

REFLECTIONS

Why are idols prohibited? Most think because God has no image, and therefore to fashion an image of God is sacrilege. But in his book "Seek My Face, Speak My Name," Arthur Green brings a beautiful teaching of Heschel's that explains idolatry differently.

Idols are forbidden. Heschel says, because there exists an image of God; it is found in every human being. So there is only one medium in which one may fashion an image of God, and that is the medium of one's life. The message of the Torah is to make oneself a worthy image of God, and not to seek images of God in that which we create.

As images of God we are given a sacred task. The task is to reflect that image in our lives each day. A mitzvah is a brushstroke; a well-lived life an invisible but indelible image. An idol is the work of our hands. An image begins in the work of one's heart.

Rabbi Akiva taught that God's love is not only that we were made in the divine image, but that God told us that we were made in the divine image. With such a privilege, why fashion idols?

FROM RABBI PRIESAND

The recent execution of Karla Faye Tucker raises important questions about the wisdom of perpetuating capital punishment, not because she was a woman, but because she was a human being, created in God's image. Her numerous television appearances in the weeks before her death put a particularly human face on those condemned to die, forcing us all to think about what it means to take a human life and asking us to consider whether those on death row are capable of redemption or simply beyond hope. The United States of America is one of the few countries in the civilized world that continues to carry out the death penalty. Most European nations consider it barbaric.

Many people base their support for capital punishment on religion or the bible, without recognizing that passages written thousands of years ago have evolved over time. At its highest level, religion does not call for retribution or revenge. True, Torah lists several actions that had as their consequence the death penalty: murder, kidnaping, certain sexual crimes, idolatry, public desecration of the Sabbath and even striking one's parents or insulting them. In fact, the punishment for a rebellious child was to take him to the gate of the city and stone him to death. Reference to capital punishment is not unusual in biblical law; it was a way of underlining the severity of the crime.

We know, however, that the Rabbis had a deep aversion to the death penalty. In the Mishnah we read that a Sanhedrin (the high court of Jewish law) which executes a criminal once in seven years is known as murderous. Rabbi Elazar ben Azariah said: "Once in seventy years." Rabbi Tarfon and Rabbi Akiba said: "If we had been members of the Sanhedrin, no one would ever have been executed." These comments, and others like them, reflect how reluctant the Rabbis were to impose capital punishment even if it was preceded by due process of law. In fact, they added so many conditions surrounding a sentence of death that it could hardly be carried out in practice.

Many people believe that capital punishment is a deterrent to crime. That might be so, but only if executions were done publicly, if children were taken to see them, if our entire country watched on television, stopped what it was doing every time a person was executed and accepted responsibility for the sentence that was being carried out. There is no lesson in executing a person without providing a clear understanding of what that execution involves.


Every time a person is executed I find myself pondering the question: how does killing people who kill people teach that killing people is wrong? I always remember an article I read once about Sister Helen Prejean, the author of DEAD MAN WALKING. She listened while a friend explained to his child why those on death row had to be killed. Her friend, a lawyer, said that because they had taken someone's life, they had to be executed by state officials. And the child asked: "So who kills them?" It seems to me that killing people is wrong, whether it is done by individuals or by the government.

On Friday evening, March 13th, Rabbi Priesand will report on the recent demographic study commissioned by the Jewish Federation of Greater Monmouth County. Its results are fascinating and particularly relevant as we plan for the future. Among its findings:

- *Monmouth County is the 22nd largest Jewish community in America
- *48% of Jews living here belong to a synagogue
- *Most newcomers settle in Western Monmouth County
- *Of those who send their children to private school, most attend a Jewish Day School





One of the most important aspects of my membership in Monmouth Reform Temple and its Social Action Committee for the past three years has been the opportunity which I have had to volunteer at nursing homes. My favorite project is the Jewish Sabbath service that I conduct each month at Applewood Estates Continuing Care Retirement Community in Freehold. The outlay of time and effort is very small when compared to the personal satisfaction I receive from doing this mitzvah. The people who attend the service are always grateful that someone has taken the time to come. In some very small way, I feel that I am part of Tikkun Olam, repairing the world. I like to think of my Applewood group as one tiny corner of the world which I make a little better because I am there.

We are pleased to report that this project is being expanded and that you, too, may experience the joy of performing this mitzvah. Max Singer and Bernie Brandwene have been conducting services on the fourth Friday of each month at Brighton Gateway, Avante, and Monmouth Gardens. Extended Care. Ayse Dilber has now become part of this group and we would like to add more nursing homes to our list. The service itself only takes about 15 minutes. It is nice to add a personal touch with a short reading or a few remarks. The service is contained in a booklet we have prepared, complete with English transliterations of the Hebrew. You do not have to be able to read Hebrew. You do not need a lovely singing voice. All you need is a little time to share with others to brighten their world as well as yours. Purim is almost upon us. Our annual Purim covered dish dinner is scheduled for March 11 at 5:45 PM. Following the dinner at 7:00 PM, Rabbi Priesand will conduct the Megillah Reading. In anticipation of a large attendance at the Megillah Reading, I ordered 2 gross of groggers for your children to use at the mention of Haman's name.

Our annual Purimspeil and carnival will be held on March 15 in our Temple's sanctuary and social hall. At the carnival, there will be a small charge to play the games. All proceeds go to support our Temple youth groups. Our Religious School Players, namely our teachers, will dramatize the Purim story and I have the distinction of portraying the man everyone loves to hate—Haman. The Purimspeil will begin by 9:40 am and the carnival will commence at 10:30 and end around 12:30 PM.

Closely following Purim is our model seder on April 5. With Religious School held in the Tinton Falls School, I am especially looking forward to the family atmosphere that is always present when the entire school celebrates Passover together. The model seder is a large undertaking. We expect to provide seder plates for approximately 210-230 students. Please volunteer to help set-up and cleanup by contacting Ilene Saporta, 530-7307. In mid-March each class will receive its model seder food responsibility. By contributing part of the seder meal, each child, in a small way, becomes a host and guest.

We were fortunate to secure the hospitality of the Tinton Falls School as our construction project continues toward completion. The overall response from teachers and students has been very positive. But we are visitors and must understand that we are an intrusion to those teachers who would ordinarily remain after school on Wednesdays to work on lessons or beautify their rooms. These teachers take pride in their rooms; therefore, keep your children's snacks as mess free as possible. Please show your appreciation to the Tinton Falls staff by writing thank you notes or contacting the principal, John Lichtenberg, to give a personal word of gratitude.

Classes will be conducted at Tinton Falls School for all March sessions except March 11th, 15th and 29th. The Purim dinner and Megillah reading preempts classes on March 11 and the Purimspeil and carnival will be held at Temple on March 15 as mentioned in paragraph 3. No class on March 29 due to the Festival of the Arts. In addition, classes will be held at the Tinton Falls School on Wednesday, April 1. I will keep you informed if construction considerations cause us to hold classes after April 1 at the Tinton Falls School.

Our dismissal procedure at the school has been very successful. Park your cars in the school's parking lot to the left of the building and pick up your children in the cafeteria.

As I walked around the Tinton Falls School on a recent Wednesday afternoon, my anticipation of our completed school wing initiated thoughts as to how our curriculum should be altered to meet the Jewish educational needs of our students. Religious School educators must look ahead and not remain in the past rooted to ever present fears of anti-semitism and Jewish cultural bias. And, our school must meet the needs and considerations of interfaith families, learning disabled and gifted students, and eventually the needs of the physically challenged.

I strongly encourage Temple members to contact me with your curriculum suggestions. In fact, many of our past changes have resulted from parental recommendations.
