

Federation Update

FROM RABBI PRIESAND

A funny thing happened to me on the way to my sabbatical. As many of you know, I recently tripped and fell and fractured a tiny bone in my right elbow. Although I am incapacitated physically, I remain undaunted spiritually, grateful for your prayers and good wishes, and most especially, for the strength God has given me to cope with yet another medical challenge.

I plan to use the month of January for rest and recuperation. After all, that is the purpose of a sabbatical: a time for renewal and reflection on those things that should matter most. In Torah, sabbaticals were first ordained for the land. Every seven years the land was to lie fallow, replenishing its resources for the future. In the fiftieth year (that is, at the end of 7 x 7 years), the great shofar of freedom was sounded and every person was commanded to stop what he or she was doing, return home, and in a sense, begin again. The reason for these laws is quite clear: the whole world, and everything in it, belongs to God. Thus, we are instructed to let go in the seventh year, even as we do on the seventh day, thereby remembering our Creator and showing the same care and concern for our spiritual needs as we do for our physical ones.

I must admit that ever since my accident I've asked a lot of "what ifs," wondering how my sabbatical might be different if I had not fallen. But then I remembered a lesson I learned long ago. The English word life has in its middle the word "if," but the Hebrew word for life, chayim, has in its middle two yuds, which spell Adonai, the name of God. If we put God in the center of our lives, we challenge without feeling can meet any overwhelmed or dismayed, knowing that who we are and what we do and how we act matters to God and makes a difference in the world. I look forward to celebrating Shabbat with you in January from the pew rather than the pulpit, as together we pause and give thanks for the many blessings we have.

In the spirit of tzdakah, the Jewish Federation of Monmouth County will soon begin its annual fundraising campaign. Nearly 70% of the money raised stays right here in Monmouth County, benefiting local organizations like the Jewish Community Center, Jewish Family and Children's Services, the Brookdale Center for Holocaust Studies and other educational and humanitarian programs in our community including the Continuity Commission which has funded programming in our own religious school for the past two years.

The campaign also supports the work of the United Jewish Appeal. Recently, our Federation voted to allocate 25% of its overseas funding directly to UJA programs promoting pluralistic institutions in Israel. One example is the Shalom Hartman Institute. It is a Beit Midrash geared toward educating secular Israeli teachers on issues of diversity within Judaism. Another program is AMCHA, a support group for Holocaust survivors and their children in Israel.

On a national level, UJA has responded to our efforts for religious tolerance and Jewish unity in Israel by starting a supplemental campaign to raise \$10 million each for Reform and Conservative institutions in Israel. Two gifts were already pledged to benefit Israeli projects of the World Union of Progressive Judaism, the global umbrella organization of the Reform Movement. The first gift was \$500,000 to the Israel Education Fund for the construction of an Early Childhood Center in Jerusalem. The project's total cost will exceed \$1 million, the balance of which will be raised by the World Union of Progressive Judaism.

The second gift of \$250,000 came from New Jersey through UJA of MetroWest and will go toward the construction of a kindergarten in the Jerusalem suburb of Mevasseret Zion. This comes in response to the September arson of a Reform kindergarten that Rabbi Priesand spoke about.

FROM THE PRESIDENT

It is always difficult to recognize individual accomplishments when our entire organization depends on the volunteer efforts of dozens of people. However, I want to publicly acknowledge a few each month.

The past several weeks have required Rich Sachs and JoAnn Brousell-Kurry, the co-chairs of our construction committee, to put in inordinate hours of time, at the Temple, in conversations with the builder, and with construction consultants. Thanks to you and your committee members.

My thanks this month seem to be going to groups, because I want to acknowledge and thank the three co-chairs of the Arts Festival, Dolores Phillips, Bob Blank and Barbara Cobuzzi, who are the key players in putting together our single largest fund raiser. I should add that they are still looking for additional help. Please say "yes" when called to help.

Another pair that should be mentioned for recognition are Arlene Berg and Joanna Charnick. Their co-chair efforts on our scrip program is making it more successful each month. I also thank all the participants who will make it possible for Arlene and Joanna to turn over \$7,000 to the Temple.

These are just a few names who make it possible for Monmouth Reform Temple to be what it is.

Over 50 people attended the Planning Update/Open Forum on December 21 to learn about progress on our construction, search efforts for a new cantor, ideas about adding a Hebrew logo to our letterhead, and where we are today compared with predictions made by the 1994 Long Range Planning Committee. Following are some of the many questions and comments raised along with their responses: (Both have been edited for space.)

1.) When will the construction be done? <u>Answer</u>: We anticipate completion by the end of March. 2.) How is the financing going? <u>Answer</u>: We are on target with the budget to handle an \$80,000 a year mortgage. 3.) If the Temple continues to grow at its historical rate of 5%, where will we be in 5 years. <u>Answer</u>: 450 families.

4.) What will that mean? Answer: It may impact on our policy of individual Bar/Bat Mitzvah and it may require additional construction in the future. All these possibilities will require additional planning and discussion. 5.) Did the 1994 Planning Committee recommend curtailing our growth? Answer: No. 6.) Can we search for a vested cantor and a student cantor at the same time? Answer: No. 7.) What is our time table? Answer: We want to select a vested full-time cantor by February 15. If that's not possible, we will then approach the School of Sacred Music for a new student cantor for the Fall. This would be done around March 1, 8.) Can we afford a full-time cantor? Answer: The Finance Committee has concluded that we can. 9.) Why do we need to change our name? It has served us well for over 30 years. Answer: There is no recommendation to change our name. 10.) Why add a Hebrew logo to our letterhead? Answer: Some people in the community confuse Monmouth Reform Temple with a Christian church or other organizations. Also, many members of our Temple feel the use of Hebrew would enhance our identity and say a little more about who we are as a congregation. 11.) Do some of these things being discussed today need formal congregational approval? Answer: The purpose of this particular forum was to get feedback and ideas. The Board will certainly review our constitution to check for the necessity of approval and, if any formal special meetings need to be convened, they will probably take place early next year.

This month I will be appointing a nominating committee for our 1998-99 elections. If there is anyone interested in serving on that committee or on the Board, please contact me.



Ritual Committee



Greetings from the Ritual Committee.

The Ritual Committee is working very hard to bring a full-time Cantor to Monmouth Reform Temple. We have filed an application with the Joint Cantorial Placement Commission announcing our intention to add a full-time vested Cantor to our professional staff and the JCPC has placed notice of our application in their bulletin. As I write this we have received applications from cantors who are interested in us. A Cantorial Search Committee has been formed and we expect to hold telephone interviews very soon.

All of us on the Ritual Committee are fully committed to the full-time Cantor project. Our congregation has grown and is growing at a rate that makes it increasingly difficult for Rabbi Priesand to meet all of the demands placed on her for religious observance, religious education, life-cycle events, social action and more. We need, and Rabbi Priesand needs a full professional partner to prepare Monmouth Reform Temple for the new millennium. Now is the perfect time to make this extremely important decision on behalf of our congregation and the Committee is doing everything it can to achieve this goal. Stay tuned for further news.

Not long ago, the Asbury Park Press ran an article under the headline "Going to church or Temple found a healthy habit." It reported on two studies carried out at Rutgers and Yale Universities which showed that attending services regularly is correlated with improved physical and psychological well-being in older adults. "Attendance (at religious services) ... was associated with better overall health practices, more friends and relatives, more social activities and higher levels of well-being" the studies found. Another study performed at Duke University found that older adults who attend services regularly were twice as likely to have strong, stable immune systems than those who don't. By the way, the specific religious affiliation was not a determining factor in these researches.

So when you "Just Say Yes" to attending Shabbat services, serving on the Bema, hosting the Cantor, we can now say with more confidence than usual that it's good for you! Shalom



RELIGIOUS SCHOOL NOTES

Our building construction is an easy and obvious source for discord among our students, parents and teachers. Teaching and learning in the social hall requires special effort; the partitions cannot block out the sounds of three busy classes, especially when two of them involve early childhood youngsters. Sunday dismissal can try a parent's patience. And, having books and materials in storage is causing administrative embarrassments when books have to be replaced and important, but packed away, pieces of information cannot be located. (Since I cannot get to my spare books in the storage trailers, I desperately need any textbooks that you have on your shelves that have not been returned from years past--no questions asked.)

Through it all, your children have been wonderful. Attendance is around 91% on a daily basis, including the 8th and 9th grade classes meeting off site every Sunday. Discipline problems are practically non-existent. Our classes are humming along and Jewish education is taking place amidst the reconfiguration of our building. My thanks and congratulations to you and to your children for understanding that every idea has been explored to arrange our classrooms around the expansion schedule.

Report cards were distributed to grades 4 - 7 on Wednesday, December 10. As I mentioned in December's article, the most frequent teacher complaint is that students do not practice their Hebrew lessons enough at home. Parents do not have to be Hebraic to assist their children. Most prayers are transliterated in Gates of Prayer for you, not as a crutch for your child.

Although the sample is small (only kindergarten and first grade parents have participated as of this moment), our new volunteer system in the parking lot has been a definite success. The volunteers have taken on their duties with humor and upbeat attitudes--with your children being the beneficiaries. The parents make sure that children do not wander into the parking lot as cars are moving and they stop cars from entering the lot through the exit. Personally, I am grateful for the extra eyes. Thank you to all of the parents who have and will undertake the job of helping me during Sunday dismissal.

On December 5, class 6A conducted Shabbat services and our school's choir sang a beautiful Shabbat program in front of a congregation that appeared to be filled to capacity. Frankly, I expect children to do well on the bema. The children practice and rehearse in front of their teacher and Rabbi Priesand. Conducting Shabbat services is a classroom learning experience, but it is also an honor to stand before the congregation.

Class 6A did a masterful job. The children, who I thought to be weak Hebrew readers, were excellent and the class flowed through the service as a cohesive unit in control of their task. To Mrs. Ghidali and to the girls and boys in the class--I (we) am (are) very proud of you.

Without microphones, our school choir filled the sanctuary with song. Those in attendance tapped in time, hummed along and even mouthed a few bars along with the choir. The choir made us feel in touch with the Sabbath.

I am amazed as to how many pieces of mail I receive each day asking for a monetary contribution to charities known and unknown to me. If only I had the financial ability to respond to every request. Understanding your situation as I do, I must remind you that Tu B'shevat (the New Year for Trees) will be celebrated on February 11. The school customarily asks parents to purchase a tree in Israel through the Jewish National Fund in memorial or in honor of a family member or friend for \$10.00 per tree. I know that many of you have been generous in past campaigns-hopefully those of you not familiar with this holiday will purchase a tree after reading the enclosed flyer in this bulletin.
