$20,000 and we can easily do that with each Temple family buying at least \$100 worth of scrip each month. It is not hard to do; just contact one of the Captains selling scrip or stop in at the Temple Office. Scrip is also sold on Sunday mornings in the Temple lobby. Remember, no matter what you purchase, the Temple gets 5% and whatever money you give us, we give you back in gift certificates. Where else do you get such a bargain?!

We also started a Matching Program last April. One Temple member gave us 1% of our gross sales for the month of April. We made an additional \$135. In July, another family donated 1% of our sales in scrip and we earned \$99.25. This was in addition to whatever they purchase monthly. So we double thank them. If you are interested in learning more about the program contact me or Gary Brousell.

We started out our 97-98 year by selling \$800 more than the previous July. Sometime in September we should have our new summary of activities board up in the Temple lobby which shows our comparisons from year to year.



Greetings from the Ritual Committee!

With hopes that your summer was what you hoped it would be, the Ritual Committee would like to fill you in on some news from our work in July and August. First we want to thank all those who volunteered to conduct summer services this year. With Rabbi Priesand away for two months, we needed more of you than usual. Thank you one and all.

In the fall we have decided to include some new elements in our regular Sabbath services in the spirit of experimentation and in response to requests

from congregants. We are excited to begin the experimental period with the addition of a "hakafah" or Torah processional. This lovely ceremonial practice brings the Torah down into the congregation where it is carried through the sanctuary so that everyone can feel its presence in our midst and touch it if they choose. We think the hakafah will further elevate the spirituality of our service and deepen our sense of community. Later, we will ask if you would like hakafah to continue.

Another element we plan to introduce is the singing of Aleinu in Hebrew in place of the Adoration in English. Besides being requested by some congregants, this liturgical practice has become more and more common in Reform congregations across America. If you find learning and chanting the Aleinu rewarding or distracting, we will want to know about it. Stay tuned.

On another front, we have been having discussions with Temple Beth Miriam in Elberon about buying gravesites in their cemetery in Neptune. The Ritual Committee will be sending a flyer later this season asking you to state your interest in having cemetery plots nearby. This has been a recurrent issue in our Temple but we have never found just the right situation to offer you. Details are not available yet, but feel free to call me for further information.

Finally, the High Holydays are near. Your Information Packets will arrive shortly so you can begin planning for services. Please note the deadlines for Memorial Book entries, extra tickets, babysitting needs, etc. Also, be aware that we have purchased additional copies of the *Gates of Repentance* but the new additions contain gender-neutral language. Don't be surprised if your book has slightly different words than those in the books around you.

I hope everyone has had a lovely summer. The Adult Ed Committee has been working on the illustrated-text page for the Temple calendar. This year's Theme of Shabbat has been a particular delight to work on. Committee members Bill Kurry, Gloria Hoffman, Ayse Dilber, Jay Wiesenfeld, Norma Kohn and Gerald Reisner did some fine work on the topic for their particular month. When you receive your calendar, please note the beautiful graphics produced by Joel Morgovsky.

Among the reading that I have done this summer are two books I want to recommend. Roger Kamenetz' The Jew in the Lotus is a personal account of the 1990 meeting between a contingent of American Jews and the Dalai Lama in Dharamsala, India. The leader in exile of Tibetan Buddhists, the Dalai Lama, is a highly regarded spiritual teacher and the winner in 1989 of the Nobel Peace Prize. Kamenetz tells us that it was also in 1989 that he first looked towards the Jewish people for assistance with a condition they shared; "Tell me your secret," he said, "the secret of Jewish spiritual survival in exile." What follows is part fascinating travelogue, part examination of the personalities involved and an entirely intriguing discussion of different religious sensibilities. It may get a little thick in places, but is worth slogging through.

The other book was recommended to me by Rabbi Priesand. Finding Joy; A Practical Spiritual Guide to Happiness reveals some gentle and pleasant ways to let go of some of the stress that often seems to take over. The author, Dannel I. Schwartz, looks to the teachings of the Kabbalah "as a basis of happiness in the context of Jewish mystical tradition." Filled with charming stories and easy to follow exercises, Finding Joy... manages to make the sometimes esoteric and dense cabalistic philosophies easily accessible. Both books are available in our wonderful Temple library.

The Adult Ed Committee is pleased to begin a mentoring program for anyone who would like some assistance with the Hebrew prayers in our services. If you find it difficult to recite along with the congregation, we will match you with another MRT member to work privately with you or create a small group in which to study. Please let me know if this program interests you. Give me a call at 747-6184.

Now there may be others claiming the mantle of pluralism and religious freedom. ARZA is the authentic voice of Reform and Progressive Judaism. Deliver a strong, clear and unmistakable message to the Israeli political and religious establishments that you believe in religious freedom and democracy.

When you receive your ballot for the World Zionist Congress elections, look for the ARZA slate (slate 3), mark it and return your ballot.

Fight back for your rights as a Jew.

RELIGIOUS SCHOOL NOTES

where parents set the example

OPENING DAY - SEPTEMBER 7 BACK-TO-SCHOOL MEETING - 10:30 AM

Is there a better way to set a positive example for your children than by volunteering as a family for one of the MITZVAH DAY projects? We sometimes forget that Reform Judaism is more than study or prayer. Its tenets call for social action. TIKKUN OLAM (to heal the world) is a fundamental teaching which mandates that we work toward a perfect world for all. Formal classes will not be conducted on MITZVAH DAY; however, participation in the program is required for school attendance credit on September 21

The Religious School's annual tzdakah cam-paign is a second area in which parents can easily set positive examples for their children. Over the years tzdakah has become erroneously understood as the commandment to make charitable contributions. For the record tzdakah encompasses the larger meaning of righteousness, not specifically the giving of money or goods to charity. Every Sunday children contribute money to their class' tzdakah collection. Students tend to bring less and less tzdakah to Religious School as they reach the higher grades. The Confirmation class is the exception to this trend. Parents in the younger grades make sure that their children have money for the tzdakah envelope. For some reason, parents take this responsibility less seriously as their children reach grades 6, 7, 8, and 9. Hopefully, this reminder will help the four very worthy charities sponsored by the older grades.

Mitzvah day and tzdakah bring to mind that Religious School is a place where ethics are taught. As a public school teacher in NYC, I have found that many teachers are reluctant to involve their classes in discussions centering on issues of right and wrong. Some teachers prefer sticking to their curriculum to avoid any conflicts with a parent over what and how morality should be taught to children.

Religious school is the place for lessons on morality. The Torah and the books of prophets contain stories involving right and wrong, truth and deceit. It is our job to discuss difficult issues with Religious School students. I urge parents to accept the challenge of dealing with the subjects that we teach in Religious School. Do it when the children are young and will talk easily to you. Develop the rapport now so that when they reach high school and college, your children will be accustomed to talking with you about sensitive issues.

A new school year is here and, as always, there will be some changes. Betsy Millman has been appointed as the principal of Temple Beth Torah in Ocean Township. We wish her well. It will seem empty to open the school year without Betsy in Room 4 where she has been with "her" second graders for so many years. (The second grade's annual trip to Israel will not be the same without Mrs. Millman as the tour guide.)

Also, we welcome Lea Ghidali to the sixth grade Hebrew program in our school. Lea brings to MRT extensive religious school experience and is conversant in Hebrew and six other languages.

The Religious School Booklet is (almost) the last word on Temple policy and curriculum. Over the years, the Religious School Committee and I have tried to be as communicative as possible regarding policies, rules and curriculum. Religious School Committee meetings are always open to the casual visitor and/or new committee members. You need not be present to place your question, suggestion or concern on the committee's agenda, simply contact Susan St. Lifer, Committee chair, to be included.

As the Religious School continues to grow so does the wait for pick up at dismissal. Our dismissal system is certainly not perfect and Temple members are encouraged to come up with a better one. I must ask all drivers to pick up their riders at the rear of the parking lot. Do not park on Hance Avenue and then summon your child to meet you in front of the Temple. Certainly, do not back into the parking lot through the exit side to avoid the long line. Do not be the cause of an accident by beckoning your child to your car. A child dashing out to an impatient parent or grandparent will not look for moving vehicles. The Committee is concerned, as we all are, about our children's safety. The few drivers who break these rules will be confronted in the parking lot.

Our school has 30 sessions on Wednesday and 30 on Sunday. This year, Rabbi Priesand had an unusually difficult time meeting our contractual obligations to our teachers and still conclude the school year before Confirmation. I urge you to read the calendar carefully this year as you make plans to take winter holidays, visit relatives or take a long weekend with your families.

Students in grades 4 - 7 are permitted 12 absences and students in grades 8 and 9 are allowed 6. While a 20% absentee rate is generous, it does become very limiting for some families. School is in session the Wednesday before the NJEA weekend, but not in session on NJEA Sunday. The same is true for Thanksgiving weekend. And, school is in session the weekend of Martin Luther King's Birthday. The moral of this story is that days should not be taken off lightly. Soccer, basketball and little league are not viable excuses for excessive absences.

I hope to see and greet you on our first day.
