REFLECTIONS

Creating traditions aren't limited to the Shabbat dinner table or the Passover Seder. Every moment of Jewish life is an opportunity to teach our children and to share traditional values.

When my children were learning to drive, we discussed at length how the car was to be used. Certainly, they would be using the car for their own purposes. However, with freedom comes responsibility and my husband and I wanted our children to understand their roles as members of a family and a community.

First, we talked about the rules of the road. Because of a lifetime as Jews, they certainly understood the concept of rules: rules of kashrut (Jewish dietary observance), rules of Shabbat, the 10 commandments. They weren't small children anymore but there's nothing like a car to drive home issues regarding (no pun intended) the responsibility, laws, and community. One rule was imposed of which I am most proud: in order to be entitled to drive the car for their own social needs. the children were required to use the car at least once each week to perform an act of tzedakah or charity. They had to perform an act of community service at some point during the week. To their surprise, neither child found this a difficult requirement to fulfill. As active members of school clubs and youth groups, they found they didn't need to perform this act alone. They visited the home for the elderly, took food to the food bank, collected charitable items and found other creative ways to fulfill this requirement.

In the process, we talked a lot about tzedakah, and created another tradition, which I still follow to this day. We created lunch bags, usually three at a time, which were kept in the car. Each paper bag had a small can of tuna fish with a flip top lid; a juice pack; a small can of fruit cocktail or applesauce with an easily removable lid; a package of crackers; and a disposable fork and napkin. Whenever individuals asking for charity approached us at street corners, we gave them a bag of lunch. Every time, the offering was accepted with gratitude. We learned that tzedakah can be cheerfully given, that there was value in being prepared, and that our car should be an instrument for doing good deeds as well as pleasure.

A Note from Cantor Daniel M. Rosenfeld

Alas, another High HolyDay season has passed and we have survived. We now enter into the regular yearly cycle of events and celebrations, in particular the Festivals or, as they're known in Hebrew, *Shalosh R'galim*, taken from Chapter 23 of the book of Exodus: "Three times a year you shall hold a festival for me." I will be discussing these holidays as they approach, paying special attention to the music and liturgy accompanying them. The festival days are *Sukkot, Pesach, and Shavuot*. The phrase *Shalosh R'galim* is a direct quote from the passage in Exodus 23 in which the Israelites are commanded to make pilgrimage on their *r'galim* or "legs" to Jerusalem in commemoration of these special times.

Now you have already heard me discuss nusach on several occasions, nusach being the specific set of tunes and melodies that accompany each holiday and festival. Sukkot is no exception. Just as in the other holidays, certain prayers and passages are sung to certain tunes so as to identify the holiday. Also, just as in other holidays, Sukkot contains special liturgy to mark the time of the year, corresponding most significantly with the agricultural cycle which, in turn, corresponds with the flow of seasons. On the eighth day of Sukkot, the Cantor traditionally leads the congregation in a special prayer for rain known as Geshem during the Musaf service. Musaf is the part of the service hearkening back to the time when additional sacrifices were performed in the Temple. There is great historical significance attached to the prayer for rain in the land of Israel as it is predominantly a desert and contains an arid to semi-arid climate throughout except in the North. This shows not only the awareness, but the dependence of the ancient Israelites on the regular changes of the seasons in their land.

On a different note, I would like to extend my profound gratitude to all of you for your concern and consideration during my illness. You have all shown yourselves to be a community of genuine care and kindness. I truly appreciate it. Believe me when I say that no one is more anxious than I to get back into "the swing of things." I am hoping that this happens as soon as absolutely possible. From my heart, Thank You. B'shalom v'ahavah,

FROM THE PRESIDENT

TEMPLE REPORT STATE OF THE CONTINUED... My daughter pointed out to me that I neglected to give some statistics in my High HolyDay speech. I told her I was sure no one ever remembers numbers from Yom Kippur speeches, so here are a few in writing.

The Temple membership now stands at 364. This is an increase of 14 over last year. The number of children in our religious school is 236, compared to 220 in 1997-98. The number of students confirmed in May was 6 and next May we expect 12. The Temple family celebrated 22 B'nai Mitzvot in 1997-98 and has 25 scheduled for 1998-99. The school wing now contains 14 classrooms along with the library and several offices. During the day, 4 rooms are used for our nursery school program. While the Temple is a family, it is also an organization with income and expenses. Our budget for this year reflects a matching increase for income and expenses of 19% over last year. To teach our children, minister to us, maintain our building and grounds and write the checks, we employ 38 people, the majority of whom are part-timers.

If you want to know more than this, come to a Board meeting or better yet join a committee.

2ND ANNUAL MITZVAH DAY-A SUCCESS

Monmouth Reform Temple's Second Annual Mitzvah Day held on October 4th drew on the experiences of last year's program and achieved a new level of success! Nearly 500 people (mostly religious school students and their parents) from the membership ranks of Monmouth Reform Temple, participated in 27 community service projects both at the Temple and various off-site locations. The goal of Mitzvah Day is to provide an opportunity for all Temple members to participate in community service as part of *Tikkun Olam*, repairing the world. For the parents of our religious school students, it was an opportunity to participate with their children in this important endeavor.

The day's activities commenced with a brief service led by Rabbi Sally Priesand with music under the leadership of Cantor Rosenfeld and Lisa Goodall. All assembled were then divided into smaller groups to work on the projects which the participants had chosen.

At the Temple, the projects varied from stuffing envelopes for non-profit organizations to the physical work of painting shelves for the nursery school, gardening to beautify the Temple grounds and the decoration of the Temple sukkah. One of the projects worked on at the Temple was the assembly and decoration of tzdakah boxes. Each Temple family is to have its own tzdakah box. If you have not picked yours up, please arrange to do so at the Temple office. The hope is that each Friday evening before the Shabbat meal, the family will place some money into the tzdakah box. From time to time, the family should decide to what charity the funds will be contributed. Certainly, donations to the funds within the Temple are always appreciated.

Projects off-site included trail and stream clean-up, a nursing home visit at Shrewsbury Manor Nursing Home, dog walking at the A.S.P.C.A. in Tinton Falls, story telling and singing at the Count Basie Learning Center in Red Bank, painting classroom walls at the Monmouth Day Care Center and collecting donations of canned goods at various food stores. The Temple was also represented at the sale/auction of birdhouses at Brookdale Community College for the benefit of Habitat for Humanity.

The event closed with the Temple's annual picnic. Everyone had a chance to share with one another what Mitzvah Day had meant to them.

RELIGIOUS SCHOOL NOTES

Where parents set the example ...



Steven Hayet is a special kind of sixth grade student. He took the concept of mitzvah to a higher level and, therefore has earned my praise and respect. Last spring, Steven and a

friend organized a bike-a-thon to raise funds for the Ronald McDonald House. Obstacles were put in their path before they could even begin the project. The organizational process required meetings with the Ronald McDonald officials, local police and the township administrator. The boys had to apply for insurance from the charitable organization and submit various applications along the way. In addition, they had to design flyers, pledge sheets, rule sheets and two course levels. Finally, the bike-athon was set for June 14, 1998. After months of preparation, meetings and telephone calls, rain forced the event's cancellation.

As in all MRT stories, this one had a happy ending. The boys printed new flyers announcing a rescheduled date and delivered them from door to door. After Religious School on September 13, Bike-a-Thon '98 was held and raised \$90.00 for the Ronald McDonald House.

My congratulations to Steven and his friend for demonstrating that *Tikkun olam*, repairing the world, is an ongoing process and certainly extends beyond the walls of MRT. In future articles, I hope to bring to your attention the efforts of other students (and their families) as they make the world slightly better for all of us.

It is no secret that Jewish education is not restricted to our Religious School. Summer is only nine months down the calendar road. Allow me to make my annual suggestion that you include a Jewish resident site if you are considering a sleepaway camp experience for your children. My preference is our UAHC sponsored facility, Camp Harlam, located in Pennsylvania. My three children attended Camp Harlam and I enthusiastically endorse this program. The camp has superb facilities, an experienced, well-trained staff, and a carefully put together daily set of activities. Services are under gorgeous summer evening skies and Shabbat is enjoyed on relaxed July and August Saturdays. I encourage you to ask me for an application.

Mitzvah Day, attended by approximately 500 Temple members, was a superb way for students to gain a better understanding of *Tikkun olam* and far more practical than anything our children could learn about the performance of mitzvot in our classrooms. I was extremely impressed with the event's organization and the cooperation of your children as they took part in the activities. Students did not look around for things to do; they understood why they were at Temple on Mitzvah Day. They quickly joined another project when theirs was completed. Next year, I anticipate 600 members participating.

Our Temple's annual Jewish Book Fair is another opportunity for Jewish education beyond our classrooms. Our library volunteers, Roz Reisner and Shelley Gordon, always create a real treat for book lovers. A book display will be available for review and purchase beginning Wednesday, November 18 and extending through Jewish Book Month Shabbat on November 20. The sale concludes on Sunday, November 22.

Roz and Shelley have arranged for a guest author to talk about her recent book about Ellis Island. Students in grades 3 through 7 will attend this assembly.

We were unable to use the Federation of Greater Monmouth County's grant during our construction period last year. The grant was intended to expose our students to Jewish cultural events and the first offering will be the Avodah Dance Group on December 13. Other grant-sponsored programs will be announced in future Bulletin articles.

Jewish education is a team process and parents are certainly an integral part. I encourage and implore all parents to become involved in our Religious School by making their suggestions in writing, joining our Religious Education Committee, becoming teachers in our Religious School or adding their names to our substitute teacher list.
